



CORONERS INQUESTS



Odstock Parish

1803 – Nathaniel Eastman

“And on the same day (*Monday*), he (*Mr Whitmarsh*) took an inquest at Odstock, on the body of Nathaniel Eastman, a butcher, who died on his return home from Salisbury market the Saturday evening preceding. The Jury also here returned Verdict –“Visitation of God.”

Salisbury and Winchester Journal 19 Dec 1803

1804 – George White

Salisbury. On Sunday evening, the inst. George White, Odstock, attempting cross the meadows from Downton, fell into one of the hatches, and was drowned. His body was found on Wednesday, and an inquest being taken, the verdict was Accidental Death,- White, a young man, of good character, was shortly to have been married. The accident is attributed solely to the darkness of the night.”

Salisbury and Winchester Journal 12 March 1804

1835 – Charles Budden

Inquests - At Fisherton Anger. The body of Charles Budden, nearly four years old, who received a kick from a horse at Odstock. He was taken to the Salisbury Infirmary, and died soon afterwards. Verdict, Accidental death.”
