

Kelly's Directory Extract 1867 Sutton Mandeville



Sutton Mandeville is a parish, in the Southern division of the county, Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Chalke, Cawden and Cadworth Hundred, and Hindon petty sessional division, lying near the Salisbury and Yeovil railway, about midway between the Dinton and Tisbury stations, 11 miles south-by west from Salisbury, 10 north-east from Shaftesbury, 8 from Wilton and 7 from Hindon. The church of All Saints is an ancient structure in the Norman style of architecture; it was repaired in 1850, transept added in 1852, and it was completely restored in 1862; it has a nave and chancel; the interior is in the Decorated style; it has a plain square tower containing 3 bells, and will seat 150 persons; the back of the old pulpit has been preserved; on it are cut the names of the churchwardens, and its date is 1631. In the churchyard is a fine yew tree, planted 1765. The register dates from 1654.The living is a rectory, value £310, in the gift of William Wyndham, esq.; and held by the Rev. John Wyndham, M.A. of Magdalen College, Oxford.

Here is an Infant school, principally supported by the rector and family. The greater part of the parish is the property of William Wyndham, Esq., lord of the manor, whose seat is at Dinton. The soil is light, sandy loam; subsoil, green sand. The chief crops are wheat, beans, oats and barley. The area is 1,300 acres and the population in 1861 was 289.
