From The Editors

Recently the village has been hit with the news that the development of 700 houses at Ridgeway Farm has been approved after appeal, despite opposition from all the Councils concerned. This decision seems unreasonable because it relies on an outdated, even revoked, housing strategy. It seems irrational because, whereas this Inspector did not find a five-year supply of housing that might suggest that this development was simply not needed, other Inspectors did find such a supply for North Wiltshire – both cannot be correct. A further key complaint against the finding is that it seems irresponsible because the Inspector readily acknowledges that the decision also relies on the Government's economic growth policy being kick-started by construction – which is simply not proper planning.

While local disgruntlement will probably rumble on into the New Year, Christmas is a good time to be thankful for living in our caring community. Yet again, this issue of your magazine contains several thank-you messages for increasingly different ways of helping others.

Most years, Christmas can create lots of cheerful and colourful accoutrements but soon afterwards, when their reason has been run, just throwing them away often seems rather wasteful. This month on page-32 you will find helpful suggestions for re-using and recycling many left-overs.

Christmas is also a traditional time for church-going and our new vicar, Revd Ian Tweedie-Smith is offering a Taster Evening to introduce a Christianity Explored course starting in January; details on <u>page 15</u>. Also, St Mary's church is seeking a part time Parish Administrator to support the Vicar and Curate as well as providing general office duties for the Parish.

In a lovely reminder of the origins of Christmas, a baby was recently born in most unusual circumstances – in the Shetland Coastguard helicopter some 1,000 feet up in the air. A doctor on Unst, the most northerly inhabited island of the UK, called for assistance in the early hours, long before the first ferry. The baby boy will have a very interesting 'place of birth' on his certificate – it is thought that it might be a navigational fix rather than either the place of take-off or landing. The pilot also had to increase the number of passengers on the flight list from his initial report when taking off – much to the amusement of flight control.

We hope that your Christmastide is just as exciting, if not quite so dramatic.

Parish Council News

Parish and Neighbourhood Plans – the Parish Plan is now progressing well, having had its first feedback meeting on 12 December. This is an important project and the more people that get involved the better as the end result needs to reflect the views of as many people as possible within the community.



As you may be aware we are also starting work on preparing a Neighbourhood Plan for Purton. The overall plan will include some other parishes within the Northern Area Board boundary. It will be interesting to see what shared problems there are across the parish borders. Purton has always had close links with the Lydiards given their closeness to Purton so this joint approach will hopefully prove to be beneficial and will also give a better insight into some of the villages that lie further afield. The group is called the North East Wiltshire Villages (NEW-V). One major bonus with this joint project is that it is being funded by Central Government and Wiltshire Council as part of what is called a frontrunner Vanguard Scheme. What we need to ensure is that local people take an interest and get involved with the development of this plan.

The Parish Plan work will feed into the Neighbourhood Plan and given that the information in the Parish Plan is up-to-date it will be very useful. The Neighbourhood Plan will become an important planning document. Before it can be adopted however it will need the support of local residents through a referendum. Fifty percent of those who vote in the referendum must support the plan for it to go the next stage which will be a public inquiry. A Planning Inspector will then determine if the plan can be adopted. As you can see this is not a piece of work to be entered into lightly. The involvement of the Community is essential, therefore you will be invited to attend a workshop on Saturday 23 February 2013 in the Village Hall. More details will be included in next month's Magazine report about this event. We hope that as many people as possible will attend to give their support to the project.

Cllr Nick Simpkins – sadly we said goodbye to one of our Councillors recently, namely Nick Simpkins. who has moved away from Purton. We hope Nick and his wife have now settled into their new home.

There will be a Parish Council election in May 2013, however if anybody would like to join the Council before then to get an idea of what is involved in being a Purton Parish Councillor, you can write to the Council including details about yourself and the Council will consider your application at its next meeting. If you would like to know more you can get an information pack from the Council Office.

Ridgeway Farm Appeal – no doubt you will have already heard that the Planning Inspector has approved the outline planning application for around 700 dwellings at Ridgeway Farm. The Parish Council is bitterly disappointed with this outcome as it will have a significant impact on our community particularly with increased traffic both through the village and on the rural roads across the parish.

Projector, Screen and Laptop – The Parish Council has been successful in securing funding for a projector, screen and laptop for use by the community. If you

would like to hire these items then please contact the Parish Council office.

Purton Cemetery – If you have visited the cemetery lately you may have noticed that our groundstaff have been working in the Garden of Remembrance. At the moment the area is looking rather sad as we have removed the grass and dug over the borders but it will not be too long before it is rejuvenated and we hope it will prove to be a very worthwhile project providing a pleasant, peaceful place for people to visit.

- N12/02216/FUL *Malfords, Locks Lane, Purton*, First floor extension to bungalow to form two-storey dwelling.
- N12/02351/FUL *Hafawey, Hoggs Lane*, Replace single storey garage with two-storey extension.

The following planning applications have been taken to appeal by their respective applicants:

- N12/02351/FUL Hafawey, Hoggs Lane, Purton Replace single storey garage with two-storey extension. The appeal will be determined on the basis of written representation.
- N12/01862/FUL Caerhays, The Hyde, Purton, Detached dwelling and garage with formation of new access at Caerhays.

Swindon Dial A Ride & Community Transport - A Lifeline Service!

Swindon Dial A Ride provides door-to-door transport for people of any age who are unable to use existing public transport due to a temporary or permanent impairment or disability. Community Transport provides a vehicle hire service for local community groups.

Our fleet of fully accessible minibuses travel throughout the Swindon Borough including Purton and the Lydiards. The Dial A Ride Bus service can be used for a variety of purposes, such as traveling to work or training, going shopping or social activities like the cinema or bingo. The service runs Monday to Saturday 9 am to 5 pm; to book a journey simply call at 10 am the day before you would like to travel.

To use Dial A Ride you will need to register with us. For a FREE registration pack or further information please telephone 01793 616050 after 12 noon.

Community Transport has a range of wheelchair accessible minibuses that any voluntary or community group in the local area can hire. Perhaps you run a scout group or a senior citizens club? The minibus would allow you to take your group on a day trip or longer, maybe to the seaside or for a cream tea at the local garden centre.

Additionally, we have an Access Car available for hire to individuals, small groups or families where one member has a disability. It is particularly suitable for people who need to travel in their wheelchair. The hired vehicles can be used to travel anywhere in mainland Britain and could mean that a family member or friend can join you on a weekend break or summer holiday.

Mrs Stella Hunt of Witts Lane. She has not been in the best of health for the last eight years after suffering two mini-strokes with husband Roy became her main



husband Roy became her main carer. As you know, Roy died a few months ago and you do not know how people react to such news, especially when they rely on that person so much. Although the whole family were very caring with love and attention to Stella, as much as they tried, they were no substitute for Rov.

Stella was born in Reading then the family moved to Leckhamstead, Berks, a little later where she enjoyed life, making her own pleasures one of which was cycling. I do not mean cycling around her home town but cycling to places like Leicester, North Wales and Southampton. She was also a very talented lady performing in local concert parties around various halls, singing and dancing. You do not think about people doing things like that when they were younger, but when you consider the type of person Stella was I bet she was the star of the show. It makes you think back to one's younger days - I can remember in Purton there were three such parties, like Sid Spiller's party - he was also heavily involved with the Recreation Hut and was a special constable. Mrs Webb of the Peak had a very talented family group who entertained - her eldest daughter Muriel eventually took over the running of this group. Mrs Purnell, who later became Mrs Sheppard and was Matron at the Childrens' Home in Restrop Road (or was it Wootton Bassett Road in those days) also ran a concert party. Believe it or not, I was in one or two of these parties at times! Sorry I got carried away with my memories.

Stella met Roy in 1954 and they were married in 1956 at Brightwalton, coming to Purton in 1962 by which time they had two daughters. Stella started work in Littlewoods but you know what they say about new surroundings, new house, well it happened to Roy and Stella - David came along. Later on Stella returned to Littlewoods where she stayed until she retired. On her retirement, she loved doing the garden – you could tell that when going past the house – the garden was always neat and tidy, then she would relax with a good book for a well earned rest I would think. After Stella suffered her strokes, our minibus was her source of transport to the doctors etc. The drivers all said what a pleasure it was to take her. She coped very well really with losing Roy and the family were very good, taking her to their homes and giving her loving care but, as I have already said, you cannot make up for a husband as hard as you try. To the family I would say you all did your best and our thoughts are with you all. You certainly put a smile on your mum's face.

We are so lucky in Purton to have a lady such as the person whose picture was on the front of last month's magazine. Sheila and I had the honour of being invited to Pauline Ward's presentation of her richly deserved award of the MBE by the Lord-Lieutenant of Wiltshire. Pauline's one thought in life is trying to help other people and make their lives easier, never thinking about herself. It was a lovely village occasion, held in the Red House Club, where everyone was made most welcome. We saw people we hadn't seen for years socially and it was good to have

a chat and catch up. Pauline was able to socialise and speak to everyone as did the Lord-Lieutenant – a very gracious lady – who had a word with all the guests. What a great ambassador she will be for Wiltshire.

Pauline did have the chance to go to Windsor Castle to receive the honour and was offered transport and an escort but she chose to be presented with the award in Purton amongst her friends. I am sure she will look back on it with pride. Pauline has got a lot of good friends who put on this celebration for her and could I thank you all on behalf of the guests – you put on a buffet fit for a queen, which in our eyes Pauline is. The organisation was perfect – I am not going to mention names as it is easy to forget people but thank you – you did her proud!

The parties we have held appeared to be enjoyed by all – the first one was the 'less able' party in the Silver Threads. We decorated the hall the night before and we leave these decorations up for all to enjoy over the festive season. It looked really lovely, especially when the tables were all laid and decorated. The only down-side was the weather but, once inside the hall with a glass of sherry, it was all warm with a lovely cosy atmosphere, good food and entertainment by *The Jolly Roger*. What more do you want except perhaps a visit by Father Christmas if he wasn't too busy. Mum used to cut chicken, slice eggs and spread mayonnaise on the same cutting board with the same knife and no bleach, but we didn't get food poisoning. She also used to defrost mince-meat on the kitchen sink AND I used to eat some raw sometimes, too. Our school sandwiches were wrapped in wax paper, in a brown paper bag, not in icepack coolers, but I can't remember anybody getting E.coli.

Almost all of us would have rather gone swimming in the river or local pond instead of a pristine pool (talk about boring).

We all played sport, and also did PE ... and risked permanent injury with a pair of plimsolls (only worn in the gym or the sports ground) instead of having cross-training athletic shoes with air cushion soles and built-in light reflectors. I can't recall any injuries but they must have happened, because they tell us how much safer we are now ...

How did we ever survive?

News about St Mary's Church

In September 2011 St Mary's applied for the temporary removal of two pews at the front of the nave to be made permanent. Some in Purton objected to this and the issue was send to the Chancellor of the Diocese of Bristol for adjudication. The Chancellor has now agreed a compromise solution. This is that the two pews and associated panel currently in storage will be returned to the church and modified to make them removable as and when necessary, a heater currently sitting in a cut pew at the front of the nave will be re-sited and the pew restored, and the front of the nave will be re-carpeting. We will now appoint contractors to carry out this work. The Chancellor has also agreed to the provision of a plaque to mark the grave of Sir Nevil Maskelyne.

Those in Purton who have attended services recently will know that the sound system has become unreliable. The Parochial Church Council asked a specialist consultant for advice and he has designed a new audio/visual system for the church. This will enhance the quality of the amplified sound and reduce the risk of feedback. The design retains the hearing loop and has the option of plugging in additional equipment to enhance its capability to meet the needs of worship that includes instruments and singing groups. However, when this equipment is not needed it can be unplugged and stored away, so that it does not impact on the building. What will change is that the six speakers currently mounted around the nave will be replaced by four speakers high-up at the front of the nave. It is also planned to install a woofer speaker for low frequencies in a space behind the pulpit steps.

There is also a need to make provision for projected images in church. For example when Bishop Lee came for a confirmation service last year, he asked for a projector screen and we had to jerry-rig something. The consultant has provided us with good advice on how to provide a screen without it having a significant impact on the building. What is proposed is to mount a boom behind the north pillar at the chancel steps over the choir, which can be swung out when projected images are required. An electrically deployable screen is mounted on this boom that rolls up when not needed. So when not in use, all visitors to the church will see is a boom high up over the choir in front of the organ pipes; it will be painted in a neutral colour recommended by our architect.

In order to make these enhancements we need to apply for a faculty, just as we did for the pews discussed above. The first step in the process was to obtain a certificate for the work from the Diocesan Advisory Committee. This has taken some time as they have worked with us to obtain the optimum design. The certificate was issued in November and we will be applying for the faculty in January. A public notice will be displayed at the church and on the Parish Council noticeboard by the village hall and more information about what is proposed will be available in the church as the notice is posted. This is a significant investment for the church, it is likely to cost about £20,000, but it is necessary if the building is to continue to provide a quality place for worship for Purton.

Tamara de Lempicka (1898-1980), the Art Deco artist, led a colourful life, and Brian Coe's talk on 6 November was very informative and interesting.



Born of wealthy parents in Warsaw, multi-lingual and well-educated, Tamara later adopted a free and sometimes 'Bohemian' lifestyle. Although living the 'high life', she also produced many works, sometimes painting five at the same time.

Biographers were often mislead as she lied at interviews, and she often signed her work using a false name, leading to some inaccurate accounts of her life. However, she lived and worked in St Petersburg, Paris and later America, where her work was well-received. Her paintings included portraits of the rich and famous, (which commanded high prices), controversial nudes and artworks for *Harpers' Bazaar* and the German magazine, *Die Dame*.

Tamara de Lempicka's name may be unfamiliar, but her art epitomizes the Art Deco movement.

Recycling Bookworms

Along with reading, Wiltshire bookworms have shown that they are also keen recyclers.

Figures released by Hills Waste Solutions show that close to 50 tonnes of hard and soft covered reading books have been recycled over the past 12 months. That is enough books to fill an average sized classroom.

Over the past year book collection containers have been installed at all 11 of the council's household recycling centres and demand for the service has been high.

"The book recycling service has proved so popular, that some of the sites have more than one container to keep up with the volumes we are receiving," said Cliff Carter, recycling manager for Hills. "Wiltshire residents have shown once again that they are keen to recycle as much as possible and reduce waste to landfill."

The good quality of the books collected means that only a small percentage are sent for reprocessing. "The majority of the books we receive are perfect for reuse," says Ruth Derham of Recycled Reading, the company responsible for collecting the containers which she runs with her husband. Ian.

"Our partnership with traders across the UK means that many of the books we collect from the recycling centres go back into general circulation to be sold online and in a variety of retail outlets", explains lan. "In addition, some of the books are sent abroad or to schools and nurseries within the UK."

Whilst this has been an impressive start, the volume of books Wiltshire recyclers are able to save is set to rise over the coming year, particularly in the south of the county where the containers have only recently been installed. "We have been amazed by the response to our venture and are frequently approached by members of the public while we are on site to be told how pleased they are to have this service", says Ruth. "We continue to be grateful for their support."

Exhibit of the Month: A Bentham Lane Resident Part Two

Following my Exhibit last month, Mrs Kathleen Fuller (née Kennett) was in touch with me. Although not living in Purton, she has Purton connections and has been researching her family tree in the area.

She informs me that the gentleman in the picture was William Kennett, her great-grandfather. The spelling of surnames has often changed over the years so the 2 spellings of Kennett/Kinnett below are not a typing mistake!



Mrs Fuller told me that William Kennett was born in Purton on 16 October 1826, the son of Joseph Kinnett and Elizabeth Mathews. He married Eliza Skeates in the Parish Church at Chilton Foliat in August 1854. In 1856 he worked as a gardener in Millfield Lane, Highgate, London. In 1861 he was back in Purton working as a gardener and by 1871 he was listed in the census as an agricultural labourer. She believes he was then living in Bentham Lane in a cottage which he owned. His wife died in 1898: he then lived alone until his death in 1911.

The photo we showed in the Magazine was scanned from a copy of *Purton's Past* and is not very clear. Mrs Fuller would be very pleased if anyone could offer access to a copy of the photo in better condition. You can contact her on 01793 642981.
