WINTERBOURNE DAUNTSEY (or DANTSEY, or MIDDLE WINTERBOURNE) is a village and parish, in the Bourne valley, 1½ miles south-south-west from Porton station on the main line of the London and South Western railway, 4 north-east from Salisbury and 5 south-east from Amesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Alderbury hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Salisbury County Court district, Amesbury Union, rural deanery of Amesbury (Alderbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury.

The church of this parish was taken down in 1867 and the inhabitants attend that of Winterbourne Earls, to which this parish is annexed.

Here is a United Methodist Chapel.

Frederick Burt Esq. is lord of the manor and Mrs Wyndham-Long is the chief landowner.

The soil is chalk, subsoil same.

The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots.

The area is 1,187 acres; rateable value £920.

The population in 1911 was 159 in the civil and 386 in the ecclesiastical parish.

Figsbury Ring (or Clorus's Camp) is 1 mile south-east.

Letters arrive from Salisbury at 5am and 3.5pm; Sundays 5am; dispatched at 1.45 & 7.15pm; Sundays 5pm.

The nearest money order & telegraph office is at Winterbourne Gunner, half a mile distant.

The children of the parish attend the school at Winterbourne Earls.
