

## An Unprofitable Visit from a Tramp

She accused the prisoner of having gone upstairs, and on looking round she saw that some of her bedlinen had been brought downstairs, and she accused him of taking the clothes. The prisoner immediately made for the door, and she attempted to stop him, when he struck at her and fled. She raised a hue and cry, and P.C. Chandler, with commendable promptitude, went in pursuit, and apprehended the fellow on the towing path of the Canal, and took him to Melksham. Remanded.
