

## **Other Significant Information**

Parents married at Bemerton on 26th February 1899 and the marriage is registered in the March Quarter of 1899 in the Wilton Registration District George's mother died in 1904 aged 26

His father remarried in 1906. He married Edith Alice Musselwhite

His father and family in 1911 were resident at 13 George Street, Salisbury. This included Thomas, Edith Alice, Frederick Bertram Hilda Amy and Ellen Matilda Sanger.


Guildhall Square War Memorial, Salisbury

HMS D3 was one of eight submarines of its class, built for the Royal Navy during the first decade of the 20th century.

D3 was mistakenly bombed and sunk by a French airship AT-0 off Fecamp in the English Channel and lost with all hands on 12 March 1918. AT-0 was patrolling when at 14:20 a vessel was spotted to her north east. The airship drew close for recognition purposes and according to the commander of the airship, the submarine fired rockets at her. Four 52-kg bombs were dropped by the airship. The submarine disappeared but several minutes later men were seen in the water. Attempts were made by the airship to rescue the men but it proved too difficult. The airship withdrew to seek help but all the men had

drowned by the time it arrived. It is clear that D3 was the victim of a serious identification error on the part of the French airship, with identification rockets being mistaken for aggressive gunfire.
