# Letter from the Vicarage

November will be the last letter I write in the parish magazines. This month I want to look back and next month look forward.

We moved here in 2004 from a large Midlands parish. Ann and I were excited about getting back to the country where we naturally belong, but we came with a reluctant thirteen year old daughter who did not want to leave her friends. It is testimony to these villages that all of us, Sarah included, so quickly felt at home.

I am often asked the question: what for a Vicar are the biggest differences between town and country ministry? I think there are two. First is the distribution of work. For example, in the city we had many more funerals and weddings and a much larger congregation. That meant a constant pressure on time, with endless appointments. However, on a Sunday there were only ever two services which was an easier load than here. Second is the way people view 'the Vicar'. In the city I was fairly anonymous; on a day off, a tee shirt and jeans meant that hardly anyone knew who I was. The Vicar in the city was like the dentist or doctor - someone you only want to see when you need his services. In the country the Vicar is at least recognised by almost everyone, and is therefore always to an extent on duty.

So what did we find when we arrived here?

Lovely villages, beautiful countryside, an amazing house and garden and, above all else, wonderful people. Countryside and houses are all well and good, but you know as well as me, it is people who make or break any neighbourhood.

It has been a pleasure and a privilege for us to be members of these villages for the past twelve years. We found here vibrant and welcoming communities. It was good to give up the anonymity of city life and feel we were once more in a situation where people by and large knew and cared for one another. That, for me, is one of the most important memories I shall cherish. Someone at a Worton and Marston newcomers' party told me they knew more people here after six months than they did in their last village after ten years; that is a sign of a healthy and warm community.

In the Christian congregations particularly (that is after all where the Vicarage family begin their work) we were embraced with a joy and friendliness which was striking and genuine. That warmth and openness characterises the churches here. It has been remarked upon by many who have come to church for a variety of reasons; to hear banns read, for baptisms, people moving in, visitors.

A basic human need is to be in a place where we belong and are valued. Jesus drew a community around him and showed them by word and action how much God loved and cared for each of them. At the last meal they shared together Jesus gave His disciples a simple command –'love one another; as I have loved you so you must love each other'.

That has to be at the heart of all Christian communities and we give thanks that in our village churches that love is very much to the fore. Why not come and discover it for yourself, you will find a warm welcome.



1. The exhibition in Christ Church to celebrate the 175<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of its consecration had been a great success and profound thanks were expressed to Joy Stokes who had organised it all.

2. Thanks were also expressed to Eddie Pennell, who does such a superb job in keeping the churchyard tidy. It is admired by so many visitors and comments are often made in the Visitors Book about it.

3. There has been a good response to the appeal to renew the funding of Steve Dewar's youth work. This has depended up to now on the original large donations and, whilst further generous sums have recently been pledged, the on-going work requires the certainty of regular income. #### What's happening on the Farm!

After a very busy summer I am writing and submitting my article on time for once! Since I last wrote, silage making has been done, and haymaking is completed, as is harvest. The straw this year was not rained on so we have both golden barley and wheat straw. It's a massive improvement on last year's black and dusty wheat straw. It's only used for bedding the cattle down with during the winter months but it is nice to look in the barns and to see the cattle on nice golden straw.

We have been as busy as ever calving in the dairy heifers over the past three months. Father estimates that 75 per cent of the heifers that have calved, have calved during the night. We calve our dairy heifers all year round not just during the spring and summer months as was traditionally the case many years ago. Most of our customers supply various supermarkets with milk, which means they are on a level milk profile; in English this means they have to supply the same amount of milk each month because each supermarket knows how much milk they will need. If our customers fall behind on their milk production they are penalised (money deducted from their pence per litre), therefore they come to us to buy more dairy cattle to keep to their level milk profile. They may fall behind because of various reasons the main ones being losses due to bTB, extended wet and dry periods or they may wish to increase their profile if the supermarket requires more milk.

As we prepare for the winter months, I have been cleaning out some of the sheds and spreading the manure on the grass fields. This will rot down into the soil over the winter and the benefits will be seen next spring and summer.

When out for a walk this week you will know autumn is here as the Horse Chestnut trees are starting to yield their annual fruit, the conker! This brought back a memory to me. Whilst I was at school father had a prize conker that he won the local pub competition with. I gleefully took it to school to boast to my friends, where we decided to have a competition. The first hit, it shattered! Was I going to tell dad? I didn't, I just put it back where I found it. I think he figured it out! Happy conkering.

### A Message from Richard Gamble

#### Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

You may agree that 2016 has been a year of surprises. Anyone looking forward at the beginning of the year could be forgiven for not predicting some of the events that have transpired, and we still have three months to go.

Some of the news has been good. Leicester City (my birthplace) was not expected to come top of the Premier Division - the spirits of my ancestors must be tickled pink. Nor did we expect Team GB in Rio to beat the number of medals won at the London Olympics four years ago. At the time of writing, we look likely to do just as well in the Paralympics. And it's nice to know that Giant Pandas are no longer on the list of endangered species.

Some news was not so good. The massacre in France on Bastille Day was a shock and a tragedy. The selection of candidates for the US Presidential elections might also come into this category.

Famously, the pollsters failed to predict the vote for Brexit. Who, in January, would have foretold that, by July, David Cameron and George Osborne would have retired to the back benches and that Teresa May would be PM?

The latest item to catch me by surprise is the debate about grammar schools.

Whatever the arguments for or against selective education, the fact is that the schools in this county are already doing pretty well by national standards. About 96% of our children are in schools classified by Ofsted as Good or Outstanding, which puts Wiltshire very nearly at the top of the list.

Provisionally, it looks as if our A level results are up to or above national standards. Our GCSE results look good too and, on very tentative data, may be as much as 4% better than last year.

Locally, the results for Lavington School have been assessed by The Independent to be the 82<sup>nd</sup> best in the country, which puts it in the top 3% of secondary schools. Congratulations are due to the pupils, the staff and the leadership team for this achievement.

Not to be outdone, Dauntsey's School is reporting its best GCSE results ever, putting it in the top quartile of independent schools in the country. Well done to them too!

I have no idea what other surprises may be in store for us but it's good to know that our schools are giving our young people the best possible start on the roller coaster of life.

When I say, 'I am a Christian,' I do not wish to judge. I have no authority – I only know I'm loved."
