North Tidworth



North Tidworth is a township, parish, and small agricultural village, in Amesbury hundred, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury and deanery of Amesbury, Andover Union, South Wilts, pleasantly situated 2 miles south-west from the ancient town of Ludgershall, 15 from Salisbury, 9 from Andover station, and 75 from London. The population is now 385, and comprises 3,120 acres of land.

The church of the Holy Trinity is a small neat structure, with square tower and 5 bells. The living is a rectory, annual value of £324, with residence, in the presentation of the Lord Chancellor; the incumbent is the Rev. James Francis Turner, M.A.

A National School has been erected for popular education.

CLEARINGTON HILL is half a mile west; Sidbury, a large round camp, 2 miles north-west, There is a large group of barrows.

POST OFFICE – George Moore, receiver. Letters arrive by mail from Swindon at 7.15 a.m.; dispatched at 7 p.m. The nearest money order office is at Andover.
