

Harrod's Directory Extract 1865 North Tidworth



TIDWORTH (NORTH) is a parish and village in the Amesbury hundred, Andover union, South Wilts, distant 2 miles S.W. from the ancient town of Ludgershall, 15 from Salisbury, and 9 from Andover station.

The population in 1861 was 374, and the acreage 3,120.

The church of the Holy Trinity is a small neat edifice, with square tower and five bells. The living is a rectory, annual value £324, with residence, in the presentation of the Lord Chancellor; the Rev. James Francis Turner, M.A., is the incumbent.

Here is a National school. There is a large group of barrows.
