

## Kelly's Directory Extract 1867 Upton Lovell



Upton Lovell is a parish and small village, on the banks of the Wiley, in the Southern division of the county, Heytesbury hundred, Warminster union and county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Wylye, distant 5 ½ miles south-east from Warminster station, 120 from London, and a mile and a half south-east-by-south from Heytesbury.

The church is a small edifice, built in Mixed styles of architecture: on a stone in the wall, over one of the porches, is the date 1632, which is supposed to signify the date of its restoration: the building was again restored in 1833: it has a small nave and chancel, low square tower with 3 bells, and will seat about 150 persons. The register dates from 1712. The living is a rectory, yearly value £325, with residence, in the patronage of the Lord Chancellor and held since 1842 by the Rev. William Gray.

There is a large manufactory here, employing about 200 persons, which does a considerable trade in superfine woollen cloths. Here is a small Free school.

John Frederick Everett, esq., is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is chalky; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The population in 1861 was 210; the area is 1,399 acres; rateable value, £1,763;
