WINTERBOURNE DAUNTSEY (or Dantsey, or Middle Winterbourne) is a village and parish, in the Bourne valley, 1½ miles south-south-west from Porton station on the main line of the Southern railway, 4 north-east from Salisbury and 5 south-east from Amesbury. It is in the Salisbury division of the county, Alderbury hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Salisbury county court district, Amesbury rural district, rural deanery of Amesbury (Alderbury portion), archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury.

The church of this parish was taken down in 1867; the inhabitants attend that of Winterbourne Earls, to which parish this is annexed. There is a United Methodist chapel.

Frederick Burt Esq is lord of the manner.

The soil is chalk, subsoil same. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots. The area is 1,187 acres. The population in 1921 was 159 in the civil and 409 in the ecclesiastical parish.

Figsbury Ring, or Chlorus's Camp, is 1 mile south-east.
