

Kelly's Directory 1875

WINTERBOURNE GUNNER (or Cherborough, or Upper Winterbourne) is a parish and village, situated in the Bourne Valley, in the Southern division of the county, Amesbury union, Alderbury hundred, Salisbury county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and Amesbury rural deanery, 4½ miles north-east from Salisbury and 4½ miles south from Amesbury.

The Bourne, a fine trout stream, flows through this parish.

The church of St Mary is a plain structure, built about 300 years since; it was somewhat injured by the Cromwellians, but repaired in 1810. It has chancel, nave, south porch, low square tower and 2 bells. The register dates from 1573.

The living is a rectory, value £235, with residence, and 9 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held by the Rev Edward G Griffith, M.A., of Trinity College, Cambridge.

Here is a chapel for Wesleyans. Tanner's charity of £12 11s yearly is for fuel and clothing.

Mrs Francis Evans, of Cheltenham, is lady of the manor and principal landowner.

The soil is chalk, subsoil same. The area is 1,493 acres, gross estimated rental £1,843; rateable value £1,476.

The population in 1871 was 147.
