## *Death of Mr. Sidney Tuck*

The funeral took place at Ford Churchyard last week of Mr. Sidney Tuck of Long Deane, a well-known roadman, Mr. Tuck was 50 years of age and served in the last great war. He was a member of the British Legion and also the local N. F. S. He had suffered for some months and had undergone three operations at Bath and Bristol Hospitals.

The coffin was borne to the Church by four of his workmates - Messrs. B. Taylor, B. Miller, W. Neate and W. Tarling. Mr. England carried out the funeral arrangements. The coffin was draped with the Union Jack. The Rev. G. F. Pilcher officiated, and Mr. J. C. James was at the organ, the hymns "Let Saints on Earth" and "Christ Shall Gather in His Own" being sung.
