WINTERBOURNE EARLS (or WINTERBOURNE) is a parish and village, in the Bourne valley, 1½ miles south-west from Porton station on the London and South Western railway, 3½ miles north-east from Salisbury, and 6 south from Amesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Alderbury hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Amesbury Union, Salisbury County Court district, rural deanery of Amesbury (Alderbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury.

The church of St Michael erected in 1868 near the site of the old church, for this parish and that of Winterbourne Dantsey, is a fine building of flint and stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, south porch, south aisle and an embattled tower with pinnacles, containing 5 bells: the east window and others in the chancel are stained; there are 287 sittings.

The register of this parish dates from 1567, that of Winterbourne Dantsey from 1561.

The living is a vicarage, with Winterbourne Dantsey annexed, joint net yearly value £236, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1897 by the Rev. Frank Elcho Skyrme M.A. of Brasenose College, Oxford.

The Bungalow, formerly a private residence, situated on high ground, has been purchased by the Corporation of Salisbury, and is now used as an Isolation Hospital for 17 patients.

The poor of the parish participate in Tanner's charity, see Winterbourne Gunner, also in Cartwright's charity.

The hamlet of Hurdcott, half a mile south, consists of a large number of cottages. There is a small Wesleyan chapel.

Capt. George Hounsom Fort, of Alderbury House, who is lord of the manor of Winterbourne Earls, and Richard Arthur Pleydell Bouverie-Campbell-Wyndham Esq, of Exon, Hants, who is lord of the manor of Hurdcott, are also chief landowners.

The soil is chalk; subsoil, same.
The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots.
The area is 1,698; rateable value £1,845
The population in 1901 was 216.

Winterbourne Gunner is the nearest money order & telegraph office, 1 mile distant.
Wall letter box cleared 7.25pm; Sundays 10.45am.

Elementary School, for the use of this and the adjoining parishes of Winterbourne Dantsey and Winterbourne Gunner, built in 1867, for 100 children; average attendance 80; there is a residence for the mistress adjoining the schools.
Miss Aplin, schoolmistress.
