Alick Raymond MATTHEWS

Alick Raymond Matthews was born on 26th July, 1896 at Nhill, Victoria to parents John & Wilhelmina (Minnie) Matthews (nee Holtzman). He was a 21 year old, single, Motor Mechanic from 10 Henrietta Street, Glenferrie, Victoria when he enlisted at Melbourne, Victoria on 21st May, 1918 with the 8th (V) Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 60725 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his father – J. Matthews of 10 Henrietta Street, Glenferrie, Victoria. Alick stated that he had previously been rejected as unfit for Service due to his chest measurement.

Private Alick Raymond Matthews was encamped at Broadmeadows.

Private Alick Raymond Matthews embarked from Melbourne on HMAT *Marathon* (A74) on 23rd July, 1918 & disembarked at London on 27th September, 1918.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Matthews was marched in to 1st Training Battalion on 27th September, 1918 & allotted to Reinforcements of 7th Battalion at Fovant, Wiltshire.

Private Alick Raymond Matthews was admitted to the Group Clearing Hospital at Sutton Veny on 12th October, 1918 with Influenza & Pneumonia then transferred to Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 16th October, 1918 seriously ill.

Private Alick Raymond Matthews died at 4.30 a.m. on 20th October, 1918 at the Military Hospital, Sutton Veny of Influenza & Pneumonia.

A death for Aleck R. Matthews, aged 22, was registered in the December quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Private Alick Raymond Matthews was buried at 2.30 p.m. on 25th October, 1918 in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 3. From the burial report of Pte Matthews - *Coffin was good polished Elm with Brass Mounts – Deceased was buried with full Military Honours, the coffin draped with the Australian flag being conveyed to the graveside on a Gun Carriage preceded by a Firing Party and Band from the 1st Australian Training Brigade. Six of deceased's comrades supported the Pall. The funeral was attended by 3 Officers and about 80 N.C.O.'s and Men from deceased's late Unit. Headquarters A.I.F. Depots in United Kingdom were represented at the funeral.*

Pte Alick Raymond Matthews requested in his Will dated 12th June, 1918 that all his real & personal Estate be left to his mother – Mrs Minnie Matthews.

Pte Alick Raymond Matthews was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Matthews' father – Mr J. Matthews (sent July, 1921 & November, 1922).


The CWGC lists Private Alick Raymond Matthews, 60725, of 7th Battalion, Australian Infantry, A.I.F. He was the son of John and Minnie Matthews of 10 Henrietta St, Glenferrie, Victoria.

MATTHEWS – On the 20th October at Sutton Veny Military Hospital England, while on active service with A.I.F., Private A. R. Matthews, of influenza and pneumonia, loving brother of Mrs J. W. Leats (?), of Hamilton.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
