THE Proprietors, in submitting to their Subscribers and the Public the Ninth Edition of KELLY'S DIRECTORY OF HAMPSHIRE, the ISLE OF WIGHT, WILTSHIRE, AND DORSETSHIRE, trust that it may be found equal in accuracy to the previous Editions.

Every effort has been made to render it as perfect as possible. Lists of Hundreds and Poor Law Unions are included in the Topography of each County; it is stated under each parish in what Petty Sessional Division, Hundred, Union and County Court District, and Division of the County, pursuant to the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," as also in what Diocese, Archdeaconry, and Rural Deanery it is situate. The population from the Census of 1891 is given; lists of Farm Bailiffs of Gentlemen farming their own land have been added, with a table of Agricultural Statistics.

A New Map is provided for each County.

The County Councils, under the "Local Government Act, 1888," will be found duly inserted, and various changes caused by the "Local Government Act, 1894," are noticed.

A sketch of the Geological features of each County, by Mr. W. J. HARRISON, of the School Board, Birmingham, is prefixed.

The Proprietors have to thank those Clergymen and other Gentlemen who have given the work the benefit of their local knowledge by the assistance rendered to their Agents while collecting the information.

. The Letters S.O. and R.S.O. at the end of addresses in various parts of the book are abbreviations adopted by H.M. Post Office to represent Sub-Office and Railway Sub-Office; and if these Initial letters, with the name of the County, are added to the addresses of letters in lieu of the usual name of Post Town, the delivery of such letters will be accelerated.

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WILTSHIRE.

WILTSHIRE is a south-western inland shire to the south of the Thames, bounded on the north-west by Gloucestershire, on the north-east by Berkshire, on the east by Hampshire, on the south by Hampshire and Dorsetshire, and on the west by Somersetshire: its shape is that of an oblong, with a round head to the north; it lies between $50^{\circ} 55'$ and $51^{\circ} 43'$ north latitude, and $1^{\circ} 30'$ and $2^{\circ} 22'$ west longitude, the area is 880,248 acres. The greatest length from north to south is 54 miles, and the greatest breadth from east to west is 37 miles. The population at various periods has been as follows:—1801, 183,820; 1811, 191,853; 1821, 219,574; 1831, 237,244; 1841, 256,280; 1851, 254,221; 1861, 249,311; 1871, 257,177; 1881, 258,965; and in 1891, 264,997 viz.: males, 130,662, and females, 134,335. Number of houses: inhabited 57,464, uninhabited 4,047 and building 270.

Wiltshire seems to take its name from Wilton, the town on the Wiley: it was first held by the Britons. The Romans, under Vespasian, took the country and built many towns, and laid out roads. Sorbiodunum (Old Sarum) seems to have been of some note. The West Saxons fought with the Britons many battles and in 501 Cerdic beat their king Nathan-leod; it was not, however, till about 577 that they drove the Britons from South Wilts. In 591 there was a great slaughter of the Welsh at Wodensbury, or Wanborough, near Swindon. In 715, Ina, King of the West Saxons, and Cholred, King of the Mid-English, fought at the same place. In 871 King Alfred fought with the Danes at Wilton, and was beaten; in 878 they burned Chippenham, but he afterwards beat them at Eddington. In 995 the Danes from East England overran North Wilts, and again in 1003, 1006, 1010, 1015 and 1016. In the Parliamentary war there was a battle in 1643 on Roundway Down, and the castles and towns of Salisbury, Marlborough, Devizes, Malmesbury, Ludgershall, Warminster and Wardour were besieged.

There are a great many antiquities in Wilts, whereof some are British, some Roman and some Saxon. Stonehenge is a circle of rough stones on Salisbury Plain, and there is another at Avebury, or Abury.

Wansdyke is a great earthen wall, with a ditch on the north side, stretching across Wiltshire for nearly 20 miles from Bath to Marlborough. Old Ditch, 11 miles long, runs from Knooke to Durnford. Grimsdike and Bokerley dike are south of Salisbury, together about 12 miles long.

Of the camps are Ogbury, near Stonehenge, and another near Oxford; Whitesheet hill; Winklebury, or Vespasian's camp, near Amesbury; Liddington Castle, on Beacon hill, near Chiseldon; Purton camp; others on Eastern hill and Pewsey hill; Battlesbury; Bishopstrow; Yarnbury Castle, near Fisherton Delamere; East Castle, and Bilbury, near Wiley; Whitesheet Castle, near Mere; Barbury, near Broad Hinton; Castle Combe, Shrewton, near Orcheston; Chisbury, near Little Bedwin; Redhorn, near Wilford; Castle Rings, near Donhead St. Andrew; Chisenbury and Lidbury, near Batshill; Soldiers' Ring, near Bokerley Ditch; Clearbury Ring, near Oldstock; Scratchbury; Cotley and Knooke, near Heytesbury; Oldbury, in Codford St. Mary; Clerbury Camp, in Downton; Cherhill, with a white horse cut on the down; Whiten Hill, near Longbridge Deverill; Groveley, near Rolston; and Whitchbury.

There are other buries, or barrows, at Casterley, Badbury, Haselbury, Silbury, Alderbury, Tisbury, Whistbury, Ramsbury, Wilbury, Bury Hill, near Purton, Strawbury, Sidbury, Fosbury, Rowbury, Bury Court, Banbury, Clitsbury, Busbury, Bluebury, Chiselbury, Upperbury, Charlbury, Burycroft, Long Barrow near Tilshead, Long Barrow near Tidcombe, Long Barrow near Edington, Silver Barrow, White Barrow, Kill Barrow, Handbarrow, Ellbarrow, Twinbarrow, Kingbarrow, Bowles Barrow, Heytesbury and Knook Barrow; Knighton Long Barrow, Durrington; Godsbury, near Easton.

The Roman settlements include Marlborough, Malmesbury, Heytesbury, Amesbury, Westbury, Wanborough, Goldborough, Brokenborough, Woodborough, Spittleborough, Oldborough, Rowborough, Bradford, Codford, Endford, Wilsford, Manningford, Woodford, Durnford, Bul-

ford, Ford, Wivelsford, Endford, Stoford, Dunsford, Wishford, Stapleford, Langford, Barford, Ugford, Deptford, Axford, Dodford, Malford, Somerford, Slaughterford, Quemerford, Clatford, Ilford, Britford, Blackford, Milford, Warneford, Maidford, Landford, Stratford, Plaitford, Allenford, Bourton, Burcombe, Overton, Overtown, Idoover, Over Street, Oare and Stoneover.

There are remains of the feudal castles of Devizes, Old Sarum, Castle Coombe, Farley, Ludgershall and Malmesbury; of the abbeys of Malmesbury, Laycock and Kingswood; of the priory of Bradenstoke and the nunnery of Kington St. Michael. The finest building is Salisbury Cathedral. Bowood, Longleat, Wilton, Charlton House, Stourhead, Clarendon Park, Tottenham Park, Longford Castle, Corsham House and Trafalgar House are among the seats of the nobility.

The shire is cut by a line of down across the middle, to the south of which is Salisbury Plain: in the south another line of downs runs right across. The great cluster of Marlborough Downs fills the north-east to the south of Swindon. The climate on the downs is healthy, but the air is cold and sharp: in the north-west it is milder. North-east Wilts is drained by the feeders of the Thames, North-west Wilts by those of the Severn, and South Wilts by the heads of the Salisbury Avon.

In the north rise the Thames head, Flagham brook, and Swill brook, joining the Churn, or true Thames, near Cricklade; it then flows along the north border of Wilts, taking the Key, or Ray and the Cole. The Key, which is a mill-stream about 16 miles long, rises in the hills near Wroughton, passes near Swindon and joins the Churn near Cricklade; the Cole, which is 13 miles long, rises to the east of the Key and flows towards Lechlade; the Kennett rises near Wroughton, within Marlborough Downs, flows south, then east to Marlborough and so past Hungerford to Reading and the Thames: at Marlborough it receives the Ogbourn, near Ramsbury the Aldburn, and near Hungerford a brook: the Kennett flows for 20 miles through Wiltshire.

The north, or Bristol Avon, rises in the Cotswold Hills in Gloucestershire, enters Wiltshire near Luckington, and flows east to Malmesbury, where it takes the Tetbury brook 9 miles long; it then flows south to Chippenham: near Chippenham, the Marden, 10 miles long, flows in from Calne; the Avon flows south to Melksham, where a feeder from Devizes 13 miles long, flows in; from Melksham the course of the Avon is south-westerly by Bradford towards Bath, and so to the Severn below Bristol: the Mere, from Trowbridge flows in near Bradford. The feeders of the Frome rise near Warminster, and that stream joins the Avon below Bradford.

The Salisbury Avon is formed by five arms spreading over South Wilts—the Ebele, the Nadder, the Wiley, the Avon and the Bourne; the Ebele flows along the south border from east to west, and falls into the Avon below Salisbury; the Nadder, 18 miles long, rises near Shaftesbury, under the name of the Don, and flows east to Wilton, where it joins the Wiley; the Wiley or Willy, rises under the name of the Deverill near Mere, flows north towards Warminster, and past Heytesbury, below which a small bourn, 6 miles long, flows in; the Wiley, near Wilton, joins the Nadder, and then flows to the Avon at Salisbury, being 27 miles long; the Avon rises near Devizes, in North Wilts, and keeps a southerly direction, taking near Rushall the Pewsey stream, and so going past Amesbury to Salisbury; the Bourne rises in the middle downs to the north of Ludgershall, and flows southerly for 23 miles to Salisbury; below Salisbury the Avon, after taking the Ebele, flows into Hampshire, and so towards the sea at Christchurch; its whole length in Wiltshire is 41 miles. Near Mere some of the feeders of the Dorsetshire Stour rise. None of the Wiltshire rivers are of much use for navigation, but they turn mills and feed the canals.

Wiltshire has in the north three great lines of canal. The Thames and Severn Canal skirts the north border, passing by Cirencester, Cricklade and Lechlade. The Kennett and Avon Canal passes through the middle of Wilts, by Hungerford, Devizes and Bradford and near Trowbridge, to Bath

and Bristol. The Wilts and Berks Canal joins the above south of Melksham, and then is itself joined to the Thames and Severn Canal by a branch called the North Wilts Canal between Cricklade and Swindon. North Wilts is thus well provided with canals. South Wilts is almost destitute of canal service.

The railways belong to the Great Western and London and South Western Companies: the main line of the Great Western comes in from London, south of Highworth (to which there is a branch), passes by Swindon, Dauntsey (with a branch to Malmesbury), Wootton Bassett, Chippenham, Corsham and Box, to Bath, and so to Bristol, Exeter and South Devon. Swindon is the chief locomotive and carriage factory of the company. A branch runs from Swindon by Purton and Minety to Gloucester, Cheltenham, and South Wales, and through Oxford to Worcester and Birmingham, and so to all parts of the north and east of the island. From Chippenham a line is made, called the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth, by or near Bradford and Trowbridge to Westbury, Warminster and Frome, and from Westbury there is a branch line to Salisbury, known as the Salisbury and Bristol line. A line from Reading to Hungerford, and thence to Marlborough (by a branch line) and Devizes, joins the main line at Holt junction near Melksham. A branch from Chippenham to Calne is called the Calne Railway, and is worked by the Great Western Railway Company. The Midland and South Western Junction railway has a line from Cirencester through Cricklade, Swindon, Marlborough and Andover, to Southampton Docks. The South Western line runs from Basingstoke through Andover to Salisbury, and thence by Wilton, Dinton and Tisbury to Yeovil, Exeter and the West of England. A branch from Salisbury, through Romsey to Bishopstoke, connects Salisbury with Gosport, Portsmouth, and the South Coast line, and by boat to Ryde Pier, and another line connects Salisbury with Weymouth, Dorset.

The average yearly rainfall for the whole county of Wilts may be taken at about 30 inches yearly, which is less than that of the adjoining districts on the south and west. The line of chalk downs intercepts the southerly and south-westerly winds, and causes some of their moisture to descend as rain; still the rainfall is not so great as in Dorset to the south, or in Devon or Cornwall further west.

The absorbent nature of the rock causes the surface of the chalk country to be almost dry, but by deep wells water of excellent quality, though of considerable hardness, may everywhere be obtained.

The north and north-west parts of Wilts belong to the oolite formations, and the rest to the chalk. The line separating these two divisions may be taken through Swindon, Calne and Westbury. A small portion of oolite comes in at the south-west, between Semby and Tisbury.

The chalk district is divided into two by the vale of Pewsey, or that in which the heads of the Salisbury Avon rise, and which belongs to the greensand. The northern chalk district is that of Marlborough Downs, and the southern that of Salisbury Plain. The southern formation is broken by three faults where the chalk has been laid bare, the upper valleys of the Salisbury Avon, the Wiley and the Nadder. Many of the hills on the Downs are very high. Inkpen Beacon, where the borders of Berks, Hants and Wilts come together, is the highest chalk hill, being 1,011 feet high. The Salisbury downs or plains form a high bleak ground, with scanty grass, and unpeopled, except in the valleys of the rivers, where the towns and hamlets lie close together.

On one of the hills at Alton Barns is the figure of a horse of vast size cut into the chalk, which can be seen at a great distance. There is a similar figure of a horse on the side of Bratton Hill, near Westbury: these are generally supposed to be of Celtic origin. At Cherhill, between Calne and Malmesbury, is a similar figure, but executed in modern times.

The greensand forms a broad strip skirting the chalk, by the south of Swindon; near Calne, Devizes, Market Lavington, Westbury, Warminster and Mere: it likewise crops out in the valley of the Nadder, between Hindon and Swallowcliffe. South and south-east of Salisbury we find beds of the Hampshire plastic clay, Kimmeridge clay, oolitic freestone, coral rag, calcareous grit, Oxford clay, cornbrash and forest marble, belonging to the upper, middle and lower oolite, crop out in strips beyond the greensand, forming the west and north-west of the county: these have many quarries of building stone. There are mineral springs in the Oxford clay. The hills in general do not rise above 400 feet high; but the highest, Alfred's Hill, near Stourhead, is about 800 feet high.

In South Wilts and North-East Wilts there is tillage only in the dales. The great downs are grazed by sheep, though in some places they have been broken up for tillage. North-West Wilts has a sub-soil of broken stone, with clay or reddish chalky loam lying upon it: here are richer soils,

with much corn land, meadow and dairy ground; the grazing is for cows and oxen, and much cheese is made. The curing of bacon is carried on largely, principally at Calne, and many thousand pigs are slaughtered yearly. There is little market gardening.

Wilts yields limestone and freestone, chalk, marl, brick-earth, corn, oxen, cheese, sheep and wool.

Iron ore was raised to the extent of about 62,234 tons, valued at £12,446, and there are works for smelting at Westbury; the quarrying of freestone is a considerable industry, 113,957 tons being procured, valued at £28,489.

Wilts was formerly a great seat of the clothing trade, but this has much fallen off, and in and around Bradford there are now only a few mills and looms. Trowbridge is the head of the broadcloth weaving, which is carried on there, at Bradford and Westbury; also wool dyeing. At Salisbury some boots and shoes are manufactured. At Melksham there are looms for hair-cloth weaving and sacking and cocoa-nut fibre works. At Chippenham broadcloth is woven. Silk-throwing is carried on at Warminster. At Malmesbury silk ribbon is made. Ropes and sacking are made at Marlborough. At Wilton are carpet works and a pianoforte felt factory. At Devizes portable engines are extensively made, and tobacco and snuff manufactured. There are malting and brewing in all the large towns.

Wiltshire is in the Western circuit, has one court of quarter sessions and is divided into 16 petty sessional divisions, in the province of Canterbury and mostly in the diocese of Salisbury, except the deaneries of Chippenham, Cricklade and Malmesbury, which are in that of Gloucester and Bristol, in the archdeaconry of Bristol. The other part forms two archdeaconries; Sarum, with the sub-deanery of Sarum and rural deanery of Wilton, deaneries of Amesbury, divided into Amesbury and Alderbury portions; Chalk, Chalk and Tisbury portions; Wyly, Wyly and Heytesbury portions; and Wilts, with the deaneries of Avebury, Avebury and Cannings portions; Marlborough, Marlborough and Pewsey portions; and Potterne, Potterne, Enford and Bradford portions. The civil parishes are 344 and parts of five others.

The municipal boroughs are: Calne, population in 1891, 3,495; Chippenham, 4,618; Devizes, 6,426; Malmesbury, 2,964; Marlborough, 3,012; Salisbury, 15,533 and Wilton, 2,120. Other towns are Bradford-on-Avon, 4,943; Cricklade, 2,027; Downton, 3,378; Melksham, 2,073; New Swindon, 27,295; Trowbridge, 11,717; Warminster, 5,563; Westbury, 6,014, and Wootton Bassett, 2,237. Many of these are very well built, and with good churches and town buildings. Salisbury is well known for its cathedral. There is a large college or grammar school at Marlborough, and grammar schools in the large towns. There are no watering-places or towns of resort other than for the purposes of business. Swindon has large works of the Great Western railway.

The Wilts County Lunatic Asylum, at Devizes, opened 19th September, 1851, is a structure of Bath stone, in the Italian style from designs by Mr. Thomas Henry Wyatt, architect; the site, which is within a mile of the Town hall, is considerably elevated above the level of the adjacent valley of the Avon, rather less so than the town of Devizes itself, and is well sheltered on the north-east and east by the hill of Etchilhampton; the asylum has been repeatedly enlarged since its first erection and will now hold about 700 patients. The land belonging to the Asylum consists of nearly 90 acres: John Ireland Bowes M.R.C.S. Eng. medical superintendent; James Wilson M.A., M.B., C.M. senior assistant medical officer; Edwyn Henry Beresford M.R.C.S. Eng., L.R.C.P. Lond. junior assistant medical officer; Rev. John Hart Burges D.D. chaplain; Edward Baverstock Merriman, treasurer; Joseph T. Jackson, clerk to the visitors; James Turner, clerk to the asylum.

Her Majesty's Prison is at Devizes; it is of polygonal shape and was built in 1810: Richard Kemp, governor; Rev. Arthur Charles Devas M.A. chaplain; Edward Nicolls Carless M.B., C.M. medical officer.

The Wilts Reformatory for boys is at Warminster and was certified December 23rd, 1856; the Rev. William Moore B.A. Kingston Deverell, corresponding manager; Charles James Walker, superintendent.

The Limpley Stoke Reformatory for Girls, near Bath, was certified January 9th, 1861: Canon Bond, Steeple Ashton, Trowbridge, hon. sec.; Sister Anne Crake, lady superintendent.

PARLIAMENTARY REPRESENTATION OF WILTSHIRE.

Wiltshire formerly returned 4 members to Parliament in two divisions, but under the provisions of the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," it now returns 5 members in 5 divisions :

- (1) The Northern or Cricklade division comprises the sessional divisions of Cricklade and Swindon.
- (2) The North-Western or Chippenham division comprises the sessional divisions of Calne, Chippenham and Malmesbury.
- (3) The Western or Westbury division comprises the sessional divisions of Bradford, Melksham, Trowbridge and Westbury, Warminster (except the parishes of Fisherton-de-la-Mere and Wily), and Whorwellsdown.
- (4) The Eastern or Devizes division comprises the sessional divisions of Devizes, Marlborough, Everley and Pewsey (except the parishes of Figheldean and Milston), and the municipal boroughs of Devizes and Marlborough
- (5) The Southern or Wilton division comprises the sessional divisions of Hindon, Salisbury and Amesbury, the municipal borough of Salisbury, the parishes of Figheldean and Milston, in the sessional division of Everley and Pewsey, and the parishes of Fisherton-de-la-Mere and Wily, in the sessional division of Warminster

Under the provisions of the above Act, the representation of the boroughs of Cricklade, Calne, Chippenham, Devizes, Malmesbury, Marlborough, Westbury and Wilton were merged into that of the county. Salisbury now returns only one member, and its boundary was enlarged

WILTS COUNTY COUNCIL.

Local Government Act, 1888, 51 & 52 Vic. c. 41.

Under the above Act Wiltshire, after the 1st of April, 1889, for the purposes of the Act, became an administrative county (sec. 46), governed by a County Council, consisting of chairman, aldermen and councillors (the number of councillors being determined by the Local Government Board) elected in manner prescribed by the Act (sec. 2).

The chairman, by virtue of his office, is a justice of the peace for the county, without qualification (sec. 46).

The police for the county is under the control of a stand-

ing joint committee of the Quarter Sessions and the County Council, appointed as therein mentioned (sec. 9).

The coroners for the county are elected by the County Council, and the clerk of peace appointed by such joint committee, and may be removed by them (sec. 83-2).

The clerk of the peace for the County is also the clerk of the County Council (sec. 83-1).

The administrative business of the County (which would, if this Act had not been passed, have been transacted by the justices) is transacted by the County Council.

GEOLOGY OF WILTSHIRE.

In the magazine of the Wiltshire Archæological and Natural History Society (vol. xiv.) we have a list compiled by Mr. W. Whitaker of 169 papers, &c., by 89 authors which relate to the geology of Wilts. The whole of the surface has been mapped by the officers of the Geological Survey (Messrs. Bristow, Aveline, Hull and Whitaker), and the northern portion of the county is described in a "Survey Memoir," by Professor Ramsay. Of local workers we must name Messrs. Cunnington, C. Moore, G. P. Scrope, C. J. A. Meyer, T. Colrington, R. N. Mantell, J. C. Pearce, the Rev. P. B. Brodie, Professors Buckman and Rupert-Jones; whilst for our knowledge of the fossils we are largely indebted to Drs. Wright, Lycett, and Woodward, Professors Morris, E. Forbes, Milne-Edwards, Bell, &c. Unfortunately these works are scattered over numerous and expensive scientific publications, as the volumes of the Palæontographical Society, the Quarterly Journal of the Geological Society, the "Geological Magazine," the "Wiltshire Magazine" above referred to, &c. Recently Mr. Hulleston and the Rev. J. F. Blake have written a valuable account of the Coralline rocks, and the latter gentleman has also described the Kimmeridge Clay.

The recent deposits near Salisbury which contain such interesting traces of the early existence of man have been diligently worked by Dr. Blackmore and others, and their "finds" are to be seen in the Blackmore Museum at Salisbury, which contains a splendid series of the tools and weapons both of prehistoric man and of modern savage tribes for comparison. The excellent work entitled "Flint Chips," written by Mr. E. T. Stevens, gives a full account of this admirable collection. In the adjoining rooms of the Salisbury and South Wilts Museum there are some fine specimens of local fossils. At Devizes, geological collections may be seen in the museum of the Literary and Scientific Institution and in the museum of the Wiltshire Natural History Society. At Marlborough College, the School Natural History Society is also doing good work.

The rocks which form the county of Wilts belong mainly to the Secondary or Mesozoic formation: they run across the county in broad irregular bands, which have a general line of direction or *strike* from north-east to south-west: they incline or slant or *dip* to the south-east, not lying now horizontally as they did when they were originally deposited on some sea-floor, but tilted up towards the north-west, so that the edges of a number of successive rock-beds are visible, forming the irregular bands we have mentioned above. As the lowest strata are certainly the oldest or first formed, it follows that those rocks which we find in the north-west of the county, about Bradford, Malmesbury &c. are of the most remote geological age, for as we try to follow these across the strike in a south-easterly direction, we find they pass under newer beds, which in turn pass under the chalk, while the chalk is itself overlain by the Tertiary strata in the south-east corner of the edge of the New Forest.

In describing the strata we shall commence in the north-west with the oldest beds, and then take the others one by one, in ascending order, finally treating of the alluvial and other surface deposits which occur irregularly over the whole area.

But, first looking broadly over the entire county, we note that it may be divided into two regions, whose wide difference in appearance, agriculture, and population is entirely owing to geological causes. The first of these lies in the north-west, and includes about one-third of the county: it has a level or undulating surface and a south-easterly slope; it is a district of oolitic limestones and clays, and the chalk escarpment forms its boundary. The remainder of Wilts—the southern and eastern parts—is mainly formed of chalk, where breezy downs and long level treeless plateaux have a distinctiveness which instantly reveals to the discerning eye the nature of the rock of which they are composed.

The heights above sea-level of a few points determined by the Ordnance Survey are, Highworth Church, 442 feet; Cricklade Church, 297 feet; Wootton Bassett Church, 424 feet; Christian Malford Church, 187 feet; Chippenham Church, 184 feet; Corsham Church, 303 feet; Warminster Town Hall, 388 feet; Tower or Downton Hill, 445 feet; Salisbury Cathedral, 153 feet.

THE LIAS.—The liassic strata only enter Wiltshire in the extreme west, running up the valley of the Box Brook from Bathford by Ditcheridge to a little beyond Colerne. Ditcheridge stands on the *Middle Lias*; but the hard band called the "Rock-bed" is here very thin, while a few feet of blue clay which lie upon it belong to the *Upper Lias*, the beds thus thinning out greatly in this direction. The junction of the Lias with the sands of the Oolite above is marked by

wet ground, caused by the springs which are thrown out along the top of the impervious clays.

THE OOLITE.—This great assemblage of strata has received its name from the fact that some of the beds of limestone which it contains have a structure like the roe of a fish: it consists of an alternation of beds of sandstone, limestone and clay, which, as a whole, attain their maximum development in Gloucestershire, where they form the Cotteswold range. As the oolitic strata are followed in a south-easterly direction, they become greatly attenuated, as has been shown by Professor Hull; still in Wiltshire they are of a very respectable thickness.

LOWER OOLITE.—*Midford Sands.*—These are transition or passage beds connecting the liassic and oolitic formations. They contain liassic ammonites, as *A. bifrons*, *A. opalinus*, &c. and oolitic bivalves, as *Hinnites abjectus*, *Trigonia striata*, &c.; as Professor Phillips remarks, "before the liassic life had come to an end, the oolitic life had begun." The Midford Sands are of a yellow tint, and contain concretionary masses of limestone called "sand-bats;" they occur resting upon the Lias along the sides of the valley of the Box Brook, and are here about 40 feet in thickness.

Inferior Oolite.—This is a buff-coloured sandy limestone, under which lies a rubbly bed full of corals. "It occurs at Elmhurst and Upper Shockerwick, and runs up the sides of the Box valley nearly to Slaughterford: from near Box it stretches through Ashley Green and Bathford to near Bradford." It is well exposed in the bank of the canal opposite Limpley Stoke, and in a gully near Charlcombe church, where it is about 25 feet thick. At Limpley Stoke and Beechen Cliff the Inferior Oolite is almost entirely composed of corals, with various species of such shells as *Trigonia*, *Ostrea*, &c. Thus the small portion of this stratum which enters Wilts, possesses neither the thickness nor the qualities which elsewhere (Cotteswolds, Ham Hill, &c.) make it such a valuable building stone.

The Fullers' Earth.—This is a bed of blue and yellow clay, from 60 to 100 feet thick; in the lower portion it contains bands of limestone, the "Fullers' Earth Rock." It can be traced by Bonner Down and Ashley Wood to beyond Slaughterford, and then returns on the opposite side of the valley past Box. The characteristic fossil is a small oyster named *Ostrea acuminata*. The position of the bed is rendered visible at a distance by the way in which the superincumbent beds of Great Oolite have in places slipped down over the clay; the water which issues plentifully at the junction has lessened the adhesion, and produced the catastrophes. The Fullers' Earth proper is a hydrous silicate of alumina; it is "an unctuous clay, usually of a greenish-brown or greenish-grey colour, sometimes blue: it is opaque, soft, dull, with a greasy feel and an earthy fracture: it yields to the nail and affords a shining streak; it scarcely adheres to the tongue, and falls into a pulpy, impalpable powder when placed in water, without forming a paste with it." (Bristow.) It occurs in veins from 18 inches to 3 feet in thickness, and was formerly largely dug for fulling at the cloth mills, but it is not now worked.

The Great Oolite.—This division, which is also known as the *Bath Oolite*, furnishes perhaps the most famous building stone in England. It does not occupy much of the surface of Wiltshire; from near Limpley Stoke and Corsham we can trace it to Yatton Keynell and Castle Combe: it is again exposed in the valley which runs east and west by Great Sherston, and we again find it (this time brought up by a fault) on the east of Tetbury. The thickness of the Great Oolite varies from 100 to 200 feet; the upper beds are blue limestones, weathering white when exposed to the atmosphere, and so hard as to have been largely used for mending the roads; below these come the fine oolitic freestones which furnish such valuable building material. At Corsham the stone is worked underneath higher strata (forest marble) by means of shafts (sometimes 70 feet deep) and tunnels; the underground quarries here are perhaps the largest and best worked in the kingdom. Box Hill yields a stone of a very superior quality as to fineness of texture, called Scallet. "The absence of fossils renders the stone more valuable as a freestone, as it then yields more readily to the saw and to the chisel; when fossils are abundant the stone is best adapted for rough building purposes, such as walls and the foundations of houses." (H. B. Woodward.) When first removed from the quarry the stone is soft and moist, and easily carved or sawn, but as it dries it hardens and becomes an excellent hard white stone. Of fossils, univalve shells, such as *Nerinea Voltzii*, *Purpuroidea Morrisii*, &c., and many bivalves, as *Trigonia costata*, *Tancredia brevis*, &c., are abundant, especially in the upper limestones.

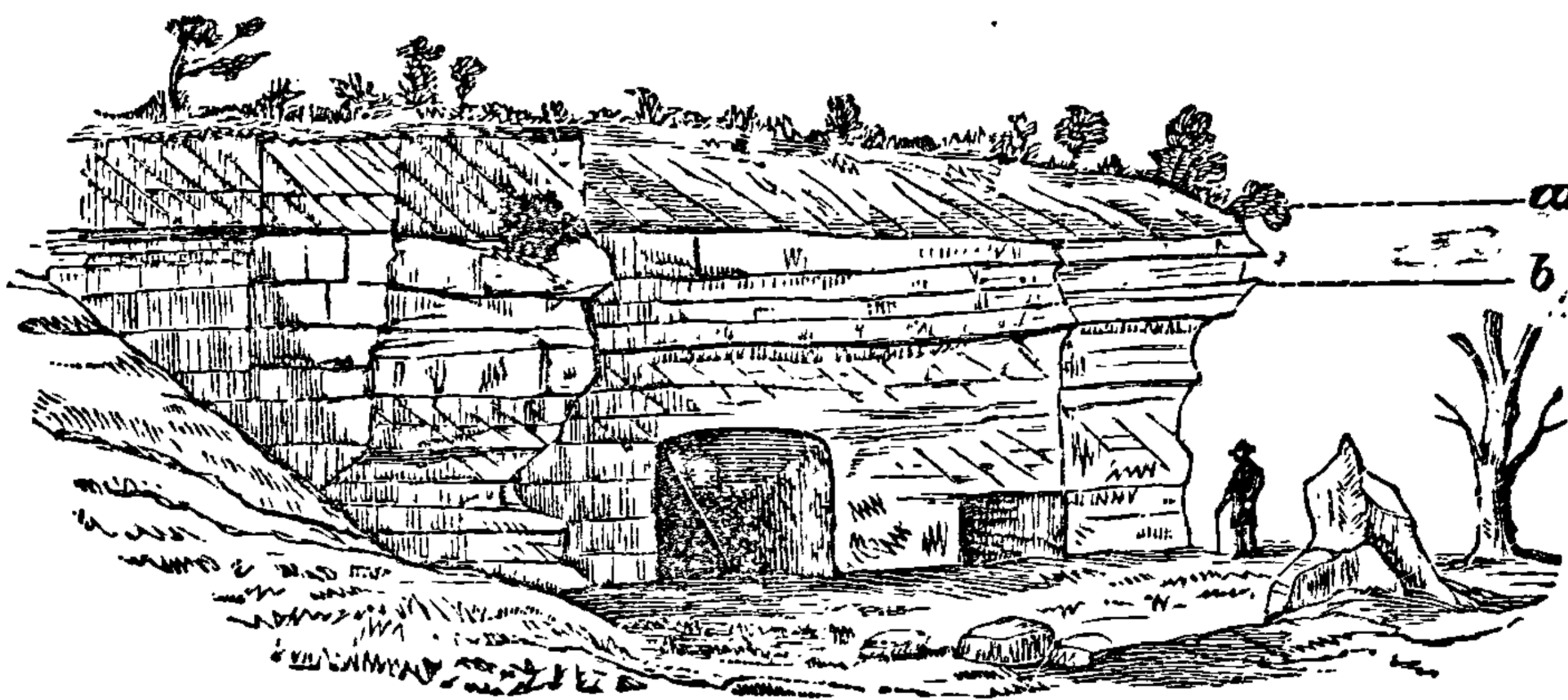


Fig. 91. Quarry at Yatton Keynell, near Corsham,

The Forest Marble (with Bradford Clay).—The strata which own this name occupy a considerable surface area in the north and west of Wiltshire. From Bradford-on-Avon and Corsham (where they are well exposed in the railway cutting), they run northward to Tetbury, and then turning north-east form a tract some 5 or 6 miles wide, on which stand the villages of Ashley, Crudwell and Kemble. The strata are a variable series of shelly limestones, sands and clays, about (Fig. 91) 60 feet thick near Tetbury, but thickening as they are followed southwards. Near Bradford a thick mass of clay, the *Bradford Clay*, is locally developed in the lower portion of the Forest Marble. It is a pale grey clay about 40 feet thick, containing a little carbonate of lime and enclosing thin slabs of brownish limestone and sandstone; a fossil called the Pear Eocrinite (*Apiocrinites rotundus*) is abundant in the Bradford Clay; its fragments are called "coach wheels" by the quarrymen. The large slabs of coarse limestone furnished by the Forest Marble proper, are, according to Professor Buckman, "of great value for forming the sides of piggeries and cattle sheds. The smaller pieces broken up form a very durable material for road-making, and some of the thicker blue-centred slabs are used for building purposes. As a soil the Forest Marble is usually poor, but capable of great improvement by draining and cultivation." The remains of the oldest known British Crab (*Palainachus longipes*) were found by Mr. William Bury, in the Forest Marble near Malmesbury.

The Cornbrash.—This is a rubbly, pale-coloured earthy limestone, about 20 feet thick. We can trace it between

tranquil sea. After the accumulation of a great thickness of mud, an elevation of the sea-floor accompanied by a clearing of the waters made the conditions fit for the growth of coral reefs. In the Coral Rag we have a bed of rubbly oolitic limestone, full of the remains of corals and about 20 feet thick: it is accompanied by beds of sand and calcareous sandstones, termed the *Upper* and the *Lower Calcareous Grit*. Near Westbury a bed of iron-ore (hydrated peroxide) has been largely worked; it occupies a narrow strip of ground running north and south near the railway station, and the bed of ore is from 11 to 14 feet in thickness. In 1877 there were raised 79,176 tons of iron-ore, valued at £19,784, but in 1879 the amount had fallen to 47,623 tons, valued at £9,525. *Ostrea deltoidea* is a very common fossil here. At Steeple Ashton, many fine corals, such as *Thecosmilia annularis*, are found, mostly on the surface of the ploughed fields; at Seend the *Lower Calcareous Grit* is well exposed where the furnaces for the iron-ore stand. From this point we can follow the beds by Westbrook to Calne, and thence by Hillmarton and Purton to Highworth. At the latter place the total thickness is about 100 feet, and fine sections are exhibited where the beds are quarried for building stone. Spines and plates of a sea-urchin (*Cidaritis florigemma*) are very characteristic of the Coral Rag. Physically this bed forms a ridge or escarpment rising about 100 feet above the plain of Oxford Clay; by its decomposition it produces a light sandy arable soil. At Calne specimens of a new genus of sea-urchin (*Pelanechinus*) which possessed a flexible test have been found by Mr. Keeping.

Trowbridge and Semington, and round Great Chalfield and Atford; from Corsham and Chippenham it runs by Kington, Hullavington and Malmesbury to Charlton and Pool Keynes. At Rodborne it is quarried for rough building stone. The fossils are numerous, and include *Ammonites Herveyi*, *Avicula echinata*, &c. Numerous villages occur along the outcrop of the Cornbrash, as it is a water-yielding stratum; it furnishes a good corn-growing soil.

MIDDLE OOLITE.—The Oxford Clay (with Kelloway Rock).—This formation consists of blue clay, weathering yellow near the surface, and here attains a thickness of about 500 feet. Near its base is a fossiliferous bed of calcareous sandstone called Kelloway or Kelloway's Rock, either after the village of the latter name near Chippenham (Woodward), or because it occurred in pits belonging to a man named Kelloway (Ramsay). The Oxford Clay extends from Bradley and Melksham to Christian Malford; then between Wootton Bassett and Malmesbury the outcrop is 7 miles in width, and so it continues by Purton Station, South Cerney, and Cricklade, towards Lechlade; sections are exposed in the cuttings of the Great Western Railway, and in brickyards near Malmesbury and at Miney station. The Oxford Clay forms a stiff, heavy soil, difficult to cultivate and mostly in permanent pasture; the old Forest of Braydon stood on it, and there are still many woods. Of fossils the large flattish oyster-like shell (*Gryphaea dilatata*) is abundant, ammonites and belemnites are also plentiful. In making the railway cutting near Christian Malford, about 1840, many fossils were found including some new forms of cephalopods, which were described by Mr. Pearce under the name of *Belemnoteuthis*; even the impressions of their soft parts were wonderfully preserved. Remarkable branches of some coniferous trees from the Oxford Clay of this locality have been figured by Mr. Carruthers in the "Geological Magazine" (vbl. vii.); he there remarks that it would be very desirable if foliage or fruit could also be found.

The Coral Rag.—The thick beds of clay we have just described were probably deposited in a moderately deep and

UPPER OOLITE.—Kimmeridge Clay.—Between Semley, Sedghill, and Knoyle Common, we find a bed of bluish-shaly clay, about 65 feet thick; we can trace it again on the north-east, between Westbury Station, Worton, and Bulkington; it is then overlapped and concealed by newer strata, but we recover it again at Olney Marsh, and find it thickens northward to 500 feet at Swindon, where its outcrop is also broad, occupying all the ground between Swindon on the east and Wootton Bassett and Stratton St. Margaret's on the west. There are large brick-pits in the Kimmeridge Clay at Swindon; here *Ammonites biplex* is common in a bed of sandstone, and limestone nodules occur; *Ostrea deltoidea* is another common fossil. In these pits in 1874 bones of enormous extinct reptiles (*Omosaurus*, &c.) were found, which were extracted and removed with great skill by Mr. W. Davies, of the British Museum, and have since been described by Professor Owen.

Portland Beds.—Strata of this age are exposed in three separate areas in Wiltshire. At Chilmark and Tisbury, in the valley of the Nadder, about 12 miles west of Salisbury, there are large quarries in a siliceous limestone, of which Salisbury Cathedral and Wilton Abbey were built. At Tisbury about 61 feet of stone are seen in the quarries, and the beds here contain beautiful yellow crystals of sulphate of barytes (sugar-candy stone). A coral (*Isastraea oblonga*) which has been converted into flint and chert, is also plentiful at Tisbury. In the valley east of Worton and south of Pottern sandy beds of the same age occur. Lastly, in the stone quarries at Swindon we see about 8 feet of yellowish Portland stone, underlaid by sands 25 feet thick; there is an outlying mass round the village of Bourton.

The Portlandian Beds are a marine shallow-water series, indicating an upheaval of the oolitic sea-bottom.

Purbeck Beds.—Strata of this age occur at two points only: at Teffont Evias, Chicks Grove, and Chilmark Common slabs of a thin compact limestone are raised for tiling; at Swindon we see in the stone quarries about 10 feet of fresh-water marls and limestones of Purbeck age, which have yielded to the diligent researches of Mr. C. Moore, of Bath,

more than eighty species of fossils, including teeth of mammals, bones of the oldest true frog, together with fruits and seeds, and such fresh-water shells as *Paludina* and *Bithynia*. They thus show a continuation of that upheaval of the oolitic sea-floor which we have already noted when describing the Portland Beds, and which finally resulted in the formation of a continent occupying part of what is now the Atlantic Ocean.

NEOCOMIAN (OR LOWER CRETACEOUS) FORMATION.—Over the continent just referred to a great river flowed eastwards, the deposits in whose estuary constitute the Hastings Sands and Weald Clay of Kent, Surrey and Sussex: of the *Hastings Sands* a small outcrop has been mapped by the Geological Survey at Catherine Ford on the Nadder.

Lower Greensand.—The sandy beds of this age are from 25 to 30 feet thick; they commence on the south at Poulshot Green, near to which is an outlier at Seend, where a patch of Lower Greensand rests on Kimmeridge Clay; here it contains a rich bed of iron ore, which has been largely worked. The outcrop broadens between Rowde, Bromham, and Bowden Hill, but soon narrows again to a band about a quarter of a mile wide, which can be traced by the dryness of the ground through Blackland, Corton, and Swindon Reservoir. At Sands Farm, east of Calne, a bed of very pure and white quartz sand has long been worked, and is carried to great distances for domestic purposes. Fossils are scanty in the Lower Greensand, but the curious shell *Diceras Lonsdalei* has been found. The beds are evidently a marine littoral deposit, and indicate subsidence.

THE CRETACEOUS FORMATION.—The lowest division of the cretaceous beds proper is termed the *Gault*. It is a stiff blue clay, full of small spangles of mica, and occasionally it contains calcareous concretions, septaria, and phosphatic nodules; it varies in thickness from 80 to 140 feet, and can be traced continuously, as a band of low ground at the base of the chalk escarpment, from Dilton by Westbury, Coulston, Heddington, Cliffe Typard, Wroughton, to Wanborough Marsh and Hinton Mill. It is worked for brick-making at several points along this line. The *Gault* is found along both sides of the Nadder Valley, at Donhead and Sutton Mandeville on the south side, and at Dinton on the north, but is absent at East Knoyle.

The *Upper Greensand* is in thickness equal to the *Gault*. It is a grey or brown sand, speckled with green grains, and containing irregular beds of sandstone and chert. From Shaftesbury it passes eastwards by Charlton and Berwick St. John to Barford St. Martin; then turns west by Knoyle, skirting the chalk by Warminster and Westbury, and then running like a bay into the chalk past Pewsey and Milston to Burbage. From Devizes the outcrop narrows greatly through Cherhill, Compton Bassett, Wanborough, and Little Hinton. Many echinoderms (sea-urchins) have been found in this formation in the neighbourhood of Warminster.

The Chalk.—The well-known pure white earthy limestone which we call "Chalk" occupies a larger area in Wiltshire than all the other strata put together. From Cranborne Chase in the south it stretches over Salisbury Plain, and then passes north-east by Marlborough; its total thickness is here about 800 feet, in which the following sub-divisions can be traced. At the base we have a bed called *Chloritic Marl*, about 6 feet thick; it is of a pale yellow colour, with green grains of glauconite and phosphatic nodules. Next comes the *Chalk Marl* (locally called Malm), or Grey Chalk, about 50 feet thick; springs issue from the top, but in summer these become so dried up as to be without water for months together; shark's teeth are common, with *Ammonites varians* and other fossils. Above this we have the *Lower Chalk*, or Chalk-without-flints, about 300 feet thick; it is softer than the Upper Chalk, and of milk-white or creamy tint. The *Upper Chalk*, or Chalk-with-flints, is about 400 feet thick; the layers of flint which mark the planes of bedding form a conspicuous feature in pits in the Upper Chalk, and enable us at once to distinguish it from the beds below. Fossils are common, mostly rounded sea-urchins, such as *Ananchytes ovatus*, *Cidaris*, *Micraster*, and *Galerites*, with remains of sponges and *Ventriculites*.

Between the Upper and Lower Chalk is a hard bed which Mr. Whitaker has named the *Chalk Rock*: it is a hard cream-coloured chalk with layers of green nodules, is well jointed, breaks with an even fracture, and rings under the hammer; sections are exposed near the top of the road-cutting on the northern side of the Pewsey Valley, about 4 miles south-south-west of Marlborough, also at Leigh Hill, and on the top of Whitesheet Hill, where it is about 3 feet thick.

The Chalk forms a bold escarpment facing west and north; in North Wilts "the unequal denudation of the hard and soft chalk forms a striking feature, especially when viewed from the north-west and west. The hard chalk rising abruptly out of the high and broad plateau of the soft chalk, the bare greasy sides and tops of the former contrast strongly with the cultivated plains of the latter;

and while the plateau of the Lower Chalk rises and falls in gentle undulations, interspersed with small streams, the Upper Chalk is cut up into numerous ridges and valleys, and is nearly destitute of water." (Aveline.)

The "balks," or "linchets," or terraces which run along the slopes of the chalk escarpment, are due to the down-wash of soil by rain.

The Upper Chalk forms a white land, with a scanty covering of soil and a short sweet turf; the beech and box grow well upon it, and it affords pasturage for great flocks of sheep; much of it, however, has of late years been brought under cultivation. The great expanse of this rock, which is about equally divided between Hants and Wilts, forms what Pennant calls the "great central Patria of the chalk," the centre whence all the ranges of this rock traversing our island diverge.

There are many pits or quarries where the chalk is worked to burn into lime. "At Bishopston Down, near Warminster, enormous blocks of crystalline carbonate of lime, one of which weighed 50 cwt., were cut into slabs for mantel-pieces. Calcareous spar also occurs in a chalk-quarry at Nook, near Heytesbury, in blocks less both in number and size." (Conybeare.)

At Cherhill, east of Calne, a "White Horse" has been formed by cutting away the turf on the chalk escarpment.

Microscopical examination shows chalk to be composed of the minute shells of animals called foraminifera; it was formed by their slow deposition on the bed of a deep ocean.

TERTIARY PERIOD.—EOCENE FORMATION.—Though the beds we are now about to describe rest upon the chalk, there intervenes a period of time to be reckoned perhaps in millions of years. For during this interval the whole life of the globe had had time to change: not one species of animal or plant is common to the chalk and to these Eocene beds which rest upon it, and such a change could only have been accomplished in a vast period of time. The Eocene strata of England lie in two *basins*, viz., the London Basin and the Hampshire Basin; outliers only of the former occur in Wilts, but of the latter the main outcrop enters the south-eastern extremity of the county.

Hampshire Basin.—On each side of the chalk ridge called Dean Hill, about 5 miles south-east of Salisbury, we find a narrow band of the *Woolwich and Reading Beds*—unfossiliferous plastic clays and mottled sands. On these rests the *London Clay*, forming the Earldom Woods, Bentley Wood, &c. Then we get the *Bagshot Sands*, forming Hamptworth, Landford, and West Wellow Commons, with an outlying patch at Alderbury and West Grinstead.

London Basin.—Capping the hills round Great and Little Bedwin, outliers of the divisions of the Eocene strata occur. The *Reading Beds* and *London Clay* are here very thin, not more than 12 to 15 feet each in thickness, so that we are close to their original western termination.

THE DRIFT OR SURFACE DEPOSITS.—In the counties south of the Thames, no clear evidence of glacial action has yet been made out, and it seems probable that this district was above water when icebergs came sailing over the submerged more central portions of our island. The brick-earths of the Marlborough Downs, the clay-with-flints often found upon the chalk, and the flint gravel and quartzose gravels which are seen lying on the Oxford Clay are of very dubious and uncertain age; the gravels and alluvial deposits which border the present streams are, however, of much more recent formation, and form the last or newest of the geological series.

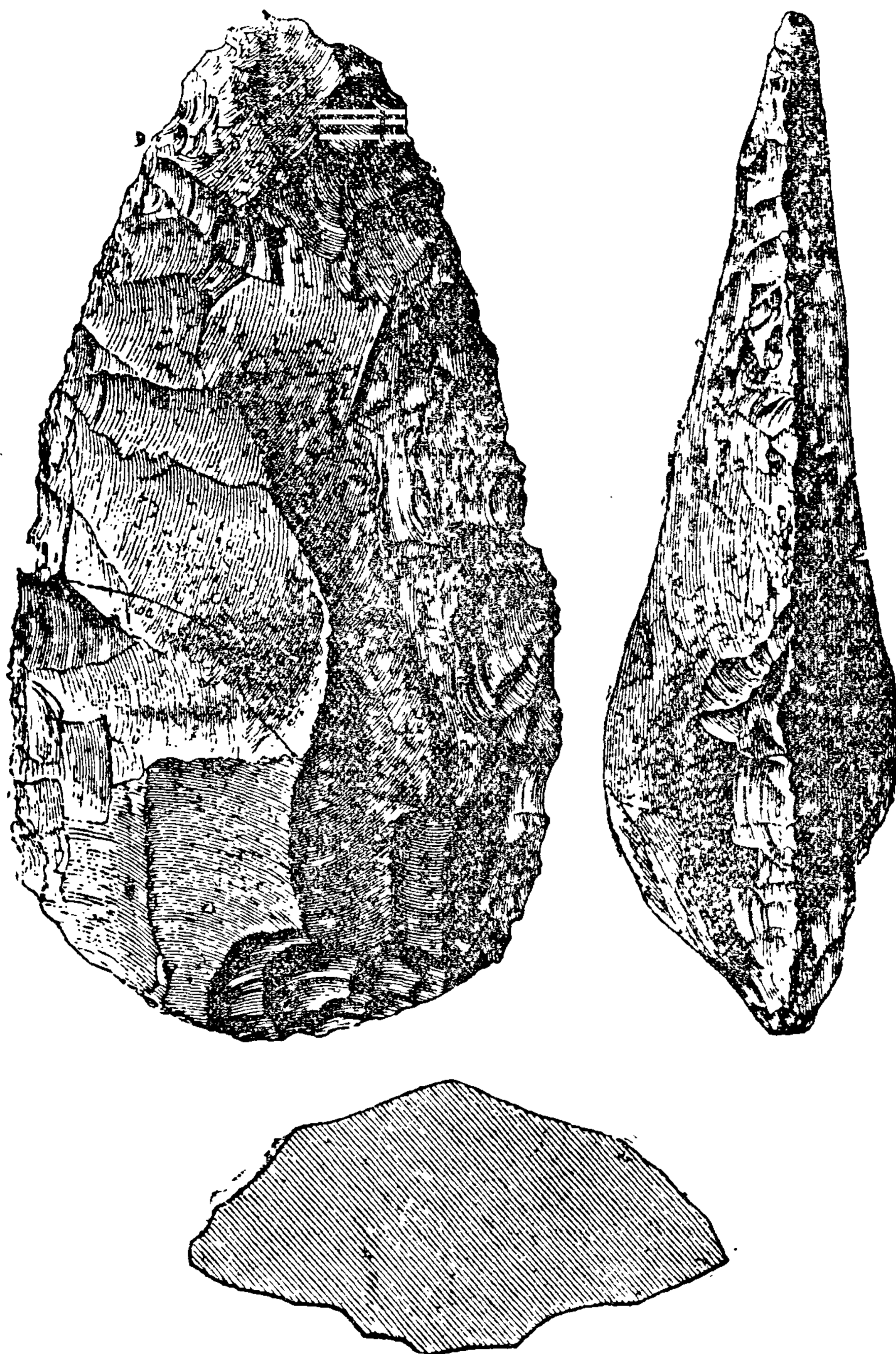
The Druid Stones, Sarsens, or Grey Wethers are huge blocks of a siliceous sandstone which are strewn in great numbers over the surface of the Chalk. The circles of Stonehenge and Avebury are mainly formed of these stones, the inner circles at Stonehenge, however, are of greenstone; similar, Professor Ramsay says, to some of the Silurian rocks of North Wales. The Grey Wethers are probably the relics of a bed of sandstone contained in the *Bagshot Series* (*Eocene*), which formerly stretched much further to the west than they do at present.

PREHISTORIC MAN.—Wilts is rich indeed in the remains of races of men of whom no written records exist. The earliest traces of man's presence in this district consist of certain roughly-shaped flint implements found in gravels on the sides of the valleys of the Avon, Wiley, &c. at Bemerton, Fisherton, Milford Hill, Lake, Ashford, Britford, Downton, &c. These gravel-beds are from 40 to 100 feet above the present level of the rivers, a fact which alone marks their great age, since the river has, since their formation, deepened its valley to that extent. These rough tools belong to Sir John Lubbock's *Palaolithic Stone Age*. Of much later date, and showing marks of great progress, are the elegantly fashioned and skilfully chipped stone implements of the *Neolithic Age*—the celts, chisels, scrapers, arrow-heads, knives, &c., which have been found scattered on the surface in so many localities in Wiltshire, but more especially at Avebury, Durrington, Everley, Roundway

near Devizes, Stonehenge, Upton Lovel, West Kennet, Wilsford, and Winterbourn Stoke. In the mounds or barrows—prehistoric burial-places—which stud the Chalk Downs in such numbers, Sir R. C. Hoare found numbers of such objects, which are noted in his magnificent work on “Ancient Wilts.” All or most of these stone objects were the

has of late years claimed for them a date about 520 A.D. and believes that the purpose was to commemorate the twelve great battles in which King Arthur overthrew for a time the Saxons, but these are questions which belong rather to Archæology than to Geology.

The composition and origin of the great blocks of rock

work of men who lived in this country long before the time of the Romans—of men who were ignorant of the properties of metals.

Then we have the grand megalithic structures of Stonehenge and Avebury, and Silbury Hill, a miniature mountain which covers about 5 acres of ground and rises to a height of 130 feet: these structures, too, have usually been assigned to Druidic (*i.e.* pre-Roman) times, but Mr. Fergusson

which compose Stonehenge have been lately investigated by Prof. Maskelyne; the outer circle is composed of “Sarsen stones”—compact quartzose rocks from the Tertiary strata: the “altar-stone” is a grey sandstone or micaceous grit, resembling the Old Red Sandstone of the Mendip Hills near Frome; 29 of the stones which form the inner circle may be referred to the igneous rock called *diabase*; three others are hornstones, and one is a siliceous schist.

AMESBURY (originally Ambresbury or Ambrosebury) is a parish, formerly a market town, which gives name to a hundred and union, and is in a small valley on the river Avon, 4 miles north-west from Porton station on the main line of the London and South Western railway, 8 north from Salisbury and 78 from London, in the Southern division of the county, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Amesbury (Amesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary is an ancient structure of flint and stone, apparently Norman, having chancel, transepts, nave of three bays, south aisle, square central tower, 6 bells and clock: it was reopened after extensive repairs, December, 1853: the north transept has a chapel at the east end (now used as a vestry), and a double piscina: overhead is a parvise or priest's chamber: the chancel has a stone credence supported by two angels: there are 656 sittings. The register dates from the year 1579 of baptisms, and 1509 of marriages and burials, but is complete and continuous only from the years 1624 for baptisms, and 1610 for marriages and burials. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £300, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Canons of Windsor, and held since 1876 by the Rev. Arthur Whitmarsh Phelps M.A. Worcester College, Oxford, and chaplain of Amesbury union. Here is a Wesleyan chapel. A cemetery chapel was built and an acre of land laid out in 1860, as an addition to the churchyard, at the sole expense of the late Sir Edmund Antrobus bart.; date of consecration, May, 1860. There is a charity, founded by Richard Harrison in 1725, derived from 21 acres of land at Allington, for apprenticing poor children who are not receiving parish relief. This was a Roman settlement, and its present name is by some derived from Aurelius Ambrosius, a king of the Romano-Britons. There is the site of an old British village, commonly called Vespasian's Camp, to the westward of the town, intersected by the road to Stonehenge: it occupies the summit of an eminence on the banks of the Avon and is surrounded by a single ditch and vallum, inclosing an area of 39 acres.

The celebrated remains of a supposed Druidical temple, called Stonehenge, are situated on Salisbury plain, 2 miles west-north-west of Amesbury and within the parish: these consist of two circles of monolithic blocks of sandstone and greenstone, with an inner horseshoe of five trilithons, some retaining their original upright position and others prostrate. A nunnery was founded here by Queen Elfrida to expiate the murder of King Edward: it was once in such repute that Queen Eleanor, widow of Henry III. retired to it, and there, in the year 1284, took the veil, as did also, subsequently, the Princess Mary, daughter of Edward I. carrying with her a train of thirteen noble young ladies. In a finely timbered park, and on the site of the old nunnery, stands the Abbey, the residence of Sir Edmund Antrobus bart. D.L., J.P.: it was once the residence of the Duke and Duchess of Queensberry, the patrons of the poet Gay. On the further bank of the Avon, opposite the abbey, is a lawn called the Diamond, in the centre of which is a large cave, where, it is stated, Gay wrote several of his celebrated fables. Sir Edmund Antrobus bart. is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is light; subsoil, chalk. There are many downs in the neighbourhood affording good pasturage for sheep, of which large flocks are kept. The chief crops are barley, wheat and oats. The area is 5,625 acres of land and 41 of water; rateable value, £4,773; in 1891 the population was 981, including 43 officers and inmates in the workhouse.

There are several quarries of excellent stone in the neighbourhood, well adapted for building purposes. The land is chiefly in wheat and pasture. The area of the ecclesiastical parish of Atworth and South Wraxall is 2,927 acres; the population in 1891 was 1,013. The area of the civil parish of Atworth, including Great and Little Chalfield and Cottles, is 2,693 acres; rateable value, £3,832; the population in 1891 was 767.

AVEBURY is a parish on the Kennet, containing the village of Avebury, 7 miles west from Marlborough station on a branch of the Great Western railway, 9 north-east from Devizes, with the hamlets of Beckhampton and West Kennett, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Selkley, union and county court district of Marlborough and Ramsbury, Marlborough petty sessional division, rural deanery of Avebury, archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The register dates from the year 1697. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £67, gross yearly value £327, net £300, including 101 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Trustees, and held since 1894 by the Rev. William Henry Davis B.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. There is a

Free Church of England, which will seat 200 persons. There is a Baptist chapel in the village, built in 1873. Hawkins' charity of £5 17s. 6d. yearly is for clothing. Sir Henry Bruce Meux bart. of Dauntsey, is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is loam and clay; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and roots. The area is 4,544 acres; rateable value, £3,233; the population in 1891 was 674.

Beckhampton is 1 mile south-west; West Kennett, 1 mile south-east, on the road from Marlborough to Calne.

On Windmill Hill, as well as on the surrounding downs, are numerous barrows. Silbury Hill, rising to the height of 130 feet, is 1 mile south. The remains of the Druidical temple at Avebury are crossed by two roads; it originally consisted of an outer and two inner circles of huge stones, some of which are still in position.

JOHN is a parish and village, 14 miles south-west from Salisbury, 6 south from Tisbury station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway and 6½ east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Chalke hundred, Tisbury and Mere petty sessional division, Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district and rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. BISHOP'S CANNINGS is a scattered parish containing a village of the same name, near the Kennet and Avon canal, 3 miles north-east from Devizes station, and the tithings of Horton, Bourton, Easton and Coate, in the Eastern division of the county, Potterne and Cannings hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Devizes, Avebury rural deanery (Cannings portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary, built about A.D. 1190-1200, is a large and beautiful cruciform structure, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles, transepts, chantry chapel, south porch and a central tower with turret, and surmounted by a spire of the 15th century, 230 feet in height and containing 8 bells: the church appears to have been many years in construction, as the nave arcade is Transition Norman, and the edifice, in its progress towards completion, assumed the distinctive features of the Early English style: the south porch has a groined stone roof, and from the ball-flower ornament in the arch mouldings of the outer doorway, seems to have been added in the Decorated period: within the porch are traces of a holy water stoup, and over the inner doorway is a bracket which formerly supported a small statue: the nave roof and clerestory are Perpendicular, and were probably added in the earlier half of the 15th century: the chancel is large, and has a groined stone ceiling: it contains a piscina of Early English date, with the remains of sedilia: in the south wall of the south transept is another piscina with stone shelf, probably indicating an altar here: at the north-east angle of the chancel is the ancient sacristy, having a groined stone roof and two small lancet windows, deeply splayed internally: in the outer wall of the north aisle, on the west side of the small doorway, can be seen a stoup in excellent preservation: the chapel to the east of the south transept is almost coeval with the

latter, but of its founder nothing is known; it was dedicated to "Our Lady of the Bower"; in 1563 the churchwardens conveyed it by deed to John Ernle, of Bourton, "to construct seats therein for the purpose of hearing divine service in the church, and also as a place of burial for himself and family"; it contains, in the south wall, an exceedingly small piscina; against the north wall is a freestone monument to John Ernle, ob. 1571, bearing the arms of Ernle quartered with Malwyn; there is also another monument to Edward Ernle, ob. 1656, of Etchilhampton, with a shield bearing the arms of Ernle quartered with Hungerford; immediately above, on the sill of the east window, is an ancient helmet surmounted with the Ernle crest: the organ, erected in 1809, at a cost of 400 guineas, and since enlarged, and the yearly interest of £600 to keep the instrument in order and pay the organist, were bequeathed by Mr. Wm. Bayley, a native of this village, who circumnavigated the globe with Captain Cook, and died in 1809: there is a very curious panelled oak chair in the north transept, date unknown; it is square in shape, with a seat and desk; on one side of the square is a painting of a large hand with open fingers and a label on the wrist, inscribed "The Hand of Meditation"; the palm and fingers have twenty other labels with short Latin inscriptions; there are also two scrolls similarly inscribed; many theories have been advanced as to the use of this ancient relic, but they are more or less hypothetical: the east window of three lights with detached marble shafts is stained; it was erected in 1860 by the clergy and churchwardens of the archdeaconry of Wilts and other friends to the Ven. William Macdonald M.A.; he died in 1862, having been vicar of this parish for 46 years, and is further commemorated by a brass in the chancel, inserted by his widow; another brass is to William and Joseph Christopher Ewart M.P.'s for 38 and 10 years respectively: the church contains many

other brasses, mural tablets and floor stones: the church was restored in 1883-4, at a cost of about £3,600, under the direction of Mr. Charles E. Pointing, architect, of Marlborough, when the floors were relaid, the interior refitted and re-seated with oak benches, carved by Mr. Harry Hems, of Exeter, no two being alike: there are sittings for 500 persons. The register dates from the year 1591. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge £638, average £477, net income £200, including 20 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury, and held since 1873 by the Rev. Charles William Hony M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford. Here are Baptist and Wesleyan chapels. The Devizes waterworks, in this parish, and distant from that town $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles, were erected in 1879, at a cost of £11,700. The Commissioners of Her Majesty's Woods, who are lords of the manor, and Mr. George Skeate Ruddle, are the principal landowners. Mrs. Erle Drax, of Bere Regis, Wareham, is the principal landowner of the hamlet of Coate. The soil is greensand and chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, beans and turnips. The parish contains 8,893 acres, of which 1,389 are in the tithing of Coate, and consists of partly arable, pasture and down land; rateable value, £5,531; the population in 1891 was 894, exclusive of South Broom and Chittoe.

BISHOPSTONE (near Salisbury) is a parish and village, situated on the river Ebele, 6 miles south-west from Salisbury, 4 south from Wilton station, in the Southern division of the county, Downton hundred, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, Chalke rural deanery (Chalk portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. John the Baptist is a handsome cruciform Gothic structure of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, north and south transepts and a square embattled tower rising from the centre, with 3 bells: the communion service was presented in 1663 by Bishop Earle, formerly a rector of the parish: at the end of the south transept is an elaborate monument, designed by Pugin, to a former rector, the Rev. G. A. Montgomery, and a munificent benefactor to the parish, who died in 1842: there are 300 sittings. The register dates from the year 1625. The living is a rectory and vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £728, gross yearly value £712, net £612, including 29 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Earl of Pembroke, and held since 1850 by the Venerable Francis Lear M.A. of Christ Church, Oxford, archdeacon and canon residentiary of Salisbury, and surrogate. The Pembroke family have been lords of the manor since 1550; the principal landowner is the

BISHOPSTONE (near Shrivenham) is a village and parish $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-west from Shrivenham station on the Great Western railway, and 7 east from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, on the Berkshire border, hundred of Ramsbury, petty sessional division and county court district of Swindon, union of Highworth and Swindon, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. Mary is a stone structure of early foundation, but was to a great extent reconstructed in the 14th and 15th centuries: the portions of the early building at present existing are the Norman doorway of the chancel, which dates from the latter part of the 12th century, and the north porch and adjoining part of the nave wall, erected early in the 13th century: it consists of chancel, nave of five bays and aisles, with square embattled western tower containing a fine peal

Borton (or Bourton) tithing, a Roman settlement, is half a mile north-east; Horton tithing, half a mile south-east; Coate tithing, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south; Easton tithing, 1 mile north-east. On Pound Down are many barrows.

St. James (or South Broom), formerly a chapelry attached to this parish, was in 1832 made a separate ecclesiastical parish: it is partly within the town and borough of Devizes, which see.

Chittoe ecclesiastical district is partly in this parish, but will be found under a separate heading. A part of this parish is included in the ecclesiastical parish of Derry Hill.

of 8 bells and clock: the chancel has been restored by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, when an old piscina was discovered: on the tomb of Christopher Willoughby, in the chancel, is an epitaph, setting forth that he was most happy with his first wife, but unhappy in his second nuptials: in 1882 and 1883 the church was excellently restored, at a cost of £1,600, under the direction of the late Ewan Christian esq. architect: on Good Friday evening, 1891, a disastrous fire broke out in the tower, consuming the belfry; the roof of the tower and clock were destroyed, and the bells were melted; they have since been replaced, also a new clock, the whole of the restoration costing upwards of £2,600: there are 250 sittings. BISHOPSTROW is a parish, on the road from Warminster to Salisbury, 1½ miles south-east from Warminster station on the Bath and Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, and 2½ west-north-west from Heytesbury, in the Western division of the county, hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Warminster, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury: the river Wylve flows through the parish. BLUNSDON-ST.-ANDREW is an ecclesiastical parish, formed out of the parish of Highworth in 1884, 4 miles south-west from Highworth, 4½ north from Swindon and 1½ north-west from Stratton station on the Highworth branch of the Great Western railway, in the Northern division of the county, hundred of Highworth, petty sessional division and county court district of Swindon, union of Highworth and Swindon, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The tithing of Blunsdon-St.-Leonard (or Broad Blunsdon) was united with Blunsdon-St.-Andrew in 1884, and together form one civil parish, under the name of Blunsdon-St.-Andrew, but are still separate ecclesiastically. The church of St. Leonard is a handsome structure of stone, in the Early English, Decorated and Perpendicular styles, and consists of chancel with chantry chapel, nave of four

at Bourton quarry, distributed in coal; rent of 40 gardens (under the Common Closures Act) distributed in fuel and clothing: there is also a piece of ground in the centre of the village, purchased by the late Rev. BOWOOD, a liberty, included in 1889 for civil purposes in the parish of Calne Without, is 2 miles south-west from Calne terminal station on a branch of the Great Western railway and 3½ south-east-by-east

from Chippenham, in the North Western division of the county, hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Calne and ecclesiastical parish of Derry Hill. The estates of Bowood anciently formed part of the royal forest of Pewsham, but being disafforested were ultimately acquired by the family of Petty, ancestors of the Most Hon. the Marquess of Lansdowne K.G. present owner: Bowood, his seat here, consists of three distinct parts, built at various times, and hence presents an irregular and diversified mass of architecture; the chief or principal portion was erected by the Earl of Shelburne, from designs by the Adams', and forms the eastern portion and includes the reception rooms; to this was added, at the end of last century, a wing 300 feet long, after the model of the Emperor Diocletian's palace at Spalatro; this forms the southern side of two quadrangular courts and contains the libraries, conservatory and chapel, which are surrounded by domestic offices: the third portion, to the north, consists of the drawing room and a series of private apartments: the principal front faces the south and commands a rich and diversified view: the main entrance at the eastern end is ornamented by a large portico supported by 10 Doric columns, with corresponding entablature, and pediment, on which the family arms are sculptured in bold relief: the mansion contains a very fine collection of pictures by English and foreign masters: the gardens along the south front are

arranged in two terraces, one above the other, inclosed within stone balustrading adorned with vases: the park and pleasure grounds of this demesne, including the woods, extend over an area of 1,000 acres, the surface being greatly diversified by nature, and studded with oaks, pines and cedars, comprise a variety of beautiful scenery: in the midst is a noble lake of about 30 acres, the outlet of which, falling over a mass of artificial rock, forms a grand cascade, encompassed with trees and reached through winding caverns. About 1 mile west of the mansion, and deeply shaded by the woods, stands the family mausoleum, first consecrated to the memory of John Petty, created Earl of Shelburne 1753 (d. 1761), son of Thomas, 1st Earl of Kerry, and Anne, his wife, daughter of Sir William Petty, physician general to the army in Ireland: William, 2nd Earl of Shelburne, son of John, was the first Marquess of Lansdowne. The soil is for the most part sandy, belonging to the calcareous grit formation, but on the higher part there are patches of Kimmeridge clay, above which occurs the iron brash of the Lower Greensand; the lowest parts of the valleys reach to the Oxford clay. The area is 969 acres.

The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value from tithe rent-charge £408, average £318, net income £315, including one acre of glebe, with residence, in the gift of William Stancomb esq. of Blounts Court, Potterne, and held since 1874 by the Rev. George Edward Gardiner M.A. of Brasenose College, Oxford, who is also sinecure rector of Haslebury. There is a Free Methodist chapel at Box Hill, and a Wesleyan chapel in the village. A cemetery of about 1¼ acre was formed in 1858 and has a mortuary chapel; it is under the control of a Burial Board of 6 members. Here are extensive stone quarries, a tallow factory, and some brewing and malting are done. The Box tunnel near here, through which the Great Western railway passes, is about two miles and three quarters in length. The charities amount to £409, arising from funds left in 1844 and 1861 by John Neat esq. and Mrs. Holworthy, and invested in £2¼ per cent. Consols; the interest is divided on Christmas day

amongst 20 old men and women who are parishioners and members of the Church of England. Ashley Manor is the residence of Col. George Wilbraham Northey D.L., J.P. The principal landowners are the Rev. Edward William Northey M.A. Woodcote House, Epsom, who is lord of the manor, together with his brother, Col. George Wilbraham Northey, George Pargiter Fuller esq. of Neston Park, and Sir John P. Dickson-Poynder bart. M.P. of Hartham Park, Corsham. The soil is various; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley, and oats. The area is 4,404 acres; rateable value, £17,569; the population in 1891 was 2,360. Parish Clerk, Charles Richards.

BOYTON is a parish on the river Wylve, half a mile south from Codford station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, 3 miles south-east from Heytesbury and 7 south-east from Warminster, in the Western division of the county, hundred of Heytesbury, Warminster petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Wylve (Wylve portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary the Virgin is a fine specimen of Early English architecture, and was restored in 1860: it consists of chancel, nave, the Lambert chapel, north transept, south porch and a square western embattled tower with 4 bells: there are 220 sittings. The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value from tithe rent-charge £517, average £392, net income £302, including 9½ acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Magdalen College, Oxford, and held since 1861 by the Rev. Richard Zouche Walker M.A. late fellow of that college. Here is a small cemetery, the ground for which was given and laid out by E. D. V. Fane esq. The charities are the Monpesson money invested, £1 ros. yearly, in the hands of the Charity Commissioners; Snelgrove charity, interest on £100 in Consols, yearly, both for clothing and food. Boyton Manor, tenanted

by John Evans Hamilton Martin esq. M.F.H. is in the Elizabethan style, and stands in an extensive and well wooded park. Edmund Douglas Veitch Fane esq. J.P. is lord of the manor and principal landowner and has had waterworks erected here to supply the farms and the manor house: the pumping station is at Sherrington. The soil is light chalk; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 4,578 acres; rateable value, £2,796; the population in 1891 was 291.

Corton (or Cortington) is a township, 1 mile north-west from the village, where is a place of worship for Baptists.

BRADENSTOKE-CUM-CLACK is a district formed in 1866 for ecclesiastical purposes out of the parishes of Christian Malford and Lyneham, three quarters of a mile south from Dauntsey station, on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 5 south-west from Wootton Bassett, and 7 north from Calne, in the Northern division of the county, petty sessional division of Cricklade and Wootton Bassett, Calne county court district, Avebury rural deanery (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary the Virgin is a Gothic stone building, exceedingly beautiful, and was erected in 1864 by Sir Gabriel Goldney bart.: it consists of chancel, nave of three bays, north aisle, north porch and western bell turret with one bell: there are sittings for 250 persons. The register dates from the year 1867. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £35, net yearly value £105, in the gift of Sir Gabriel Goldney bart. and held since 1892 by the Rev. Hubert Alfred Corke, of St. Bees. Here is a Baptist chapel also a Primitive Methodist chapel. There is a reading room open during the winter months.

Bradenstoke Abbey is a farmhouse, occupying the site of a priory for Augustine monks, founded about 1142, and dedicated to the Blessed Virgin; some parts of the building are very ancient. There is a Pilgrim's well within the abbey grounds, from which tradition says a pathway leads direct to Malmesbury abbey. In the village is a stone cross. Sir Gabriel Godfrey bart. is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is of a sandy nature; subsoil, sand. The chief crops are grass and wheat. The area is 1,000 acres; the population in 1891 was 437.

BRADFORD-ON-AVON.

BRADFORD-ON-AVON is a parish, market and union town, situated on the Somersetshire border, on the river Avon and on the Kennet and Avon canal, with a station on the Salisbury, Weymouth and Bath branch of the Great Western railway, 102 miles from London by road and 100 by railway, 8 south-east from Bath, 3 north-east from Trowbridge, 5 south-west from Melksham, 12 west from Devizes and 12 north from Warminster, in the Western division of the county, hundred and petty sessional division of Bradford, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The town is built within a recess, on the abrupt declivities of the sides of a rocky hill, and the most ancient parts are laid out in a succession of terraces, rising one above another to the very summit of the hill, from one of which, called Tory Rank, the views are very picturesque, and the prospect is extensive and delightfully varied; in the valley below stands the fine old parish church; near to its base, after emerging from between the hills, flows the river Avon, its banks dotted with factories: on the west, and under the side of Grip Hill, is a fine old barn, called "Barton Barn," formerly belonging to the "Grange," or principal farm of the Abbess of Shaftesbury: on the east is the greater portion of the town, while in the foreground may be seen the village of Hilperton, and the town of Trowbridge, with Westbury Down and the Wiltshire hills in the distance.

Bradford means the "broad ford" over the river, and was inhabited as early as the time of the Roman occupation of this part of the country. The town was a place of some consequence even in the time of the West Saxons, being the site of a monastic institution, founded by St. Aldhelm in 705; it was given to the nunnery at Shaftesbury in 1001. In 954 St. Dunstan was elected Bishop of Worcester at a synod held at Bradford: this town was privileged to send members to Parliament, but this right was not exercised more than once: a portion of the town still bears the appellation of the Borough of Bradford, but whether it was ever incorporated and had a separate jurisdiction seems to be unknown. The river Avon is here crossed by two bridges, and on one that crosses in the centre of the town is a stone building with a square domical roof, once a chapel, where pilgrims offered at once devotions and alms. Near this, to the west, is the ancient ford by which the town was approached; at times it can be crossed dry-shod. The other bridge, called Barton Bridge, with four arches, is lower down the stream.

Bradford is considered to be a very pleasing, exceedingly picturesque and very healthy town, well defended from the north and east winds, while all impurities, after passing down its sloping streets, are immediately carried off by the waters of the Avon: the houses are mostly gable-fronted, built with stone, and roofed with the same material. The streets are generally narrow and irregular, but, in some instances, they have been widened and improved. In 1834 the town was lighted with gas by a company, and on the 15th of July, 1839, the "Bradford Town Improvement Act" received the Royal Assent; this has been superseded under the "Local Government Act, 1894," by an Urban District Council.

Waterworks, the property of the Council, were erected in 1883: the adits, situated at Avoncliff, yield a copious supply of pure spring water, which is pumped thence into the reservoir at the top of the hill between Winsley and Bradford: the town is supplied by gravitation: the cost of the works was £12,000, and they were opened in October, 1883, by Miss Hobhouse, daughter of Sir Charles Parry Hobhouse, the lord of the manor and then chairman of the Town Improvement Commissioners.

The church of the Holy Trinity is an ancient and handsome structure in the Norman, Early English and Perpendicular styles; it consists of a chancel with reredos, nave of five bays, north aisle, chapel and south porch, and has a square western tower, with an embattled parapet, and surmounted by a low short spire of disproportionate dimensions: the tower contains a fine peal of 8 bells, and a set of chimes playing the tunes of "Hanover" and the "Sicilian Mariners' Hymn" every three hours, and having a clock: there are many old tombs, of which the most remarkable are in the chancel: on the south side, within a niche, is the mutilated

recumbent figure of a knight in armour: on the north side is a niche containing the full-length effigy of a lady: there is a brass in the chancel to Roger Deverell (d. 1546), and his wife and son Michael Deverell (d. 1627), and John Deverell (d. 1726); also a brass to Anne, daughter of John Yewe (d. 1601), and others to Lieut.-General Henry Shrapnel, Col. Commandant 6th Battalion of Artillery (d. 1842), and to D. Clutterbuck (d. 1769): in the north aisle is an ancient brass to Thomas Horton and Mary his wife, the date is left in blank: some stained windows were presented many years ago by John Ferret esq. a native of this town: about 1855 an east window was put in, and more recently the stained west window of the tower, and a stained window has been placed at the east end of the north aisle to the memory of Emanuel Taylor, his wife, and only daughter, he having been churchwarden over twenty years: in 1888 a stained window was placed in the north aisle to the memory of Canon Rich-Jones, the late vicar: in 1893 a stone dwarf screen, with wrought iron entrance gates, separating the chancel from the nave, was erected in memory of the Rev. Baldwin Francis Leighton B.A. sometime hon. curate: there are sittings for 637 persons: in the churchyard, opposite the door on the south side of the chancel, is a very ancient tomb, highly decorated. The register dates from the year 1565. The living is a vicarage, tithes commuted at £391, average £297, net income £228, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury, and held since 1886 by the Rev. Sydney Garbett Collisson, who is a surrogate.

Christ Church is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1843; the church, a building of stone, was erected in 1840, at Bearfield, within the town: it is in the Perpendicular style, consisting of a chancel, with a reredos and nave, south porch with a western tower, lofty spire and one bell: the chancel was added from designs by the late Sir G. Gilbert Scott R.A. at a cost of £2,000: there is a stained east window and eight others: in 1884 the church was re-seated with oak benches, the floors re-laid with patent wood blocks, and the approaches laid with Godwin's encaustic tiles: the work was carried out under the direction of the architect, Mr. John Oldred Scott M.A. London: an oak screen, separating the chancel from the nave, and an organ chamber were added in 1891: there are 500 sittings. The register dates from the year 1842. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £300, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Bradford, and held since 1873 by the Rev. Richard Umfraville Lambert M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge.

The Dissenting chapels are:—Old Baptist, founded 1689, rebuilt 1797, with 400 sittings; Baptist, Providence, founded 1704, with 300 sittings; Particular Baptist, Zion, built 1823, 480 sittings; Congregational, Huntingdon street, founded 1798, 250 sittings; Congregational, founded 1740, enlarged 1798 and 1835, 500 sittings; Wesleyan Methodist, founded 1818, 600 sittings; and Wesleyan Iron Mission Room, Bradford Leigh, built in 1892, to hold 50.

A cemetery of 4a. 8p. in the Holt road, was formed in 1856 at a cost of £3,000, with two mortuary chapels; it is under the control of a committee.

A handsome Town Hall, built in the heart of the town, has attached, and forming part of the design, justice rooms and dwellings for the police; the structure is of Bath stone, and the style is Elizabethan, designed by Thomas Fuller esq. architect, late of Bath: the Urban District Council's offices are in this building. The Temperance Hall in Sladesbrook, erected in 1845, will hold 200 persons. The Armoury of the 1st Wilts (E Company) Volunteers, which was embodied in 1860 and now numbers about 92 efficient members, is in Silver street. The Fire Brigade consists of a superintendent and 12 members, who have a manual engine.

Bradford was at one time the central town in the west of England for the manufacture of superfine broad-cloths, but at the present time there are only two factories at work: this business is known to have been carried on here to some extent in the time of King Edward I. Edward III. invited clothworkers to repair to England out of foreign parts, to whom he granted sundry privileges. Anthony Methuen, the ancestor of the present Lord Methuen, of Corsham House, was the

first to improve upon the old mode of cloth-making by introducing into Bradford, in 1740, operatives from Flanders, in order to manufacture superfine broadcloth. It is said that the town of Bradford, in Yorkshire, was founded by natives of this place. There are works here for the production of india rubber goods; two banks and two breweries and two foundries, and several quarries from which good building stone is obtained.

The market days for provisions are Saturdays. The fairs are—one in Bradford on Trinity Monday, for cattle, horses and peddlery; one also at Bradford Leigh, on the first Monday after the 24th August, except when Monday falls on the 24th, then on that day.

Lord Chancellor Bethell, afterwards Lord Westbury, was born at Westbury house, in St. Margaret street.

In the Frome road are two almshouses—one for four poor men, founded by John Hall esq. the last of an ancient family who had been inhabitants of this town since the reign of Edward I.; his arms, crest and motto are over the doorway—motto, "Deo et pauperibus" (for God and the poor), date 1700: this interesting building was entirely restored in 1891-3, by the late H. Moulton esq. who, by his will, further endowed it with a sum of £1,000: each inmate receives 5s. per week: the other, for poor old women, was rebuilt from designs by C. S. Adye esq. in 1868 and added to by the same architect in 1878: it is a very ancient charity, endowed with lands in the neighbourhood that once belonged to the monastery of Shaftesbury; this charity is in the patronage of the lord of the manor, and has, by the erection of a fourth almshouse, been restored to its original size: four old women enjoy the benefits of this endowment, and each receives 4s. weekly. The charities for distribution amount to £64 8s.

John Curl, of Turleigh, by will dated 1703, gave £30 yearly out of the rents of his estate at Churton to be distributed on the Feast of St. Thomas to 120 poor persons, 5s. each, of Bradford, Winsley, Leigh and Woolley; Mrs. Elizabeth Tugwell left in 1799 £100 stock, the interest to be given to 40 old and infirm persons; Samuel Cam left in 1792 £100 stock, the interest to be given to the poor in bread; Mrs. Charlotte Amelia Beaven left £50, the interest to be given in bread on Christmas Day; Edward Thresher left £100 stock, which is now increased to £200; John Strawbridge left £400 in Consols, the interest of these charities to be given to the poor in crowns and half-crowns.

There are the remains of many ancient edifices, both of a private and also of an ecclesiastical character, in and about the town, such as the Saxon Church, Priory, Chantry House, Tory Hermitage, besides others, which from lapse of time, their dilapidated condition, or partial incorporation with other buildings, cannot now be specified by name, their foundations, as well as their subsequent history, alike being lost. Of these the Saxon church is the most interesting; Professor Edmund A. Freeman, in "English Towns and Districts," says "It is probably the only perfect surviving church of its kind in England, if not in Europe," and is believed to be the ecclesiola, or little church, attached to the monastery before mentioned as founded by St. Aldhelm, and which is mentioned by William of Malmesbury as standing in his time, A.D. 1120, although the monastery has been destroyed: it owes its discovery to the archaeological intelligence of the late vicar, the Rev. Canon William Henry Rich-Jones M.A. who, standing on Tory Rank about 1858 and looking down on the roofs of the town, observed that the outline of the three roofs of a very old building was of an ecclesiastical character, and that the roofs were apparently those of the chancel, nave and porch of a church; at that time the building was so surrounded by other structures and by the accumulation of the dirt of centuries, to the height in some places of six feet above the foundations, that it was difficult to form an accurate judgment on the subject: the building has been purchased and vested in trustees, of whom the Rev. the Hon. S. Meade, of this town, is one: the surrounding objects have been cleared away, and the proportions of this old building fairly displayed: the existing porch is on the north side, but there appears to have been a similar one to the south, so that the church was cruciform; the workmanship is of a rude character; the most striking feature is the great height of the building as compared with its length and breadth: the nave is 25 feet by 13, and 25 high; the chancel is 13 feet by 10, and 18 feet high; the porch is 10 feet square and 15 feet high; and the opening from the chancel to the nave is rather a doorway than an arch, being 2 feet wide and 8 feet high; some progress has been made in the restoration of the church and the reconstruction of the archways, which has been assisted by the fact that many of the original stones have been found, either

embedded in the rubbish or worked into the other buildings, and these have been replaced in their original positions; it has been so far restored as to admit of service being held in this ancient building.

The Hermitage or Tory Chapel stands on Tory Rank, the highest part of the town, and in 1869, being then in a very dilapidated state, passed into the hands of the late T. B. Saunders esq. of the Priory, who restored it, with great taste and judgment and at considerable expense, and it was opened again for public worship in 1871: this building is mentioned by Leyland in his "Itinerary" in 1533, and it is also mentioned by Aubrey as follows:—"On the top of the north hill, above Mr. Methwyn's, is the finest hermitage I have seen in England, several roomes and a very neat chapel of freestone." Previous to the restoration the interior was excavated to the depth of 10 feet below the floor: the east window remains as it was in Aubrey's time, with the exception of new mullions and repaired tracery; the other windows have been designed from parts of the former window, pieces of which were found when the ruins were explored: the niche on the south side of the east window has been simply restored, and the one on the north side, with the exception of the shaft and the canopy, is new, being made to correspond with the other: the north porch is also new, except the holy-water stoup, which was found in excavating the interior of the chapel: the cross over the eastern window has been restored, the upper portion of it having been found amongst the ruins: the building is cruciform, and almost immediately above the Lady Well, from which circumstance it has now been called St. Mary's Chapel, in addition to the name of Tory Chapel: there is a tradition that a subterranean passage existed from the Hermitage, conjectured to have led to the old buildings (which belonged to the Abbey of Shaftesbury) in the churchyard and Barton Farm: the east window contains three lights, having Our Saviour in the centre, St. Peter on the one hand, and St. Paul on the other, above which is the monogram I.H.S. with angels on either side: the window in the south porch represents St. Joseph, with the infant Jesus in his arms, and St. John the Baptist; the shield above represents the Lamb and Book with the Seven Seals.

There are many good residences in and about Bradford, also some large and ancient mansions; one amongst the number was once the residence of the notorious Duchess of Kingston, and is known as Kingston House, but now called The Hall, its original name: it was beautifully restored, in strict accordance with its original design, by the late S. Moulton esq. J.P. and is now the residence of John Moulton esq.

Leigh House is the seat of Lord Edmond Fitzmaurice J.P.; the mansion, pleasantly situated, stands in a park and grounds of 16 acres.

Bradford Old Priory is the residence of Frederick Thomas Saunders esq.; the mansion was built in the 15th century.

Berryfield House, standing in a park of about 60 acres, is the residence of Mrs. Palmer.

Frankleigh House is the seat of the Rev. the Hon. Canon Sidney Meade J.P.; the mansion, built about the time of James I. stands in a park and grounds of about 220 acres.

Northleigh is the seat of George L. Lopes esq. D.L., J.P.; the mansion stands in a park and grounds of about 40 acres; and Woodleigh, standing in a park of 16 acres, is the residence of Edward Mallinson J.P.

Sir Charles Parry Hobhouse bart. of Monkton Farleigh, is lord of the manor.

The principal landowners are Francis Atkinson esq. Rev. the Hon. Canon Sidney Meade, Earl Manvers, George Lionel Palmer esq. and Frederick Thomas Saunders esq. The soil is aerolite; subsoil, clay; the chief crops are wheat and grass.

The whole parish originally covered 10,036 acres, but the County Council have (1895) divided it into five viz: Bradford Urban and Without Holt, South Wroxall and Winsley; the area of the urban is 1,962 acres; the whole of the original parish is included in the rateable value, £36,735; the population in 1891 was 4,943 in the town. The population of the ecclesiastical parish of Holy Trinity in 1891 was 3,522, and of Christ Church, 1,766.

Atworth, formerly a tithing, was, by an order of the Local Government Board, dated 19th December, 1884, amalgamated with Great and Little Chalfield and Cottles, to form the civil parish of Atworth, and will be found under the heading of Atworth.

Bradford Leigh, Woolley and Trowle are tithings.

South Wroxall, a tithing, has been formed into a separate parish, and will be found under the head-

ing of South Wroxall. Holt, another separate parish, will be found under Colt.

Winsley and Limpley Stoke form another consolidated parish, and will be found under the headings of Winsley and Limpley Stoke.

Turleigh is a hamlet in Winsley.

NORTH BRADLEY is a parish comprising the tithings of North Bradley and Southwick, in the Western division of the county, hundred and petty sessional division of Whorwellsdown, union of Westbury and Whorwellsdown, county court district of Trowbridge, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury: North Bradley is 2 miles south from Trowbridge station on the Great Western railway, 3 north-west from Westbury, 7 north from Warminster and 7 north-east from Frome. The river Biss flows through the southern portion of the parish. The church of St. Nicholas is of mixed architecture, built of stone, and consists of chancel, nave of six bays, transepts and aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower, containing 6 fine toned bells, which were rehung in 1894, at a cost of £200: it was restored about the year 1863 at a cost of nearly £2,000, raised by subscription: the east and west windows, and also one in the north aisle and one in the sanctuary, are stained: the church contains a monument to Lady Emma, d. 1446, mother of John Stafford, Bishop of Wells, 1425, and Archbishop of Canterbury, 1443, and a mural monument to John Trenchard, the author, ob. 1723, and several to the Long family, Henry Long, 1727, Ellen Long, 1752, and William Long, 1773: there is a remarkable old Gothic font: there are 278 sittings. The register dates from the year 1665. The living is a vicarage, tithes commuted at £640, average £485, net yearly value £288, with 4 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Winchester College, and held since 1885 by the Rev. Wyndham Arthur Scinde Merewether M.A. of Oriel College, Oxford. St. Thomas', Southwick, a chapel of ease to St. Nicholas, is an iron building, consisting of chancel, small turret with a bell: there are 120 sittings. The Baptist chapel, built in 1779, and enlarged in 1803 and 1831, will hold 400. There is an almshouse for four poor persons, with a monthly allowance of 18s. each, founded in 1810 by Archdeacon Daubeny, who also built, in 1818, the vicar's poor house for 6 poor persons. A charity of £3 was given by Mrs. Rachael Long, in 1871, to six poor families of this parish. W. H. Long esq. M.P. of Rood Ashton House, is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Winchester College, Sir William Roger Brown J.P. of Highfield, Hilperton, and W. H. Laverton esq. J.P. of Leighton House, Westbury. The soil is clay; subsoil,

clay. The area is 4,036 acres, which is principally pasture; rateable value of North Bradley, £5,305, and of Southwick, £5,097; the population in 1891 was 1,837—809 in Bradley and 1,028 in Southwick, including Roadhill. The population of North Bradley ecclesiastical parish in 1891 was 1,560.

Yarnbrook is a hamlet three-quarters of a mile south-east. Here is a Baptist chapel, built in 1873, to hold 200.

Southwick tithing is 1½ miles west. Here is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1815, to hold 200; there is also a Particular Baptist chapel, erected in 1861, to hold 150. Southwick Manor Court was the residence of Archbishop Stafford; it is surrounded by a moat: the ruins of the chapel may still be traced: it is now occupied as a farm house.

BRATTON is a parish for all purposes, formed in 1894, it having been an ecclesiastical parish since 1845, out of Westbury, and is situated among the downs on the road from Westbury to Devizes, 3 miles east-by-north from Westbury station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, in the Western division of the county, petty sessional division of Trowbridge, Westbury union and county court district, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. James is of stone, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, transepts, aisles, and square embattled western tower containing 4 bells: it was restored, re-seated and newly roofed in 1860, at a cost of about £900, from designs by the architects, Scott and Wyatt: there are several stained windows; one at the eastern end representing the four greater prophets and the four evangelists, and the eastern window representing the Birth, Death and Resurrection: the church will seat 200 persons. The register dates from the year 1542. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £270, including 3½ acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Westbury, and held since 1875 by the Rev. Stephen Hall Jacob, Theol. Assoc. of King's College, London: the vicarage house was erected in 1863, at a cost of £1,600,

BREMILL (or Bremble) is a large parish and vil-
lage, 2 miles north-west from Calne terminal station of
a branch of the Great Western railway and 4 east from
Chippenham, in the North Western division of the county,
Chippenham hundred, Calne petty sessional division,
union and county court district, rural deanery of Ave-
bury (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and
diocese of Salisbury. The Berks and Wilts canal runs
through this parish. The church of St. Martin is a
stone building, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays,

of Salisbury and rural dean of Avebury. In Bremhill,
Charlcote and Foxham, there are free libraries, the gift
of Lord Edmond G. P. Fitzmaurice; there are com-
modious and convenient reading rooms, supplied with
the chief daily and weekly papers. The principal land-

owners are the Marquess of Lansdowne, who is lord of the manor, Lord Houghton and Sir John Poynder Dickson-Poynder bart. M.P. The soil is the Oxford clay and calcareous grit of the upper oolite, presenting varieties of loam, brash and clay; subsoil, sand, clay and stone brash. The chief crops are wheat, barley and beans. The area is 5,665 acres; rateable value, £10,077; the population in 1891 was 1,090 in the civil and 1,048 in the ecclesiastical parish. Part of this parish has been added to the ecclesiastical parish of Derry Hill.

BREMILHAM (or Cowgate), formerly a parish, was, by an order which came into operation March 25, 1884, for civil purposes, apportioned between Brockenborough, Foxley and St. Mary Westport; it is on the river Avon, 2 miles west-south-west from Malmesbury terminal station on a branch of the Great Western railway and 10 north-west from Chippenham, in the Northern division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Malmesbury, rural deanery of Malmesbury, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church has been pulled down, but the ground is still used as a cemetery: there is a small stone building used as a mortuary chapel. The inhabitants attend the church of Foxley. The register dates from the year 1790. The living is a rectory,

average tithe rent-charge £104, gross yearly value £106, in the gift of Lady Northwick, and held since 1893 by the Rev. George Lewis Pitt B.A. of University College, Durham, who is also rector of and resides at Foxley. Capt. George Lindsay Holford, of Weston Birt House, Gloucestershire, is lord of the manor and the principal landowner. The soil is brashy; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots and grass. The area and rateable value of this place is included in Malmesbury and Foxley; the population in 1891 was 44.

BRINKWORTH with GRITTENHAM.

BRINKWORTH is a parish and village, pleasantly situated on the high road from Swindon to Malmesbury and watered by a tributary of the Avon, 5 miles north-west from Wootton Bassett station, on the Reading and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 6 south-east from Malmesbury, in the North Western division of the county, hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Malmesbury, rural deanery of Malmesbury, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. Michael and All Angels is an ancient stone structure in the Early English style, consisting of a chancel, nave, aisles, south porch, and a square embattled western tower containing 5 bells: the chancel has been (1889) restored by the rector at a cost of £700: there are two hagioscopes and an ancient communion table in this church: there are 320 sittings. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a rectory, in the gift of Pembroke College, Oxford; tithe rent-charge commuted £742 a

year, gross income £900, net £800, with 146 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Pembroke College, Oxford, and held since 1861 by the Rev. William de Quetteville M.A. formerly fellow of that college. There is a chapel of ease, built in Callow Hill lane in 1889, to seat 80 persons. Here are Congregational and Primitive Methodist chapels. The churchyard was closed as a burial ground by Order in Council in October, 1887, and a cemetery formed close by, the cost of which, £350, was defrayed out of the rates; it is under the control of a burial board of 9 members. The charities are £15 a year, devised by the will of the late Mr. Weeks: £10 of this are given in shillings to the poor of the parish, and £5 are paid at Christmas for the free instruction of ten poor children: £7 19s. 8d. the second charity, consists of the dividends arising from sums invested in the funds, which, under the will of the late Mrs. Hannah Nicholls, are to be expended in the purchase of blankets to be distributed to the poor.

Lady Winchcomb gave £1 a year charge on land, for the purchase of books for the children of the poor. Penn's Lodge, 1½ miles north-east, was once the property of the famous William Penn. The Earl of Suffolk and Berkshire is lord of the manor and principal landowner of Brinkworth. The representatives of the late Lady Holland are owners of the manor of the tithing of Grittenham. The soil is clay; subsoil, clay; the land is principally in pasture; the area is 5,464 acres; rateable value, £10,837; the population in 1891 was 1,185 with Grittenham.

Grittenham is a tithing and manor, with 230 inhabitants, in which the late Lady Holland erected a school-church, licensed by the bishop, which will seat 80 persons.

BRITFORD (or Burford) is a parish and village on the river Avon, 2 miles south-east from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Cawden and Cadworth, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Alderbury union, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Chalke portion), archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Peter is a cruciform structure built of rubble and stone in the Decorated style, having chancel, nave, aisles, south porch and transepts, with a very large but low square embattled tower of Chilmark and green sandstone, springing from the intersection and containing 5 bells, the gift of the Jervoise family: it contains a mausoleum of the Bouverie family and a monument to Henry (Stafford) 2nd Duke of Buckingham, beheaded at Salisbury, 2 Nov. 1483: the church was restored and reseated in 1873: the new oak choir stalls in the chancel are copies of the remains of the 14th century work: in the nave are three very curious semicircular arches which are said by competent authorities to be Roman work in situ: the east window is stained, representing, in three lights, The Way to the Cross, The Crucifixion, and the Taking Down from the Cross, with corresponding types below: there are 240 sittings. The register dates from the year 1573. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £234, net income £210, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury Cathedral, and held since 1894 by the Rev. Thomas John Woodall. The Alderbury union workhouse is in this parish; for particulars of union see Salisbury. A large sheep and cattle fair is held in this parish on August 12th. Britford was a Roman settlement. Four Roman coins of the era of Constantine and Constans were picked up in the débris of the church during the restoration in 1873, which

BROAD HINTON is a parish, on the road from Wootton Bassett to Marlborough, surrounded for many miles by open downs, 4 miles south-east from Wootton Bassett station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 7½ south-west from Swindon, in the Eastern division of the county, Marlborough petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Avebury (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury (partly in the hundred of Silkley and partly in Kingsbridge). The church of St. Peter-ad-Vincula is an old stone building of Early English architecture, with nave (partly built on previously existing foundations), chancel, organ chamber, added in 1880, vestry built in 1843, and south porch of 14th century date, having a square embattled western tower of Perpendicular style with pinnacles and containing 6 bells and chiming apparatus: the roof of the nave is a fine oak specimen of combined hammer and tie-beam construction, erected in 1634; the edifice itself was completely restored in 1880, at a cost of £2,300, when some interesting relics were discovered, all old monuments retained, the rood-loft staircase opened out, and the tower, previously unsafe, made secure: the pulpit and seats were added at a partial restoration in 1843, when a western gallery was removed: in 1882 the churchyard was enlarged: a handsome lych-gate was erected in 1884: there is also a life-size alabaster figure of Colonel Francis Glanvil, dated 1645: also a curious monument to Sir Thomas and Lady Wroughton and their eight children kneeling, much mutilated, each having lost the hands, excepting Lady Wroughton, dated 1597: there is also a fine mural tablet to Sir John Glanvil, Speaker of the Short Parliament, who was buried in the chancel, date 1661: also a memorial of the great Duke of Wellington, consisting of

BROAD TOWN is a parish, formed in 1846 out of Broad Hinton and Cliffe Pypard parishes, and in 1884 made a civil parish; it is on the road from Wootton Bassett to Marlborough, 3 miles south-by-east from Wootton Bassett station, on the Great Western railway, 8 south-west from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, petty sessional division of Cricklade, Swindon county court district, Avebury rural deanery (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. Christ Church is a modern stone building, in the Early English style, and has a nave, western bell cot, one bell, and stained east window: there are 324 sittings. The register dates from the year 1847. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £124, net £101, with residence and 2 acres of glebe, in the gift of the vicars of Broad Hinton and Cliffe Pypard alternately, and held since 1876 by the Rev. Hingeston-Randolph, rector of Ringmore, Devon; it was nearly destroyed by fire

By an Order of the County Council, dated July 10, 1894, Brokenborough was made into two parishes called Brokenborough Within, and included in the Malmesbury Urban District, and Brokenborough Without, within the Malmesbury Rural District.

BROMHAM is a parish, 3 miles north-east from Seend station on the Newbury and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 4 north-west from Devizes and 4 east-by-north from Melksham, in the Eastern division of the county, Potterne hundred, Devizes petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Avebury (Cannings portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The ancient houses of the village, built of timber and brick, are ranged irregularly on one side of an unpaved street, facing the church on the east and south. The church of St. Nicholas, is a building of stone in the Lancet and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, south aisle, south transept, south-eastern chapel, south porch and an embattled central tower with octagonal spire, 110 feet in height, containing a clock and 6 bells, hung at a cost of £600: the chancel was entirely rebuilt in 1865 in the Lancet style, at the cost of the rector: it retains a credence with trefoil-headed arch, and a hagioscope: the reredos is arcaded, and has marble shafts: the rest of the church is Perpendicular: the chapel, which is the most interesting portion, was built by Richard Beauchamp, 2nd Baron St. Amand (d. 1508), who founded therein a chantry dedicated to St. Mary and St. Nicholas: it has an embattled parapet, with crocketed pinnacles, panelling and shields of arms: in the centre of the east wall, above the roof, is a richly designed canopied niche, the flat ceiling is divided into thirty-two compartments, painted and gilt, and profusely decorated, and against the east wall is a canopied niche, and there are sedilia, formed in the sill of a window on the south side: the chapel opens to the chancel by two lofty Perpendicular arches, a similar one communicating with the transept: in the centre of the chapel stands a large tomb, with a full length recumbent effigy of a knight in armour, in excellent preservation, representing Sir Roger Tocotes, or Touchet, who married the widow of William Beauchamp, 1st baron St. Amand (d. 1457): there is also a canopied tomb to his wife Elizabeth, and on an upright slab within the canopy is a brass kneeling effigy of a female in the costume of the period (circa 1490), and a representation of the Holy Trinity, formerly in a matrix above: immediately opposite, against the south wall, is a canopied tomb to Sir Edward Baynton kt. ob. 1578, with brass effigies of himself, his two wives, and two out of three children, all kneeling; and on the floor is a brass effigy of John Baynton, ob. 1516, cousin and heir of Richard Beauchamp, 2nd Lord St. Amand: beneath the east window of this chapel are five recesses, three of which contain tablets to Sir Edward Baynton kt. ob. 1670; Henry Baynton, ob. 1691; and John Baynton, ob. 1716; and there is another to Lady Anne Wilmot, ob. 1703, besides many memorials to various members of the Baynton family: the chapel has a stained east window, erected in memory of John Baynton Starkey, who died in Australia, by his widow: the transept has a stone-groined roof, with a long pendant in the centre: the porch is embattled, and on the west is a stair leading to a parvise above: three windows on the north side of the chancel are stained: on the tower is a curious figure of a skeleton, cut into the north wall, and near it, surrounded by a scroll, a skull and cross-bones, with the inscription, "Death is swallowed up in victori": in the churchyard rest the remains of Thomas Moore, the

James I. sojourned here in 1616, 1618 and 1621. Rowdeford House, the seat of Lieut.-Col. Thomas Duncan William Dunn, is a modern building. The manor was given by William Rufus to Battle Abbey, Sussex, and was subsequently held by the Roche, Beauchamp and Baynton families, and afterwards by those of Rolt and Starkey. In 1864 the estates were sold, the purchasers being the Crown and the late Major John W. G. Spicer, the father of Capt. John Edmund Philip Spicer, of Spye Park, who is lord of the manor. The soil is sand; subsoil, red sand. The chief crops are wheat, barley and peas; the latter are extensively cultivated for the Bath market. The parish contains 3,593 acres; rateable value, £5,486; the population in 1891 was, in the civil parish, 1,137; and in the ecclesiastical, 932.

Part of this parish, including Spye Park, is in the ecclesiastical parish of Chittoe.

The church of St. Mary is an ancient structure of stone in the Perpendicular style, having a chancel, nave, aisles, south porch, and square western tower, having immense buttresses, a turret and an embattled parapet containing 2 bells: the aisles are separated from the nave by pointed arches, the pillars of which are different—three on the south side being octangular, and four on the north cylindrical, with an ovolo moulding: these, with other parts of the church, show that an ancient structure of Norman times once existed here, and that the present building was erected probably in Henry VII.'s reign, some of the old materials having been worked in: there is a curious old brass to Robert Long: the church was thoroughly repaired and restored by subscription in 1878 at a cost of £2,000 and has 250 sittings. The register dates from the year 1665. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £342, gross yearly value £386, net £331, with 32 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1877 by the Rev. Alan Brodrick M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford. Here are Wesleyan and Particular Baptist chapels. Here is a charity of Ann Harding and Betsy Paradiice, who left, on July 11, 1786, £19 yearly to educate 20 poor boys or girls (this is given to the National school), and £6 yearly to be distributed at Christmas between 10 poor persons who have not received parish relief: Mrs. Purbeck left by will £5 yearly, to be distributed at Christmas, in sums of 5s. each, to the most deserving and necessitous families. On April 24th, 1880, Mrs. Elizabeth Sly left by will the sum of

£100, the interest of which is distributed among the poor of the parish at Christmas. A very full and complete history of the parish of Broughton Gifford was written by the Rev. Prebendary Wilkinson and published in 1859 in the "Wiltshire Archæological and Natural History Magazine." There was a Roman station near some ground called Bradleys, where many coins of the later empire have been found. There are three houses of some architectural pretensions in the village—Monkton, the old house at the Cross, and another on the common; the first is said to have been erected by the Earl of Hertford, son of the Lord Protector Somerset, to whom the manor of Monkton came on the suppression of the Priory of Monkton Farleigh; the second was built by Sir John Horton, lord of the manor, in the year 1629; and the third by William Harding about the year 1700. Sir Charles Parry Hobhouse bart. J.P. of Manor house, Monkton Farleigh, is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is fine mould, lying on gravel, which rests on clay, with a subsoil of a heavier clay. Agricultural industry in this parish consists principally of dairy farming, and it is said that some of the best land in the county for grazing purposes is the pasture at Monkton by the side of the river Avon. The parish contains 1,694 acres, of which 260 are arable and the remainder pasture; rateable value, £4,673; the population in 1881 was 613.

BULFORD is a parish and village on the east bank of the Avon, 6 miles north from Porton station on the main line of the London and South Western railway, $1\frac{1}{2}$ north-east from Amesbury, and 9 north from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred and petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, union of Amesbury, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Amesbury (Amesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. John the Evangelist is an ancient structure of stone and brick in the Early English style, consisting of a chancel, nave, north transept, south porch, and square western tower containing 2 bells: the church was partially restored in 1879, the seats in the nave and transept being lowered, the pulpit placed in its original position and a new reading desk and lectern provided: the prayer book was the gift of George Melsome esq. of Watergate House, in this parish: in 1891 an organ was added at a cost of £150: a brass altar cross and vases were given by Mrs. Hill and the site given by Mr. Hill for a new vicarage; the cost of building, which was raised by subscriptions and grants from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the trustees of Queen Anne's bounty, amounted to £1,891; there are 200

sittings. The register dates from the year 1645. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £212, net yearly value £118, in the gift of James Ledger Hill esq. and held since 1887 by the Rev. Cecil North Arnold M.A. of Clare College, Cambridge. Here is a Congregational chapel, with a Sunday school attached. Near the village, lying in the Avon, which flows through it, is a stone, supposed to be of the same description as those at Stonehenge. James Ledger Hill esq. who is lord of the manor, and Miss Seymour are the principal landowners. The soil is light and chalky; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats. The area is 3,543 acres of land and 14 of water; rateable value, £1,667; in 1891 the population was 341.

BURBAGE is a village and parish, on the road from Marlborough to Salisbury, 5½ miles east from Pewsey, 6 south-east from Marlborough, 17 east from Devizes and 70 from London, having within the parish, and 1 mile north-east from the village, the Savernake Junction station of the Berks and Hants extension branch of the Great Western railway and 1 west from Grafton station of the Midland and South Western junction railway, this company having also running powers through Savernake station; it is in the Eastern division of the county, Kinwardstone hundred, petty sessional division and county court district of Marlborough, Pewsey union, rural deanery of Marlborough (Pewsey portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of All Saints is a Perpendicular and Early English building of stone and flint, rebuilt in 1854, excepting the tower: it has a chancel which retains a piscina and sedilia, nave of five bays with clerestory, aisles, south porch, and an embattled western tower containing a clock and 5 bells: there are eight stained windows, one in the chancel being to the late Bishop of Salisbury (Denison): in 1876 a south aisle, called the Stanton chapel, was added to the chancel and the interior of the church renovated, as a memorial to Archdeacon Stanton, who was for 23 years vicar of the parish: the church is seated with open benches, and has 400 sittings. The churchyard was extended by an addition of half an acre of land in 1891. The register dates from the year 1561. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £276, gross yearly value £363, net £225, including 5½ acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1890 by the Rev. William Augustine Heygate M.A. of New College, Oxford. Here is a Wesleyan chapel which will seat 700. There are charities of the yearly value of £72 17s. 6d. In 1805, Philip Pearce bequeathed the sum of £2,000, the interest of which, after deducting the sum of £10 for educational purposes, is given annually about Christmas to the "second poor." Robert Highett, left by will, in 1873, the sum of £500, the interest of which is given in coals to the poor and for education. In

BURCOMBE is a parish and village, 2 miles west from Wilton station on the London and South Western and Great Western joint railways, and 5 west from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Cawden and Cadworth, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Wilton, archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. John, formerly a chapel of the Priory of St. John at Ditchampton, in this parish, is a small and very ancient stone building, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, north aisle and low, square, flat-roofed tower, with one bell: it was completely restored in 1858, when the aisle and a vestry were added: the chancel is extremely small: the east window is stained and is of three lights: on the south side of the chancel are two memorial windows: there are 170 sittings. The earliest register bears date 1682. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £30, net yearly value £59, with residence, in the gift of the Prior of the Hospital of St. John at Ditchampton, in this parish, and held since 1894 by the

Rev. Calcraft Neeld Wyld, who is also Prior of St. John's Hospital. This seems to have been a Roman settlement. The principal landowners are the Earl of Pembroke, who is lord of the manor, and the Prior of the Hospital of St. John. The soil is principally chalk; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat and barley. The area is 1,423 acres; rateable value, £3,061; the population in 1891 was 330 in the civil and 305 in the ecclesiastical parish.

The church of St. James, restored in 1852, is a plain edifice of stone in the Early English style, and consists of chancel and nave, south porch with tower and spire in the centre containing one bell: there are sittings for 86 persons. The register dates from the year 1727. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value from tithe rent-charge £298, average £226, net income £153, including 1½ acres of glebe, Burkitt Rev. William Esdaile B.A.

CALNE.

CALNE is a very ancient municipal borough, market town, and the head of a union and petty sessional division, with a terminal station on a branch of the Great Western railway from Chippenham, opened 3rd of November, 1863; it is on the old road to Bath and Bristol, 88 miles from London by road and 100 by railway, 19 east from Bath, 30 north from Salisbury, 8 north from Devizes and 6 east from Chippenham, in the North Western division of the county, Calne hundred, rural deanery of Avebury (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The town is a borough by prescription, but received a charter or a confirmation of then existing privileges from Hen. III.; under the provisions of the "Municipal Corporations Act, 1835" (5 & 6 Wm. IV. c. 76), the Corporation was reformed, and now consists of a mayor, four aldermen and twelve councillors, who act also as the Urban Sanitary Authority. In 1889 the borough was enlarged, under the Local Government Board's "Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 6) Act, 1889" (52 & 53 Vict. c. 146); the Local Board of Health was then also merged in the municipal council, and, on March 25th, 1890, the area within the borough was created a separate civil parish,

called "Calne Within," the remainder of the original Calne parish to be known in future as "Calne Without," which see. The town is lighted with gas by a company, and supplied by a limited company with water obtained from rock springs in the parish of Calstone Wellington, from whence it flows through pipes by gravitation direct to the town. A reservoir has been constructed to supply the mills which would otherwise have suffered.

A scheme of sewerage was carried out about 1880, and has since been altered and improved at a cost of about £6,000; the sewage is conveyed by gravitation to an outfall about 2 miles distant, where it is passed through filter beds, and the pure effluent falls into the river.

The borough returned two members to the Parliament of 1295, and again in 1300-1, and from 1304 to 1307; after this date its representation in Parliament appears to have been for a long time very irregular, but it still, when represented, continued to return two members, until the passing of the "Reform Act, 1832" (2 & 3 Wm. IV. c. 45), by which the number was reduced to one, and under the provisions of the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885" (48 & 49 Vict. c. 23), the representa-

tion of the borough was merged in that of the north-west division of the county.

In the neighbourhood are a number of springs, sufficient in their united strength to turn several corn mills, and which, with other streams, constitute the head of the river Calne or Marden, which flows through the centre of the town and joins the Avon near Chippenham.

The church of St. Mary the Virgin, standing in the middle of the town, is a large edifice in the Transition and Perpendicular styles, with some portions of modern date, and consists of chancel, with chapels, nave, aisles, south porch, the chapel of St. Edmund Rich, formerly called the "Horse market," and a tower, rising over one of the transepts, and containing a clock with chimes and 8 bells: the original central tower fell in 1628: the arcades between the nave and aisle are Norman; the clerestory Perpendicular; the chancel is in part in the Renaissance style: the stained east window was presented in 1891 by Miss Maria Gabriel: the reredos, of Corsham stone, designed by Mr. J. L. Pearson R.A., F.S.A. and illuminated in gold and colour, was the gift of Mrs. Murray, of Castle House, Calne: there are several other stained windows and a fine pulpit, and in 1882 a new organ was provided: the church also retains an ancient parish chest banded with iron: the church was restored and enlarged in 1864 by Mr. Slater, architect, at a cost of £1,100, and further restored in 1882-3 under the direction of Mr. J. L. Pearson R.A., F.S.A. when a screen was erected between the aisle and St. Edmund Rich's chapel and a new porch built, and in 1891 the chancel was widened, the total cost amounting to £2,300: there are now 800 sittings. The register dates from the year 1527. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £778, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1865 by the Rev. John Duncan M.A. of Aberdeen University, canon and prebendary of Salisbury and surrogate. A portion of this parish was, on August 14, 1879, for ecclesiastical purposes annexed to the adjoining parish of Cherhill; other portions by Order in Council, 2nd December, 1887, were added to the parishes of Calstone Wellington and Blackland and Heddington.

The Society of Friends have a meeting house in Wood street, erected in 1816, with 150 sittings.

The Free Church, in Church street, erected in 1867, at a cost of £6,000, has sittings for 300 persons.

The Wesleyan chapel, Silver street, erected in 1876, at a cost of £2,200, will seat 400; a new organ was provided in 1893.

The Baptist chapel, Castle street, rebuilt in 1815, has 350 sittings. Zion Baptist chapel, Wood street, erected in 1836, will seat 250 persons.

The Primitive Methodist chapel, The Quarry, has 200 sittings. This sect has also a meeting room in Wood street, built in 1893, and seating 150.

The Nonconformist Cemetery, in the Bath road, contains about one acre of land, given by the Marquess of Lansdowne: it has a mortuary chapel and a caretaker's lodge.

The old Town Hall, which stood on the Market hill, was taken down in 1882, and the site was then given to the town by the Marquess of Lansdowne to be kept as an open space for ever. The new Town Hall, erected on the site of the old Town mill, which was purchased by the corporation, is a building of stone in the Tudor style, and contains the Corn Exchange, Council Chamber, Assembly Rooms, Magistrates' Room, Police Station (with 2 cells), Volunteer Drill Hall and Armoury. The cost of the site and building was £9,365, of which £6,505 was given by voluntary subscriptions.

The municipal insignia consists only of a mayor's chain and badge and a borough seal; the former, of silver gilt, was made in Birmingham in 1881, and purchased in 1883 by the Corporation for £43; it consists of fifteen links and a pendent oval badge, surrounded by scroll work of oak and olive leaves, surmounted by a cherub's head and inclosing the town arms: gu. a castle towered, between 2 ostrich feathers, and 1 in base arg. The borough seal, of silver, is circular, and bears the arms as above, and a marginal inscription, with the date 1836; this seal is apparently a copy of seals existing in the 16th and 18th centuries. The corporation has a fine two-handed silver loving cup, with cover, ornamented with repoussé work, and presented in 1860 by the Earl of Shelburne, and there is also a silver gilt snuff-box, given by Lord Shelburne in 1851; it is elaborately engraved, and bears the borough arms on the lid, between the dates 1696 and 1720. The mayor's robe is of purple or chocolate coloured cloth, faced with sable fur.

The most important branches of trade in this town are the two large establishments for curing bacon, belonging to Messrs. Charles and Thomas Harris and

Co. Limited; this firm kills over 100,000 pigs annually. Mr. Edward Ward Maundrell has considerable agricultural engineering works. There are branches here of the Capital and Counties Bank Limited and the Wilts and Dorset Banking Co. Limited.

The market, formerly held on Wednesdays, is now discontinued.

The Literary Institution and Free Library has a library of 1,800 volumes: there is also a Friendly Society, and in connection with it a Juvenile Friendly Society: the Oddfellows', who purchased the building in 1893, hold their meetings here.

A branch navigation from Calne unites the Wiltshire and Berkshire canal with that of the Kennet and Avon.

The Hospital for Infectious Diseases, in Northfields, was erected by the Urban and Rural Sanitary Authorities in 1887, on a site given by the Marquess of Lansdowne; it is of brick, and contains 4 wards, with beds for 20 patients; it also has a detached lodge for the matron and a mortuary.

Charities.—The Church lands consist of 3a. 3r. op. in Northfield and 3r. 34p. in Abberd, the rents of which are paid to the churchwardens, and applied by them for church purposes. Finamore's charity consists of a rent-charge of 40s. yearly on certain property in High street, Calne, formerly the Crown inn; this sum is now paid to the treasurer of Calne Boys' National School. Dr. Swadden's charity comprises a rent-charge on certain property at Great Horwood and Singleborough, in the county of Bucks, of £4 yearly, distributed by the four aldermen of the borough "for the use of the poor of honest conversation" in the parish of Calne, as directed in the original bequest. Smith's charity consists of a share in the profits of property situate in the parish of Longney, in Gloucestershire, and is applied for the benefit of the poor of the parish. The Baydon lands comprise 27a. 3r. 16p. situate in the parish of Baydon, Wiltshire, the rents of which are distributed by the vicar and churchwardens and 4 representative trustees, 2 each being appointed by the vestry and the town council respectively. Foreman's charity, established by Robert Foreman for educational purposes, is represented by the rent of ground called Clotly, in the parish of Calne, which is paid to the trustees of the Boys' Middle Class school. Dr. Townson's almshouses consist of 8 houses situate at Calne, in which persons appointed by the vicar reside free of rent. Sir John Ernle's charity, founded by Sir John Ernle kt. formerly of Whetham, near Calne, who conveyed the property at Calne to trustees for the maintenance of "four poor women, widows of the parish of Calne," nominated by the vicar and churchwardens. Harris's charity: this charity consists of £1,000, bequeathed by the late Mr. Henry Harris and now invested in 2½ Consols, in the names of trustees, the interest on which is distributed annually by the town council among the poor of the parish of Calne, in the shape of great coats, cloaks and blankets. Joseph Harris's charity of £200, bequeathed in 1891, and invested by testator's direction in the shares of the Calne Water Company, is administered by the town council. The Town Stock charity is represented by £226 os. 8d. invested in 2½ per cent. Consols, the dividends whereon are annually distributed among the poor of the parish by the town council. The charity formerly invested in the Calne Savings Bank, consists of £76, the interest of which is annually distributed by the churchwardens among the poor of the parish. Weeks' charity originally consisted of certain property which, in 1846, was sold for £450, and the proceeds invested in 3 per cent. (now 2½) Consols, the dividends thereon, now amounting to £14 5s. 8d. yearly, are annually distributed among the poor widows of the parish of Calne. Hungerford charity was founded by Walter Hungerford esq. of Studley, in Calne parish, who, in 1845, granted an annuity of £20 out of certain messuages, lands and hereditaments at Calne, Blackland and Heddington, "for the recovery, support or maintenance of any sick, wounded or maimed people of the said parish of Calne:" this charity, the present income of which is £31, is distributed "from time to time" by the minister, churchwardens and two members of the Calne town council.

The public recreation ground at the Anchor, given to the corporation in 1890 by Ald. Thomas Harris J.P. was opened in 1891; it consists of about 6 acres, and has a splendid cycling track, cricket ground, tennis courts, a pavilion and a caretaker's lodge. The new thoroughfare called "Ivy walk" was presented to the town by Ald. T. Harris in 1887.

In 1894 the Marquess of Lansdowne presented to the corporation a piece of land 70 feet by 30, adjoining the river Marden, for the purposes of a public bathing place.

On the 24th of October, 1882, a disastrous flood, supposed to have been occasioned by an unusual storm of rain on the hills, occurred here, during which the water rose to the height of 4ft. 4in. at the post office: from about 6 a.m. until 1 p.m. gradually subsiding until 6 p.m. when the usual level of the stream was reached.

The principal landowners are the Marquess of Lansdowne, who is lord of the manor, Sir John Poynder Dickson-Poynder bart. M.P. Lord Houghton and Major Clement Walker-Heneage V.C.

The soil is chiefly sandy, except in the valleys, which dip into the Oxford clay.

The parish of Calne occupies a part of the middle oolite series of rocks, and contains all the members of that geological division—coral, rag, coarse sandstone, alternating with beds of clay and sand. The lower greensand and Kimmeridge clay are found on the eastern side

of the parish, immediately overlying the middle oolite; the Portland beds being absent and the chalk occurring in the extreme portion of the parish to the east. A bed of the coral rag containing a coarse kind of freestone is worked in the town, and affords a tolerably good building stone: this bed is famous for the remains of echinidæ (sea-urchins, star-fishes &c.), and other fossils found in it. The land in the district is chiefly in pasture, but not entirely so, there being a considerable portion of the sandy soil under the plough. Wheat and beans are grown on the heavier portion, and barley and roots on the lighter. The Marquess of Lansdowne has a large tract let on the allotment system. The area of Calne Within is 356 acres; rateable value, £10,253; the population in 1891 was 3,495, including 86 officers and inmates in the workhouse.

CALNE WITHOUT is a parish formed by order of the Wilts County Council and confirmed by Local Government Board Order, which came into operation March 25, 1890; it comprises the portion of Calne original parish not included within the Municipal borough, and the parishes of Blackland and Calstone Wellington, beside the liberty of Bowood and part of the parish of Bremhill, and is in the North Western division of the county, Calne hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Avebury (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Peter, situated in Blackland Park, is a small ancient Gothic edifice of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, north porch and bell turret with one bell; there are sittings for 80 persons. The register dates from the year 1757. Calstone Wellington church of St. Mary is very ancient and built of Bath stone, partly in the style prevalent in the latter

half of the 15th century and partly Tudor, consisting of chancel, nave, north porch and an embattled western tower containing one bell: it was thoroughly restored at a cost of £1,300 in 1885, when two new bells were added: there are 100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1760. The joint living is a rectory, the two having been annexed November 2nd, 1880, average tithe rent-charge £178, gross joint yearly value £327, net £259, including 70 acres of glebe, with residence, in the alternate gift of the Marquess of Lansdowne and the trustees of the late Mrs. Macdonald, and held since 1880 by the Rev. George Randolph Hadow M.A. of Jesus College, Cambridge. There is a Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1866. A reading room was built in 1883 by Lord Edmond G. Petty-Fitzmaurice, to which is attached a free lending library, and is supported by the Marquess of Lansdowne, Lord Edmond G. Petty-Fitzmaurice, the rector and farmers of the neigh-

bourhood. Blackland Park, of 150 acres, and well wooded, through which flows the river Marden, contains a very large oak tree: the mansion is the seat of Henry Browne esq. J.P. who is lord of the manor of Blackland. The Marquess of Lansdowne K.G., G.C.M.G. lord of the manor of Calstone Wellington, Lord Houghton, Sir John Poynder Dickson-Poynder bart. M.P. of Hartham and Henry Browne esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is rich loam; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat and oats, and some land in pasture. The area is 631 acres.

CASTLE COMBE is a parish, 6 miles north-west from Chippenham station, 6 north from Corsham station, both on the Great Western railway, and 10½ north-east from Bath, in the Northern division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Chippenham, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. Andrew is a building of stone in the Early English and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel with clerestoried aisles and nave of three bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower, with pinnacles, 85 feet in height, and containing 2 bells and a clock: the lower stage of the tower forms the principal entrance: the body of the church was built, temp. Richard II. 1377 to 1399, and the tower in the first half of the 15th century: the stained west window was the gift of the late rector, the Rev. R. C. Christie LL.B.; under the belfry is a stone groined ceiling of very elegant design: the chancel arch is decorated with the figures of saints upon pedestals under canopies: in the gable is a beautiful stained rose window, and the east window, consisting of four Early English lancets, is also filled with richly stained glass, as well as all the remaining windows, 16 in number; one of these, in the Lady chapel, represents the arms of the lords who successively held the manor: there is an altar-tomb, with a recumbent effigy of one of the De Dunstanvilles, d. 1270, ancestors of the Scrope family: there are sittings for 430 persons. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a rectory, yearly value from tithe rent-charge £383, average £286, net income £267, including 26 acres of glebe, in the gift of Edward Chaddock Lowndes esq. and held since 1893 by the Rev. Henry William Jukes M.A. of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. Here are

In the village is a fine specimen of an ancient market cross, consisting of a square stone pedestal raised upon two steps and ornamented with sunk quatrefoiled panels, bearing shields and roses alternately; from this springs a slender shaft capped by a finial: at each angle of the platform is a massive stone pier, about six feet high, supporting the wooden lintels of a pyramidal roof, covered with tiles. On the Castle Hill are the remains of a British encampment and the ruins of a castle built in the reign of Henry I. The great Roman road, called the Fosseway, leading from Bath to Cirencester, skirts the north-western limit of the manor; the property was held by the Scrope family from the 13th century, but now held by Edward Chaddock Lowndes esq. M.A., D.L., J.P. lord of the manor, who resides at Castle Combe Manor House. The soil is brash; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats. The area is 1,490 acres; rateable value, £2,262; the population in 1891 was 459.

other windows in the church are Perpendicular; the nave has a vaulted plaster ceiling; the north transept, which was added in 1699, has a flat ceiling divided into 24 compartments by oak beams, with bosses at the intersections; the base of the tower, surrounded as it is by irregular blocks of much-worn and decayed stones, appears to be of earlier date than the main portion, which is Early English: the upper stage is Perpendicular; there is a handsome marble monument in the north transept to James Townsend, ob. 1750, and wife; also a tablet in the nave to Sir James Stonehouse bart. ob. 1795: the church was restored and reseated in 1868 at a cost of about £500, and has 158 sittings. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge £2, gross yearly value £280, net £240, with 339 acres of glebe and residence, and held since 1892 by the Rev. John Henry Burn, Theol. Assoc. K.C.L. Here are Baptist and Wesleyan chapels. Townsend's charity of £8 yearly, derived from land in the parish of Easterton, is for clothing and bread. Townsend's educational charity of £7 10s. yearly, derived from a tenement and land in the parish, is now applied in prizes to scholars of

The church of St. Peter, entirely rebuilt, with the exception of the tower, in 1580, at the joint expense of the late Earl of Radnor and the then rector, is an edifice of grey stone, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, north porch and a small western tower, in the Perpendicular style, containing a clock placed there in 1862 and also one bell. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £405, arising from 190 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the trustees of the Right Hon. CHEILMARK is a village and parish a short distance southward of the road from Salisbury to Hindon and Wincanton, 3 miles north-east from Tisbury and 3 north-west from Dinton railway stations on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, 12 west from Salisbury and 9 north-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Tisbury petty sessional division and union, Dunworth hundred, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Margaret is an ancient structure, in the Early English style, restored in 1856: it consists of a chancel, nave of four bays, transepts, north aisle and south porch, and a noble tower springing from the intersection, surmounted with a spire and containing a clock and 6 bells, two having been added in 1877: the restoration, costing £1,700, was defrayed by subscriptions, the late Earl of Pembroke and members of his family contributing

the Sunday school and day school. Simon Watson-Taylor esq. of Erlestoke Park, is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil throughout the parish is variable, producing good crops of grain and turnips; subsoil, green sand. The area is 1,840 acres; rateable value, £2,301; the population in 1891 was 370.

liberally: Mr. Wyatt was the architect, who has displayed great taste and judgment in blending the new and the old buildings: an ancient Norman doorway, now forming the entrance to a new aisle, for centuries stood on the south side of the church, entirely blocked up and disregarded: beneath a pointed arch in the south wall of the chancel and in the transept are piscinæ in good state of preservation: there are several stained windows: an east window, representing the Crucifixion, has been inserted; also two stained windows, one in the south transept, the other in the north aisle, opposite the porch. In the churchyard, at the principal entrance, is a lych-gate, of modern construction. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £329, gross yearly value £345, net about £300, including 24 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Earl of Pembroke, and held since 1804 by the Rev. CHILTON FOLIATT is a parish, delightfully situated in a vale watered by the river Kennet, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles north-west from Hungerford station on the Newbury and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 9 east from Marlborough, in the eastern division of the county, partly in the hundred of Kinwardstone and partly in the hundred of Kintbury Eagle, Berks, petty sessional division of Marlborough and Ramsbury, Hungerford union and county court district, rural deanery of Marlborough (Marlborough portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary is a building of stone, in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, nave of four bays and aisles, with small embattled western square tower with pinnacles, containing a modern clock and 5 bells: it is in good repair: the pulpit, reading-desk, the organ gallery and the whole of the seats are of polished oak: the chancel contains several monuments of the Popham family: the windows exhibit various figures in stained glass, and the flooring is composed of some rare specimens of glazed pottery in squares: south of the communion table is an effigy in ancient armour, in a recumbent position: there are 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1530. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £785, gross yearly value £595, net £560, including 50 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of F. W. Leyborne-Popham esq. and held since

CHIPPENHAM.

CHIPPENHAM is a municipal borough, market and union town and head of a county court district, and junction station on the Great Western railway, from which the branch to Calne and to Weymouth starts, and on the river Avon, and connected by a short branch with the Wilts and Berks canal, $93\frac{3}{4}$ miles from London, 13 north-east from Bath, 33 north-west from Salisbury, 10 north-west from Devizes, 10 south from Malmesbury, 7 north from Melksham and 6 north-west from Calne: it is in the North Western division of the county, hundred of Chippenham, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

Chippenham is an ancient borough, and was incorporated in 1554 by charter, and a second charter was granted by King James II. in 1685; under the Municipal Corporation Act, 1832, the government is vested in a mayor, four aldermen and twelve councillors: it formerly returned two members to Parliament, but under the "Representation of the People Act, 1867," it returned one only, and by the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," it now forms part of the north-western division of the county. The houses are well built, and

the principal streets are High street and Market place. The sanitary arrangements are under the corporation. The borough is lighted with gas from works, the property of a company, and supplied with water by the Urban Sanitary Authority.

The parish church of St. Andrew is an ancient structure, in the Norman, Early Decorated and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel, nave of five bays, aisles, three chapels, west and south porches, and a Late Perpendicular western tower, with spire, containing 8 bells and an illuminated clock with chimes: the Hungerford chapel has various memorials of the Hungerfords, and a monument to Sir Gilbert Prynne (1627); another of the chapels was dedicated to St. Catherine: the organ, which is of very ancient date, was rebuilt in 1885: the church was enlarged and restored in 1878 at a cost of £6,759 17s. 2d. and has 1,200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1578. The living is a discharged vicarage, with the rectory of Tytherton Lucas annexed, joint average tithe rent-charge £134, joint net yearly value £198, including 31 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Christ Church, Oxford, and held since 1861 by the

Rev. John Rich M.A. late student of that house, honorary canon of Bristol, rural dean of Chippenham and also rector of Tytherton Kellaways.

St. Paul's is a separate ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1855 out of the parishes of Chippenham, Hardenhuish, Kington St. Michael and Langley Burrell. The church of St. Paul, situated near the railway station, and erected in 1855, is a building of stone, in the Gothic style of the 14th century, and consists of a chancel, clerestoried nave of 6 bays, aisles, and a western tower with a spire 176 feet high containing clock, with chimes, and 8 bells: there are sittings for 800 people. The register dates from the year 1855. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £37, net yearly value £120, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and held since 1855 by the Rev. Thomas Augustus Strong M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford.

The Catholic church, dedicated to St. Mary, erected in 1855, has 70 sittings. There are two Baptist chapels, one in High street, seating about 320 persons, and the other in the New road, erected in 1856, which has 283 sittings. The Congregational chapel, Emery lane, was erected in 1826, and has 450 seats; the whole of the interior was renovated in 1889, at a cost of £300. The Primitive Methodist chapel in the Causeway, was erected in 1834, and has 450 sittings. The Wesleyan chapel, Causeway, erected in 1851, will seat 350 persons.

The Cemetery, on the London road, is about 3½ acres in extent, and was formed in 1855, at a cost of £2,500, including two mortuary chapels; it is under the control of a burial board of 9 members. The old Cemetery, in Wood lane, belongs to a company, and is principally used by Nonconformists.

The Town Hall, Market, Exchange-room and buildings, in the High street, were erected at a cost of about £12,000, at the sole expense of the late Joseph Neeld esq. of Grittleton, who was for many years member for the borough of Chippenham, and include a hall 50 feet in length, 33 in width and 19 in height, with spacious ante-rooms; the hall will hold 350 persons. The Cheese market, which has a frontage of stone towards the High street, surmounted by the old borough arms and the motto, "Unity and Loyalty," was three times enlarged during the life of Mr. Neeld, at a further cost to him of from £4,000 to £5,000.

The market is now held on the second Friday in every month for cheese and cattle, and the fourth Friday for cattle. Wool market, last Friday in June. Corn market every Friday. There is an annual cattle show held the last week in November. In the Market place is a fountain, erected by public subscription, at a cost of £260.

The principal manufactures are Anglo-Swiss condensed milk, broadcloth and churns; a tannery, gun and cartridge works and a bacon curing factory.

The Temperance Hall, in Foghamshire, is a building of stone, comprising a lecture hall to hold 500 persons, workmen's reading and coffee rooms, refreshment room, and a residence for the hall keeper: it occupies the site of an old public house and malt-house, known as the "White Hart," and was erected in 1863, at a cost of £1,384.

The Institute is a building mainly of local stone faced with Bath stone dressings, erected in 1889, at a cost of £870, by public subscriptions, on land given by the late Sir John Neeld bart. It has three floors which contain three rooms of equal size, 50 feet by 30 feet, with adjacent smaller ones for library and lavatory. The ground floor is used as a recreation room. The first floor, a spacious and handsomely furnished apartment, is used as a literary and scientific institution, and the second by the school of art.

Charities:—Thomas Ray, in 1615, left tenements in Giggin street, New Sarum, now yielding a yearly rental of £15, to be given every fourth year to the poor clothiers of Chippenham; Robert Gale, in 1628, gave £20 yearly, to be paid out of the Claypool and Brassington estates, in the counties of Lincoln and Derby, for distribution among the poor of this parish, 20s. to the vicar for preaching a sermon on the day of the distribution, and 20s. for those who distribute the aforesaid £20, "to drink withall;" Elizabeth Hawkins, in 1638, left the interest on £10 to be paid on Candlemas day (Feb. 2) to six poor freemen's widows; Henry Smith, in 1642, gave an estate at Longney, Gloucester, yearly rental about £500, to be divided amongst 23 parishes: the proportion

received by Chippenham (about £20) is distributed in greatcoats; Richard Scott, in 1661, gave a free school house; William Woodroffe, in 1664, gave £5 yearly to educate 4 boys; Gabriel Goldney, in 1681, gave £6 yearly to purchase coats for 6 honest labouring men; John Wicks, in 1689, gave land at Pipsmore, the yearly rental of which is £23, to purchase linen garments for poor men and women; Rev. R. Cock, in 1719, gave land, the yearly rental of which is £9 9s. to educate 25 girls "in the principles of the Church of England;" Sir Francis Popham, in 1735, gave land in Christian Malford parish, the yearly rental of which is £23, for poor freemen; Mary Bridges, in 1764, gave 15s. yearly to educate 2 boys; William Colborne, in 1769, gave £1,100 in 3 per cent. Consols, for maintaining poor freemen or their widows living in free houses; Robert Sadler, in 1838, gave £38 13s. 4d. in 3 per cent. Consols, to purchase "Duffell cloaks" for elderly women, to be given on his birthday, 17 October; Miss Ann Bradbury, in 1838, gave £100, interest to purchase blankets; Rebecca Church, in 1842, gave £304 3 per cent. Consols, to purchase "Duffell cloaks" marked "R. Scott" for poor elderly women; William Gundry, in 1851, gave £449 11s. 5d. in Consols, for coals or clothing, to be distributed yearly on his birthday, Feb. 14. By a scheme of the Charity Commissioners, sanctioned by the Court of Chancery, the Ray, Scott, Bridges and Woodroffe charities are now merged into one fund, and the income is applied to the education of 7 boys, and by an order of the Charity Commissioners, six houses, left by Charles Bailey esq. were sold and the income of the proceeds is divided amongst a certain number of widows and orphans of medical men. In 1886 Mrs. William Lewis built 4 almshouses and one for a caretaker at Lowden and endowed the same for four poor females, to be nominated by the vicar for the time being.

A causeway, 4½ miles in length, from Chippenham Cliff to Wickhill, Bremhill (extending through the parishes of Langley Burrell, Kellaways and Tytherton), was constructed in the year 1474 by Maud Heath, who gave to certain trustees some houses and land in and near Chippenham to keep the same in repair: she is said by common report to have been a market woman who, having long felt the inconvenience of a swampy walk, devoted the savings of her life to the purpose of providing a good footing for her successors in all time to come: the trustees have extended and renewed the causeway from their surplus funds, and some years since erected an iron bridge across the Avon at Kellaways, where a raised path, upon 64 arches, exists for the convenience of travellers, enabling them in times of flood, which are frequent in this neighbourhood, to pass the stream in safety: the causeway is marked with upright inscribed stones at intervals, and a monument to the donor has been erected at Wickhill.

Æthelswitha, sister of Alfred the Great, who had a residence in Chippenham, was married here to Burhead, King of Mercia, between A.D. 870 and A.D. 880.

Lodowick Muggleton, founder of a sect of religious enthusiasts called "Muggletonians," was a native of this parish, where he was born in 1607. John Scott D.D. a celebrated divine, canon of Windsor and rector of St. Giles-in-the-Fields, was born here in October, 1638.

The parish contains several manors, of which the following gentlemen are lords:—John Carrick Moore esq. F.R.S., F.R.G.S. of 113 Eaton square, London, lord of the manor of Monkton; Sir Algernon William Neeld bart. of Grittleton, lord of the manors of Fowlewick and Allington; and Sir Gabriel Goldney bart. of Corsham, lord of the manors of Chippenham, Lowden, Rowden and Sheldon.

The lords of the manors are the principal landowners. The area of the parish is 6,191 acres; rateable value, £26,069.

The population of the civil parish in 1891 was 5,392, including 176 officers and inmates in the workhouse, and of the ecclesiastical parish, 4,961. The population of St. Paul's ecclesiastical parish in 1891 was 1,413.

Allington is a hamlet, now forming part of the parish of St. Paul, 2 miles north-west from Chippenham.

Stanley and Studley are tithings, and are given in the ecclesiastical parish of Derryhill, which extends over a portion of the civil parish of Chippenham.

CHIRTON (Churton, or Cherington) is a parish and village, 5½ miles south-east from Devizes and 2½ south-west from Woodborough station on the Newbury and Bath section of the Great Western railway, in the Eastern division of the county, Swanborough hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Devizes, Potterne rural deanery (Enford portion), Wilts archdeaconry and Salisbury diocese. The church of St. John the Baptist is an ancient and beautiful structure of grey stone, in the Transition Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower containing 5 bells; the south entrance has an elaborately wrought arch, with zigzag mouldings and a series of animals' heads and other figures surrounding its outer edge: there is a piscina in the chancel, with sedile, and another in the south aisle of Late Decorated character: the font, which is particularly fine, and is evidently coeval with the church, bears representations of the Twelve Apostles: there are six stained windows in the church and two in the south porch; also a handsome 18th century stone monument in the north aisle to the de Conock family: the church was restored and re-seated in 1850, and has 175 sittings. The register dates from the year 1579. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £143, net yearly value £107, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1892 by the Rev. Henry Thompson Adam M.A. of Corpus Christi college, Cambridge. The trustees of different charities hold land in this parish—the Heytesbury charity for

almshouses, the Bradford-cum-Freshford charities for the same purpose, and the Froxfield charity for lay and clerical widows, also Eveline almshouses, Oxon. The lordship of the manor is vested in the Heytesbury trustees. The principal landowners are Miss Mills and Mr. Chandler. The soil and subsoil are green sand. The chief crops are wheat and barley. The area is 1,858 acres; rateable value, £1,671; the population in 1891 was 314, including Conock.

Conock tithing is half a mile south-west, situated on the road to Devizes and contains the Manor House, an interesting residence, formerly the property of the Wariner family, now occupied by William Charles Hitchcock esq.

CHISLEDON is an extensive parish and village, near the road from Swindon to Marlborough, 7 miles north from Marlborough and 4 south-east from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, hundred of Kingsbridge, union of Highworth, Swindon county court district and petty sessional division of Swindon, rural deanery of Marlborough (Marlborough portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury: the Midland and South Western Junction railway runs through the village, connecting the London and South Western railway at Andover with the Great Western railway at Swindon; the line is completed to Cheltenham and joins the Midland railway. The church of the Holy Cross is a plain

stone structure, in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, and aisles, south porch, with embattled square tower with pinnacles containing 5 bells: the chancel is paved with encaustic tiles: there are several monuments and tablets to the families of Mellish, Calley, Browne and Crowdy: there is also a stained window, erected by Mrs. John Browne to her late husband: the church was re-opened in March, 1893, after restoration, at a cost of over £2,000: the tower still remains in an unsafe condition (1895): the east window has been filled with stained glass in memory of H. Calley esq. of Burderop Park, by his widow: there are 292 sittings. The register dates from the year 1641.

The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £80, net yearly value £110, with 74 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Major T. C. P. Calley, and held since 1887 by the Rev. John Henry Calley M.A. of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. There is a mission house, licensed for divine worship, for the use of residents at Coate and Snodshill, in which service is held every Sunday: it has 130 sittings. There are places of worship for Wesleyan Methodists, and one belonging to the Primitive Methodists. The churchyard was closed by an Order in Council in 1879, and a cemetery of 1½ acres was formed in 1877 at a cost of £1,100, with two mortuary chapels; it is under the control of a burial board of 9 members. There is a charity of £15 a year derived from land, left in 1659 by Richard Harvey, vested in and distributed by the vicar and churchwardens on St. Thomas' day amongst twenty deserving parishioners. The principal seat in the parish is Burderop, a noble stone mansion, situate in a small park, the seat of Major Thomas Charles Pleydell Calley J.P. 1st Life Guards, lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Major Calley, William Edward N. Brown esq. of The Cottage, and William J. E. Warry-Stone esq. The soil is chalk, and the subsoil is chalk; the land is chiefly arable. The area is 4,916 acres; rateable value, £5,850; the population in 1891 was 1,204.

Badbury is a tithing, half a mile north-east, where there is a Wesleyan chapel; Burderop, a tithing, 1½ miles west; Hodson, a tithing, 1 mile north-west, having a Wesleyan chapel; Snodshill and Coate are hamlets, 3 miles north.

CHITTERNE ALL SAINTS is a parish on the road from Warminster to Amesbury, 4 miles north-west from Codford station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, and 8 east from Warminster, in the Western division of the county, hundred of Heytesbury, Warminster petty sessional division, union and county court district, Wylde rural deanery (Wylde portion), archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. CHRISTIAN MALFORD is a parish and scattered village on the Avon, which runs past the churchyard, and forms the western boundary of the parish, 3 miles south-west from Dauntsey station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 6 north-east from Chippenham, 8 south-west from Wootton Bassett, in the North Western division of the county, North Damerham hundred, Chippenham petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. CHUTE is a village and parish, delightfully situated on the side of a hill, bordering on Hampshire, 4 miles north-east from Ludgershall station on the Midland and South Western Junction railway, 13 south-east from Marlborough and 8 north-west from Andover, in the Eastern division of the county, Kinwardstone hundred, Everleigh and Pewsey petty sessional division, union of Pewsey, Andover county court district, rural deanery of Marlborough (Pewsey portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Nicholas was entirely rebuilt by private subscription in 1871, and reopened by the bishop of the diocese 15th August, 1872: it is of flint with red brick and stone facings, in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, nave and small south transept, south porch, with western tower and spire, and has a clock and 2 bells: there is a very fine piscina, with oak leaf and ball tracing within the altar rails, and an ancient Norman font at the west end: the chancel was entirely rebuilt in 1869, at a cost of £500, by the late Thomas Everett Fowle esq. J.P. of Chute Lodge, from designs by J. L. Pearson esq. R.A.: the edifice is sheltered on the south-west by a row of yew trees: there are 288 sittings. The register dates from the year 1580. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £225, gross yearly value £254, net £200, including 30 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1885 by the Rev. Lancelot Ridley M.A. of Lincoln College, Oxford. A piece of land was added to the churchyard in 1887, and consecrated by the Bishop of Sarum; in the churchyard are a water tank and pump, placed there and given to the poor of the parish by the late vicar, the Rev. CLIFFE PYPARD (or Clyffe Pypard) is a village and parish, 4 miles south from Wootton Bassett station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 9 south-west from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, union of Cricklade and Wootton Bassett, chiefly in the hundred of Kingsbridge and partly in that of Cricklade, petty sessional division of Cricklade, Swindon county court district, rural deanery of Avebury (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Peter is a handsome stone structure of Perpendicular architecture (late Henry VII.), consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch and a fine embattled western tower, with pinnacles, containing a clock and 6 bells: each aisle is divided from the nave by an arcade of four columns; the chancel, originally of Early English work, but altered to Perpendicular at a later period, was restored in 1861 by the impropiator and patron, Horatio Nelson Goddard esq. with a memorial east window to the late vicar and patron, the Rev. Edward Goddard, and a side window to other members of the family of Goddard, to one of whom, who died in 1585, there is an interesting monument of oak, still in a state of good preservation: a screen of fine oak, painted in the original colours, separates the chancel from the nave, and two rectangular screens cut off the eastern extremities of the aisles: in the north wall of the north aisle, under a canopy, is a tomb surmounted by a recumbent figure, supposed to be one of the family of Cobham, who formerly possessed the manor: the pulpit is of the 17th century, a good specimen of elaborate carving: the font, an octagon, of Bath stone, a copy of that of Over, Cambridgeshire, was carved by the Rev. F. Goddard, in 1840: a brass of about 1380, of excellent design, embedded in stone, is laid in the north chapel, and is supposed to belong to the Quintin family: a monument of costly work in varied marble fills the western end of the south aisle, presenting the likeness of a carpenter named Thomas Spackman, a native of Cliffe Pypard, who, having amassed considerable wealth by his trade, bequeathed the interest of the sum of £1,000 to the following purposes, viz.: for preserving the above-mentioned monument; secondly, for maintaining a school for the poor children of the parish; thirdly, for the purchase of loaves of bread to be disposed of every Sunday after divine service: by an Order in Council a scheme has been issued for the future management of this charity: the church was beautifully restored in 1874, at a cost of £1,400, exclusive of the chancel, which was restored at a cost of £1,000, de-

COLLINGBOURNE DUCIS (or Lower Collingbourne) is a parish on the River Bourne, with a station on the Midland and South Western Junction railway, 3 miles north-west from Ludgershall, 11 south-east from Marlborough, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Elstub, Everleigh and Pewsey petty sessional division, union of Pewsey, county court district of Marlborough (Pewsey portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The adjunct of Ducis is derived from this place having once been parcel of the Duchy of Lancaster. The church of St. Andrew is an ancient edifice of flint and stone, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch, and castellated western tower containing 5 bells and clock: the chancel was rebuilt by the Rev. W. C. Lukis M.A. a former rector, and in 1877 the church was restored at a cost of £1,300 (Sir Arthur W. Blomfield A.R.A. was the architect): a stained east window was put in by Mr. John Russ in 1880, in memory of his wife, and a west window was given by Mr. John Mackrell, to his parents and family: some ground was added to the churchyard and consecrated in 1878: there are 225 sittings. The register dates from 1640. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £468, gross yearly value £535, net £321, including 56 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Marquess of Ailesbury, and held since 1875 by the

COLLINGBOURNE KINGSTON (or Upper Collingbourne) is a parish on the river Bourne (which at this part is only a winter stream), 4 miles north-west from Ludgershall station and 5½ south from Savernake Junction station, both on the Midland and South Western Junction railway, and 9½ south from Marlborough, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Kinwardstone, Everleigh and Pewsey petty sessional division, Pewsey union, Marlborough county court district, rural deanery of Marlborough (Pewsey portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary is a flint and stone edifice, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave of six bays and aisles, south porch with embattled western tower of very massive proportions, surmounted with pinnacles, which contains 5 bells: in the chancel is a very elaborate monument of Sir Gabriel Pile, of Collingbourne, and his wife, who died early in the 17th century: there is a brass in the church to Constantine Darell and his wife, bearing the date of 1495: the richly-stained east window was added in 1865 to the memory of Robert and Elizabeth Mackrell, also at the west end is a fine Perpendicular window: the church was restored in 1861 at a cost of about £1,600, and the chancel in 1862 by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners as rectors, at a cost of nearly £400: there are 400 sittings. The

register dates from the year 1653. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge is £320, average £239, net income £200, with glebe (£14) and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Winchester, and held since 1879 by the Rev. Herbert Favell Gibson M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford: the rectorial tithe and rent-charge is £1,230, now the property of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. Here is a Wesleyan chapel. There are two charities, producing about £70 yearly, one left by Miss A. A. Clarke in 1879 and the other by Miss E. Piper in 1890, for the benefit of the parishioners over 55 years of age. The soil is chalky loam; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats, turnips and swedes. The area is 7,125 acres; rateable value, £3,807; the population in 1891 was 739.

Aughton is a tithing, half a mile north; Brunton tithing, half a mile north-east; Southton, or Sunton Vallance, tithing, 1 mile south.

COMPTON CHAMBERLAYNE is a parish and village, bounded on the north by the river Nadder, 3 miles south-east from Dinton station, on the London and South Western railway, 6 west-by-south from Wilton and 9 west from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, South Damerham hundred, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, rural deanery of Chalke (Chalke portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Michael is a stone edifice, close to the manor house, containing remains of Norman and Early English architecture: its general style is that of the late Decorated period, and consists of chancel, nave, south porch and a small square tower: it has been very well restored with an addition of 3 bells, making a peal of 6: the chancel contains a tablet in white marble to the Penruddocke family, who have been interred here since 1598, one of whom, Col. John Penruddocke, was beheaded, by Cromwell's order, 1655, for proclaiming Charles II. king: there are sittings for 150 persons. The register dates from the year 1538. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £85, gross yearly value £96, net £75, with residence, in the gift of Charles Penruddocke esq. and held since 1884 by the Rev. CORSHAM is a parish and town with a station on the Great Western railway, 98½ miles from London, 3½ south-west-by-west from Chippenham, 36 north-west from Salisbury, 12 north-west from Devizes, 8½ north-east from Bath, 4 north-west from Melksham and 7 north-east from Bradford, in the North Western division of the county, hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Chippenham, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. At Thingley, 2 miles east, the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth railway diverges from the Great Western railway. The church of St. Bartholomew is an ancient edifice of stone, in the Norman, Decorated and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel with chapels, nave of five bays, aisles, south chapel, south porch, and a southern tower with pinnacles and spire, containing a clock and 6 bells, and on the north side of the chancel is a mortuary chapel, built by the Tropnell family, and still repaired by the owner of the Neston estate, of which the Tropnell family were formerly the possessors, and a chapel erected in 1879 by Lord Methuen for himself and household: the church was restored in 1878 at a cost of £5,500, and has 800 sittings. The register dates from October, 1563, and contains the following curious entry—"Memorandum of Sweets Hole, in Minty Mead, August 4th, 1606. Here William Sweet and — Bricker fought with swords concerning a Woman, and in the fray the former was slain and the latter acquitted." The living is a vicarage, tithes commuted at £300, average £228, net income £237, with 2½ acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Lord Methuen, and held since 1889 by the Rev. James Dunlap Dunlap M.A. of Jesus College, Cambridge. There are three Congregational chapels, four Baptist, one Primitive Methodist and one Wesleyan, and a meeting place for the Brethren. The Town Hall, in High street, rebuilt in 1882 at a cost of nearly £2,000, is a building of Bath stone, in the Italian style: on the ground floor are the library, reading, smoking rooms and billiard room of the Mechanics' Institute, a coffee bar and attendants' room; an upper floor includes an assembly room holding 400 persons, with a platform at one end. Petty sessions for the Chippenham division are held at the Town Hall every third Thursday at 11.30 a.m.; for magistrates and places in the division, see Chippenham. A fair is held on the 7th March, for cattle of all kinds. In this and the adjoining parish of Box are extensive underground quarries of the celebrated Bath stone, where a large number of men are employed by The Bath Stone Firms Limited, and Yockney and Co. The charities include an almshouse for a master and six aged poor, endowed by the late Lady Margaret Hungerford with £20 yearly for the master, and £30 for the six inmates, with rooms; the endowment has been increased by Mrs. Alexander; the Earl of Radnor is the governor: Lady James' charity, producing about £38 yearly, is given in blankets and sheets: William Kirby's of about £48 yearly, is divided between eight poor persons of good character. Under the direction of the Charity Commissioners, and with the consent of the Earl of Radnor, a scheme has been formed, and five trustees have been appointed. The feoffees are trustees of certain lands and funds producing about £150 yearly for—1st, the repair of the fabric of the parish church and necessary utensils thereof; 2nd, for affording medical relief to 300 families of the second poor dwelling in the parish; 3rd, for the repair of all decayed bridges in the parish. The principal seats in the parish are—Corsham Court, the property of Major-Gen. Lord Methuen C.B., D.L., J.P. but now occupied by Montague Ballard esq. is an ancient mansion of stone, partly sur-

rounded by a park of about 400 acres, in which there is an extensive lake; the mansion contains a good collection of paintings; Hartham Park, the seat of Sir John Poynder Dickson-Poynder bart. M.P.; Beechfield, the seat of Sir Gabriel Goldney bart. D.L., J.P.; Monks Park, the property of Sir Gabriel Goldney, occupied by Daniel Hugh Clutterbuck esq. J.P. and Gastard House, the seat of Sir Thomas Fowler bart. J.P. Here are two manors, the Royal and Rectory manors; Lord Methuen is lord of the Royal manor, which has its bailiff, who is chosen by the tenants, and invested with the power of a coroner; a court leet is held annually: Sir Gabriel Goldney bart. of Beechfield, is lay rector and lord of the Rectory manor. The principal landowners are Maj.-Gen. Lord Methuen, G. P. Fuller esq. M.P. Sir John Poynder Dickson-Poynder bart. M.P. and Sir Gabriel Goldney bart. The soil is various, subsoil, stony. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots. The area is 6,290 acres; rateable value, £26,972; the population in 1891 was 3,931 in the civil, and 3,075 in the ecclesiastical parish.

 pasture. The area is 2,961 acres; rateable value,
 £5,250; the population in 1891 was 926.

CORSTON a tithing of Malmesbury, on the road from Malmesbury to Chippenham and intersected by the river Avon, was, with Rodbourne, formed into an ecclesiastical parish in 1881; it is 2 miles south from Malmesbury terminal station, on a branch of the Great Western railway, in the North Western division of the county, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Malmesbury, and in the rural deanery of Malmesbury, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of All Saints, formerly a chapel of ease belonging to Malmesbury, is a modern structure in mixed styles, and consists of chancel, nave and south porch, with a curious old western turret containing 2 small bells: there are 200 sittings. The registers date from the year 1881; before that period they were kept at Malmesbury. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £90, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1881 by the Rev. George Alexander Johnson M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin: a vicarage house was erected in 1885 by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. The principal landowners are the Earl of Radnor and Sir Richard Hungerford Pollen bart. The soil is brashy; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and roots; the population in 1891 was 452.

EAST COULSTON is a parish on the road from Westbury to Market Lavington, 6½ miles north-east from Westbury station on the Trowbridge and Salisbury section of the Great Western railway, and 8 south-west from Devizes, in the Western division of the county, Whorwellsdown hundred and petty sessional division, Westbury and Whorwellsdown union, county court district of Westbury, rural deanery of Potterne (Potterne portion) archdeaconry of Wilts, and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Thomas à Becket is a very small building of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, side chapel and western turret containing one bell: the chancel was rebuilt in 1860: the church, originally Norman, was nominally restored in 1842, and has unhappily thus lost every Norman feature, except a part of one doorway in the south wall: there are 125 sittings. The register dates from the year 1695. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge £175, average £132, net yearly value £150, including 38 acres of glebe, and Hughes Rev. William, Rectory

residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1894 by the Rev. William Hughes, of St. Bees. Simon Watson-Taylor esq. D.L., J.P. of Erlestoke Park, Westbury, is lord of the manor and principal landowner. Baynton House, now (1894) unoccupied, is a commodious house in the Italian style, dating from 1798, standing in 30 acres of park land, in which is a small lake. The soil is greensand; subsoil, chalk. The chief crop is wheat. The area is 868 acres; rateable value, £875; the population in 1891 was 103.

CRICKLADE is a market and union town and head of a petty sessional division, near the Gloucestershire border, with a station on the Midland and South Western junction railway, 4 miles north from Purton station and 5 east from Minety station on the Swindon and Gloucester branch of the Great Western railway, 52 north-west from Salisbury, 26 north from Devizes, 7 south-east from Cirencester, 8 north-east from Wootton Bassett, 8 north-east from Swindon and 84 from London, in the Northern division of the county, hundreds of Highworth, Cricklade and Staple, county court district of Swindon, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. This town is pleasantly seated in a level tract of country on the south bank of the Thames (or Isis), and is of great antiquity. The Thames and Severn canal passes to the north of the town, and is connected with the Wilts and Berks by the North Wilts canal, which passes the town to the south-west. In 1015 it was taken and plundered by Cnut the Dane, but has not been distinguished by any event of national importance since the Conquest. A high bailiff is appointed for the town by a jury at the court-leet of the lord of the manor: it was a prescriptive borough, and from Edward I. exercised the elective franchise with various interruptions till the reign of Henry VI. from which time it regularly returned two members to Parliament till 1782, when the franchise was extended to the adjoining divisions of Highworth, Cricklade and Staple, and it included 50 parishes, but by the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," the representation was merged into that of the county. The town consists of one long street, is well paved and lighted with gas by a

company whose works are in Gas lane. There is a town estate called Cricklade Waylands, for paving and improving the town. Cricklade comprises two parishes, St. Sampson's and St. Mary's. The church of St. Sampson is a spacious structure of stone, embracing several periods of architectural styles dating from about 1180; it is cruciform, and consists of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, north porch, and a handsome square embattled tower rising from beautifully proportioned arches at the intersections, surmounted by a pierced parapet and pinnacles, on one of which is the Catherine Wheel, finely executed; it contains a striking clock, but no dial, and 5 bells: the present vestry was formerly a chapel, built by the Hungerford family: the church was restored in 1864, under the direction of the Rev. Francis Dyson M.A. the late vicar, who died in 1887, and to whom the stained west window is a memorial: there is also a memorial window in the south aisle to Rose Billingham, 1870: there are several ancient tablets in the north aisle, the principal being to Edward Pleydell, 1675; John Nott, 1763, and John Bristow, 1788: there are sittings for 600 persons. The register dates from the year 1672. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge £471, average £358, net income £290, with residence and 6½ acres of glebe, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol, and held since 1887 by the Rev. Henry James Morton M.A., LL.B. of Trinity Hall, Cambridge. The church of St. Mary is a stone building, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, south porch and a low western tower containing 4 bells: there is a clock at the east end of the nave, above the chancel roof: the chancel is divided from the nave by a circular Norman arch of the

11th century, with the chevron ornament: the aisles are of the Perpendicular character of the 15th century, while the tower is Early English: there are sittings for 220 persons. The register dates from the year 1684. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £10, gross yearly value £231, net £226, including 50 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and held since 1885 by the Rev. John McKaye B.A. of Trinity College, Dublin. There is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1852, and having 200 sittings; a Congregational chapel, built in 1878, with 300 seats; a Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1855, to hold 250 persons; and Wesleyan chapel, built in 1870, and has 200 sittings. Cricklade and Wootton Bassett form a union, for which see Wootton Bassett. The Town Hall, erected in 1861, will hold 250 persons. In the parish of St. Mary are the remains of a priory, dedicated to St. John the Baptist, founded in the reign of Henry III. now converted into private residences; there was also a hospital dedicated to the same patron saint; some land belonging to it, in St. Sampson's parish, is still called the Spital. A market for fat cattle on the third Tuesday in each month is well attended; fairs have been wholly discontinued, with the exception of a pleasure fair on the 21st of September. Major Henry Smyth, in 1853, gave £1,000 to the two parishes for the promotion of education: it is vested in the hands of five trustees for that purpose. There is also Hodge's charity of £5, to be distributed to ten poor householders, not receiving parochial relief; and 100 acres of land were given to the poor of Cricklade out of the forest of Braydon, when it was disafforested by King Charles II. now producing about £140 yearly, one moiety to be distributed to poor men and women not receiving parochial relief, the other moiety to be divided into two equal parts, one part to apprenticing children, the other to paupers. The interest of £600 to St. Sampson's and £400 to St. Mary's, also the gift of Major Smyth, is laid out annually in the purchase of warm clothing for the poor in November. Dunche's charity, consisting of lands, producing about £23 yearly, to decayed householders not receiving parochial relief. Sir A. Hungerford's charity, of £19 yearly, is divided into three parts, two whereof are taken by the parish of St. Sampson, and the remaining third by the parish of St. Mary: the money is laid out in great coats, which are given to the poor. Farmor's and Barker's charity, of £53 yearly, is distributed to the second poor of both parishes who are not receiving any of the other charities belonging to Cricklade. There is a Lammas meadow, called North meadow, of 104 acres, into which, from Lammas to Candlemas, the inhabitants have the right of turning their cattle. A stone cross, which formerly stood in the principal street, was removed into the churchyard of St. Sampson when the old Town Hall was taken down. There is also a stone cross in good preservation in the churchyard of St. Mary's parish. The kennels of the Vale of White Horse hounds are situated here; T. B. Miller esq. is master. Sir Algernon W. Neeld bart. is lord of the manor of the borough and tithings. The principal landowners are Sir Algernon W. Neeld bart. the Hon. Duncombe Pleydell-Bouverie, of Coleshill House, Highworth and the Earl of St. Germans. The soil is a rich loam. The land is mostly in pasture. St. Sampson's parish, which includes the hamlets of Great and Little Chelworth and Calcutt, and part of the hamlet of Braydon, contains 6,002 acres of land and 31 of water; rateable value, £12,057; and in 1891 had 1,249 inhabitants. St. Mary's parish contains 117 acres; rateable value, £904; the population in 1891 was 427.

The church of All Saints, a handsome building of stone, in the Early English style, consisting of a chancel, nave, and aisles (running the whole length of the church), a fine square western tower with ornamental parapet, and containing 5 bells and a clock: the windows are of the 15th century Perpendicular: the church contains some interesting monuments, also some good carving, and was restored in 1880: a window in the north wall contains some old glass, representing five of the seven (Catholic) sacraments; also a stained window over the communion table representing the Te Deum was erected in 1887: there are 350 sittings. The register dates from the year 1659. The living is a rectory, with residence, tithe rent-charge £570, average £434, net income £390, with 68 acres of glebe, and residence, in the gift of Mrs. Lingwood, and held since 1888 by the Rev. William Anslow Sole. Here are Baptist and Primitive Methodist chapels. Charities producing £22 yearly are distributed in coals. Near the village runs the old fosse way to Cirencester. The living is a vicarage, with the chapelry of Crockerton annexed, joint yearly value from tithe rent-charge £120, net income £400, including 70 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Marquess of Bath, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Frederic Wilson Cooper M.A. of Keble College, Oxford. The church of the Holy Trinity, at CROCKERTON, a chapelry in this parish, was built of Crockerton stone, in the Byzantine style, in 1843: it consists of apsidal chancel and nave and small western tower surmounted by a turret containing one bell: the seats, for 500 persons, are entirely free and unappropriated. There is a Primitive Methodist chapel at Longbridge Deverill, and Congregational and Baptist chapels at Crockerton; and almshouses, founded in 1665, by Sir James Thynne, for six men and two women, each of whom receive 15s. 6d. monthly. A priory of Black Canons was founded here by Sir John Vernon about 1270, but had fallen into decay (1529), and was sold: ultimately became possessed by Sir John Thynne, son of Earl of Hertford, Duke of Somerset. Longleat, the seat of the Marquess of Bath F.C.A., L.L., J.P. in this parish ecclesiastically, but for civil purposes in Horningsham, was erected on the site of the priory by Sir John Thynne: the foundation was laid in January, 1567, and twelve years elapsed before it was completed, and it is traditionally asserted that the model was obtained from Italy: the mansion is spacious and magnificent, standing in a park 12 miles in circumference, watered by a branch of the river Frome, amidst pleasant woods and scenery, with wide prospects over the adjacent country: the park contains a herd of deer, and has some fine timber, comprising some venerable oaks and some very large Scotch spruce firs, some upwards of 120 feet high: "Shearwater" Lake, covering 38 acres, is within the domain, which covers 2,000 acres: Sir John Thynne, the founder, died in 1580, and at the time of his decease part of the interior was left unfinished, and his son did not live to complete the works: his descendant, Thomas Thynne, who was shot in his coach in Pall Mall, in 1682, formed the road to Frome, which is planted with elms, and the whole was completed by the first Viscount Weymouth: alterations were made in the disposition of

the grounds by Thomas, third Viscount Weymouth, when the gardens were remodelled by Launcelot, known as "Capability" Brown: the second Marquess of Bath built the northern front, from designs by Sir Jeffrey Wyattville, and the mansion now forms a parallelogram, 220 feet by 180 in dimension, built entirely of freestone: it is of three stories, the façade broken by projections, with pilasters of Corinthian order on top storey, Ionic in the centre and Doric at the base, and the whole surmounted with a balustrade on which are statues: the principal entrance is on the southern front and the entrance hall is grand and imposing in its appearance, rising to the height of two stories, having a flat ceiling with spandril brackets and pendants, and at the lower end is a richly carved screen: the staircase comprises a central flight of oaken steps, 10 feet wide, with two returns, and is adapted to the style and magnitude of the building, and is lighted by an octagonal lantern, 15 feet in diameter, rising from a coved ceiling, enriched with arabesque foliage: the old baronial hall, used as a dining room, has carved wainscotting, and is hung with arms and trophies of the chase: a fine collection of pictures by Vandyke, Holbein, Lely and Reynolds, including family portraits, adorns the principal apartments, and there is a valuable library: Queen Elizabeth resided here, 1575; Charles II. 1667 and George III.; Bishop Ken, after the deprivation of his see of Bath and Wells, resided and died here in 1711 and was buried at Frome; he officiated in the small chapel here, and to him is ascribed the naming of a gap in the woods as Heaven's Gate. The Marquess of Bath is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is light sand and chalk; subsoil, chalk and stone. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 3,762 acres; rateable value, £3,882; the population in 1891 was 730 in the civil parish and 870 in the ecclesiastical parish, with Crockerton.

MONCKTON DEVERILL is a parish and village situated amongst the Wiltshire hills and on a stream called the Deverill, 6 miles south from Warminster station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, and 8½ south-east from Frome, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Damerham South, union of Mere, Frome county court district, petty ses-

sional division of Warminster, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), and Salisbury archdeaconry and diocese. The parish church, in the Early English style (of which the dedication is not known) was restored and the interior decorated in 1852: it consists of chancel, nave, south porch and square tower with 2 bells: the nave is separated from the baptistery by a modern

oak screen: in the chancel is a stained window, representing scenes in the life of the Saviour, and there are four other stained windows: the pulpit has four panels:—1st, representing Adam in the Deep Sleep; 2nd, The Woman Formed from his Rib; 3rd, The Temptation at the Tree of Knowledge; 4th, The Angel Driving Adam and Eve out of Paradise: there are sittings for 100 persons. The register dates from the year 1695. The living is a vicarage, united in 1892 to the rectory of Kingston Deverill, in the gift of the Marquess of Bath, and held since 1892 by the Rev. William Moore B.A. of St. John's College, Oxford, who resides at Kingston Deverill. This parish was once the property of Glastonbury Abbey. Upon a house opposite the

church are the arms of the Ludlow family, which were removed here from Hill Deverill by the late Mr. Coker. The Marquess of Bath is lord of the manor and the principal landowner. The soil is light clay and chalk; subsoil, stony, with chalk. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 1,735 acres; rateable value, £857; the population in 1891 was 104.

DEVIZES.

DEVIZES is a municipal borough, market, union and assize town, head of a county court district, railway station and military centre, on the old road from London to Bath and Bristol, and nearly in the centre of the county, of which it may be termed the second capital, and the chief town of North Wilts, 88 miles from London by road, 23 north from Salisbury, 6 North from Market Lavington, 7 south from Calne, 7 east from Melksham and 20 east from Bath, with a station on the Berks and Hants section of the Great Western railway, which joins the main line at Reading and the Wilts and Somerset section at Trowbridge: it is in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Potterne and Cannings, rural deanery of Potterne (Potterne portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury; and is on the flat top of a hill, forming a sort of table-land of considerable extent and elevation, which stretches far away to the west. The town is 500 feet above the level of the sea, and from its lofty and exposed situation is subject to winds from every point of the compass, hence the air is often cold, piercing and sharp, but dry and salubrious. The nature of the soil varies considerably from the more southern and western parts of the county; in the latter stone is abundant, while here all traces of it are lost; in this district is found the green sand, one of the beds lying between the chalk and the oolites, which is very porous and of great thickness. A vast number of fossils are found about here.

The town is of great but uncertain antiquity, some believing it to be Roman, while, from some fragments of rude pottery, and a quern, found on the site of the castle, others trace an earlier occupation by the ancient Britons: it is not, however, mentioned in "Domesday Book," but it is thought then to have been called "Kainningham," or the chief town in the manor of "Kannings." The present name, which is a barbarous Anglicization of the Latin "Divisas," seems to point to nothing older than the erection of the castle: William of Malmesbury, in the 12th century, speaks of the "Castrum ad Divisas" (the castle of the boundaries), and the site on which it was built is at a point where the manors of Rowde, Potterne and Canning met. The borough of Devizes obtained its first charter from the Empress Maud, the daughter of Henry I.; it was afterwards confirmed by her son Henry II. Two members were returned to Parliament from the time of Edward I. but by the "Representation of the People Act, 1867," it returned only one, and under the provisions of the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," the representation was merged into that of the county. The municipal borough, from north-east to south-west is 2 miles long, one mile broad, and comprises the parishes of St. John the Baptist and St. Mary the Virgin, part of St. James or Southbroom and part of the parish of Rowde; it is divided into North and South wards, and is governed by a mayor, 6 aldermen and 18 town councillors, who also act as the Urban Sanitary Authority. The borough has a commission of the peace and a separate court of quarter sessions.

The town is well paved, drained and watched, and is lighted with gas, and supplied with water by the Town Council, to whom both the gas and waterworks now belong. The waterworks, completed in 1879, at a cost of £11,700, are about 5 miles north-east of the town, in the parish of Bishop's Cannings.

The Kennet and Avon canal (begun in 1794 and

finished in 1805) winds through the valley below the town, and is carried over a hill by a series of twenty-nine locks, and, after passing Devizes on the north-west, eventually joins the river Kennet at Hungerford, thus affording means of transit for goods to the eastern and western parts of the kingdom.

The church of St. John the Baptist, near the castle, was probably built by Roger, Bishop of Salisbury, in the early part of the 12th century, and is a building of stone, originally cruciform, and consisting of chancel, nave, transepts and a central tower; aisles were added about 1450, and the chapels on either side of the chancel, about 1480, and in 1863 the nave and aisles were extended one bay westward: the church, 126 feet long by 68 wide, now consists of chancel, nave of six bays, aisles, transepts, with eastern chapels, north and south porches, and an embattled central tower with stair turret, and containing 8 bells, all cast between 1610 and 1747: the chancel, restored in 1844, is Norman and has an intersecting arcade running round the interior: the aisles are Perpendicular: the north-east chapel has in the hollow moulding of the east window the inscription:—"Orate p bono statu Ricardi Lamb": the south-east chapel, a very fine example of Late Perpendicular, has an embattled parapet, ornamented with Tudor flowers, and square panels enclosing quatrefoils, and in the centre of the east wall, above the roof, is a canopied niche: the transepts retain the outline of the original Norman windows, now blocked up, and the north transept shows traces of the doorway formerly leading to the rood loft: the east wall of each transept is pierced by a hagioscope: the tower is oblong in plan; of the four arches supporting it, two are semi-circular, and those on the north and south pointed: the upper stage is relieved externally by an arcade of sixteen semi-circular arches, six of which are pierced for lights: all the windows in the church, except those in the chancel, are Perpendicular insertions: the east window and three others are stained, and there are many brasses, mural monuments and tablets, including several to the Heathcote and Sutton families: there are 1,050 sittings. The register dates from the year 1559.

The church of St. Mary the Virgin is a building of stone 132 feet long by 65 wide, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower 91 feet in height, with pinnacles, and containing 6 bells, four of which were cast in 1663, and one in 1696: the chancel, the most ancient portion, is Norman, and was originally lined within by an intersecting arcade, much of which on the north and south sides has been cut away to admit of the insertion of four Perpendicular windows: the east end of the chancel was restored in 1852: the roof is vaulted and groined in stone: the chancel arch, cut through the original Norman wall, is late Perpendicular: on either side of its western face is a canopied niche, with a hagioscope beneath: the nave, aisles and tower were rebuilt by William Smyth, who died 1 June, 1436, and is commemorated by a Latin inscription on the nave roof: in the centre of the east wall of the nave above the ridge of the chancel roof is a canopied niche, with a statue of the Virgin and Child: at the north-east angle of the nave is a stair turret, with both upper and lower doorways: the tower, 14 feet square within, opens to the nave by an arch 40 feet in height and 10 feet wide, and the lower stage has stone groining: on either

side of the west window, on the outside, is a canopied niche: the embattled porch has an outer doorway of Transition Norman date, and a turret stair to an upper chamber: the porch was repaired and the upper part was probably rebuilt in 1612: the east and west windows are stained: in the chancel is a brass to Anne Badger, ob. 1871: there are also mural monuments to John Garth, M.P. for Devizes 1739-64; Major-Gen. William Hull C.B. ob. 1840; Abel Filkes, ob. 1815; Rebecca Garth, ob. 1785, and others, besides many floor stones of the 17th and 18th centuries: there are 799 sittings. The register dates from the year 1669.

The living of Devizes is a rectory, gross yearly value £347, net £300, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1874 by the Rev. John Hart Burges D.D. of Trinity College, Dublin, and surrogate; the living comprises the parishes of St. John the Baptist and that of the Blessed Virgin Mary, quite distinct from one another for civil matters, but forming a united rectory, and designated as the rectory of St. John the Baptist with the chapel of the Blessed Virgin Mary annexed.

St. Peter's is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1867 from the parishes of Bishop's Cannings and Rowde: the church, on the Bath road, is a building of stone, erected in 1866, consisting of chancel, nave, south aisle and vestry: the south aisle was added in 1884: there are 360 sittings. The register dates from the year 1866. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £300, net £290, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1885 by the Rev. Arthur Charles Devas M.A. of Christ Church, Oxford, and chaplain of Her Majesty's prison.

The Parish Mission Room, in Long street, built in 1890, will accommodate 100 persons.

The Catholic church, on the bank of the canal, and dedicated to St. Joseph, erected in 1865, is a small building in the Gothic style, consisting of nave only, and is 60 feet long and 23 feet wide: the church was restored in 1887 at a cost of £70: there are 200 sittings. Near the church is a convent, the residence of four sisters of the order of St. Joseph.

There are three Baptist chapels: the one in Maryport street, founded in 1780, has about 400 sittings: that in New Park street, founded in 1838, will seat 200 persons, and one in Sheep street, founded in 1851, with 650 seats.

The Congregational chapel, Northgate street, founded in 1776, has 400 sittings.

The Wesleyan chapel, New Park street, founded in 1819, will seat 200 persons.

The Friends' Meeting House is now disused.

The Salvation Army have a hall in Commercial road, with accommodation for 200 persons.

A Cemetery of four acres, at Belvidere, was formed in 1878 at a cost of £3,000 and has two mortuary chapels: a part of the cemetery is reserved for Catholic burials: it is under the control of a burial board of 27 members.

The Town Hall, in St. John street, is a building of stone, with a segmental front adorned with four pillars of the Ionic order; the upper storey includes the Council Chamber of the Corporation, the Grand Jury room, and the Assembly room, which will hold 500 persons.

The Epiphany sessions for the county, and the Spring assizes are held here. The Assize Courts, in Northgate street, erected in 1835, form an important building, in the Classic style, the principal front exhibiting a pedimented centre, supported by four Ionic columns resting on an elevated base, approached by a flight of steps, on either side of which are wings of considerable extent.

The Odd Fellows' building in Maryport street, erected at a cost of about £2,400, contains a large room for the meetings of the order, which is also let for public entertainments, and will hold about 300 persons.

The Market place, which occupies a central position in the town, is a large triangular space, from which the main street and several other streets diverge, some of which take a very irregular course. An extensive corn and cattle market, which is the mainstay of the town is held every Thursday. There is also a market on Thursdays for poultry, butter and vegetables, which was rebuilt and enlarged in 1839, and is well supplied; in November, 1862, a monthly cheese market was established, and has now become important; the markets are under the control of the Corporation. The Market Cross was erected in 1814, from designs by Benjamin Wyatt, at the expense of Viscount Sidmouth, who was recorder of the borough for 30 years, and represented it in six successive parliaments previous to his eleva-

tion to the peerage; it is constructed of Bath stone, and consists of a plain rectangular base, with a buttress at each angle crowned with a pinnacle and an octagonal decorated spire. This cross has obtained wide-spread notoriety in consequence of the following remarkable inscription on the east panel:—"On Thursday, the 25th of January, 1753, Ruth Pierce, of Potterne in this county, agreed with three other women to buy a sack of wheat in the market, each paying her due proportion towards the same. One of these women, in collecting the several quotas of money, discovered a deficiency and demanded of Ruth Pierce the sum which was wanting to make good the amount. Ruth Pierce protested that she had paid her share, and said, she wished she might drop down dead if she had not. She rashly repeated this awful wish; when, to the consternation and terror of the surrounding multitude, she instantly fell down and expired, having the money concealed in her hand." In the market place also stands a memorial to the late Right Hon. G. Sotheron-Estcourt, formerly member for the county, President of the Poor Law Board, and founder of the Wilts Friendly Society, consisting of a pedestal of Aberdeen granite, over 50 feet in height, on which is placed a statue of Mr. Sotheron-Estcourt: at the base are water troughs for cattle.

The fairs are on the 20th and 21st of April, and 20th and 21st of October, for sheep, cattle, toys and pedlery, and are held on the Green. Candlemas fair, Feb. 14th, is held in Monday Market street.

The Corn Exchange, in the Market place, opened on the 3rd December, 1857, is a building of stone 142 feet long by 46 broad; the principal front is adorned with four Corinthian columns supporting a handsome cornice, and in the centre is a statue of Ceres, by Thorp, of Leeds, presented by Christopher Darby Griffith esq. then M.P. for the borough.

The Savings Bank, near the Town Hall, is a large and well-built edifice of stone, in the Jacobean style, erected in the year 1848, and comprises banking and waiting-rooms, with a large board-room; the remainder of the building is used for residential purposes: the bank is open for the transaction of business every Thursday morning from 11 to 1 o'clock, and on Monday evenings from 6 to 8; and the accumulated funds now (1894) amount to about £50,000. A Penny Bank, conducted in the same building, is open every Monday from 6 to 7 p.m., and has been very successful; Mr. David Owen F.C.A. is the actuary of the Savings Bank and hon. secretary of the Penny Bank.

Bateson Conservative Club, New Park street, was formally opened in 1886, by Mr. Walter Long, the then member for East Wilts, and occupies the premises formerly known as the Bateson Reading Rooms. The club is managed by a committee of 15 elected yearly. President, Charles E. H. A. Colston esq. M.P., D.L., J.P.; secretary, Mr. James Turner, Devizes.

Three newspapers are published here: the "Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette," the "Devizes and Wilts Advertiser," and the "Wiltshire Telegraph."

Her Majesty's prison, on the Bath road, near the canal, was built in 1810, and is of a polygonal shape, the governor's house standing in the centre.

The Wilts County Lunatic Asylum, opened 19th September, 1851, is a structure of Bath stone, in the Italian style, from designs by Mr. T. H. Wyatt, architect; the site, which is within a mile of the Town Hall, is considerably above the level of the adjacent valley of the Avon, though rather less so than the town of Devizes itself, and is well sheltered on the north-east and east by the hill of Etchilhampton, about a mile distant; the asylum has been repeatedly enlarged since its first erection, and will now hold about 700 patients. The land belonging to the asylum consists of nearly 90 acres.

Here are the extensive works of Messrs. Brown and May, manufacturers of portable engines, the tobacco and snuff factory of Messrs. E. and W. Anstie, who have had erected by Mr. Henry Ash, builder and contractor, of this town, additional premises in the Market place, from designs by Mr. John Ashley Randell; there is also the brewery of Wadworth & Company Limited.

Devizes is the head quarters of the Wiltshire Friendly Society, founded in the year 1828, and which has upwards of 100 branches throughout the county: the president is Lord Nelson, and secretary Mr. David Owen: there is also a very successful juvenile branch, founded in the year 1882.

A Literary and Scientific Institution was established in 1833, and has now (1894) 200 members.

The Museum of the Wiltshire Archaeological and

Natural History Society, situated in Long street, was formally opened by Sir Gabriel Goldney bart. the president of the society, on the 8th September, 1874; the purchase of property, and the cost of its adaptation to its present purpose, has been met by a subscription from the members: the museum contains the famous Stourhead collection of antiquities, formed by the late William Carrington esq. of Heytesbury and Sir Richard C. Hoare, of Stourhead; there is also a collection of British birds, a herbarium, representing several thousand Wiltshire plants, some fine specimens of British, Roman, and Roman-British urns, both funereal and domestic, a representative geological collection, stratigraphically arranged, an almost complete set of Wiltshire tokens, and a valuable library of books.

Sir Thomas Lawrence P.R.A. was born at Bristol, 13th April, 1769, and spent part of his youthful days in this town, where his parents kept the Bear hotel.

Devizes is the depôt of the 1st and 2nd Battalions of the Wiltshire Regiment (Duke of Edinburgh's), 62nd and 99th Foot, which form No. 62 Regimental District; barracks were erected on the London road in 1877-8: the staff of the Royal Wilts Militia are attached to the depôt. The B Troop of the Prince of Wales' Own Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry and the C and D Companies of the 2nd Volunteer Battalion, Duke of Edinburgh's Wiltshire Regiment, have their head quarters here, the total strength being 185 members.

There are many charities in the town, founded for educational and other purposes. Wylde's foundation for 5 boys; Woodroffe's foundation, for 10 boys; Bancroft's foundation, for 20 boys; Eyle's foundation, for 6 boys; Imber's for girls. There are almshouses under the management of the Municipal charity trustees for 8 persons; others, controlled by St. Mary's feoffees, for 22 persons; and St. John's Almshouses for 16 persons, to whom money allowances are also made.

The Devizes Cottage Hospital and Provident Dispensary, Park road, was established in 1876, and contains 16 beds, and is supported principally by voluntary contributions, and was enlarged in 1887 and its benefits extended to several of the surrounding parishes; the number of in-patients in 1893 was 102.

The Hospital for infectious diseases, situated near the union workhouse, contains twenty beds. The North Wilts Dispensary for the homœopathic treatment of diseases is in Monday Market street, and was founded in 1860.

To the north-east is Roundway Down, the abrupt termination of a long ridge of chalk hills stretching westward from Marlborough: here was the scene of the defeat, in 1643, of Sir William Waller by the Royalists under the command of Lord Wilmot: on its brow, and nearly overlooking the town, are the remains of an ancient earthwork or Roman station, and near it is Roundway Park, of 200 acres, with some fine timber, the seat of Charles Edward Hungerford Athol Colston esq. M.P., D.L., J.P.

In a picturesque and romantic situation, to the west of the borough, formerly stood the ancient Castle of Devizes, built in the reign of Henry I. by Roger, Bishop of Salisbury: old writers say that, for magnificence, extent and strength, this castle had not its equal in Europe: in 1106, Henry I., on his return from Normandy, caused his brother Robert, Duke of Normandy, to be confined here: it seems that in 1139, Stephen, being jealous of the power of Roger, Bishop of Salisbury, sent his minister, William D'Ypres, to lay siege to this castle; it was obstinately defended by Nigel, Bishop of Ely, a nephew of Roger; but Stephen, under threat of hanging the son of Roger, obtained possession, and found a treasure therein of 40,000 marks, besides other valuables. In 1141 Stephen was defeated and taken prisoner at the battle of Lincoln; the castle then surrendered to the Empress Maud, but she was unable to retain it, for having fled hither from Winchester, and still distrusting her safety, she caused herself to be inclosed in a bier, and thus passing out unsuspected, made good her retreat to Gloucester. In 1174, Queen Eleanor, the young Queen Margaret, the Earl of Chester, the Earl and Countess of Leicester, and, one author says, the wives of the Princes Richard and Geoffrey, were committed to the castle: Prince (afterwards King) John held the castle of Devizes for his brother Richard during his absence in the Holy Land. In 1223 Hubert de Burgh, the minister of Henry III. was a prisoner here, but effecting his escape took sanctuary at the high altar of St. John's church, from which he was dragged by the soldiers; the parties engaged in this sacrilege being thereupon excommunicated by the Bishop of Salisbury, the fugitive was restored to the sanctuary

of the church; but the king, intent upon his destruction, endeavoured, by cutting off the supply of provisions, to starve him to death; he eventually, however, effected his escape into Wales. In 1281, Edward I. stayed at the castle, where he collected his army, previous to starting to suppress the Welsh rebellion of that year. In 1419, Humphrey, the "Good" Duke of Gloucester, was appointed governor of the castle: in 1533, it was visited by Henry VIII. and Anne Boleyn. It was in a ruinous state in the reign of Henry VIII. for Leyland who visited it in 1538 wrote "there remained yet divers goodly towers in the outer wall of the castle, but all going to ruin;" and he further records that a part of the structure had been carried "fully unprofitably" to the building of Old Bromham House. "The keep or dungeon of it," he says, "set upon a hill cast by hand, is a piece of work of an incredible cost." Lambard, in 1569, says—"From being the most gorgeous in Christendom, it is now the most decayed."

During the Civil War this neighbourhood was the scene of a desperate conflict between the Parliamentary forces, under Sir William Waller, and the Royalists, commanded by Lord Wilmot, on the 22nd of September, 1643: the king, for some considerable time after, held the castle and garrison of Devizes, and contemplated concentrating most of his forces here, or in the neighbourhood; but on the 23rd September, 1645, Cromwell in person, accompanied by Fairfax, appeared before the town, when the governor, Sir Charles Lloyd, was forced speedily to capitulate: after which the castle was destroyed, by order of Parliament, and the fortifications of Devizes razed to the ground: this property is now held by Sir Charles Rich bart. who purchased it on its being put up to auction shortly after the death of the late owner. On a portion of a site of the ancient fortress there now stands a modern castellated residence, called "Devizes Castle," which was greatly enlarged, and the grounds by which it is surrounded improved at great cost by the late Mr. Leach.

SOUTHBROOM, or St. James, to the east of the town, and partly within the borough, was formerly a chapelry attached to the parish of Bishop's Cannings, but in 1832 was made a separate ecclesiastical parish. The church of St. James, standing within the borough, on the Green, rebuilt, with the exception of the tower, in 1834, is of stone in the Late Perpendicular style and consists of chancel, nave of 3 bays, aisles, south and west porches and a western embattled tower with staircase turret and pinnacles, 67 feet in height, and containing 4 bells: in the chancel is a credence with trefoil-headed arch; on each side of the east window are two canopied niches; the nave arcade is late Perpendicular: the tower is in three stages, the lower stage having a stone-groined ceiling: the stained east window is a memorial to Edward Francis Colston, of Roundway, d. 1847; the stained east window of the north aisle commemorates the Rev. John Nicholas LL.D. d. 1836, and his family: the east window in the south aisle was erected by the officers and men of the 99th (Duke of Edinburgh's) Regiment to many of their comrades killed during the Zulu War in 1879: the west window is also stained: there are brasses to the Rev. Benjamin C. Dowding M.A. d. 1870, and to John Frederick Nicholls M.D. surgeon to the 3rd battalion Wiltshire Regiment, d. 1885, and marble monuments to Bridget Nicholas, d. 1752: Edward G. M. Colston, d. 1859, besides other mural monuments and tablets: there are 592 sittings, all free. The register dates from the year 1572. The living is a vicarage, yearly value from tithe rent-charge £119, net £125, and £186 from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, with residence, in the gift of the Vicar of Bishop's Cannings, and held since 1883 by the Rev. Charles Edward Benedict Barnwell M.A. of

Christ Church, Oxford. In 1887 a parish room was erected by the late Alexander Meek esq. on a site adjoining the schools, and will accommodate about 50 persons. In 1699, several hundred Roman coins were discovered in this parish on ground belonging to Sir John Eyles and in 1714 a large urn was dug up on the Green, containing twenty-one pocket household deities, called by the Romans "Penates," together with a coin of the Emperor Severus. The landowners are the Crown,

C. E. H. A. Colston esq. M.P. of Roundway Park, Alexander Grant Meek esq. of Hillworth House, Miss Ewart, Broadlees, and Simon Watson-Taylor esq. The area is 2,648 acres; the population in 1891 was 3,633 (including 159 officers and inmates in the workhouse, 785 in the Lunatic Asylum, and 204 in the Barracks), of which 1,850 are within the borough of Devizes.

DILTON is a parish, formed in 1894, it having been an ecclesiastical parish known as Dilton Marsh since 1845, out of the parish of Westbury; it is 2 miles south-west from the Westbury station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, 3½ north-west from Warminster and 14 south-east from Bath, in the Western division of the county, Westbury and Whorwellsdon union, county court district of Westbury, petty sessional division of Trowbridge, hundred of Westbury, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion) and Salisbury archdeaconry and diocese. Holy Trinity church, built in the year 1844, is a large and very fine cruciform Norman stone structure, consisting of apsidal chancel, nave and transepts and north porch, with large square central embattled tower containing one bell and a clock: in the south transept is an organ: in the north aisle is a stained window, put in by the officers of the 7th Hussars, in 1887, as a memorial to Major Phipps, who died at Cairo on returning from the expedition for the relief of General Gordon: it represents "The Good Centurion:" the east window was erected in 1885 by friends, to Chas. Paul Phipps esq. and his wife: in 1893 a small west window, in memory of Miss Sarah Bailey, late schoolmistress, was erected by public subscriptions: there are sittings for 600 persons. The register dates from the year 1844. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £284, net £239, including 4 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1879 by the Rev. Charles Holt Wilson M.A. of Merton College, Oxford. Chalcot, the seat of Charles Nicholas Paul Phipps esq. D.L., J.P. is a noble structure of red brick and stone, pleasantly situated amid an undulating park of about 250 acres, on the high road to Frome and about 2 miles south-west from Westbury station. Chas. Nicholas Paul Phipps esq. and the Marquess of Bath are the principal landowners. The soil is sand and clay; subsoil, chalk and marl. The area is 2,989 acres; rateable value, £8,698; the population in 1891 was 1,218.

CHAPMANSLADE, nearly 3 miles south-west, is partly

in this parish and partly in Corsley. The church of SS. Philip and James, a chapel of ease to Holy Trinity parish church, is a small stone building, erected by a subscription in 1867, and consists of chancel, nave, south porch and a small western belfry containing 2 bells: the chancel and nave are paved with encaustic tiles: the reredos is of Caen stone and bears a representation of the Four Evangelists: there is a stone pulpit: the seats, which are of oak and all open, will seat 130 persons. Here is a Congregational and a Baptist chapel.

FAIRWOOD, 2 miles north, and Short Street, half a mile south, are hamlets in the district of Dilton.

DINTON is a parish and village, on the river Nadder, with a station on the main line of the London and South Western railway, 8 miles west from Salisbury, 5½ west from Wilton, and 92 from London by railway, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Warminster, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Chalke portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary the Virgin is a handsome stone building in the Transition Norman, Early English, Decorated and Perpendicular styles, is cruciform, having chancel, nave and transepts, porch, with a square embattled tower rising from the intersection, with 6 fine-toned bells and clock, and was re-

paired and re-seated in oak in 1876, under Mr. Butterfield, at a cost of £2,000: the font is of Purbeck marble: there are 279 sittings. The parish registers are complete from the first year of Queen Elizabeth (1558): they contain the baptism of Henry Lawes, the musician, January 1st, 1600, and of Edward Hyde, the first Earl of Clarendon, February 22nd, 1608, who was born here: the Hydes were for many years lay rectors and patrons of the living: the last possessor, Robert Hyde, died 1725, a Fellow of Magdalen College, and bequeathed the rectorial rights and the patronage to his college. The living is a vicarage, with the chapelry of Teffont Magna annexed, tithe rent £367, average £280, net income £200, in the gift of the president and scholars of Mag-

dalen College, Oxford, who are lay rectors, and held since 1886 by the Rev. John Heslop Audland M.A. and late Demy of that college. There are also about 30 acres of glebe, of which about 4 acres belong to the Dean and Canons of Windsor. Dinton House, the seat of William Wyndham esq. B.A., D.L., J.P. is a large handsome stone building, commanding extensive views of the surrounding country. The Earl of Pembroke, who is lord of the manor, and William Wyndham esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is clay, chalk and greensand; subsoil, same; many of the meadows are irrigated. The chief crops are wheat, barley, hay and apples; cider is largely made; there is also much dairy farming, butter and cheese are made, and milk is sent to the London market. DITCHERIDGE (or Ditteridge) is a parish and small village, and is now, by the Divided Parishes Act, attached to Box for civil purposes, and is on the Somersetshire border of the county, half a mile north from Box station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 6 miles north-east from Bath and 7 south-west from Chippenham, in the North Western division of the county, hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Chippenham, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. Christopher is an ancient edifice of stone in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and a bell gable over the chancel arch, containing one bell: there is a curious old font: the whole of the building was restored in 1859 and stained glass put in all the windows, chiefly at the expense of the late rector: there are 100 sittings. DONHEAD ST. ANDREW is a parish and straggling village, 3 miles south-east from the Semley station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, 16 miles west from Salisbury and 4 north-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Dunworth, Tisbury petty sessional division and union, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. The river Don rises in Donhead St. Mary and flows through Donhead St. Andrew to Tisbury, turning five mills in its course; it then joins the river Nadder. The church of St. Andrew, which lies in a deep hollow, is an ancient structure in the Perpendicular style, built of the green sandstone of the district, and consists of a chancel and nave of six bays, with aisles, the south aisle built in 1826, south porch and a western tower, with an embattled parapet, adorned with pinnacles and containing 4 bells and a clock; the chancel, rebuilt in 1838, contains four handsome stained windows: the whole of the church was re-seated in 1876: the tower is at present being restored, at a cost of about £800, defrayed privately: there are 220 sittings. The register dates from the year 1645. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £583, gross yearly value £650, net £600, including 12 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Rev. Horace Edward Chapman M.A. and held since 1891 by the Rev. John Givens Kirkaldy Baskett B.A. of Trinity College, Dublin. There is a charity of the yearly value of £7 16s. 4d. being the interest of £284 12s. 3d. Old South Sea Annuities, bequeathed by the Rev. W. Bowles, a former rector of this parish, for the support of education. Grove's charity of £8 5s. yearly, derived from Consols, was founded by will 1840, the income to be equally divided between the parishes of Donhead St. Mary, Donhead St. Andrew and Berwick St. John, and is given as a bonus to the village clothing club. DONHEAD ST. MARY is a parish, adjoining the parish of Donhead St. Andrew, being half a mile east, 3 south-east from Semley station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway and 4 north-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Dunworth hundred, Tisbury and Mere petty sessional division and Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), and archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. The river Don rises in this parish. The church of St. Mary the Virgin, standing on an eminence called Church Hill, was originally a rude Norman structure, consisting of small chancel and nave: of this, only part of the walls and font remain: towards the beginning of the 13th century the church was enlarged and modified, arches being cut through the Norman walls, apparently at two different periods, a clerestory added as well as aisles, and a large chancel attached: about a century later a stone porch was built at the south entrance: in the year 1400 the present western embattled tower was erected and ornamented with pinnacles, and now contains 6 bells: a few years later the north and south chancel aisles were added: the church was again thoroughly restored in the year 1885 at a cost of £2,000, of which sum £1,000 was left by the late rector, the Rev. R. W. Blackmore, the remainder raised by voluntary contributions: there are four stained windows to the memory of the Rev. R. W. Blackmore and his parents and the late Mrs. Dunston: the church will seat 250 persons. The register dates from the year 1678. The living is a rectory, with the chapelry of Charlton annexed, average tithe rent-charge, £875, joint gross yearly value £995, net £784, including 59 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of New College, Oxford, and held since 1882 by the Rev. Walter Francis Short M.A. late fellow of that college, and rural dean of Tisbury portion. There is a Wesleyan Methodist chapel, and at Bird Bush a Congregational chapel, and a chapel for Primitive Methodists at Ludwell. Grove's charity of £24 15s. yearly, derived from £900 Consols, was founded by will in 1840, and is to be equally divided between the parishes of Donhead St. Mary and St. Andrew, and Berwick St. John, and is applied in clothing. Mrs. Jones Bateman's charity of £15 yearly is also for clothing. The remains of a Roman encampment, called Castle Rings, are on Ticklepath Hill, whence there is an extensive and almost panoramic view of the surrounding country. Donhead Hall, the seat of John Du Boulay esq. D.L., J.P. was built by the celebrated painter Sir Godfrey Kneller, who formerly resided here. Coombe House, a handsome mansion, built of the local green sandstone, with facings of red Farley stone, is the seat of Mark Hanbury Beaufoy esq. M.P., J.P. Wincombe Park is the seat of Charles William Gordon esq. Lord Arundell of Wardour is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Charles William Gordon esq. M. H. Beaufoy esq. M.P. and J. Du Boulay esq. Sir M.

R. Shaw-Stewart bart. Lord Arundell of Wardour, Sir Thomas Fraser Grove bart. Sir R. G. Glyn bart. and Reginald Benett Graves-Knyfton esq. also own land. This parish is very fertile, and is celebrated for its corn and down land; the higher parts are of a diversified character, rising into bold and lofty eminences, partly covered with woods, and here and there crossed by deep ravines, or combes, in one of which, called Chilver Combe Bottom, in the hamlet of Ashgrove, is a burial ground for the Society of Friends: according to the register, which is preserved in the parish church of Donhead St. Mary, the first interment took place in 1678, and the last in 1746: although not used for many years, yet the right to the land is kept up by periodical visitations. The soil is sandy; subsoil, stony. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and pasture. The area is 5,218 acres; rateable value, £6,207; the population in 1891 was 1,207 in the civil and 1,237 in the ecclesiastical parish.

By Local Government Board Order detached parts of Donhead St. Mary parish were in 1884 transferred to Donhead St. Andrew.

Ludwell hamlet is 2 miles south, on the road from Shaftesbury to Salisbury.

In Charlton tithing and manor, 2½ miles south, is a chapel of ease, erected in 1839, for the use of parishioners resident in this district, and also of Ludwell and Bird Bush: it is a square stone building, consisting of nave with two towers at the west end, with one bell; also a porch at the south entrance: the Rev. John Harris Arundell M.A. of New College, Oxford, has been curate in charge since 1893.

Higher, Middle and Lower Coombe are hamlets, 2 miles, 1½ and 1 mile south.

DOWNTON is a parish, formerly a market town, giving name to the hundred, situated in a vale, watered by the Upper Avon in three channels, with a station on the Salisbury and Dorchester section of the London and South Western railway, 7 miles south-east-by-south from Salisbury, and 90 from London, in the Southern division of the county, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Alderbury union, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Wilton, archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The place is of considerable antiquity, and formerly returned two members to Parliament, but was disfranchised by the Reform Act in 1832. The church of St. Lawrence was restored in 1860: it is a large cruciform tint and stone structure of mixed architecture, dating from the 12th century: it consists of fine chancel of the 14th century, nave, aisles, south porch, and north and south transepts: rising from the intersection is a square, massive embattled tower, with four pinnacles, and containing a clock and 6 bells: the tower, which had been raised, has been reduced to its original height: the church contains monuments to the Duncombe family; the principal are those of Anthony, Lord Feversham, of Downton, who died in 1763, and of Sir Charles Duncombe, who died in 1711: a lych-gate was erected in 1894, with money left for the purpose by the late Rev. Canon Payne, former vicar of the parish: there are 700 sittings. The register dates from the year 1599. The living is a vicarage, with the chapelry of Nunton annexed, average tithe rent-charge £592, gross yearly value £614, net £200, including 4 acres of glebe, in the gift of Winchester College, and held since 1882 by the Rev. Arthur Du Boulay Hill M.A. of Magdalen College, Oxford. A church is in course of erection at Morgan's Vale, and is endowed with £4,000, by the late Rev. W. Ferryman, in addition to £2,000 for the expense of building. South Lane Baptist chapel is a substantial building in a plain Italian style, erected in 1857: the interior is chaste and elegant, and will accommodate about 350 persons. There are also chapels for Methodists and Wesleyans. A Burial Board, consisting of 6 members, was formed in March, 1885, and the churchyard extended. Here are paper and corn mills, and a tan yard. Malting is also carried on to a considerable extent, and there is brick-making and lime-burning. Here is a reading room well supplied with daily papers and literature. The market has long been discontinued, but two annual fairs are still held, on the 23rd April and 2nd October, principally for horses, sheep and cattle. The charities are: Stockman's charity, of £70 yearly, derived from a farm in White parish, left in 1626, by William Stockman, of Downton, for distribution to those who are surcharged with children; Woodland's charity of £45 yearly, left in 1882, by John Woodlands esq. of Downton, for distribution among the aged poor of both sexes; Noyes's charity, derived from the interest of £200, left in 1784 by Mrs. Emma Noyes, to be given to the schools of Charlton and Downton; Clarke's charity, derived from the interest of £900, left in 1878 by Archdeacon Liscombe Clarke, a former vicar of Downton, to be divided between the National schools of Downton and Redlynch. Barford Park is in this parish, 300 acres in extent: a large house, bearing the same name, formerly stood in the park, and was the residence of the Duncombe family. An earthwork of considerable dimensions has existed in Downton from an early period, which from its position, commanded the river Avon and the valley through which it flows: the name—the Moot—points to its having been used by the Saxons for their Folk Mote, or Parliament: a double crescent-shaped earth-

work remains, much in its original state, and at one horn of the inner crescent the grass terraces of the ancient meeting place are still perfect. The Moot now forms the garden of E. P. Squarey esq. On a high hill, overlooking Downton from the other side of the valley, is an entrenched area, called Clerbury Camp. Cerdic, the Saxon, gained the battle of Cerdic's Ford, or Charford, in the meadows below Downton, in A.D. 519. The Earl of Radnor is lord of the manor. The principal land-owners are the Earl of Radnor, Earl Nelson, William Eyre Matcham esq. Mrs. Morrison, and the governing body of Winchester College; the latter hold the great tithes. The soil is alluvial, chalk and gravel; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and turnips. The area is 12,405 acres of land, and 90 of water; rateable value, £14,050; the population in 1891 was 3,430 in the civil and 2,151 in the ecclesiastical parish.

DRAYCOT CERNE is a parish and small village 3 miles north from Chippenham station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 7 south from Malmesbury, in the North Western division of the county, hundred of Malmesbury, Chippenham petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. James is an ancient edifice of stone, chiefly in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, north porch, and a Perpendicular western tower, containing one large bell and a clock with chimes, presented by the Cowley family: the chancel is conjectured to have been the original church, and retains the tomb of the supposed founder: there is a fine brass to Sir Edward Cerne and memorials to the Long family: the font is decorated, and there are some good stained windows: there are about 110 sittings. Draycot House, a large mansion of stone, standing in a park of 217 acres, stocked with deer, is the seat of Earl Cowley J.P. who is lord of the manor and principal landowner: Henry Richard, the first Earl Cowley K.G. succeeded to this property in 1863 by gift of the fifth and last Earl of Mornington, who died at Paris, 25th July in that year. The soil is a rich loam; subsoil, partly gravel. The chief crops are barley, with pasture lands. The area is 911 acres; rateable value, £1,374; the population in 1891 was 147.

ancient and modern, is one of the 17th century to Sir Edward Lewys: in the south transept is an ancient tomb containing the effigy of a monk in full canonicals, which cannot be identified, and a fine group by Sir F. Chantrey, representing the death-bed of Sir Simon R. B. Taylor bart. d. 1815: the eastern and western windows are magnificent; and to the east of north transept is a fine stained window of the 14th century: this transept was evidently used in the old monastery as a Lady Chapel, dedicated to St. Mary the Virgin, as in a niche in the wall there was formerly a figure of the Virgin, and the lily is still to be seen painted on the wall: there is a handsome piscina in the same wall, and the rood screen is still surmounted by the rood loft: the windows of the north aisle retain a great deal of the original stained glass, indicating where the cloisters formerly were, by the height of the windows: in 1889 a diocesan committee was formed with the Bishop at its head, who thoroughly restored and beautified the church, the sum

of £7,000 being spent on the nave alone; the chancel was also restored by the patron, at a cost of about £1,000: a noticeable feature in the restoration is the return to the original design of the architect, William of Edyngdon, Bishop of Winchester; the chancel being the monastic church, the nave the people's church: the chancel is now used for daily prayer, the nave for services on Sunday and holy days: the nave as now arranged, contains seating for 300 persons: the church will hold about 1,000. The register dates from the year 1695. The living is a vicarage, rent-charge £30. net yearly value £165, with residence, in the gift of Simon Watson-Taylor esq. and held since 1890 by the Rev. George Edward Long. William of Edyngdon, a native of this place, reached the dignities of Bishop of Winchester, Lord Treasurer and Chancellor of England in the reign of Edward III. and founded here, in 1358, at the instance of the Black Prince, a monastery of Bonhommes of the Augustine order, of which nothing remains but the present parish church; the manor anciently belonged to the Abbey of Romsey, and on the dissolution of monasteries the land was granted to Thomas Lord Seymour of Sudeley, and subsequently to William Paulet, 1st Marquess of Winchester. Simon Watson-Taylor esq. of Erlestoke Park, is lord of the

manor, lay impropiator and principal landowner. The soil is green sand; subsoil, chalk with some clay. The chief crops are wheat and some land in pasture, and there are numerous apple orchards. The area is 5,705 acres; rateable value, £5,183; the population in 1891 was 846, including its adjuncts.

FONTHILL BISHOP (or Bishop's Fonthill) is a village and parish, 3 miles north from the Tisbury station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, 14 west from Salisbury, and 10 north-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Downton hundred, Tisbury petty sessional division and union, Shaftesbury county court district, Chalk rural deanery (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. FONTHILL GIFFORD is a parish, 2 miles from Tisbury station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, 16 west from Salisbury, and 9½ north-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Dunworth hundred, Tisbury petty sessional division and union, Shaftesbury county court district, Chalke rural deanery (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. The adjunct Gifford seems to have come from a family that held this with 14 other manors in Wilts soon after the Conquest. The date of foundation stone of the old church, built into the wall of the vestry of the new, is May 18th, 1748. The register dates from the year 1518. D.L., J.P. Fonthill House, the seat of Alfred Morrison esq. D.L., J.P., F.R.G.S. is seated in park-like grounds containing a large lake. FROXFIELD is a straggling parish, on the Bath road and the Berkshire border, 2¾ miles west-by-south from Hungerford station, on the Great Western railway, and 7 east from Marlborough, in the eastern division of the county, hundred of Kinwardstone, petty sessional division of Marlborough and Ramsbury, Hungerford union and county court district, rural deanery of Marlborough (Marlborough portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury; the Kennet and Avon canal passes through here. The church of All Saints, standing on an eminence west of the village, is a brick building, in the Early English style, consisting of a chancel with low tile roof and wooden belfry and 2 bells: there are 150 sittings. The register dates from the year 1561. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £246, net £230, with 51 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Canons of Windsor, and held since 1880 by the Rev. Froxfield is most notable for the almshouses, or Somerset Hospital, founded in 1686 by Sarah, Duchess Dowager of Somerset, who bequeathed landed & other property for its erection & for the maintenance of 30 widows; 20 apartments were added to the building in 1773, & the revenues, having since increased, enable the trustees to afford asylum, with an allowance of

£36 each yearly, to 50 widows: owing to the depreciation of the value of agricultural produce only 21 widows, with an allowance of £26 each annually, are now (1894) afforded asylums: the building is an oblong quadrangle, with small chapel within it, erected by Thomas, formerly Earl of Ailesbury, the minister of which has an annual stipend of £50: 30 widows of laymen & 20 widows of clergymen, from different parts of England, within 150 miles of London, are eligible to this charity: the trustees, 12 in number, who are chosen from the nobility & gentry of the county, nominate the steward & chaplain of the establishment.

FUGGLESTONE ST. PETER (commonly called Foulstone) is a village, adjoining Wilton, at the junction of the rivers Wiley and Naddar, 3 miles west from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Branch and Dole, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, Wilton rural deanery, archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Peter is a small stone building, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch, and a small western turret containing 3 bells: it was repaired about 1848, and has 70 sittings. The register dates from the year 1568. The area is 1,778 acres of land and 40 of water; rateable value, £8,482; the population in 1891 was 1,060.

H. the Prince and Princess of Wales, and a good selection of pictures, amongst others a very fine one by Rubens, subject, “The Garden of the Hesperides,” and a landscape by Cuyp, subject, “Evening:” H. R. H. the Prince of Wales stayed here eight days during the autumn manœuvres in September, 1872.

G. H. Bourne D.C.L. sub-dean of the cathedral: the chapel now contains the fine old Jacobean oak altar-table which formerly stood in the chancel: a screen of Jacobean oak divides the chapel from the nave: the south porch is modern, said to be

HEYTESBURY and TYTHERINGTON.

HEYTESBURY is a parish, formerly a market town, consisting principally of one street, on the banks of the river Wylye and borders of Salisbury plain, with a station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, 118 miles from London, 18 north-west from Salisbury and 4 south-east from Warminster, in the Western division of the county, hundred of its own name, Warminster union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Wylye (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury: it was a prescriptive borough, governed by a bailiff and burgesses, and sent two members to Parliament till disfranchised by the Reform Act. The market is discontinued, but an annual fair is still held on the 14th of May. The church of SS. Peter and Paul was collegiate, and had, until recently, four prebends: it is a spacious cruciform edifice, chiefly Early English, and consists of clerestoried chancel with aisles, north and south transepts, clerestoried nave of four bays and aisles, south entrance porch and low square central tower: the columns of the nave, which had fallen much out of the perpendicular, have been rebuilt, and also a part of the tower, which contains a fine peal of 6 bells and a clock: some Early English arches and columns, long hidden behind the plaster of the walls in the chancel, have been opened and repaired, and the aisles which formerly existed rebuilt, and the high pitch of the original roof restored: the cost of these works considerably exceeded £6,000: the north transept has a stone screen between it and the nave: there are several stained windows; one at the eastern end, the gift of Lady Heytesbury, and a memorial window in the north transept is the gift of the Hon. Mrs. Robert Daly, the daughter of the first Lord Heytesbury: there are also memorial windows to the late Lord Heytesbury, his eldest son, the Hon. William L. A. Court, and the late vicar, the Rev. John Knight M.A.: the whole church has been reseated with open benches seating 450. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a vicarage, with that of Knook annexed, joint yearly value from the tithe rent-charge £206, gross income £400, net £290, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1883 by the Rev. William John Swayne M.A. of Corpus Christi college, Oxford. The Vicarage House was built in 1894, on a portion of land conveyed by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners to the vicar, in lieu of and in substitution for £3 per annum of the yearly stipend of £200, payable by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. Here is a Congregational chapel.

Here is a very ancient hospital or almshouse, founded by Lady Hungerford, for twelve poor men, one woman, and a custos, who is appointed by the dean and chapter and chancellor of Salisbury, must be in holy orders and act as chaplain. The Rev. W. J. Swayne M.A. vicar, has held the office since 1883. On Cotley Hill, north-west of the town, is a tumulus, surrounded by an entrenchment, 480 feet in diameter. About a quarter of a mile north-west from Knook Castle is Bowls Barrow, and on the north bank of the Wylye, Golden Barrow. Close to Bowls Barrow, waterworks were established in 1894, consisting of a deep well and a reservoir, with wind engine and pumps to supply the parish of Heytesbury with water. There is a similar installation for the water supply at Tytherington. Near the town is Heytesbury House, the seat of Lord Heytesbury J.P.; the house is a square stone building, partly rebuilt about 1784, standing in a well-wooded park of 95 acres containing some good specimens of lime, cedar and beech. Lord Heytesbury is lord of the manor and sole owner of the parish. The soil is light; subsoil, chalk and stone. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 4,762 acres; rateable value, £4,340; the population in 1891 was 826.

Tytherington, about 1 mile south from Heytesbury, is a hamlet, and formerly a prebend in the collegiate church of Heytesbury. The church of St. James is a plain old stone building in the Early Decorated style, about 19 feet wide and 50 feet long, with stone covered roof and western bell cot containing one bell: the interior is fitted with open benches, and will seat about 70 people. It was restored in 1892. The population and area are included with Heytesbury.

HEYWOOD is a small village and ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1849 out of the civil parish of Westbury, 1 mile north-east from Westbury station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, and 4 miles south from Trowbridge, in the Western division of the county, Westbury and Whorwellsdown union, hundred and county court district of Westbury, petty sessional division of Trowbridge, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of the Holy Trinity is of stone, in the Decorated style, and consists of chancel, nave, south porch and aisles, divided from the nave by three arches resting on cylindrical piers, with a small western open bell cot, containing 3 bells: the pulpit is of Caen stone, and at the north-west end of the nave is an organ: the church was built and endowed with £32 a year by the late Henry Gaisford Gibbs Ludlow esq. and will seat 250. The register dates from the year 1849. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £290, net £280, with 3½ acres of glebe, and residence, in the gift of three trustees, and held since 1889 by the Rev. Samuel Henry Pemberton Whittuck. The vicarage house was erected

in 1890, at a cost of £1,400, defrayed by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. Heywood House is the seat of The Right Hon. Lord Justice Sir Henry Charles Lopes P.C., D.L., J.P. Sir Massey Lopes bart. is lord of the manor of Westbury, which includes Heywood, Edward E. Porter esq. of East Hill, Frome, and William Henry Laverton esq. of Leighton House, and Lord Justice Lopes are the principal landowners. The soil and subsoil are heavy clay. The land is principally pasture and corn. The population in 1891 was 465; rateable is included with Westbury.

Hawkeridge is a hamlet 1½ miles north-west. Here is a small Congregational chapel.

HIGHWAY is a parish, 4½ miles north-east from Calne and 5 south from Wootton Bassett, belonging to the hundred of Potterne and Cannings, though locally in the hundred of Calne, North-Western division of the county, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Calne, rural deanery of Avebury (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. HIGHWORTH is a small union town and parish, and terminus of the Swindon and Highworth branch of the Great Western railway, and is on the road from Swindon to Lechlade, 75 miles from London, 6 from Farringdon, 9 north-east from Swindon and 7½ east from Cricklade, in the Northern division of the county, union of Highworth, hundred of Highworth, Swindon county court district and petty sessional division, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The town, in consequence of its elevated situation, near the Vale of White Horse, commands a fine view of the surrounding country, of which the scenery is picturesque, and the neighbourhood is considered very healthy: it is lighted with gas by a Company. The church of St. Michael is a Perpendicular structure of stone, consisting of chancel, nave of five bays, south porch, aisles and transepts, and embattled

memory of the late Bishop of Gibraltar, formerly archdeacon of Wilts and rector of the parish: there are 100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1664. Formerly the markets and fairs were well attended, and business to a considerable extent carried on here, but the Great Western railway has materially interfered with its prosperity. The fairs are held August 13th for cattle, and October 11th for cattle and hiring of servants, and a market every fourth Wednesday. There are numerous charities in this parish, amounting to £300 yearly, under the control of a body of trustees, appointed by the Charity Commissioners. James William Crowdy esq. of Herne Bay, Kent, is lord of the manor, and the chief landowners are the Hon. Duncombe Pleydell-Bouverie, Coleshill House, A. D. Hussey-Freke esq. Edgar Hanbury esq. Eastrop Grange, and the trustees of the late Robert Hanbury esq. of Poles, Ware. The soil is loam, stone brash and clay; subsoil, limestone. The chief crops are wheat, barley and beans. The area is 8,399 acres of land and 30 of water; rateable value, £20,097. The population in 1891 was 2,576 in the civil, and 2,169 in the ecclesiastical parish.

Eastrop, half a mile south; Westrop, one mile west; and Sevenhampton, 1½ miles south, are tithings in this parish.

Broad Blunsdon, formerly a hamlet of this parish, has been formed into a separate ecclesiastical parish, and under the Divided Parishes Act is now, for civil purposes, in Little Blunsdon. See Blunsdon St. Andrew.

South Marston, a hamlet, is now separated ecclesiastically from Highworth. See Marston South.

The church of St. Lawrence consists of chancel, nave of four bays, north aisle, south porch and organ chamber, and a square embattled western tower, surmounted by four pinnacles and containing 6 bells, one of which is new, the rest of old date; these were in 1885 rehung and retuned and put in complete repair by subscription, and a chiming apparatus added: in 1840 the tower was partly rebuilt: the windows of the nave are all of the Perpendicular period, probably about Henry VI.'s time: the nave is separated from the aisle by columns of the Early English order, and the chancel is entered from the aisle through an opening of unusual character in the buttress of the chancel arch; and a stone screen separates the chancel from the nave: the chancel windows are all Perpendicular, two being stained, the east window, a memorial to W. H. Poynder, the north window to Mrs. Elizabeth Goddard, wife of the Rev. Canon Goddard: in the aisle, towards the east end, is a founder's tomb, and near it a memorial window of three lights to the Rev. Francis Fisher, a former vicar, and to the left of this a two-light window to Isabella Poynder: the chief monuments in the church are those of Calley, Quinton, and of Thomas Poynder esq. who partly restored the church (1840), his son, Thomas H. A. Poynder esq. and Mrs. M. A. Poynder: the seating is chiefly of old oak, of handsome carved pattern: the old chained bible, with wooden binding, was well restored by the Rev. F. Fisher, who found it in the parish chest in a neglected state, the original chain still attached, and it has been replaced at the chancel arch: the late Mr. Street, the eminent architect, at the cost of the late William H. Poynder, restored almost the whole church, and added an organ chamber to the south of the chancel: the church was re-opened on the 24th February, 1881, and has 250 sittings. The register dates from the year 1645. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £376, net £235, including 5 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Crown, and held since 1892 by the Rev. Ralph Walker M.A. of All Souls College, Oxford. The Congregationalists and Primitive Methodists have each a

chapel at Goatacre tithing, 1½ miles north, in this parish, and the Baptists have a chapel here. Jacob's charity of £10 yearly is for the second poor, and the interest of £300 stock is for religious education. Here is a reading room, with a library of 60 volumes, built in 1892 by the lord of the manor, and managed by a committee of working men. There is also a reading room at Goatacre. Here are five almshouses, erected by the late William Poynder esq. lord of the manor of Hilmarton, in the year 1877, and endowed with £3,000 £2¼ per cent. Consols to provide 6s. per week for five inmates, eligible at the age of 65 years, who have worked on the estate. The principal landowners are Sir John Poynder Dickson-Poynder bart. M.P. who is lord of the manor and lay impropiator, Worcester and Magdalen Colleges, Oxford, Thomas Pinnegar esq. Mr. W. A. A. Large, Miss Henly and Mrs. Charles Bridges, daughters of the late Mrs. Henly, and the executors of the late Messrs. R. and S. Stiles. The soil is Oxford clay, oolitic, except Cleveancy district, which is on the chalk and greensand; subsoil of Goatacre is coral rag, of Hilmarton other forms of oolite; large drainage operations have been carried on by the late Mr. Poynder and the trustees of his estates. The area is 4,582 acres; rateable value, £5,553; the population of the civil parish in 1891 was 810.

Beversbrook, 1 mile south, and Catcombe, 1 mile north, are tithings, Cleveancy, 2 ½ miles east, and Goatacre, 1½ miles north, are hamlets; a district called New Zealand forms part of Goatacre.

Highway was, by an order of the Wiltshire County Council, confirmed by Local Government Board order, which came into operation March 25, 1890, joined to Hilmarton for civil purposes, and will be found under a separate heading.

HILPERTON is a parish and pleasant village, on the road from Trowbridge to Melksham, 1½ miles north-east from Trowbridge station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, 4 south-west from Melksham,

and 3 south-east from Bradford, in the Western division of the county, hundred and union of Melksham, petty sessional division and county court district of Trowbridge, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The Kennet and Avon canal pass through the parish and have a wharf at Hilperton Marsh. The village is lighted with gas by the British Gas Light Co. Limited from works at Trowbridge. The church of St. Michael is a plain stone building in the Decorated style, consisting of chancel and nave (which were rebuilt in 1854), south porch, with square western tower, surmounted by a low spire and containing 4 bells and clock: a new vestry and choir stalls were added in 1892: there are two stained windows: there are 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1694. The living is a rectory, with that of Whaddon annexed, average tithe rent-charge £271, gross joint yearly value £401, net £321, with glebe (£126) and residence, in the gift of Walter Hume Long esq. M.P. and held since 1888 by the Rev. Samuel Theodore Wood M.A., B.C.L. of Christ Church, Oxford. St. Mary's-in-the-Marsh chapel of ease is a plain iron building, with sittings for 100 persons, erected October, 1889. There is a Baptist chapel, built in 1806, to hold 150, and a Wesleyan chapel, built in 1890, to hold 300. Highfield, a large mansion in the Renaissance style, and pleasantly placed, is the seat of Sir William Roger Brown

J.P.; Wyke House, an ancient mansion in the Elizabethan style, and standing in a park of 24 acres, is the seat of William Perkins Clark esq. J.P. The land belongs principally to Walter Hume Long esq. M.P. of Rood Ashton House, who is lord of the manor, and Sir W. R. Brown, of Highfield. The soil is clay; subsoil, gravel, shallow rock and clay. The land is chiefly in pasture. The area is 1,202 acres; rateable value, £3,719; the population in 1891 was 1,011.

Hilperton Marsh is a hamlet half a mile north-west (letters should be addressed Hilperton Marsh, Trowbridge).

HINDON is a parish, mostly comprised in one straight street, nearly a quarter of a mile in length, on a gradual acclivity, on the high road from Salisbury to Taunton, 3½ miles north-west from Tisbury station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway, 7 miles east from Mere, 16 west from Salisbury and 8 north-by-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Downton, Tisbury and Mere petty sessional division, Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalk (Tisbury portion), and archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. This was an ancient Parliamentary borough by prescription, and possessed a local government, having a bailiff and burgesses, and returned two members to Parliament, but was disfranchised at the passing of the Reform Act in 1832. On Holy Thursday, July 2nd, 1755, two-thirds of the town were destroyed by fire. The houses are built chiefly of stone, raised from the quarry at Tisbury, in this locality. The church of St. John the Baptist, built in 1871, at the cost of Richard, the late Marquess of Westminster, on the site of the old church, which was built in the reign of Queen Mary (probably about 1555), and endowed with £75 yearly, is of early French architecture, built of Chilmark stone with Bath stone dressings, and consists of chancel, nave, aisles, with vestry on the south side, with square western tower and spire containing 6 bells (the bells having been removed from the old church) and clock: there are two entrances, one at the western end, and a south entrance porch: the chancel is paved with encaustic tiles, and contains a fine circular window of good design, with three others of stained glass, to the memory of the late Marquess: the nave is divided from the aisles by arches resting on cylindrical piers: the pulpit is of carved oak and the font of Bath stone, and a lectern has been added in memory of J. G. and T. Hacker: the church is seated with open benches and will hold 400 people: the organ cost over £200. The register dates from the year 1595. The living is a rectory, average £52, gross yearly value £183, net £179, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1886

by the Rev. Henry Walter Taylor M.A. of Magdalen Hall, Oxford. Here is a chapel for Primitive Methodists. James Ames esq. late of Hindon, surgeon, who died June 9th, 1828, left by will £10 annually to the poor of this parish for ever, to be distributed by the overseers in bread and clothing on Christmas Eve. The market formerly held on Thursday has become obsolete, but fairs are still held on the 27th of May and 29th of October. The town is chiefly the property of Sir Michael Robert Shaw-Stewart bart. and Alfred Morrison esq. The soil is light chalky loam; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats &c. and pasturage. The area is 212 acres; rateable value, £793; the population in 1891 was 495.

HINTON PARVA (or Little Hinton) is a village, township and parish, 4 miles south-west from Shrivenham station on the Reading and Swindon section of the Great Western railway, 5 north-east from Chiseldon station on the Midland and South Western Junction railway and 6 east from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, Elstub and Everley hundred, Highworth and Swindon union, Swindon county court district and petty sessional division, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. Anne is a plain but interesting structure of stone, having chancel, nave of two bays, with clerestory, aisles, porch and a low western tower containing 4 bells: the nave is Transition Norman, the chancel Decorated: the aisles, clerestory and porch are Late Perpendicular: the font bears a curious allegorical carving, which has never been fully explained: the oldest monument is dated 1630: the whole building was restored in 1860 at a cost of £650, and has 102 sittings. The register dates from the year 1654. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £396, yearly value £340, net £301, with 2 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, held

since 1890 by the Rev. Robert Edward Richards M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. Batt's charity of £9 4s. 8d. yearly, derived from land and Consols, left in 1785, is for coals; John Brown's charity of £5 12s. 8d. yearly, and Coker's charity of £22 11s. yearly, is for the support of schools; John Wilson left £138 in 1884, which is invested in £2½ per cent. Consols, and is for coals. The trustees of the late Henry Tucker are lords of the manor and principal landowners. The soil is limestone and chalk; subsoil, clay. The chief crop is wheat; the lower lands, grass. The area is 2,161 acres; rateable value, £2,126; the population in 1891 was 273.

HOLT, a civil parish, constituted 1895, and an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1846 out of Bradford, with a junction station on the Great Western railway, 2½ miles north-east from Bradford, 3 north from Trowbridge, 3 south-west from Melksham and 94 from London by rail, in the Western division of the county, civil parish, hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district of Bradford, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Catherine is an ancient stone structure, and consists of chancel, nave, aisles and north porch, with square western embattled saddle-back tower and 5 bells: there is a curious old Norman font, dating from the 12th century: the east window and one in the south aisle are stained, the former being in memory of Miss E. Mackay: the porch was erected by Miss Chapman, as a memorial of Robert Chapman esq.: the church was restored in 1891, at a cost of £2,300, under the direction of Mr. C. E. Ponting, of Marlborough: a new chancel has been built, new roofs have been put upon the nave and aisles, the nave raised 11 feet, new arcades built, and the whole floor paved with tiles: the oak pulpit was erected in celebration of the vicar completing 25 years' residence: there are 276 sittings. The register dates from the year 1575. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £114, gross yearly value £322, net £275, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol, and held since 1865 by the Rev Herbert Henry Moseley B.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. Here is a Congregational chapel, built in 1880, at a cost of £2,200, to hold 500, the old chapel being converted into a school. A cemetery of half an acre was formed in 1893, at a cost of £200; it is under the control of a burial board of 7 members, and was

consecrated July 13th, 1894, by the Bishop of Salisbury. Woolstapling and leather manufacturing is carried on by Messrs. J. and T. Beaven, and there are also works for bedding and wire mattress manufacturing, and a steam laundry. A substantial stone building was erected in 1873 for a reading room, and a billiard room added in 1893. A coffee tavern has been opened at the expense of Miss S. Chapman, of this village. Holt Manor House stands in a park of 45 acres, and is the seat of Major Thomas Henry Burton Forster, who is lord of the manor, and, with George L. Palmer esq. and Mrs. Alexander, are the principal landowners. The soil is rich loam; subsoil, gravel and clay. The chief crops are wheat and pasture. The area is 1,320 acres; the population in 1891 was 907.

HORNINGSHAM is a parish on the borders of Somersetshire, 4½ miles south-west from Warminster station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, 5½ south-east-by-south from Frome, in the Southern division of the county, Heytesbury hundred, Warminster union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), Sarum archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. The area is 3,367 acres; rateable value, £4,000; the population in 1891 was 862.

Edward Charles Awdry B.A. of St. Catherine's College, Cambridge. Here is a Congregational chapel. Newman's charity of £6 a year, and Taylor's of £1, are distributed on St. Thomas' Day (Dec. 21), and Woodroffe's, £1 10s. on Michaelmas Day: Bowerman's, of £5, is payable from Christ's Hospital to the school: six almshouses, of two rooms each, were built and endowed by Alderman Lyte in 1675, for poor men; Thomas White's gift of £200 is also applied to the further maintenance of this charity. In 1664 William Woodroffe, yeoman, of Chippenham, left 30s. a year "in remembrance," as he recites in his will, "of God's mercy in preserving me in a wonderful manner from drowning at Peckingell Bridge;" for this sum a sermon is to be preached yearly, in which the minister shall excite the people to be mindful of mercies received and thankful for the same. John Britton, the eminent antiquary and topographer, was born here 7th July, 1771. The chief farms are Heywood, Lodge, Easton Piers, Swinley and the Priory; on the last-named estate

Canon Young. The parish contains two manors, that of Lacock, held by Charles Henry Talbot esq.; and Lackham, held by George L. Palmer esq. of Trowbridge, who, with John

Evelyn Gladstone esq. and Herbert James Harris esq. are the principal landowners. The arable and pasture land are about equal; the parish being situated in the rich valley of the Avon. The area is 3,589 acres; rateable value, £9,135; the population in 1891 was 1,179 in the civil and 909 in the ecclesiastical parish.

Notton is a hamlet in this parish.

LANGLEY BURRELL is a parish and scattered village, on the river Avon and on the road from Chippenham to Swindon, 1½ miles north from Chippenham station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 7 south from Malmesbury and 11½ north from Devizes, in the North Western division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Chippenham, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. By an Order of the Local Government Board, dated Sept. 29th, 1894, Langley Burrell has been divided into two parishes, one being called Langley Burrell Within, and included in the municipal borough of Chippenham; the other, known as Langley Burrell Without, which is entitled to a parish council. The Burrells (anciently Borel) were, at the time of the Survey, tenants under Edward, Earl of Salisbury, and they held the manor till about the year 1300: in a document of the date 1240, John Borel, or Burel, one of the family, conveyed to the Abbot of Glastonbury "one croft in the village of Langlegh Burel which is called Penicroft." This name is still in existence in the parish, in connection with ground near Peckingell Mead: probably at a later date two farms, consisting of 115 acres, called Peckengel, were detached from Langley Burrell, and granted by one of the Borels to the Abbot of Glastonbury, who attached them to his manor at Langley, the name of a district which in William the Conqueror's reign included Langley Fitzurse and Kington St. Michael. Peckengel farms, with the Barrow farm (formerly in Slaughterford), and other portions of Chippenham, Hardenhuish and Langley Fitzurse, by the United Parishes Act of 1884, have now been absorbed into Langley Burrell. In A.D. 1304, the manor belonged to Sir John Delamere, who, with Alice his wife, obtained a license for an oratory in the "manor of Langley and Lye;" his last presentation to this church was in 1342. In 1343 Thomas, Lord Berkeley, purchased the manor and advowson of Sir J. Delamere, and gave them in the same year, with £2,000 in money, to his daughter Joan, on her marriage with Sir Reginald

Groveley Wood, formerly extra-parochial, is now a parish, 1½ miles north-west, where a small school-chapel has been erected (1867) by the Earl of Pembroke, who is the chief landowner. In the neighbourhood are some ancient entrenchments. The area is 958 acres; rateable value, £672; the population in 1891 was 60.

School, for 50 children; average attendance, 12; & supported by the Earl of Pembroke J.P.; Miss Lampard, mistress

for bread and clothing. Lord Ashburton is lord of the manor. The Duke of Somerset, Eton College and William Wyndham esq. of Dinton House, Salisbury, and Miss Moody, are the principal landowners. The soil is light loam; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 3,896 acres; rateable value, £2,949; the population in 1891 was 468.

Great and Little Bathampton (or Bedhampton) form a tithing, one mile west.

Hanging Langford tithing is half a mile south, where is a Primitive Methodist chapel. On the downs is the large and perfect British camp called Yarnborough Castle, within which a sheep fair is held annually on October 4th. William Wyndham esq. is lord of the manor of Hanging Langford.

Cobham. The Cobham arms (a chevron with three stars) appear on the ceiling of the nave, and to this family is traditionally ascribed the building, or, more correctly, the repairing of the church. In 1460 Ralph Neville, Earl of Westmorland, in right of his wife, Margaret Cobham, held the property. In 1469 Langley Burrell had passed to Edward de Burgh, second Baron de Burgh of Gainsborough, on his marriage with Anne, daughter of Sir Thomas Cobham. The manor was sold in 1565 by the de Burghs to John Read, and in the twentieth of Elizabeth, 1578, was discharged from feudal homage to the Earls of Salisbury. In 1601, Henry White, then owner of Grittleton, bought the manor, and about 1660 his grandson sold it to Samuel Ashe esq. in whose family it has remained ever since. The church of St. Peter is an edifice of stone, consisting of chancel, with south chantry, nave of three bays, north aisle, south porch, with parvise, reached by a winding stair, and a western embattled tower containing 4 bells: the nave and portions of the chancel are Early English, the tower Decorated, and the north aisle and south chantry Perpendicular: against the west wall of the tower formerly stood a slab bearing male and female heads, and now placed under a mural canopy: there are 246 sittings. The register dates from the year 1607. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge £235, average £176, gross yearly value £390, net £343, including 111 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the representatives of the late Rev. Robert M. Ashe, and held since 1879 by the Rev. John Jeremiah Daniell J.P. Wilts. Maud Heath, described in old deeds as of Langley Burrell, in 1474 gave houses and land in and near Chippenham, for the making and maintenance of a "causey," or stoned path, from Bremhill to Chippenham; this is 4½ miles long, and it is endowed with property in Chippenham to the annual value of between £100 and £200: the iron bridge over the Avon at Kellaways was constructed about 1870 with money raised on this trust; and the long pathway there raised on numerous arches is maintained from the same fund. In the year 1652 a book was written by Edward Stokes esq. of Tytherton Lucas, en-

titled, "The Wiltshire Rant, being a narrative of the most unparalleled prophane actings, counterfeit repeatings and evil speakings of Thomas Webbe, late pretended minister of Langley Burrial:" this pamphlet, of which some copies are still in existence, contains an astounding revelation of profanity and licentiousness: for his scandalous life Webb was ejected in 1651 and committed to prison: escaping conviction he brought false charges against the magistrate who committed him, which led to the publication of Mr. Stokes' book: in the novel of "Woodstock," Scott has portrayed just such a character as Webb, in Tomkins, the preaching soldier and Fifth Monarchy man. Miss Ashe is lady of the manor and the principal landowner. In a field on Peckingell farm was discovered some time since a peculiar oolitic limestone, with characteristic fossils. The appearance of a bituminous shale in the Oxford clay above this

rock led to several unsuccessful attempts to find coal in this formation. The soil is clayey and sandy loam, and the land is chiefly in pasture. The area is 1,833 acres; rateable value, £13,902; the population in 1891 was 1,445, of whom 994 are contained in the parish within Chippenham.

LANGLEY FITZURSE (in Doomsday Book Langeleghe; anciently, Langley Fearne; recently, Kington Langley) is a tithing, hamlet, and ecclesiastical parish, formed in part out of the parish of Kington St. Michael, on the road from Chippenham to Malmesbury, 2½ miles north-by-east from Chippenham station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 6 south from Malmesbury, in the North-Western division of the county, hundred of Damerham north, Chippenham union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. Peter, built in 1855, is an edifice of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, vestry, south porch and a small western turret, containing one bell: the east window is stained: there are 230 sittings. The register dates from the year 1855. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £128, net £100, in the gift of the vicar of Kington St. Michael, and held since 1871 by the Rev. Charles Clarke, of Hertford College, Oxford: the great tithe, amounting to £103 a year, is held by Earl Cowley. Here are Baptist and Primitive Methodist chapels. The chief farms are Southsea, Whitelands, and Fitzurse: the last was once the property of the family whose name it bears, and in later times of Ralph, Lord Hopton of Stratton, Cornwall, who died in 1652: an old house, with a moat, re-

mains. A chapel, dedicated to St. Peter, once stood in the village, but in 1670 had been converted into a private dwelling; in that year the bell was still preserved at Fitzurse House. The village revel was kept on the Sunday following St. Peter's day, and was, as Aubrey records, "one of the eminentest feasts in these parts." Walter T. Coleman esq. J.P. who is lord of the manor, and whose family have been settled in Langley for many generations, and Earl Cowley, are the largest proprietors. The village is situated on a high tableland of sand, with a subsoil of Oxford clay, and incloses an open common of 30 acres; the land is principally in pasture. The area is 1,498 acres; rateable value, £2,597; the population in 1891 was 556.

The church of St. John the Baptist is a Norman structure of stone with additions in later styles; it consists of modern chancel, nave with very fine oak or teak roof, and transepts, south porch, having Norman doorway with chevron ornament, and embattled western tower, containing 5 bells: in the choir and at the west end under the tower are fine Norman arches: the tower is a very good specimen of Norman architecture: in the nave are several memorial windows to members of the Beadon family, and on the south side of the chancel are two memorial windows to members of the Habgood family: there are 220 sittings. The register dates from the year 1576. The living is a vicarage, with that of Tisey annexed, joint

gross yearly value £230, net £200, with residence, in the gift of the Earl of St. Germans, and held since 1891 by the Rev. William Philpot Anderson B.A. of Jesus College, Cambridge. The charities are £11 yearly, derived from rent of land, which is yearly divided among the poor who are not in receipt of parochial relief. In straightening the watercourse a few years ago a Roman road was discovered, with tessellated pavements, a coffin, and a number of Roman coins. On the Cirencester road is an ancient stone cross. The Earl of St. Germans is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is clay and gravel. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots. The area is 1,786 acres of land and 33 of water; rateable value, £2,084; the population in 1891 was 218.

West Fields is three-quarters of a mile north-west.

LAVERSTOCK is a parish on the banks of the river Bourne, about 1 mile north-east from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred and union of Alderbury, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Salisbury county court district, Amesbury rural deanery (Alderbury portion), and Salisbury archdeaconry and diocese. The church of St. Andrew is an edifice, in the Early Decorated style, of stone and cut flint, with Bath stone dressings, erected near the site of the old church at a cost of £2,353: it has a chancel, nave of three bays and south aisle, south porch and western turret containing 2 bells: the east and south windows are stained: there are 250 sittings: in the churchyard, which has been enlarged, stands a portion of a buttress of the old church, and in the porch is a marble monument belonging to the Bathurst family. The register dates from the year 1726. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Vicars Choral of Salisbury, yearly value £270, subject to a payment of £170 to the retired incumbent, net £60, and held since 1889 by the Rev. Herbert Cromwell Bush M.A. of Hertford College, Oxford, who is Vicar Choral of Salisbury

Cathedral, and resides at Salisbury. Laverstock House is a large private lunatic asylum capable of holding 70 patients, of both sexes, J. Haynes esq. and H. J. Manning esq. being the licencees: it was rebuilt about 1854, and is now a very complete establishment, surrounded by 12 acres of well wooded land. Mrs. King Wyndham is lady of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is light loam; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat and barley. The area is 1,723 acres of land and 10 of water; rateable value, including Ford, £3,305; the population in 1891 was 420, including 57 inmates in the asylum.

Ford is a tithing about 2 miles north, and Petersfinger a hamlet about a mile south.

MARKET LAVINGTON or **EAST LAVINGTON** is a parish and small town pleasantly situated in a fertile valley, at the base of the chalk hill, which forms the northern boundary of Salisbury Plain, and consists principally of one street, 6 miles south from Devizes station, on the Great Western railway, 19 north-west from Salisbury and 90 from London, in the Eastern division of the county, Swanborough hundred, Devizes petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Potterne (Potterne portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. A market was formerly held on Wednesday, but is now discontinued. The church of St. Mary is an ancient structure of Bath stone in the Decorated and Perpendicular styles, standing on an eminence west of the town and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave of two bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with pinnacles, containing a clock and 6 bells, which were recast in 1876 at a cost of £220: the west window and the tower are in the Perpendicular style; the vestry and south porch are Early Decorated, and the remainder of the church of later Decorated character; the east end of the north aisle was formerly a chantry chapel, dedicated to SS. Mary, Katherine and Margaret, and its piscina still remains: in 1349 Robert de la Mere presented this chantry chapel, and his relative Sir Walter Beauchamp kt. in his will dated 1429, desires that his body shall be buried here: his son William Beauchamp, Lord St. Amand ob. 1457, also in his will, makes a like request; the spiral stone stair, entered by a doorway from this chapel, opens into the nave at the north-east corner, from which the ancient rood-loft was approached, but all traces of which have long since vanished; in the vestry is a curious Holy Water stoup of ancient workmanship, now under a piscina niche: during the rebuilding of the chancel in 1862 this stoup with a quantity of Norman carving (now built into a string course in the south porch) were discovered in the east wall of the nave and the chancel arch; this seems to prove the existence of a Norman structure on the same site; the chancel contains a credence and hagioscope; in 1878 a reredos of Caen stone, marble and alabaster was added by Mrs. Pearson, widow of the Rev. T. Pearson, formerly vicar of this parish; the east window is stained, as are also three others in the church: there are several mural tablets, some of which are to the Sainsbury family: the church was restored and a burial ground added in 1862: there are 380 sittings. The register dates from the year 1673. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge £310, average £236, net yearly value £300, with 30 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Oxford, and held since 1875 by the Rev. Edward Blackstone Cokayne Frith B.A. of Christ Church, Oxford. Here are Congregational and Baptist chapels. Dr.

Thomas Tanner, Bishop of St. Asaph, was born here in 1674, his father having been vicar of the parish, and at his death, in 1733, he bequeathed £200 for the benefit of the poor. In 1795 Thomas Sainsbury esq. bequeathed £200 in the £3 per Cent. Consols, to be expended in bread for the poor of the parish at Easter and Christmas eve; and in 1796 William Sainsbury esq. made a similar bequest: a like amount has been bequeathed by Miss Maria Sainsbury, a relative of the above. Sarah Stobbert left by will, in 1864, £360, the interest to be expended in fuel. In 1865 a substantial building called the Workmen's Hall was erected, with funds left by Edward Sanders esq. of Bath: in it there are a coffee room, where refreshments may be purchased, a reading room, which is well supplied with newspapers, also a small library. The trustees of the late the Right Hon. Edward Pleydell-Bouverie P.C. are lords of the manor and principal landowners: Manor House, the occasional residence of Marquise de Lavalette, is a modern Elizabethan red brick building, beautifully situated in extensive grounds. The soil is rich loam, with a subsoil of greensand and some chalk. The land is largely pasture, but in those parts of the parish most distant from the town it is arable. The area is 3,125 acres; rateable value, £5,244; the population in 1891 was 1,035. in the civil and 897 in the ecclesiastical parish.

WEST LAVINGTON (or Bishop's Lavington) is a parish, 6 miles south from Devizes station on the Great Western railway, and 1 mile south-west-by-south from Market Lavington, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Potterne and Cannings, Devizes union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Potterne (Potterne portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of All Saints is a structure of grey stone, chiefly in the Early English style (the pillars of the north aisle being of the Transitional period), and consisting of chancel, clerestried nave, aisles, transepts, south-eastern chapel, north porch, with a square embattled tower, with turret, and containing a peal of 6 bells and a clock, and was repaired and beautified in 1847, at an expense of about £1,600: there is a piscina in the chancel and another in the chapel: the east window is stained, as are eight others in the church: there is a fine alabaster monument, with recumbent effigy, in the south transept to Henry Danvers: there are sittings for about 300 persons. The register dates from the year 1595. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £360, net £275, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1892 by the Rev. Richard Winstanley Allsopp LL.B. of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. Here is a Baptist chapel. There are 10 almshouses endowed by Alderman Dauntsey, who was born here in the 15th century, and three others called "South Bank," and endowed by Lord Churchill, built in 1499; rebuilt in 1831. A large Agricultural College, for 100 boarders and day scholars, was opened in 1895; the building cost about £10,000, derived from the accumulated funds of the "Dauntsey" charity, out of which certain scholarships are provided; well fitted laboratories have been built and there are 15 acres of land for experiments. Lord Churchill, with the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, are joint lords of the manor of West Lavington and principal proprietors. The soil is rich loam; subsoil, greensand. The chief crops are corn and roots. The area is 6,823 acres; rateable value, £5,220; the population in 1891 was 1,088.

It is about 2 miles south of West Lavington, and at a spot about 400 yards from where the roads crossed, known as "St. John a'Gores," formerly stood a chantry chapel, dedicated to St. Jean, to which, in 1347, one Robert de Hegtredbury was instituted priest, and in 1359 it is mentioned in a deed of composition between the vicar of Market Lavington and the Monastery of Edington. No traces of it now exist.

LEIGH DELAMERE is a parish, 5 miles north-west from Chippenham station on the Great Western railway, and 7 south-west from Malmesbury, in the North Western division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Chippenham, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The parish includes the hamlet of Sevington, 1 mile south-west from the church. The church of St. Margaret, entirely rebuilt in 1846, at the sole expense of the late Joseph Neeld esq. of Grittleton House, is an edifice of stone, in the Early English and later styles, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, south porch and a peculiar bell-turret rising from the eastern gable of the nave and containing one bell: there are several stained windows, and the church has sittings for 150 persons. LIMPLEY STOKE is a small picturesque village with a station on the Salisbury, Weymouth and Bath branch of the Great Western railway, in the civil parish of Bradford, and was in 1846 with Winsley formed into an ecclesiastical parish: the village is 3½ miles west from Bradford, 4½ south-east from Bath and 103 from London, bounded on all sides but one by Somersetshire, and remarkable for its romantic and beautiful scenery; it is in the Western division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Bradford-on-Avon, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The houses are dotted about on the side of a steep hill overlooking the valley of the river Avon, which skirts the village on one side and separates it from Winsley, and over which is a bridge of three arches; higher up the river is a viaduct, partly in this county and partly in that of Somersetshire, carrying the Kennet and Avon canal over the river and the railway. On the crown of the hill is the small church of St. Mary the Virgin, which is of stone and of Norman foundation, consisting of chancel, nave, north porch and square tower at the west end, surmounted by a conical spire, containing one bell, the date on which is 1596: over the chancel arch is a campanile, which up till 1787 contained 2 bells, which were then sold: the old Norman south door is built up: there is an ancient Perpendicular stone pulpit, partially formed by an arched recess in the wall, so that only two sides project, but it has not been used for many years: the church will seat 120 persons: in the churchyard are thirteen Anglo-Norman tombs, ranging from the 12th to the 13th centuries. The register dates from the year 1707. The living is a vicarage annexed to Winsley, of the joint net yearly value of £231, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol, and held since 1892 by the Rev. Reginald Walter

There is also a Reformatory for girls under fifteen years of age, who have been convicted of petty offences: this institution was certified January 9th, 1861. The soil is stony brash; subsoil, freestone. Crops, wheat, barley and roots. The area, including Winsley, is 3,247 acres; the population in 1891 of the ecclesiastical district of Winsley and Limpley Stoke was 1,151, including 65 in the Reformatory.

LITTLETON DREW is a parish and village on the Gloucestershire border, 7½ miles north-west from Chippenham station on the Great Western railway, and 10 south-west from Malmesbury, in the North Western division of the county, Chippenham hundred, union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of All Saints is a building of stone, in the Decorated and Perpendicular styles, consisting of a chancel, nave, north porch and a central embattled tower containing 3 bells: in the church is an altar tomb with recumbent effigy, supposed to be that of a lady of the Drew family, which came here during the time of the conquest, from which the parish derives its adjunct: there are 80 sittings. LUDGERSHALL is a parish and village, situated in a hollow, bounded on the south-west by an extensive open country and contiguous to the borders of Chute forest and the Hampshire boundary and Collingbourne woods, with a station on the Midland and South Western Junction railway, 7 miles north-west from Andover, 17 miles north-east from Salisbury, and 73 from London, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Amesbury, Everleigh and Pewsey petty sessional division, Pewsey union, Andover county court district, Amesbury rural deanery (Amesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury: this was formerly a market town of considerable importance, and an ancient parliamentary borough, now disfranchised. There is a curious old market cross in the village, the subjects of the four sides being the "Command to St. Peter," "The Three Maries," the "Crucifixion" and the "Ascension." The church of St. James is an ancient structure of flint and stone, having chancel, nave, south porch and embattled western square tower, with four pinnacles, containing 5 bells and clock and transept: the tower was raised in 1871 in memory of Richard Thomas Everett, by his widow; the chancel, in the Early English style, was restored in 1873, and the nave re-seated in 1874, Mr. Pearson, architect: there are some Norman windows and doorways: in the east window are the arms of Chicheley, Archbishop of Canterbury: near the south porch is a niche containing two effigies in a recumbent position, with a costly monument of stone, erected in 1558, to Sir Richard and Lady Brydges, ancestors of the Dukes of Chandos: it is surmounted by a coat of arms, and interspersed with various designs in ancient carving: this magnificent tomb has been partially restored: there are 300 sittings, 240 for adults and 60 for children. The registers date from the year 1609, and are in Latin till the year 1620. The living is a rectory, tithes commuted at £427, average £334, net income £287, in the gift of E. M. Awdry esq. and

LYDIARD (or Liddiard Millicent) is a village and parish, 2 miles south from Purton station on the Swindon and Gloucester branch of the Great Western railway, 3 north-north-east from Wootton Bassett and 5 west-by-north from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, Highworth hundred, petty sessional division of Cricklade, Cricklade and Wootton Bassett union, county court district of Swindon, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of All Saints is in the Later English style, with chancel, nave of six bays, south aisle, south porch and western tower, with pinnacles, containing 5 bells: the nave was built in the reign of Henry VI.; the aisle, of a later date, is supposed to have been built by a family of the name of Russell, under a licence granted by the king to the De Clintons, who were then lords of the manor: in the church is a Norman font, which is depicted in Atkin's "Ancient Fonts of England:" the church was thoroughly repaired and re-pewed in the years 1841 and 1842: in 1870 the chancel was lengthened, oak choir stalls and reredos erected, and a vestry and organ chamber thrown out on the north side: the whole floor was laid with Godwin's encaustic tiles: during the alterations remains were found of a Norman stoup and of Lancet windows, which last were probably removed when the present Perpendicular windows were inserted; the church has 250 sittings: there is an ancient dilapidated stone cross in the churchyard. The register dates from

LYDIARD TREGOZE is a village and parish, 3 miles north-east from Wootton Bassett station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 4 west-by-north from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, union of Cricklade and Wootton Bassett, hundred of Kingsbridge, petty sessional division of Cricklade, county court district of Swindon, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The Wilts and Berks canal and the Great Western railway passes through the parish. The church of St. Mary is an ancient edifice of stone, in the Later English style, with a chancel, nave and aisles, south porch and a square tower, with pinnacles, containing 5 bells: the south aisle was built in 1663 by the Bolingbroke family, to whom there are some handsome monuments: the church underwent a repair about 1846: the eastern window is a beautiful specimen of stained glass, by Van Eyke's, of the time of Charles II. representing St. John the Baptist and the Evangelists, and a genealogical tree of the Bolingbroke St. John family: in the chancel is a pedigree of the same family from the Conquest, splendidly illuminated; there is also a monument to Sir John St. John and his two wives and family: the church has about 320 sittings. The register dates from the year 1680. The living is a rectory, tithes commuted at £595, average £445, net income £345, with 96 acres of glebe, and residence, in the gift of Viscount Bolingbroke, and held since 1885 by the Rev. Henry George Baily M.A. of Christ's College, Cambridge. Here is a Primitive Methodist chapel. The churchyard being closed, a cemetery was opened at Hook, the land being given by Viscount Bolingbroke, and is 2 acres in extent: it is under the control of the Parish Council. Here is a charity arising from the interest of £700 Consols, left by the Rev. R. Miles, a former rector, to

the year 1697. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £378, gross yearly value £498, net £405, in the gift of Pembroke College, Oxford, and held since 1881 by the Rev. Arthur Cardinal Saunders M.A. of that college. Ancestors of Whitfield were rectors of this parish twice in succession about 1632. Here is a chapel for Primitive Methodists, also one at Shaw. MALMESBURY,

WITH WESTPORT ST. MARY.

MALMESBURY is an ancient municipal borough, market town and parish, and the head of a county court district and petty sessional division, with a terminal station on a branch from Dauntsey of the Great Western railway, and is 10 miles north from Chippenham, 11 south-west from Cirencester, 5 south-east from Tetbury, and 92 from London, in the North Western division of the county, Malmesbury hundred, rural deanery of Malmesbury, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The town is pleasantly situated on a bold eminence, and nearly surrounded by the converging branches of the Lower Avon, over which there are six bridges: it consists of one principal street, called High street, crossed at the top by Oxford street and Gloucester street, leading to Westport St. Mary.

The borough was incorporated by King Athelstan, and was formerly governed, under a charter of William III. by a high steward, an alderman and 12 capital burgesses, but under the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883 (46 & 47 Vict. c. 18), it received a new Charter of Incorporation in July, 1885, and is now governed by a mayor, 4 aldermen and 12 councillors, who also act as the Urban Sanitary Authority: the borough returned two members to the Parliament of 1295 and 1298-9, and continued to do so, with some interruptions, until the passing of the "Reform Act, 1832," by which the number was reduced to one, and by the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," (48 & 49 Vict. c. 23), the representation was merged into that of the county. The town is lighted with gas, from works belonging to the Malmesbury Gas & Coke Co., and is supplied with water by the Malmesbury Water Works Co. Limited.

The town was twice burnt by the Danes, and during the Civil War, in the time of Charles I. was garrisoned for the King, who visited it, remaining one night, in 1643: south-west of the town is Malmesbury Common,

or King's Heath, given to the inhabitants by Athelstan, and containing over 500 acres, inclosed under the provisions of an Act of Parliament passed in 1821, according to which every freeman in the borough is entitled to possess one allotment, and every capital burgess a plot of from 8 to 15 acres; the highest part of the common is called Shade Hill.

The borough comprised three parishes, the Abbey district, St. Paul's and St. Mary Westport.

By an Order of the County Council, dated July 10th, 1894, the two latter parishes were altered and made into four parishes, being called St. Paul's Within and St. Paul's Without, St. Mary's Westport Within and St. Mary's Westport Without.

The abbey church of St. Mary and St. Aldhelm occupies a fine site on the crest of a hill or elevated plateau north of the town, and, as now standing, consists only of six bays of the nave and north aisle, and seven bays of the south aisle, with the south porch: the central and western towers have been destroyed, but in the churchyard is a detached tower, with spire, originally belonging to the removed church of St. Paul, and containing a clock and 5 bells: of the eastern portion of the church, including the transept, nothing now remains, save three of the piers of the central tower, and a fragment of the west wall of the south transept: the three western bays of the nave have also entirely disappeared, with the exception of a part of the south-west angle, including three stages of an arcaded stair turret: the existing portion of the nave has arcades of pointed arches, with bold but plain moldings, carried on cylindrical piers, 5 feet in diameter, with scalloped capping: the triforium consists in each bay of one large semi-circular arch, on dwarf shafts, and enriched with zigzag molding, and enclosing an arcade of four small arches: the clerestory is Decorated, and has an elegant traceried window of three lights in each bay; the roof is vaulted, the prin-

cipal ribs springing from the base of the clerestory, which, as well as the triforium, has a mural passage: projecting from the triforium, at the fourth bay from the present east end is a square watching loft, of Late Perpendicular date, with plain square windows and a battlemented cresting: the east end of the nave, now built up, includes the western piers and semi-circular arch of the crossing, and across it stands the stone rood screen, also of Late Perpendicular date, and 11 ft. 6 in. in height: it has a central doorway, now blocked, and an embattled cornice, enriched with the royal arms of Henry VI. the pomegranate, rose, and portcullis badges, and the Stafford knot; and above is hung a large painting of "The Raising of Lazarus," presented by the Earl of Suffolk and Berkshire: the easternmost bay of the nave now forms a presbytery, with prayer desk on the north and pulpit on the south side, under a sounding board: the corresponding bays of the aisles, enclosed by traceried screens, form chapels or vestries, and that on the south side has, between it and the presbytery, a panelled altar tomb, bearing a robed effigy, crowned, the head resting under an elaborately wrought canopy, and the feet on a lion; this tomb is commonly known as that of King Athelstan, but it is said that the head of the figure, and that of the lion, are later than the rest of the work: in the northern chapel is a mural monument to Thomas Stumpe, d. 1698, and some specimens of ancient floor tiles, recovered from the site of the choir: the present western bay of the church is crossed by a gallery, in which the organ now stands, and under it is the font: the oak seats are panelled, and exhibit the well known "linen" pattern; the ends are richly-carved with scroll ornament, and have carved poppy heads: the south porch includes the original Norman porch and the later Decorated work enclosing it; the former is deeply recessed, and its various orders are completely covered with carved work of the most elaborate character; three of these illustrate, within a series of vesica-shaped spaces formed by intertwining fillets, all the principal events narrated in the Old and New Testament, from the "Creation" to the "Pentecost;" and the minor orders are adorned with floriated and interlaced patterns; the inner doorway itself is similarly treated, and has a highly enriched tympanum, with a figure of Our Lord in Majesty, and attendant angels, and on the right is a holy water stoup; the intervening porch, 17 by 12 feet, is arcaded, and has on each side seated figures, with angels above them: the exterior walls of the aisles retain portions of the interlaced Norman arcading which ran along between the buttresses, and below the windows: most of the Norman windows remain, but one bay in the north aisle and two in the south aisle have been filled with large Decorated windows, containing tracery of singular design; and the bay on the north side is also gabled and vaulted: an elegant pierced parapet surmounts all the walls and is continued round the porch, which has a stair turret on the east side and double buttresses at the angles: the pinnacles and flying buttresses rising above the aisles were added on the reconstruction of the clerestory and the vaulting of the nave: the present west wall, built up at the third bay from the original west front, is pierced by a large window of six lights, flanked by strong buttresses: the church was repaired in 1822-3, and affords 1,100 sittings. The register, which is in good preservation, dates from 1590. The living is a vicarage, with the vicarage of St. Mary Westport annexed, joint gross yearly value £500, net £324, in the gift of the trustees of the late Rev. Charles Kemble and the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1874 by the Rev. George Windsor Tucker M.A. of Trinity College, Oxford, and surrogate.

The church of St. Mary Westport is a building of stone in mixed styles, and consists of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch, and a western turret containing one bell: the nave is divided from the aisles by an arcade of six arches: there are 230 sittings. The register dates from the year 1678.

The Catholic chapel, dedicated to St. Aldhelm, in Cross Hayes, was built in 1875, and has 120 sittings.

The Congregational church at Westport St. Mary, rebuilt at a cost of £2,000, has sittings for 500 persons; attached is a vestry and a schoolroom holding 400 children.

The Congregational church at Westport St. Mary, restored in 1885, at a cost of over £300, and has 350 sittings.

The Calvinistic Baptist chapel, Abbey row, erected in 1802, will seat 170. The Primitive Methodist chapel, Bristol street, was erected in 1856, and seats 130 persons. The Wesleyan Methodist chapel in Oxford street,

erected in 1886, seats 400 persons, and has a school-room adjoining.

The Cemetery at Westport, of 2½ acres, was formed in 1884 at a cost of £2,000, including a mortuary chapel, and a house for the keeper: it is under the control of a Burial Board of 12 members.

The Town Hall is a plain rectangular building. The municipal insignia comprise two pairs of maces and four borough seals. The earlier pair, dating from about 1645, are of silver parcel-gilt and have plain shafts, with beaded bands in the centre and at the foot, and also seal-shaped foot knobs, engraved with the borough arms: the heads are semi-globular, and their surfaces are divided by plain vertical bands into four spaces, ornamented with the national emblems: surrounding the flat tops, on which are the royal arms of the Stuarts, is a cresting, and an open arched crown surmounted by an orb and cross. The latter pair, presented in 1703 by Thomas Boucher and Edward Pouncefort esqs. representatives of the borough in Parliament, were made at that date by Francis Garthorne, and are of silver-gilt: the shafts, engraved with a spiral vine pattern, have encircling beaded bands in the centre and at the base, and large spreading foot knobs bearing the names and arms of the donors, and the arms of the town: scrolled brackets support the heads, which are adorned with foliated winged figures, royal badges, and the initials A. R. and have a cresting of crosses and fleurs-de-lis, and open-arched crowns with orb and cross. Of the four seals, the earliest, of the 16th or 17th century, is of brass, and bears the arms of the borough and a legend, and the others are similar.

The market is held on the third Wednesday in every month for cattle.

In the old Market place is an octagonal stone market cross, built in the reign of Henry VII. with flying buttresses and pinnacles, surmounted by an octagonal turret, richly sculptured, and surrounded with niches containing figures in bas relief, one of which represents the "Crucifixion;" the cross was restored in 1883 at an expense of £140, raised by subscriptions, £100 being given by the lord of the manor.

There are branches here of the Capital and Counties Bank Lim. and the Wilts and Dorset Banking Co. Lim.

There are two breweries and a silk manufactory. Pillow lace is still made here, though not so extensively as formerly. There are three good hotels, the "King's Arms," the "Bell," and the "George," and a temperance hotel.

The B Squadron Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry Cavalry and the A Company of the 2nd Volunteer Battalion, Duke of Edinburgh's (Wiltshire Regiment) have their head quarters in the town.

The Police Station is in Gastons lane, and the Fire Brigade Station in Ingram street.

The Cottage Hospital, near the Market Cross, was erected in 1893, at a cost of £1,200, and is supported by public subscription. It contains 5 beds, and has already (1895) benefited 43 persons, 31 in-patients and 12 out-patients.

The Charities given by order of the Corporation of Malmesbury, June 22, 1629, comprise £20 5s. yearly issuing out of the lands of the burgesses, £10 yearly for the support of a free school, and £10 for maintaining poor widows in an almshouse. Robert Arch left, by will, in 1634, two houses, gardens and 11 acres of land at Lea and Malmesbury, the rents of which are to be applied for the good of the borough. Henry Grayle, of Malmesbury, left by deed of trust £10 yearly issuing from an estate at Somerford Magna, for apprenticing poor children of Malmesbury. Michael Weeks left in 1695 a farm house and 48 acres of land at Somerford, £10 for support of burgesses' school, £10 for the support of almshouses, and £1 to the vicar for preaching an annual sermon. Elizabeth Hodges, of Shipton Moyne, left in 1723 £30 yearly from estates at Leonard Stanley, Cam, Stinchcombe and Berkeley, Glos.; the Court of Chancery, in 1730, ordered that a new school should be established wherein 15 boys, being children of poor parents in Malmesbury, should be educated, and also assigned £10 for the benefit of poor housekeepers in Malmesbury not receiving alms. Joseph Cullerne, in 1764, left £20 yearly from an estate at Cleverton, to be shared as follows:—£10 a year to the poor of Malmesbury, £5 yearly to the poor of Westport, and £1 yearly to the poor of Burton Hill, to be distributed on the 1st of January in sums not exceeding 5s. to each family, £1 for an annual sermon at the abbey on the 12th of March, £1 for a dinner for the trustees on same day, 10s. to the distributor of this benefaction and £1 10s. to Sarah Hughes; this last-named sum is now divided between the above three parishes. Ann Rowles, of

Malmesbury, left in 1774 £100 £3 per Cent. Consols, two-thirds of the interest to be paid yearly to the churchwardens of Malmesbury, and to be given by them to the poor on Good Friday, and one-third to the churchwardens of Westport, to be distributed in like manner. Edmund Wayte, of Malmesbury, in 1661, left £4 yearly, issuing out of Canopps mill, Malmesbury, £2 to be given to the poor of Malmesbury, £1 to the poor of Burton Hill, and £1 to the poor of Westport. William Arnold, of Bristol, left by will, 1778, £400 to purchase stock in Government funds; and accordingly in 1785 £576 12s. 10d. capital stock of Reduced £3 per Cent. Annuities were purchased, and the interest is distributed in bread to the poor of Malmesbury at the discretion of the trustees.

The Benedictine Abbey of Malmesbury is said to have been founded in the 6th century, by Aldhelm, bishop of Sherborne 705-9, on the site of a cell established here by Marldulph, a Scottish missionary, whose pupil he had been; it was afterwards richly endowed by the Saxon kings, and especially by Athelstan, King of England 925-40, who gave to the abbey both lands and many valuable relics: King John in 1215 gave to Abbot Loring the Castle of Malmesbury to furnish materials for works then in progress, and in the same century the abbot received the mitre. Bishop Aldhelm, on his death, was brought from Sherborne, and here interred, and King Athelstan was buried before the high altar A.D. 940. At the Dissolution there were 22 monks, and revenues estimated at £803 yearly; the buildings were then sold for £1,500 to William Stumpe, a wealthy clothier, who pulled down the eastern portion of the church, but presented the remainder to the inhabitants for a parish church; the building appears to have been originally somewhat over 300 feet in length, and had a central tower, 40 feet square, with a spire said to have been 21 feet higher than that of Salisbury: there was also a tower of equal dimensions at the west end, built over the first two bays of the nave; the total interior length of the nave, when perfect, was 150 feet; the portion

now in use is about 95 feet long. The monastic buildings were on the north side, and the vaulted doorway leading from the east end of the north aisle into the cloister is still extant, and retains its Norman arch, with later additions: but of the buildings themselves nothing now remains, save an undercroft forming the base of a Tudor house, standing north-east of the church.

The historian, William of Malmesbury, born in Somersetshire, c. 1095, was precentor of the abbey church, and died here in 1142 or 1143. The celebrated philosopher, Thomas Hobbes, was born here, 15 April, 1588, and the house in which he is supposed to have resided is still standing near the Westport church: he died at Hardwick Hall, Derbyshire, 4 Dec. 1679, at the age of 91, and in the church of Ault Hucknall, Derbyshire, where he was buried, there is a tomb to his memory. Mary Chandler, a poetess, was also born here in 1687, and died at Bath, 11 Sept. 1745.

The town gives the title of Earl to the Harris family. Cole Park is the seat of Viscount Trafalgar D.L., J.P. The mansion stands in a park of 47 acres.

Lady Northwick is lady of the manor of Malmesbury and Westport. The principal landowners are the Earl of Suffolk and Berkshire, the Earl of Radnor, Sir R. H. Pollen bart. of Rodbourne, Audley Lovell esq. and Daniel Beak esq.

The area of Malmesbury is 5,142, and Westport 4,341 acres; rateable values, Malmesbury £11,167; Abbey, £622; Westport St. Mary, £4,631; the population of the municipal borough in 1891 was 2,964, which includes St. Paul Within, 1,229; Malmesbury Abbey parish, 119; Westport St. Mary Within, 1,555; and Brokenborough Within, 61.

MANNINGFORD BRUCE (which derives its name from the old baronial family of Braose) is a small village and parish, 2½ miles south-west from Pewsey station of the Great Western railway, and 10 east-by-south from Devizes, in the Eastern division of the county, Swanborough hundred, Everleigh and Pewsey petty sessional division, Pewsey union, Marlborough county court district, rural deanery of Marlborough (Pewsey portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Peter, a building of flint, was probably built before the Norman conquest (the lofty and narrow doorways and high position of windows indicating Anglo-Saxon, or at least, very Early Norman work), and consists of apsidal chancel, which retains an aumbry and a

piscina, containing a handsome reredos, nave, western wooden belfry with 2 bells and south porch: the building formerly was covered with plaster, but in 1882 the plaster was stripped off and the church thoroughly restored, from plans by Mr. J. L. Pearson A.R.A. at the expense of the lord of the manor: the church was re-seated with new oak seats, and the roof, which is of oak, was covered with lead: the chancel walls have been decorated: the east window and one in the chancel are stained: there is a tablet in the chancel to Mary Nicholas, who was, with her sister Jane, instrumental in preserving the life of Charles II. after his defeat at Worcester: there are 84 sittings. The register dates from the year 1657. The living is a rectory, average

tithe rent-charge £219, net income £216, with 8 acres of glebe and house, in the gift of the representatives of A. Grant esq. and held since 1892 by the Rev. Edward Tanqueray B.A. of Cambridge University. Manningford Bruce Manor House is the residence of Henry Wansbrough esq. and stands in a park of about 12 acres. The principal landowner is Alexander Grant Meek esq. who is lord of the manor. The soil is sand and clay; subsoil, chalky. The chief crops are wheat, barley and beans. The area is 1,085 acres; rateable value, £1,142; the population in 1891 was 250.

MARDEN is a parish and village, 2 miles south-west from Woodborough station on the Newbury and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 6½ south-east from Devizes, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Swanborough, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Devizes, Potterne rural deanery (Enford portion), Wilts archdeaconry and Salisbury diocese. The church of All Saints is a building of stone and brick, in the Norman and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel and nave, south porch, and an embattled western tower with turret and pinnacles, and containing 5 bells: the south doorway and chancel arch are fine examples of Norman work, and are ornamented with the beaded chevron and other mouldings: the 15th century tower, which had been lowered seven feet in 1617, was rebuilt in 1885 at a cost of nearly £700, and restored to its original proportions: the church is now (1894-5) undergoing a thorough restoration. The register dates from the year 1685. The living is a vicarage, yearly value from the tithe rent-charge £99, gross income £226, net £232, including 1 acre of glebe,

Henry Thompson Adam M.A. of Corpus Christi college, Cambridge, who is also vicar of and resides at Chirton. Here is a Baptist chapel. Mrs. Johnstone, who is lady of the manor, William Fulbrook Atherton esq. and John Harriott Bott esq. are the principal landowners. The soil and subsoil are greensand, with a little clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley and turnips. The area is 1,278 acres; rateable value, £1,188; the population in 1891 was 188.

MARLBOROUGH.

MARLBOROUGH is a municipal borough and union and market town, on the banks of the river Kennet, in the Eastern division of the county, petty sessional division of Marlborough and Hungerford, hundred of Selkley, rural deanery of Marlborough (Marlborough portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury; by a branch line from Savernake the town is placed in connection with the Great Western railway system, and the station is about half a mile from the Town Hall; the Midland and South Western Junction railway from Cirencester to Andover Junction on London and South Western railway through Marlborough was opened in 1884, and the scheme includes a continuation from Cirencester, to join the Midland system at Cheltenham: the town is situated on the Bath road, 14 miles north-east from Devizes, 11 south from Swindon, 27 north from Salisbury and 75 from London. The Local Government Act, formally adopted in 1859, was put into practical operation in 1866. The municipal borough includes the parishes of St. Peter and St. Paul, and St. Mary the Virgin, and has a commission of the peace. The borough formerly returned two members of Parliament, but by the "Representation of the People Act, 1867," the number was reduced to one, and by the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," the representation was merged into that of the county. There is a common of 100 acres, on which the burgesses are entitled to pasture their cows, at a charge of 6d. a head per week. The town, which is lighted with gas by a company, under a private Act, consists principally of one fine wide street, chiefly shops; those on the north side are protected by a colonnade extending over the footpath, which renders it a dry and agreeable promenade. The houses are for the most part large and well built, though not uniform. The County Quarter Sessions are held here annually at Michaelmas.

The church of St. Mary the Virgin, founded in 1160,

is an old stone building, in the Perpendicular style, with Norman west door: it has chancel, nave and square embattled western tower, with pinnacles, containing a clock and 6 bells: the chancel was built in 1874, at a cost of about £1,000: the late G. E. Street esq. R.A. was the architect: the organ was erected in 1879: the church contains stained windows to the Merriman family, to Mr. Meyler, a former head master of the Grammar school, to members of the May family, and to a son of Captain Manders, who was drowned at Erith when serving on board the training ship "Worcester:" a clock, with illuminated dials, was erected in the tower in 1889, at a cost of about £200: the church has sittings for 600 persons. The register dates from the year 1602. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £18, gross yearly value £232, net £170, with glebe (£66), and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1887 by the Rev. William Gardiner B.D. of Exeter College, Oxford, and rural dean of Marlborough.

The church of St. Peter is a Perpendicular structure of stone: it has chancel, nave of four bays, aisles, with embattled western tower containing 9 bells and clock, and a south porch, and was repaired in 1863, when the exterior was partially restored and the interior completely refitted with a new pulpit, stalls and pews, all being of oak, also an oak screen round the baptistery, which is situated on the south side of the church: on the north side of the chancel is a marble monument, bearing date 1607, with an inscription to Sir Nicholas Hyde knt. Mary his wife, two sons and a daughter; the baptistery contains a font, supported by four Devonshire marble columns; on the sides of the font are four figures carved in alabaster, emblems of the Four Evangelists: at the east end of the church are three richly stained windows; over the west entrance is one representing the Four Evangelists, with the Apostle Peter in

the midst, and four windows have been inserted in the south aisle, representing four ministries—that of Our Lord, angels, apostles and women: there are sittings for 500 persons. The register dates from the year 1611. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £11, gross yearly value £234, net £207, with glebe (£20), and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1887 by the Rev. Henry Robert Whytehead M.A. of Corpus Christi college, Cambridge, and surrogate.

The Congregational chapel, in The Parade, was built in 1817, enlarged 1873, and has 250 sittings. The Wesleyan chapel, Oxford street, was erected in 1867, and seats 200 persons; the Baptist chapel, St. Martin's, erected in 1868, has 90 seats; and the Primitive Methodist chapel, Herd street, erected in 1841, has 200 sittings.

The Market House is an ancient building, over which is the Town Hall. Here are a Council-room and Court-house, and assembly-rooms, which will hold 500 persons. The market for corn, cheese and cattle is held on Saturday, and is tolerably well attended.

Fairs are held on the 22nd of August and 23rd of November. There are two hiring fairs, one on the Saturday before Old Michaelmas and one after.

The trades carried on are brewing, malting, rope and sacking manufacture and tanning.

There are cricket, athletic and football clubs connected with the town, of which Mr. H. Leaf is the honorary secretary.

The Marlborough Reading and Mutual Improvement Society, which was established in 1844, is well conducted and in a prosperous condition: a comfortable reading-room, situated in the High street, was opened in 1854, and is well supplied with London daily and weekly papers, provincial papers, books of reference,

and all the principal periodicals of the day: there is likewise an extensive library attached, consisting of upwards of 3,000 well-selected volumes for the use of the members.

The charities for distribution amount to about £60 yearly, derived from legacies, all now being in the hands of the Charity Commissioners.

The Savernake Hospital, established in 1866, in the old Training School on Forest Hill, was built by public subscription, at a cost of £5,000, and opened 6th of July, 1872, for 21 patients; beds in constant use, over 17; it is supported entirely by voluntary contributions, and any poor person can be admitted free of charge on the recommendation of a subscriber: out-patients are charged 2s. 6d. per week; patients are received from 60 surrounding parishes, representing a population of upwards of 40,000; the yearly average of in-patients is about 220, and of out-patients about 50. There were under care in 1893, 230 in-patients and 50 out-patients. The site was given by the late Marquess of Ailesbury, the Marchioness of Ailesbury built the two convalescent day rooms, and Mrs. Merriman, of Wykeham House, the two extra wards, the latter as a memorial to her late husband, T. B. Merriman esq.

The principal landowners are the Marquess of Ailesbury and the Corporation of Marlborough. The soil is chalk, with beds of clay irregularly distributed. The chief crops are wheat and barley.

The area is 186 acres; 116 in St. Mary's parish and 79 in St. Peter and St. Paul. The rateable values are—St. Mary's, £4,978; St. Peter and St. Paul, £6,667; the population in 1891 was 3,012; namely, St. Mary's, 1,695; and St. Peter's and St. Paul's, 1,317.

MARLBOROUGH COLLEGE.

Founded, 1843. Incorporated by Royal Charter, 1845.

Marlborough College, situated at the western extremity of the High street, was erected on the site of the ancient castle, which was afterwards an inn, & forms a magnificent group of buildings: this institution had its origin in an association to secure, on economical terms, a liberal education, more especially for the sons of clergymen, preparatory to that of the universities: in the year 1845 the institution was incorporated by letters patent, under the name of Marlborough College, & by the charter of incorporation the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being was appointed perpetual visitor, and the Bishop of Salisbury perpetual president of the Council; the charter further provides that the duties & doctrines of Christianity, as the same are received & taught by the United Church of England & Ireland, & also the various branches of literature (including the ancient & modern languages) & science, shall be taught in the said College, under the superintendence of a member of one of the Universities of Oxford or Cambridge (who shall be designated Master of Marlborough College); & such other assistant masters, professors & tutors, shall be appointed by the Council as they may see occasion; by the original charter two-thirds of the pupils must be sons of clergymen, & the rest may be sons of laymen; but by a second charter, granted in 1853, one half of the pupils may be sons of laymen. The College is divided into three schools—the upper, the modern, & the lower school. In the upper school the education is chiefly intended as a preparation for the universities, & is therefore mainly classical. In the modern school the subjects of instruction are Latin, French, German, mathematics, history, geography & natural science, with special classes for subjects of examination at Woolwich. The lower school is preparatory for the upper & modern schools; the Bible & Church Catechism form part of the regular instruction in all the schools. There are twelve Exhibitions to the Universities of Oxford & Cambridge; 4 vacant annually, worth from £22 10s. to £50 each yearly respectively, tenable for three years. Annually in December there is an election to 16 "Foundation Scholarships," of the value of £30 a year each, tenable so long as the holders remain at the college, & confined to the sons of clergymen, nominated by life governors: there are in all 70 of these Foundation Scholarships; also a certain number of "Senior Scholarships," of the value of £50 a year each, open to all boys under 15 years of age on the 1st of January before the election: two are open for competition every year, and tenable during good behaviour, as long as the holders remain at the school. There are also a certain number of "Junior Scholar-

ships," of the value of £30 a year, open to all boys under 14 years of age on the 1st of January before the election; six vacant annually, & tenable at the college for two years. Two scholarships, each of the value of £20, tenable for one year are given annually to the modern school, open to all boys under the age of 17 & 15 respectively. Three scholarships (two founded by the late Dean Ireland, & the third by the late Archdeacon Berens), of the yearly value of £15, tenable as long as the holders remain at college; candidates must be under 15 years of age; "Ireland" Scholarships being limited to clergymen's sons: two "Author's Scholarships," of the value of £15 each, are given annually in June; also a Scholarship, worth £16 a year, confined to the sons of clergymen who have served for five years within the limits of the late East India Co.'s charters: there are three "Old Marlburian Exhibitions," one "The Classical," vacant every three years, of the value of £50 yearly, tenable for three years, & two "Modern," one adjudged annually, of the value of £25 a year each, tenable for two years; & also a considerable number of annual prizes

The chapel, built in 1848, has been taken down, & in its stead the present building was erected & consecrated in 1886, at a cost of upwards of £30,000: the style is Perpendicular Gothic: the walls built of Sarsen stone, with dressings of Bath stone, & the flèche, chancel & porches are entirely of Bath stone: the western porch has richly moulded shafts & arches, with ball flowers at west end of south side & there is another entrance at east end of south side for clergy: the porch for the out-boarders is at the north side of the west end, from which a circular stone staircase in the turret leads to the gallery over the ante-chapel: there are niches with canopied heads under the apse windows, over the south porch & in the west end; the four niches of the apse have been filled with figures of the Patron Saints of the United Kingdom (St. George, St. Patrick, St. Andrew & David) presented by tradesmen connected with the college; & the angles of the apse are occupied by shafts carrying figures of St. Michael (in honour of whom the chapel is named), & the archangels St. Raphael & St. Gabriel: the west end contains a five-light window, & there are 13 two-light windows with rich tracery, all differing, in the north & south sides of the nave: the chancel is lighted by four two-light windows with tracery, & four single-light windows in apse end, & six small two-light windows with tracery give light to the chancel aisles: all these windows are stained, & the memorial windows, which were in the earlier building, have been transferred

to the new: the roof over the chancel is divided into three bays, and that over the nave into eight bays, by massive stone arches springing from moulded shafts with moulded bases & capitals; these bays are boarded & sub-divided into panels with wood ribs & carved bosses for colour decoration: the chancel & chancel aisles are groined in stone: the roof over the ante-chapel, situated under the gallery, is also groined in stone: the organ chamber, with vestry underneath, will be built on the north side, near the chancel: the floors are laid with Stephens' improved wood-blocks: the seats, with carved ends, are all of oak; & the seats for masters & visitors, with canopied heads & panelled backs, are also of oak: the pictures from the old building, the work of Mr. Spencer Stanhope, have been removed to the new chapel.

The Adderley library, in connection with the College, was founded in the year 1848 by F. Alleyne McGeachy esq. & contains upwards of 8,000 volumes. A school magazine "The Marlburian," edited by members of Marlborough College, is issued fortnightly from the "Marlborough Times" office

The register dates from the year 1590. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £60, gross yearly value £302, net £276, including 3 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of South Damerham, and held since 1883 by the Rev. Eardley Wilmot Michell, jun. M.A. of Corpus Christi college, Cambridge. Here are Congregational and Primitive Methodist chapels. MELKSHAM.

MELKSHAM is a market and union and county court town, and head of a petty sessional division, and parish, with a station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, 100 miles from London, 30 north-west from Salisbury, 6 north-east from Bradford, 5 north-east from Trowbridge, 7 west from Devizes, 9½ from Westbury, 14 from Warminster, 12 east from Bath, 7 south from Chippenham and 5 south-south-east from Corsham, in the Western division of the county, hundred of the same name, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury.

During the West Saxon era this was a place of considerable note; at the period of the Norman survey and for several subsequent reigns it was held in royal demesne, and gave name to an extensive forest. The town is on the main road from London through Devizes to Bath, and consists principally of one street nearly a mile in length; it has been governed by a Local Board from 1878, until the "Local Government Act, 1894," established the present Urban District Council, and it is well paved and lighted with gas by a company, and well supplied with water by the Trowbridge Water Company: the houses are built of soft freestone, but irregularly placed. The river Avon divides the town and is crossed by a handsome bridge of four arches, with light and elegant balustrades. The Wilts and Berks canal passes on the east of the town, and about 1½ miles southward joins the Kennet and Avon canal.

There are two mineral springs, one saline and the other chalybeate, in the vicinity; and in 1816 a new saline spa was obtained by boring to a depth of 351½ feet; it was anticipated that Melksham would advance into note in consequence of the medicinal qualities these waters possessed, and every accommodation for visitors was provided, including a pump-room, hot and cold baths, a handsome crescent and an agreeable promenade; but after a very great outlay, the wells did not prove attractive and are now little used.

The church of St. Michael is a spacious structure of freestone, chiefly of Perpendicular work, dates from the Norman period, consisting of a Norman chancel, nave of five bays, and aisles, north porch, with an embattled tower surmounted by pinnacles and containing 6 bells: it was restored and enlarged in 1840, when the central tower was removed and the present tower built at the west end; and again restored in 1881, when an organ was added: in 1891 the church was reseated with oak seats, a new floor was put in, the roof was opened, and a handsome carved oak screen and brass lectern were given by C. F. Rumboll esq. M.D.: in 1894 the reredos was restored at considerable cost by the trustees of the late Sir John Awdry: the sittings, in number 600, are all free. The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge commuted at £1010, average £682, net income £191, with 3 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Edwin

George Wyld B.A. of Exeter College, Oxford, and surrogate.

There is a handsome chapel (St. Andrew's) about 1 mile from the town, built in the Early English style, at the sole expense of the late Rev. E. L. Barnwell, of Melksham House, for the use of the district of Sandridge and Melksham Forest: it consists of chancel, nave and south porch, and western bell turret containing one bell: there are 200 sittings: adjoining the chapel there is a building comprising a Sunday school-room, and house for the use of the sexton, built in the year 1880, from plans given by the late G. E. Street esq. R.A. holding 150 children.

The Society of Friends' meeting house, King street, erected in 1734, has 300 seats.

The Baptist chapel, Broughton road, founded in 1669, has 400 sittings. Ebenezer Baptist chapel, Union street, erected in 1835, will seat 150 persons. The Baptist chapel, Forest, erected in 1839, has seats for 110 persons.

The Congregational chapel, Market place, founded in 1773, has 400 sittings.

The Primitive Methodist chapel, Forest, will seat 150 persons.

The Wesleyan chapel, Market place, erected in 1872, has 450 seats.

The Town Hall and Cheese Market were erected in 1847 by a company of shareholders at an expense of £3,350; they form a spacious and well-arranged edifice of white freestone, in the Italian style. The New Hall, Market place, built by Miss Fowler, is a building of Bath stone, and is used for lectures and meetings; it will hold 200 persons. The market is held on every

alternate Tuesday in the month for cattle, sheep and pigs. A fair for cattle, sheep and horses is held in the Market place on the 27th of July.

The manufacture of flat and round rope, haircloths, cocoa fibre and sacking are carried on here. There is also an india rubber factory carried on by the Avon India Rubber Co. Limited.

A Cottage Hospital was established here in 1868, containing 7 beds.

Bruges' charity of about £20 yearly, half of which goes to Seend, is distributed in blankets by the vicar and churchwardens at Christmas. There are also two small charities, left by the Rev. Bohun Fox and Mr. Pritchard respectively, for the benefit of the poor, at the discretion of the vicar.

The principal landowners are Walter Hume Long esq. M.P. of Rood Ashton House, who is lord of the manor, Lord Methuen, Ralph Ludlow Lopes esq. of Sandridge Park, and the trustees of the late W. P. Bruges esq.

The area of the civil parish is 8,303 acres; rateable value £24,350; the population in the town in 1891 was 2,073, of the civil parish, 4,284, and of the ecclesiastical, 3,638.

The parish was originally divided into 7 tithings, Shaw and Whalley, Beanacre, Blachmere, Woolmere, Canhold, Woodrow, and the town tithing.

Beanacre is a tithing 1 mile north-west. Here is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1839. Blackmore, 1 mile south-east is also a tithing. A mission chapel was erected in 1887, capable of holding 100 persons. A school-room adjoining was added in 1890.

MERE is a union town and parish on the borders of three counties—Wilts, Dorset and Somerset—which meet in the vicinity, and is on the road from Salisbury to Taunton Dean, 4 miles north from Gillingham station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway, 23 west-by-north from Salisbury, 7 west from Hindon, 7 east-by-north from Wincanton and 102 from London, in the Southern division of the county, Mere hundred, Tisbury and Mere petty sessional division, county court district of Shaftesbury, Wylve rural deanery (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The town is lighted with gas from works erected in 1866. The church of St. Michael the Archangel is a stone building, consisting of chancel with chapels, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles and north and south porches, over each of which is a parvise and square western tower 100 feet high, surmounted at the angles by four lofty pinnacles and contains 6 musical bells, clock and chimes: the chancel is separated from the nave by a beautifully carved oak screen: in a Gothic niche over the north porch is the figure of a saint: the chantry chapels are the oldest part, which is of the 14th century; one is used as the vestry and the other for daily prayer: in the south chapel is a very ancient brass to John Bettesthorpe, who died in 1398: there are traces of Early English work (about the year 1220) in the buttresses at the east end and in the corbels which formerly came under the eaves, and are to be seen in the south chancel wall: the present chancel and the north and south chapels were built in the 14th century with some portions of the church, but there was apparently a great remodelling of the church when the tower was built about the middle of the 15th century: there are 600 sittings: in 1883 the churchyard was levelled and planted with shrubs and flowers. The registers are in a good state of preservation, and date from 1572, and the churchwardens' books, still preserved, date from 1556. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £295, net yearly value £220, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1890 by the Rev. John Augustus Lloyd M.A. of St. John's College, Oxford, and surrogate. The mission church of St. Matthew, about 1½ miles south of the town, and on the Shaftesbury road, opened in 1882, is an edifice of stone and brick, and consists of chancel, apse, nave and north porch, with central bell turret containing one bell, and will seat 150 persons: the cost of erection was about £1,000, raised by voluntary subscriptions, the site being the gift of Miss Grove; it is served by the clergy of St. Michael the Archangel. Here is a Congregational chapel, a large Gothic structure, erected at a cost of over £5,000, at the sole expense of Charles Jupe esq. built of local Bath and Ham Hill stone; also a Primitive Methodist chapel and one for the Plymouth Brethren. The Society of Friends have a meeting house here. The Cemetery, on the south side of the town, consisting of about two acres, was opened in 1856: during the excavations necessary in its formation an earthen vessel was discovered containing 400 Roman coins of very ancient date: two mortuary chapels have been erected; it is under the control of a burial board of 9 members. The market, formerly held on Tuesday, has now become extinct, also the annual fairs that were held on the 17th of May and the 10th of October. In the Market place was formerly a market house of great antiquity, which being in a dilapidated state it was found necessary to take it down, and on the site H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, as Duke of Cornwall, erected in 1866 a clock tower with illuminated dials. The Church Institute, in the Market place, was established in the year 1885, and is under the management of the vicar as president and a committee of six members; in connection therewith is a Temperance hotel, having reading rooms, together with a library. The charities amount to £158 yearly: Gillingham Forest charity, arising from inclosure of land at Gillingham Forest, produces £100 yearly, and is distributed in shares: the allotment charity, derived from land in Gillingham parish, yields £20 annually, and is distributed to the poor. John Phillips left by his will the sum of £800, the interest of which, after paying for the repairs of tomb, and partly for support of Sunday school, is distributed by the churchwardens; there are a few minor charities. To the south of the town there is an ancient Manor House, now used as a farm house, and called Woodlands, in which is an ancient chapel. Mere constitutes a part of the Duchy of Cornwall: in the year 1253 permission was given to Richard, Earl of

Cornwall, to build a castle on the hill, now known as Castle Hill, and afterwards to fortify it, of which some traces were found during excavations in 1887. The principal landowners are H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, who is lord of the manor, George Troyte-Chafyn-Grove esq. the trustees of the late Meyrick Bankes esq. and A. R. White esq. The soil is various, clay, chalk and flint; subsoil, chalk and gravel. The chief crops are wheat, beans and oats to the north; and on the south of the town (which is principally clay) fine grazing land. The Ashfield water rises from a chalk hill in the neighbourhood, and after turning several mills joins the river Stour. The parish contains 7,310 acres; rateable value, £10,957; the population in 1891 was 749 in the civil and 2,279 in the ecclesiastical parish, including 49 officers and inmates in the workhouse.

The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a rectory, tithes commuted at £740, average £549, net income £440, with residence and 150 acres of glebe, in the gift of and held since 1894 by the Rev. Gordon Soames M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. Near Folly Farm are the remains of a Roman station, Cunetium, near which have been found many coins and other Roman remains. The Marquess of Ailesbury is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and turnips. The area is 4,025 acres; rateable value, £2,344; the population in 1891 was 464.

The church of St. Peter, a very ancient stone structure, built at various dates, commencing from the 10th century, chiefly in the Early English style, consists of chancel, nave of four bays and north aisle, south porch, with square embattled western tower with pinnacles, containing 6 bells: the chancel was restored in 1864: the whole of the church was restored in 1875 at a cost of £845, from plans by Mr. J. L. Pearson A.R.A. when, in the north aisle, which at some earlier period had formed the nave, there was discovered the founder's tomb in a splendid state of preservation: there is also a rood loft: the church has 300 sittings. The register dates from the year 1686. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £169, net £130, including 18 acres of glebe land and residence, in the gift of Mrs. Gale, of Weston, Bath, and held since 1893 by the Rev. Charles Francis Long Sweet M.A. of Keble College, Oxford. Here is a Wesleyan chapel, built about 1854, to hold 50. The Kennet and Avon canal passes through the northern portion of the parish at New Mill. Near Milton hill is a large tumulus. Fyfield Manor House is an ancient mansion in the Elizabethan style: Charles II.

MINETY (or Minty) is a parish with station, 2 miles east of the village, on the Swindon and Cheltenham section of the Great Western railway, 85 miles from London, 8 north-west from Swindon, 8 south from Cirencester and 7 north-east from Malmesbury, in the North-Western division of the county, hundred of Cricklade, Malmesbury petty sessional division, county court district and union, rural deanery of Malmesbury, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, with the exception of a small portion in Wiltshire, it was formerly in Gloucestershire, but is now, by the Acts 2 & 3 William IV. cap. 64 and 7 & 8 Vict. cap. 61, entirely in Wiltshire. The church of St. Leonard is an ancient structure of stone, in the Early English style, with traces of Tudor work, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, north aisle, south porch and embattled north-western tower, with pinnacles, having a peal of 5 bells: the pulpit, reading desk and some of the pews are elaborately carved in oak: the east window is stained: the memorial window south side of chancel is to the late vicar, Rev. John Edwards, who died 1886; the east window of the north aisle is a memorial to the Perry-Keene family: in the chancel are several ancient tablets, the principal being to Charles Pleydell, 1704, Joseph Nott, 1705 and Thomas Browne, 1726: in the north aisle is a brass tablet of great antiquity, to the Powlett family: the nave was newly roofed in 1884 at a cost of £400: the tower was restored in 1892, and the bells rehung: a stained west window was added in 1893 by a resident, and the chancel relaid with oak in 1894: there are sittings for 200 persons. The register dates from the year 1663. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £245, gross yearly value £265, net £195, including about 14 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Archdeacon of Wilts and held since 1886

by the Rev. Walter William Arthur Butt M.A. of Magdalen College, Oxford, J.P.: the rectorial tithe, amounting to about £240 net yearly value, has been made over by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners to the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester. The charities amount to from £30 to £35 yearly, distributed in money at Christmas to the second poor of the parish. An interesting fact in connection with this parish is that it was the birth-place of William Penn, the founder of Pennsylvania. Henry Whatley-Estridge esq. resides at Minety House: Major Reginald Gordon Chambres resides at Braydon Hall. John Mullings esq. is lord of the manor. MONKTON FARLEIGH is a parish and village, on the Somersetshire border, 2½ miles south from Box station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 5½ east from Bath and 4 north-by-west from Bradford, in the western division of the county, in the hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Bradford, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Peter is a stone building in the Norman and Early English styles, and consists of a chancel and nave, north porch and ancient western tower containing 3 bells: there are several stained windows: the pulpit is of the date of Elizabeth; and the tradition in the parish is that Bishop Jewell was accustomed to preach in it during his frequent visits to the manor, at that time the property of the Bishops of Sarum: there are sittings for 150 persons. The register dates from the year 1570. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £138, net yearly value £108, with 16 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1892 by

the Rev. Albert Edward Baynham M.A. of S. Mary Hall, Oxford. There is a small charity left by Mr. Blinman, for the supply of fuel to the poor at Christmas. There are celebrated free stone quarries on Farleigh Down. Monkton Farleigh derives its prefix from there having been formerly here a priory of Cluniac monks of the Order of St. Benedict, dedicated to St. Mary Magdalene, and forming a "cell" subordinate to the priory at Lewes: it was founded by Maud, daughter of Edward of Salisbury, and wife of the second Humphrey, Baron de Bohun, about the year 1125, and by her endowed with an estate, called the Buries, at Bishopstrow, near Warminster (in later times the property of the Gifford and Brockler families, and now of Sir F. E. G. Astley-Corbett bart.): it was completed and further endowed by her son, the third Humphrey de Bohun, who married Margaret, daughter of the Earl of Hereford: the revenues at the Dissolution were £217 os. 4d.: the cellars under the Manor House are believed to have been part of the original priory, but the house itself has undergone so many changes that it is difficult to recognise anything

thoroughly ecclesiastical. The spring which supplied the convent is sheltered by a little stone building, with pointed stone roof of the Early English period, called "The Monk's Conduit," standing about a quarter of a mile north-west of the Manor House. Monkton Farleigh Manor House is now the seat of Sir Charles Parry Hobhouse bart. J.P. Bishop Jewell died in this house in 1571. The principal landowners are Sir C. P. Hobhouse bart. Henry Spackman esq. and George Palmer esq. who is lord of the manor. The soil is sand, stony brash and clay; subsoil, clayey. The chief crops are wheat, roots, beans and barley. The area is 1,916 acres; rateable value, £3,111; the population in 1891 was 388.

 in the Perpendicular style: the chancel, with the
 exception of the east wall, was rebuilt in 1861, when the
 south aisle was added to afford room for school
 children: the old windows, which are Early English,
 were all re-inserted: the east window of three lights,
 in the Decorated style, and four lancet windows, are
 stained, in memory of a former rector, Canon Bouverie,
 and there are six others: in the south wall are a piscina
 and sedilia; the latter were discovered under the
 plaster at the time of the rebuilding, and restored to
 use: in 1889-90, at which date the church was restored
 and various alterations made, the vestry and organ
 chamber were added on the north side, the north aisle
 widened 6 feet and the galleries taken away: during
 the restoration the following discoveries were made
 in addition to those previously named:—a stone rood
 staircase on the north side of the chancel arch; a
 hagioscope on the south; a piscina, much defaced, in
 the south aisle; and an aumbry in the west wall: the
 stalls, eagle lectern and pulpit are of oak, from the
 designs of the late G. E. Street esq. R.A.: the font is
 ancient: there is a peal of 6 bells and a call bell; the
 fourth bell is ancient, and bears an inscription in black
 letter Sancte George Or...: the nave was repaired about
 1853: a new organ of two manuals, in which some stops
 of the old organ were worked up, was presented to the
 church in 1879, in memory of Mrs. Ravenshaw. The
 communion rails, carved by the present rector, are made
 of the wood of the Spanish battle ship, "San Josef," of
 112 guns, boarded by Nelson off Cape St. Vincent,
 14th Feb. 1797: the reredos, erected to the Earl and
 Countess of Radnor in 1890, was painted and partly
 carved by their son, the rector, and Mr. Hitch of
 London: there is another reredos in the south chancel
 aisle: the chancel screen, executed by H. Hems of
 Exeter, was erected in 1893 to the Hon. Christopher
 P. Bouverie: the timbers of the roof of the organ
 chamber and vestry formed part of the original roof
 of the refectory of the Monastery of Ivychurch, near
 Salisbury, taken down in 1889 and re-erected here in
 1890: the walls of the nave have been partly decorated
 with wall paintings by the rector: the pew system was
 by general consent abolished in January, 1874, and there

 existing being A.D. 1811, an entry of baptism. The

The church of St. Michael, rebuilt on the site of an old church, 1770, is a Gothic stone building, and has chancel, nave and square embattled western tower containing one bell, and was repaired in 1845: some of the monuments built into the walls date from the 16th century: the east window and one on each side of the chancel are stained: there are sittings for 70 persons. The register dates from the year 1632. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £171 (arising principally from 218 acres of glebe), net income £136, with residence, in the gift of the Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster,

POTTERNE is a parish and village, in a small and sheltered valley, 2 miles south from Devizes station on the Great Western railway, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Potterne and Cannings, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Devizes, Potterne rural deanery (Potterne portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The village consists chiefly of two streets, the principal of which runs north and south, on the road from Devizes to Market Lavington and Salisbury. The church of St. Mary, an ancient cruciform structure of Bath stone, erected in the 13th century, was carefully restored in 1872, the roofs being almost entirely renewed and the interior being reseated and re-arranged throughout, at a cost of £2,000; the church, which is a fine specimen of the Early English style, consists of chancel, nave and transepts, with a north and south porch: the chancel contains a piscina with two basins, also an aumbry: there is another piscina in the east wall of the north transept: the oak pulpit is hexagonal in shape, and exhibits some handsome and elaborate 15th century carving: the small doorway in the tower staircase, which admitted to the rood-loft, still remains, but is filled with masonry: the tower, rising from the intersection of the transepts, is embattled, ornamented with pinnacles, and contains 6 bells: the parapet of the tower and south porches are 15th century additions: the east wall of the chancel has an arcade of five arches, three of which are pierced and filled with stained glass, as memorials to Joseph and Dionysia Meliora Medlicott, and to the Rev. Joseph Medlicott, for 33 years vicar of this parish: six others in the chancel are stained, two on the south side being memorials to Lieut.-Col. Henry Stephen Olivier, ob. 1864, and one on the north side to Col. Thomas Wilson Oldfield, ob. 1872: the south window in the south transept is also stained, and a very successful west window was added A.D. 1876: an ancient font, dating from Saxon or Norman times, was found buried under the present font, bearing an inscription, which is a Latin version of Psalm XLII.: the north transept contains many brasses and tablets to the Hunt-Grubbe family; also a small brass to Hugh Rook, ob. 1686, with skull and cross-bones engraved above the inscription; there is also a handsome mural monument in the nave to John Spearing, ob. 1831: there are 430 sittings. The register dates from the year 1557. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £433, net income, including value of 22 acres of glebe, £222, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1891 by the Rev. Edward Inman M.A. of Oriel College, Oxford, canon and prebendary of Salisbury, and rural dean of Potterne. A burial ground adjoining the churchyard, of about three-quarters of an acre, was formed in 1872 at

POULSHOT (anciently Pauls Holt) is a parish and village, 2½ miles south-west from Devizes station on the Great Western railway, and 6 south-east from Melksham, in the Eastern division of the county, petty sessional division and county court district, Melksham hundred, Devizes union, rural deanery of Potterne (Potterne portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The houses composing the village stand in irregular detached groups, interspersed with trees, on the edge of an extensive green of an oblong form, with the high road running through the centre. The church of St. Peter, 1 mile south of the village, dates from the 13th century, and is a Gothic structure, of grey stone, having chancel, nave of two bays, very narrow aisles, south porch and a western stone tower, capped by a conical roof, built by the Rev. William Fisher, a former rector, and containing 3 bells: the chancel is the earliest portion, restored in 1889, but the east window was removed in the 15th century and the present square-headed one inserted; the rood staircase is open to the north aisle, but the upper part is blocked and the screen is gone; the porch is perpendicular and retains its original timber roof and the stoup remains: the piscina and priests' door are coeval with the walls in which they occur, and the pulpit is Jacobean and of oak: there are

sittings for 230 persons. The register dates from the year 1627. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge commutation £380, average £288, net yearly value £289, with 80 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1891 by the Ven. Thomas Boughton Buchanan M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford, archdeacon of Wilts, and canon and prebendary of Salisbury. Here is a Wesleyan chapel, built in 1836, to hold 100 persons. The manor of Poulshot passed by purchase in 1543 to Thomas Long, of Trowbridge, from whom it has descended to Walter Hume Long esq. M.P. of Rood Ashton, Trowbridge, who is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is rich loam; subsoil, clay and gravel. The land is almost entirely in pasture. The area is 1,589 acres; rateable value, £3,481; the population in 1891 was 315.

PRESHUTE is a parish adjoining Marlborough on the west, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Selkley, petty sessional division of Marlborough and Ramsbury, Marlborough union and county court district, rural deanery of Marlborough (Marlborough portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. There is no village of Preshute; it is simply a wide district surrounding Marlborough, and consists of the hamlets or divisions of Manton, Clatford, Manton Down, Wick and Temple, Barton, houses on the Bath road, and the suburban portion of St. Margaret's or Elcot. The church of St. George, which was rebuilt in 1854, is a handsome edifice of flint with Bath stone, in the Early Pointed style, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, and south aisle, south porch, embattled western square tower, with pinnacles, containing 5 bells, and stands in a field about 1 mile from the Market place, Marlborough: it contains a black slate font: there are 270 sittings.

The register dates from the year 1607. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £132, gross yearly value £179, net £86, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1887 by the Rev. William Gustavus Hubbard. Here is a Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1860, to seat 100. The Marquess of Ailesbury, who is lord of the manor, Sir Henry Bruce Meux bart. and James Blake Maurice esq. M.D. Marlborough, are the principal landowners. The soil is clayey loam; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots of all kinds. The area is 4,479 acres; rateable value, £8,019; the population in 1891 was 1,311, including part of Savernake and part of Marlborough College, 46 officers and inmates in Marlborough Workhouse and 21 in Savernake Hospital.

The population of the ecclesiastical parish in 1891 was 853.

Manton village is half a mile south from the church.

The hamlet of Clatford is 2 miles west from Marlborough. Clatford Park, 2½ miles south-by-west from Marlborough, formerly extra-parochial, is now a parish; rateable value, £189; the population in 1891 was 13. St. Margaret, a suburb of Marlborough, is also in this parish, but is under the pastoral charge of the vicar of St. Mary, Marlborough.

PURTON is a parish and village, with a station on the Cheltenham branch of the Great Western railway, 8¼ miles from London, 4 north-north-east from Wootton Bassett, 6 north-west from Swindon and 4 south from Cricklade, in the Northern division of the county, Highworth hundred, petty sessional division of Cricklade, union of Cricklade and Wootton Bassett, county court district of Swindon, rural deanery of Cricklade, arch-deaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The village is pleasantly situated upon a rising ground, commanding beautiful and extensive views of the surrounding country: the Wilts and Berks canal passes through the parish. The church of St. Mary is a large and handsome structure of stone in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, south porch, with two embattled towers, the eastern one rising from the intersection of the nave and chancel, having a lofty spire, and the other in the usual position at the west end, with pinnacles, and having a peal of 5 bells: there is only one other church in England having two towers placed as these are, viz. at Wanborough in this county, 5 miles south-east from Swindon: the east window is stained, and there are memorial windows to members of the Power family, and the late Rev. D. O. Cotes, a former curate of this parish: it contains monuments to the families of Ashley-Cooper and Sadler and Dr. Maskelyne, astronomer royal, who was buried here in 1811; the church was thoroughly restored in 1872, and has sittings for 500 persons. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £410, gross yearly value £570, with residence, and 51 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Earl of Shaftesbury, and held since 1878 by the Rev. John Veysey, of Trinity College, Dublin. Here are Congregational, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. Fairs are held on the Tuesday before May 6th and the Friday after September 19th. There is a reading room and library, supported by subscription; the library contains about 240 volumes. A Workmen's Institute and Coffee Tavern was erected by James Sadler esq. in 1879. The workhouse for the Cricklade and Wootton Bassett Union is here (particulars of the union will be found under Wootton Bassett). A Cottage Hospital was established in 1877 by Mr. and Mrs. Wykeham-Martin, containing 8 beds, and since its opening has benefitted 1,000 patients; but in 1892 was turned into a Convalescent Home for children, and has benefitted 44 children. Nevil Maskelyn esq. who died about 1789, left £5 to the poor, and a payment of 10s. to a minister for preaching a sermon on Good Friday; for the last fifty years it has been distributed to all the poor who attend church on Good Friday, in shillings and sixpences, when a sermon is preached and the present vicar allows his 10s. to be distributed with the gift: Francis Glead left £200 to be given to the poor not receiving parochial aid, not less nor more than 10s.: here is also Hiscock's charity, given away on Good Friday. At Ringsbury, near the village, is a Roman camp with a double ditch, the outer one very perfect; at Red Street, in the parish, a battle was fought between the Royalists and Parliamentary forces. The famous Lord Clarendon once resided at Purton, in what is now a farmhouse, called the College farm. There are four manors in this parish—the Great Manor, of which Corwallis Wickham-Martin esq. is lord; Purton Pouchere,

of which the Earl of Shaftesbury is lord; Purton Keynes, of which Mrs. Thorne is lady; and the Little Manor, which includes Purton Common. The principal landowners are the Earl of Shaftesbury and James Sadler esq. The soil is oolite-brash; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat on the higher lands and some pasture; the area is 6,157 acres of land and 13 of water; rateable value, £17,136; the population in 1891 was 2,432, exclusive of Braydon, and including 59 officers and inmates in the Cricklade Workhouse.

At PURTON STOKE, 2 miles north in this parish, is a mineral spring, said to possess great medicinal powers, the waters of which are extensively made use of. There is a Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1867. Wall Letter Box here, cleared at 5.20 p.m.

BRAYDON, or Bradon, is a hamlet to the west of Purton, and was a forest until the fifth year of the reign of Charles II. when it was disafforested, and in lieu of the right of feeding their cattle in the forest and of picking wood, the rent of 25 acres of land at Purton Stoke was given to the poor, the first Thursday after the 6th of January, the sums varying from 15s. to £4: the poor, when once admitted, receive the charity for life. The church (unconsecrated) is a small brick structure, with western turret containing one bell, erected in 1868, and having sittings for 100 persons: the services are conducted by the vicar of Purton. Here is a Primitive Methodist chapel. The area of the hamlet is 1,478 acres; rateable value, £1,435; the population in 1891 was 63.

RAMSBURY is a parish and village, formerly a market town, and is pleasantly situated on the banks of the river Kennet, 5 miles north-west from Hungerford station on the Newbury and Devizes section of the Great Western railway, and 6 north-east from Marlborough, in the Eastern division of the county. hundred of Ramsbury, petty sessional division of Marlborough and Ramsbury, union and county court district of Hungerford, rural deanery of Marlborough (Marlborough portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The houses are situated principally in one long street. The church of the Holy Cross is an old stone building in the Norman and Early English styles, consisting of chancel with the "Darell" chapel, nave of four bays, and cle-restory added, probably about the year 1500, aisles, south porch, with square tower, embattled western tower, with pinnacles, containing 6 bells: it contains several monuments, including one to Sir William Jones, attorney-general temp. Charles II.; in the chancel in front of the communion table is a tomb to William de St. John, with an inscription in Norman French: in the Darell chapel is a tomb of Purbeck marble, which formerly bore the effigies of a knight and his lady, with the Darell crest, a Saracen's head in profile: this tomb is assigned to William Darell, sub-treasurer of England and sheriff of Wilts, temp. Richard II.: another tomb bore effigies of a knight and his two wives, probably Sir George Darell, of Littlecote, son of the above William Darell, and a stone slab to William de St. John with the date of 1322: there are 350 sittings. The

register dates from the year 1678. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £97, gross yearly value £515, net £359, including 66 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Baroness Burdett-Coutts, and held since 1892 by the Rev. Weston Brocklesby Davis M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. Here are Congregational, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels, and barracks of the Salvation Army. Tanning, malting and brewing are carried on here. Cattle fairs are held here on May 14th and October 16th. Ramsbury Manor House, the seat of Sir Francis Burdett bart. stands in a park of 100 acres, through which the river Kennet flows, expanding into a broad sheet; bounded on the south-east by extensive fir plantations: the original house was at one time a seat of the Bishops of Salisbury, but was exchanged with one of the Earls of Pembroke; that house was taken down some time before 1672, and the present building erected from the designs of Webb, an architect of eminence in his day. Littlecote Park is occupied by Nigel Baring esq.; the mansion is a fine specimen of a Tudor manor house, standing in a park, through which the Kennet flows; it was originally built by and was the seat of the Darell family; there is a fine collection of armour and of weapons; there is a figure of St. Benedict in the stained window of the ante-entrance hall. Also Crowood House, the residence of Mrs. Barton; The Cedars, the residence of Alfred Ernest Oakes esq. and the Rookery, of Mrs. Batson, are in this parish. The chief landowners are Sir Francis Burdett bart. who is lord of the manor, Francis William Ley-

borne-Popham esq. Rev. Charles Frederic Seymour M.A. of Stratford House, West hill, Putney, and Mrs. Batson. The soil is clay; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and roots. The area is 9,742 acres; rateable value, £9,286; and the population of the entire parish in 1891 was 2,164. Axford, 3 miles south-west; Eastridge, 2 miles north-east; Ramsbury Town; Whittonditch, 1 mile north-east, are tithings. At Axford there is a chapel of ease, now closed.

ROADHILL (or Roodhill) is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1852 out of North Bradley, and is on the Somersetshire border, the river Frome forming the western boundary, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-west from Trowbridge station on the Great Western railway and 10 south from Bath, in the Western division of the county, hundred and petty sessional division of Whorwellsdown, union of Westbury and Whorwellsdown, county court district of Trowbridge, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. ROLLSTONE (or Rollestone) is a parish and village, on the road from Amesbury to Devizes, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles west from Amesbury and 10 north-west from Salisbury, 6 miles north from Wishford station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Elstub, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Amesbury union, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Wylve (Wylve portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The Tidd river flows through the parish in the winter. The church of St. Andrew, pleasantly situated on a hill, is a small ancient structure of flint and stone, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and western turret with one bell; and was thoroughly repaired in 1845: there are 60 sittings.

Walsh Rev. Henry Westenra (rector)

ROWDE is a parish and compact and healthy village, on the road from Devizes to Chippenham, 2 miles north-west from Devizes station on the Great Western railway, and 6 south-west from Calne, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Potterne and Cannings, Devizes petty sessional division, county court district and union, rural deanery of Avebury (Cannings portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The village stands on a plain, a short distance from the base of Roundway Down, which here shows itself with a bold, precipitous front. The spring-head of a stream, called Rowde Forde, rises near the foot of the Down, and, as it flows onward, forms partly the boundary line between the parishes of Rowde and Bromham. The church of St. Matthew, anciently dedicated to St. Mary, is a Perpendicular structure of stone, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of three bays and aisles, north porch, with a rectangular western tower, turreted and embattled and containing a clock and 6 bells: in the chancel is a hagioscope: the church was rebuilt in 1833, excepting the tower and a portion of the chancel: it was re-seated with oak benches in 1871; in 1872 five stained windows were inserted in the aisles in memory of the Rev. A. B. Starkey M.A. late vicar: there is also one in the west side of the tower: in 1881 the organ, which stands in a chapel on the north side of the chancel, was enlarged; in 1886 the stained east window was added in memory of F. A. S. Locke esq. of Rowde Forde: a brass lectern has been presented by C. H. Lowe esq. in memory of General Gordon: and in 1887 a carved oak screen was erected at the west end by the parishioners: there are tablets in the church to Wadham F. Locke M.P. ob. 1835, to Wadham F. Locke, ob. 1854, and to the Rev. William Higginson M.A. ob. 1816, vicar of this parish for 51 years: the mural monument in the chancel is to

SALISBURY,

WITH FISHERTON ANGER, AND MILFORD.

SALISBURY, or New Sarum, is a city, municipal and parliamentary borough, on the old road to Exeter, and is the head of a diocese, petty sessional division and county court district, in the Southern division of the county, union of Alderbury, rural deanery of Wilton, archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury, 82 miles from London, or 83 by railway through Basingstoke, 95 through Eastleigh, 93 north-east from Exeter, 29 north-west from Southampton, 37 north from Bournemouth, 23 south from Devizes, 27 from Marlborough, 14½ from Romsey and 28½ west from Winchester.

The city is built in the valley at the junction of four rivers—the Avon, Wiley, Nadder and Bourne. The Avon formerly sent off small clear streams through most of the streets; but these canals, as they were locally termed, are now filled up and stopped. The extensive sewage and other sanitary improvements of the Board of Health have effectively drained every part of the city; on the south-east side, sewage disposal works were completed in 1885 at a cost of £10,000. Extensive waterworks were constructed in 1853, on the north-east of the city, at a cost of about £14,000, and the water, which, according to analysis, is considered of very pure quality, is raised by an engine from two wells to a height of about 100 feet into a covered reservoir at Bishopsdown Hill, distant about a quarter of a mile; additional machinery and a new engine house were erected and a new well sunk in 1894, at a further cost of £5,200: the works are under the management of the Urban Sanitary Authority. The works of the Fisherton Anger and Bemerton Water Works Co. on the Devizes road, supply part of the suburbs of the city. The Milford Water Works Co. Limited, erected works to the north-east of the city in 1889. The streets intersect each other at right angles, forming a series of quadrangles, called the Chequers, the houses in each quadrangle facing outwards, and the interior laid out in courts and gardens. The Market place, in the centre of the city, is a spacious square of 2½ acres, surrounded by good shops.

Salisbury was first incorporated by Henry III. but its charter was confirmed and extended by Queen Anne. The municipal borough comprises the following parishes:—St. Edmund (Salisbury), part of St. Martin (Salisbury), St. Thomas (Salisbury), part of Fisherton Anger

parish, part of Milford tithing, and the liberty of the close of the Canons of the Cathedral. Under the Municipal Act the city is divided into 3 wards, and the council consists of 24 members, who also act as the urban sanitary authority. The city has a commission of the peace and separate court of quarter sessions and its own police. The parliamentary borough comprises in addition another portion of Fisherton Anger parish, added by the "Boundary Act, 1868:" it returned two members to Parliament, but by the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," the number was reduced to one, and the area extended by including the remainder of Fisherton Anger parish and a portion of Milford.

The South Western railway from Basingstoke to Exeter passes through Salisbury, and connects it with London, and their line through Romsey gives communication with Southampton and Portsmouth; and there is a line from the city to a junction near Ringwood, on the Southampton and Dorsetshire line, which places it in connection with Christchurch and Bournemouth. The Great Western has a station here on the Salisbury and Westbury branch, connecting the city with the coal fields of Somersetshire and with Bath and Bristol.

North of the city is a desolate mound, arising abruptly from the valley on the west, and its eastern side connected with a ridge of the Downs; its deep fosses and stupendous earthen ramparts, nearly a mile in circumference, mark the site of Old Sarum, now called Old Castle, or Castle Hill. The name is said to mean, in British, a dry situation. There is reason for believing it to have been a stronghold of the Belgæ, who inhabited the western counties of Hants, Wilts and Somerset; and that it was a station of the Romans is indicated by coins of various emperors found within its area, and by three Roman roads, of which it was the converging point, from Winchester, Silchester and Dorchester, with other three, partly traceable to Bath, Ilchester and a station on the Kennet. Under the West Saxons, it first became a Christian see. King Stephen placed a garrison here, which offended the Churchmen, who, immured upon a steep and arid hill, had probably already cast many a longing glance at the fertile and irrigated meads at its foot. A new cathedral was projected; the proud fane of Salisbury arose; and, deprived of its splendid ecclesiastical establishment, this

once important and flourishing city gradually decayed and finally disappeared; a few fragments of foundations alone remain. The elevation of the inner mound is calculated to be 339 feet; within it stood the citadel, with some streets radiating from and others encircling it. In the hot summer of 1834, the extreme drought caused the ground between the entrenchments to crack, so as to discover the entire foundations of the ancient cathedral, situated, as had been supposed, on the north-west side: a very large and curious double key was found among its ruins.

A tree near Stratford was the place of nominal election for the borough of Old Sarum, but almost immediately after the Reform Act of 1832, a violent wind blew down the principal part of the tree.

Edward III. assembled a parliament at Salisbury, at which Mortimer Earl of March and his partisans attended with their armed followers. The Earls of Kent, Norfolk and Lancaster, being summoned by Mortimer to attend this parliament without an armed force, on discovering Mortimer's position, retreated to assemble their retainers and return with an army; the quarrel, however, was compromised through the intervention of the clergy. In the reign of Richard III. the Duke of Buckingham was beheaded here, and his headless remains were discovered beneath the floor of the kitchen of the "Saracen's Head" inn.

High street lies in a direct line between the old and new cities, and its continuation is called Castle street, as Old Sarum is denominated Castle Hill, The Bath road turns off from High street by a stone bridge over the Avon through the suburb of Fisherton Anger.

The diocese was originally seated at Wilton in this county, about the 10th century; subsequently transferred to Old Sarum, and ultimately, in 1217, to Salisbury: the county of Berks, excepting a small portion, was in 1836 transferred to the Oxford diocese, while the county of Dorset was taken from Bristol diocese and added to Salisbury, which now comprises the whole of the county of Dorset with the greater part of Wilts and a small portion of Berks, and within the archdeaconries of Dorset, Sarum and Wilts. Cricklade or Malmesbury deaneries were severed from Salisbury and added to Bristol diocese in 1837.

The original Cathedral was founded at Old Sarum by Bishop Osmund (1072-99), to whom a charter of foundation was granted by William Rufus, April 5th, 1091, and the edifice was dedicated on the same day in the succeeding year, but it was translated to New Sarum in 1220.

The existing Cathedral of St. Mary, beautifully situated within a spacious grassy close of half a square mile in extent, fringed with magnificent trees, is a structure of Chilmark stone, quarried about 15 miles from the city, in the purest form of Early English, and is the only English cathedral completed in one style, on a well-arranged and uniform plan: fortunate both in its site and seclusion, it possesses advantages equally enjoyed by no other similar edifice in the kingdom, and "its beautiful symmetry of outline, its fine dimensions, consummate unity of effect, incomparable disposition of parts, its exquisite grace and simplicity, the uniformity of its architecture, and its unrivalled spire," never fail to produce on the beholder an indelible impression: the ground plan is perfect, and consists of a nave of ten bays, with aisles and a north porch, a main transept of four bays in each wing, central tower with spire, choir of six bays with aisles, choir transept of three bays in each wing and an eastern Lady chapel of four bays with aisles: south of the choir transept is an octagonal muniment room, and south of the nave, but detached from it, are the cloisters and chapter house.

The most striking features of the exterior, an uninterrupted view of which can be obtained on every side, are "the western front with its lateral turrets, the superb spire, the large and deep north porch, with a chamber above it, and the two transepts, one at the crossing and the other at the junction of the choir and presbytery." The western front or screen, a composition of the highest beauty, consists of a central compartment or bay, acutely gabled, and embattled wings, flanked by square turrets, terminating in short spires with small spirelets at the angles: the central bay is lighted by three tall lancets, and below these are three deeply-recessed pedimented porches, the middle one forming the chief entrance: and two similar porches are placed on either side of the screen, the whole of which, except the principal bay, is covered with five tiers of varied arcading, relieved by a broad band of quatrefoil work at about half its height: the lofty north porch is richly arcaded within, and has a crocketed gable set between

shafted turrets finished with spirelets; the tower, rising in the centre of the main transept, is of three storeys, the two uppermost being lighted by four canopied two-light windows in each face, divided by buttresses and enriched with tracery and niches: at each angle rises an octangular turret, and from the midst of four pinnacles springs the octangular spire, to a height of 400 feet, adorned with three bands of rich quatrefoil work: it has canopied dormers to the points of the compass, and its angles, decorated with the ball flower ornament, present a slightly broken outline against the sky; the curious timber framing of its interior is at once bold and ingenious, but it was ascertained by Mr. F. Price, architect, about 1740, to be $24\frac{1}{2}$ inches out of the perpendicular on the south and $16\frac{1}{4}$ inches on the west: it was braced with iron by Sir Christopher Wren in 1668, and no further settlement has been observed since 1681.

The cathedral was begun in 1220, the foundations having been laid by Bishop Poore on April 28th in that year, and the first service was held Sept. 29th, 1225: the work was continued by Bishops Bingham (1229-47) and William of York (1247-56), and on the 29th Sept. 1258, after an expenditure of 40,000 marks, or about £26,666, the building was consecrated by Bishop Bridport in the presence of Henry III. and was finally dedicated on Lady Day in 1260. The cloisters and chapter house were finished in 1263-70, by Bishop Walter de la Wyle: the tower carried up about 1330 by Bishop Wyville: the spire, begun in 1335 by Nicholas de Portland, was completed in 1375 by Richard de Farleigh, who designed the Abbeys of Bath and Reading: Bishop Beauchamp (1450-82) built a chapel, destroyed by Wyatt in 1792, on the south side of the Lady chapel, and erected the great hall of the palace: Bishop Audley (1502-24) built the chantry on the north side of the choir: and in 1476 Lord Hungerford's chapel, also demolished by Wyatt, was erected on the north side of the Lady chapel: Bishop Ward (1667-89) renewed the stall and screen, and laid down the marble flooring of the choir; the work being carried out under the direction of Sir Christopher Wren, who also surveyed and braced the spire. In 1741, June 21st, the spire was struck by lightning and set on fire, but did not receive any serious damage. Bishop Hume (1766-82) removed Wren's stalls and screen, and replaced them by others. During the prelacy of Bishop Shute Barrington (1782-91) the cathedral was repaired and altered, and at the same time scandalously mutilated, by the notorious architect James Wyatt, at a cost of £26,000, under whose direction the Beauchamp and Hungerford chapels were demolished, and their ornamental portions used up in the reconstruction of the reredos, organ screen and choir stalls; he also removed two porches, the screens inclosing the transept, obliterated with colour wash the curious paintings on the vaulting of the choir and eastern transept, and displacing many of the monuments, especially in the Lady chapel, arranged them in two formal rows down the nave; simultaneously a detached Early English clochard or bell-tower, of three decreasing stages with a spire, which stood north-west of the church and contained 8 bells, was wholly destroyed. In 1827 various repairs to the spire were carried out by means of an ingenious wicker contrivance suspended from the top: the interior has since been cleared of whitewash and colouring, the marble shafting of the piers renewed, and the roof paintings referred to above, representing the hallowing of human labour by the Son of Man and His glorification, together with scenes from the Apocalypse, have been carefully disclosed, and, where necessary, repainted: the 13th century choir stalls and the Bishop's throne have also been restored by the clergy and laity of the diocese, in memory of Bishop Hamilton (1854-69). More recently the porch has been restored and an oak lobby erected as a memorial of the late Dean Hamilton, by his widow, the stone screen removed, and a screen of metal-work erected, adorned with filagree work and surmounted by a cross.

From 1873 to 1892, the sums expended on the cathedral amounted in all to £49,548 18s.

The piers of the nave consist of four clustered columns, with as many shafts of Purbeck marble, supporting elegant pointed arches; the triforium has two couplets of trefoil arches in each bay, with a quatrefoil in the head: the clerestory displays triplets of lancets, and the vaulting is plain.

The main transept has two peculiar adjuncts in the beautifully designed arches erected between the arches of the crossing soon after the building of the tower, which had already shown signs of weakness in the north-east transept; against the western wall of the north-east transept is placed the ancient rood screen;

the north wing retains also an Early Perpendicular lavatory removed from the sacristy, and a double aumbry; in the south wing is a double aumbry and a piscina combined with parts of ancient doors.

The choir retains some Early English stall work, and a few stalls and misericords of the time of Henry VII. and the Bishop's throne, of rich canopied work disposed in a pyramidal form: the organ, built by Green, in 1792, and presented by George III. has been replaced by a new one, presented, at a cost of £3,500, by Miss Chafyn Grove, of Zeals, and inclosed in an oak case, provided in 1883, at a cost of £1,200. In the south side, adjoining the south end of the choir transept, is an octagonal sacristy and muniment room, where is preserved an Early English chest, a paten and chalice, an episcopal ring, a 15th century cope of green and gold, and a wooden pastoral staff of the 13th century.

The Lady chapel, formerly separated from the presbytery by a screen, removed in 1789-90, is uniquely divided into three alleys by slender columns of Purbeck marble: the former reredos, composed of fragments of the Beauchamp and Hungerford chapels, was destroyed by Wyatt: a new reredos, an exquisite work in the Early English style, has been presented for the high altar of the choir by Earl Beauchamp, in memory of his ancestor Bishop Beauchamp (1450-82). The shrine of St. Osmund stood in the first bay of this chapel, and in the presbytery are two chapels at the sides of the altar, above which was the watching loft.

The cloisters, situated at the south of the nave, but detached from it, form a beautiful quadrangle, 181 feet square, the most perfect of the kind now remaining, surrounding a fine sward shadowed by cedars; they are connected with the cathedral at the south-west angle of the main transept, and again by the consistory court at the west end of the nave. On the east side is a fine octagonal chapter house, supported by a central shafted pillar and lighted by eight large traceried windows, below which runs a continuous arcading; in the spandrils are sculptures of scripture subjects, from the Creation to the Exodus, restored by Philip; over the entrance is represented in polychrome the Pyschomachia of Prudentius; it was restored in 1856 by Mr. H. Clutton, and the roof painted by Hudson, as a memorial to Bishop Denison.

The library, built by Bishop Jewel, over the eastern alley, contains MSS. of the Venerable Bede of the 9th century, and of Geoffrey of Monmouth and St. Augustine of the 8th and 10th centuries, a Bible of the 13th century, and a Liturgy, with Saxon version; some of the earlier books were given by Bishop Gheast (1571-8): it now contains 187 volumes of MSS. and 4,990 of printed books.

The cathedral, owing largely to the destructiveness of Wyatt, who, it is said, "threw it by the cart-load into the city ditch," contains but little ancient stained glass: some portions of the Early English glass (1240-80) removed from the chapter house are retained in several of the windows, and the western triplet contains Perpendicular and Cinque-Cento glass from Dijon and Exeter, but there are no complete windows of an earlier date than 1782; the east window of the choir, designed by S. H. Mortimer, and presented by Jacob, Earl of Radnor, in 1782, represents "The Raising of the Brazen Serpent;" the east window of the Lady chapel, designed by Sir Joshua Reynolds, and executed by Eginton, represents the "Resurrection;" there are memorial windows to Mary, Countess of Radnor, who died 5th April, 1879; to the wife of the Rev. Canon Swayne, and to the 62nd (Duke of Edinburgh's) Regiment, and in July, 1884, a memorial window was placed in the south transept to Sir George Alfred Arney, late Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Zealand: a memorial window in the south choir aisle is to H.R.H. Duke of Albany K.G.: a triple lancet in the north-east transept to the memory of Mrs. W. K. Hamilton, widow of Bishop Hamilton: a double lancet in east nave aisle to the memory of W. Martin Coates: a single lancet in north transept to the late Mr. Middleton, by his widow.

The monuments in the cathedral include those of the following bishops:—Osmund, 1099; Roger, 1139, and Joscelyne, 1184, both with effigies in bas relief; Richard Poore, 1237, altar tomb and effigy of Purbeck marble; Robert Bingham, 1246, canopied arch with cadaver; Wm. of York, 1256, with canopied arch; Giles de Bridport, 1263, tomb with effigy and small chantry, enriched with biographical sculptures: Walter De la Wyle, 1274; Roger de Mortival, 1329, slab with floriated cross; Robert Wyville, 1375, with incised brass of the bishop's champion before Sherborne Castle; Richard Metford, 1407, effigy under canopy; Richard Beauchamp, 1482, altar tomb; Lionel Woodville, 1484, and John Blythe, 1500, both

altar tombs; Edmund Audley, 1524, chantry; John Salcot or Capon, 1555, altar tomb; John Jewell, 1571; John Davenant, 1641, mural monument; Seth Ward, 1689, tomb with bust; John Fisher, 1825, altar tomb; and Walter Kerr Hamilton, 1869, tomb with effigy. The slab of the tomb of St. Osmund de Seez, founder of the Cathedral of Old Sarum, and compiler of the "Sarum Use," was in 1885 fixed in the south aisle of the Lady chapel. The other principal monuments are:—William Longespée, first Earl of Salisbury and son of Fair Rosamund, 1226, altar tomb with effigy; William Longespée, second earl, killed near Cairo, 1250, and buried at Acre, effigy; Sir John de Montacute, 1389, altar tomb with effigy; Robert, Lord Hungerford, 1459, altar tomb with effigy; William Wilton, Chancellor of Sarum, 1506, altar tomb; Sir John Cheney, standard bearer of Henry of Richmond at Bosworth, 1509, effigy; Sir T. Gorges, 1635, effigy; Lord Stourton, 1556, altar tomb; Edward Seymour, Earl of Hertford, 1621, and Lady Katherine his wife, 1567, effigies; Sir Robert Hyde, Chief Justice of the King's Bench, 1665, mural tablet with bust; Sir Richard Mompesson, 1627, and wife, effigies; Edward Thomas, Lord Wyndham of Finglass, Chancellor and Lord Justice of Ireland, 1745, tomb with marble statue of "Hibernia;" James Harris, author of "Hermes," 1780, monument by Bacon; James Harris, first Earl of Malmesbury, 1820, by Chantrey; to Sir Richard Colt Hoare bart. the antiquary, 1838, by Lucas; and to Henry Jacob, 1862; a brass to Henry Parry Liddon D.D., D.C.L. 1893. The monument of Bishop Moberley, designed by Sir Arthur Blomfield, consists of an arched recess, with gabled and traceried panels, 1885. The episcopal effigies include a diminutive one in bas relief of the 13th century, found in 1680 near the pulpit; it has no inscription, but has been conjectured to represent a "Boy-Bishop" of the choristers, whose office lasted from the festival of St. Nicholas (the patron saint of boys), December 6, until that of the Holy Innocents, December 28, or till Epiphany; another reputed memorial of this kind, bearing a pastoral staff in relief, is preserved in the church of West Wittering, Sussex.

The churchyard, or lawn of the Close, was a place of burial till the time of Bishop Barrington. A broad gravelled and shaded mall, which forms the approach to the great western entrance of the cathedral, and crosses the Close from north to south, is the favourite summer evening promenade. The Close has three gates: that on the south side communicates with Harnham and the contiguous country; that on the north with High street and the body of the city; and that on the east with St. Ann street and the road to Southampton: adjoining the north gate is the Matrons' college, founded by Bishop Ward for ten ladies, widows of clergymen of the diocese of Exeter as originally constituted. The south quarter of the Close is occupied by the Bishop's palace and gardens, dividing the city from the more ancient village of Harnham.

The Palace is an embattled structure of Early Perpendicular date, with a chapel and tower of that period, and a hall dating from 1460: in the palace is a series of portraits of bishops from Brian Duppa (1641-65) to Thomas Burgess (1825-37).

The undercroft, built by Bishop Poore, has been restored by Bishop Wordsworth 1889.

The Church house for the diocese is a building of two storeys in the Late Perpendicular style of Domestic Gothic. The structure, formerly known as Crane House, was built in the 16th century by a wealthy wool stapler whose merchants' mark exists on various parts of the building; from the family of the builder it passed by purchase to the Touchets, Barons Audley: in 1631 it was forfeited to the Crown, and afterwards granted in perpetuity to the see, and was transferred by one of the bishops to the Corporation, and has been restored as a Church house under the direction of Messrs. Crickmay and Sons, architects, of Weymouth: it consists of two unequal blocks placed at right angles to each other, and partially inclosing a court-yard: the north front faces Crane street, and on the western side is a garden stretching to the river: the southern portion of the existing structure remains to be dealt with at some future time. The building fund is estimated at from £3,500 to £4,000, and the freehold has been purchased at a cost of £1,600: the library, restored and fitted, at an expense of £500, by Miss Chafyn Grove: a depôt for the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge and for the National Society is also completed: and the interior also includes a large room for meetings of different societies, a committee room, general and ladies' waiting rooms, porter's lodge &c

Besides the cathedral Salisbury contains three parish churches.

St. Martin's was thoroughly restored in 1886 at a cost of £3,000; it is in the highest part of the town, on its south-eastern confines, and considered the most ancient in the city; it is a stone edifice in the Perpendicular style: it has an Early English chancel, nave of 5 bays and aisles, with square tower containing 8 bells, surmounted by a spire; the entrance is through the base of the tower: the east window is stained; there are six other stained windows in the chancel, and one in the south aisle: on the north side of the chancel is a handsome monument of the Swayne family; and a brass dated 1632: the church was repaired and re-seated with open benches in 1850: there are 500 sittings. The register dates from 1559, and is written in Latin up to 1620. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £304, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1894 by the Rev. Charles Myers M.A. of Balliol College, Oxford. Part of the parish of St. Martin's, designated Milford, is in the charge of the Rev. Henry J. Trueman M.A. of Clare College, Cambridge. For particulars of St. Mark's church, see Milford.

St. Edmund's church stands on the north-east extremity of the city, in an extensive churchyard planted with lime trees, and is a handsome edifice of stone of the 15th century; it has chancel, nave of five bays, aisles and two chapels, with square embattled tower, restored in 1889, having pinnacles at each corner, and containing a clock and 8 bells: the church was restored from designs by the late Sir G. Gilbert Scott R.A. at a cost of more than £7,000: the chancel has been rebuilt, and the aisles lengthened: the east and several other windows are stained: there are 800 sittings. The register dates from the year 1538. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £309, net £230, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1890 by the Rev. John David Morrice M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge.

The church of St. Thomas of Canterbury, erected as a chapel of ease to the cathedral in 1240, is a building of stone, in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, nave of five bays, aisles and an embattled western tower containing a clock with chimes and 8 bells: the roof is of oak, handsomely carved and panelled: the entrance is through the base of the tower: the organ was originally presented to the cathedral by George III.: the east window is stained: in the south aisle are two monuments, each with two kneeling figures, to Charles Eyre esq. founder of an hospital in this city: under the tower entrance is a carving in oak, roughly executed by one Humphrey Beckham, and representing a series of subjects in the lives of the Patriarchs: the chancel was restored under the direction of the late G. E. Street esq. R.A.: the church affords 1,200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1570. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £300, net £295, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter, and held since 1894 by the Rev. William John Birkbeck M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford.

The handsome Catholic church, dedicated to St. Osmund, in Exeter street, was built in 1848, from a design by the late Mr. Welby Pugin, and consists of chancel, nave and south aisle, with western tower, containing one bell, through the base of which is the entrance: the church has 240 sittings: near the church are the schools, conducted by the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul.

The Congregational church, in Fisherton street, was opened June 11, 1879, having been erected at a cost of £11,000: it is in the Early Decorated Gothic style, and consists of nave, aisles and apse (with organ chamber and vestry on either side of the apse), and tower and spire rising to a height of 132 feet: the church will seat 500 persons: school buildings have been added at a cost of £1,100.

There is a Baptist chapel in Brown street erected in 1860 and having 500 sittings.

There are two Primitive Methodist chapels, one in Fisherton street, erected in 1869, will seat 450 persons, and another in St. Mark's road, built in 1890, with 180 sittings.

The Wesleyans have two chapels, one in Church street, St. Edmunds, erected in 1800 to hold 800 persons, and another in Wilton road, erected in 1880 and has 400 sittings.

The Christian Brethren have two meeting places in the city, one in Guilder lane, built of iron and having 250 seats, and the other in Church fields, erected in 1860 and will hold 400 persons.

There are two cemeteries, that for Salisbury, 16 acres in extent, is about three-quarters of a mile north-east of the town, on the London road; 8 acres were opened in 1857 and the additional 8 acres in 1888; it is under the control of a burial board of 18 members; and the other for Fisherton, 4½ acres in extent, about the same distance

north-west on the Devizes road, opened in 1856, originally comprised 2½ acres, 2 more being added in 1885; it is under the control of a burial board of 6 members: each has two mortuary chapels.

The Council House, a building of white brick, with stone portico, erected in the year 1795 at the sole expense of the then Earl of Radnor, is advantageously placed at the south-east angle of the Market place: it contains on one spacious floor the two courts, a council-room for the Corporation, 75 feet long, and retiring-rooms for the judges, officers and witnesses, waiting-rooms for witnesses and other convenient apartments; in front of the Council House, on a pedestal of granite, is a bronze statue by Baron Marochetti, of Sidney, son of 11th Earl of Pembroke, Secretary for War, and created Lord Herbert of Lea, who died August 2, 1861.

The County Hall, erected in 1889 from designs of Mr. Fred Bath F.R.I.B.A., F.S.I. architect, of Salisbury, through the public spirit of Mr. Councillor Whitehead, is a commanding building in the Queen Anne style, at the corner of Endless street and Chipper lane, and is a great ornament to the city: the interior of the hall is artistic and elegant, and is well fitted up for theatrical performances (with a stage 46 feet by 30 feet), concerts, lectures, public meetings, balls, assemblies, bazaars and exhibitions, having well-arranged entrances with special exits in case of fire or panic: it has seating accommodation for 650 persons, with a balcony for 350 additional persons: the hall has excellent acoustic properties, the sanitary, ventilation, heating and lighting appliances being of the latest description, with dressing and cloak rooms, and ample lavatory accommodation; Mr. Arthur Whitehead is proprietor and manager.

The Lent assize in March has been transferred for greater convenience to Devizes, but the Summer assize is held here.

A commodious Corn Exchange, erected in 1859, at the north-west corner of the Market place, is connected by means of a branch railway with the stations at Fisherton. The great corn market is on Tuesday, the cattle market every other Tuesday, and a cheese market is held on the second Thursday in each month.

Fairs are held on the Monday before the 5th of April and on the first Tuesday after Weyhill fair, which is held on the 10th of October. A very large sheep fair is held at the Butts on the 15th of July. Formerly a large pleasure fair was held on Whit Monday and Tuesday, in the square and churchyard of the cathedral close: but the Dean and Chapter, who received the tolls under an old charter, have caused it to be discontinued.

The local trade is limited to the necessary supply of the city and of the numerous villages around, whose inhabitants frequent the markets every Tuesday and Saturday. Messrs. Yates & Co. Limited of Wilton established a branch factory for carpets and rugs here in 1889, and Messrs. Moore Brothers & Co. Limited have an extensive boot manufactory. Here are also tanneries, breweries and flour mills.

At the junction of Silver street, the Butcher row and Minster street stands the Poultry Cross, formerly called the Yarn Market, which strongly resembles in its general design the cross at Malmesbury: it is hexagonal in plan, and has six open arches on buttressed piers terminating in crocketed pinnacles rising above a pierced parapet: over each arch is a canopied niche: the roof is supported by a central pillar continued through it: flying ogee buttresses from the angles of the structure meet the upper shaft, and the whole is surmounted by an open canopied tabernacle, finished with a cross. This building is said to have been erected in the reign of Richard II. (1377-99) as an act of penance for heterodoxy, some accounts describing it as the work of Lawrence de St. Martin, of Wardour Castle, and others attributing it to one of the Earls of Salisbury.

Races are held on two days in May, on the race plain beyond Harnham hill.

Salisbury is the head quarters of Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry Cavalry (Prince of Wales' Own Royal Regiment), and of the A and B Companies of 1st Wiltshire Rifle Volunteers.

The Salisbury and South Wilts Museum, in St. Ann's street, is open to the public gratis daily, viz.: except Friday and Sunday, during the hours of daylight: it contains local objects of art and antiquity, and geological and other collections: among the local contents is the Giant and attendant Hob nob or Hobby horse, which were important features in guild processions in this city, and are the only specimens remaining in the country.

The Blackmore Museum, St. Ann's street, was founded by the late Mr. William Blackmore in 1864, and on his

decease was vested in the governing body of the Salisbury and South Wilts Museum to be in their charge so long as they can find funds for its support—it may be seen on the same days, at the same hours, and under the same conditions as the other museum: the collection is ethnological, and contains an important series of flint implements, both English and foreign; the collection of stone pipes is very curious: the object of the founder was to make the collection illustrative of the different phases of the “stone age” in various countries, with examples of the primitive use of copper, bronze and iron.

The Free Public Library, in Endless street, opened in 1890, consists of reading and reference libraries, and a lending department: there are about 3,500 volumes.

The Halle of John Halle, an old banqueting hall, is a fine specimen of late 15th century work; the present owner has recently put in a new front to the old premises, from the designs of Mr. Fred Bath, strictly harmonizing with the style of the old Hall, which illustrates in wood and stone all the principal events connected with the Halle and life of the original owner.

There are three newspapers published in the city.

A religious house, adjoining the church of St. Edmund, was founded here in the 13th century by Bishop de la Wyle, and dedicated to St. Edmund: it was under the charge of a provost and 12 canons; the church of St. Edmund was founded at the same time, and formed the collegiate church, during three centuries, this college having been seized by the Crown, had been devoted to secular purposes: in 1873 it was purchased from the then possessors by the present occupier, the Rev. George Hugh Bourne D.C.L. of Corpus Christi college, Oxford: a number of antique military weapons and accoutrements have been dug up in its ground, supposed to be memorials of the great battle of Old Sarum, fought between the Saxons and Britons in 552.

Close to Harnham bridge over the Avon, in a pretty but low situation, stands the Hospital of St. Nicholas, said to have been built in 1220, by Countess Ela, wife of the sixth Earl of Salisbury, for six aged men and as many women, with a small chapel attached. There was also erected in 1863, near to Fisherton church, three dwelling-houses (now increased to six), called St. Paul's Home, founded and endowed by the late Francis Attwood esq. of the Close, for widows or daughters of clergymen of the dioceses of Salisbury and Winchester, with annuity to each of £30, provision being made for payment of rates and taxes and for a gardener to keep the grounds: the structure is handsome and well built. The city contains a great number of asylums for the aged and infirm, and charitable institutions for educational purposes, and a school for preparing indigent girls of the respectable classes for superior service: there is in the Close a normal training school for female teachers, under the management of a committee consisting of the bishop, clergy and some of the leading laymen of the diocese.

The Salisbury Diocesan Home of Mercy, in St. Martin's Church street, established in 1831, is for the reception of penitents under the care of the Community of St. John the Baptist, whose principal house is at Clewer, near Windsor: a new wing consisting of a laundry and dormitories was added in 1892, and in 1894 a memorial chapel to the late Hon. P. Christopher Bouverie was opened: it is of red brick with stone facings, in the Early English style, consisting of apsidal chancel, nave, organ chamber and vestry: the building will seat 90. The house is available for 30 penitents.

About £500 from various charities is distributed in money and kind.

The Victoria Park, distant about half-a-mile from the Market place, is the permanent local memorial of the jubilee of the reign of Queen Victoria: it was purchased by public subscription at a cost of £1,600 from the Dean and Chapter, who sold the land much below its actual value for this purpose: it consists of 16 acres, and has been laid out, part as gardens and the remainder as cricket field, tennis courts, football ground and a cycling track a quarter of a mile in circumference: an ornamental band stand, cricket pavilion, shelter and other buildings have been erected; many thousands of plants, shrubs and trees have been planted, and these with the buildings have wholly been provided by special gifts and by public subscriptions. The whole has been laid out and the principal buildings erected from the designs and under the superintendence of Mr. Fred Bath F.R.I.B.A., F.S.I. of Salisbury, the honorary architect of the trustees, who are publicly elected, the honorary secretary being Mr. George Fullford and the chairman Mr. Fred Griffin, who was Jubilee mayor, and to whose energy, liberality and public spirit much of the success of the park is due.

The Fawcett statue was erected in honour of Henry Fawcett esq. M.P. who was born in 1833 in Queen street (a house nearly opposite to where the statue stands). He was the second son of Alderman William Fawcett, who was mayor in 1832, when he presided over a great dinner of the citizens held in the Market place, to celebrate the passing of the Reform Bill. Henry Fawcett represented first Brighton and afterwards Hackney in Parliament, became Postmaster-General in Mr. Gladstone's second administration, and was for many years professor of Political Economy in the University of Cambridge. He died Nov. 6, 1884, at Cambridge, and was buried at Trumpington, near Cambridge. Mr. Henry Richard Pinker was commissioned to provide a bronze statue on a pedestal of grey Cornish granite, to be erected in the Market place at a cost of about £900, and it was finished and unveiled by the Earl of Pembroke in May, 1887.

The area of the borough is 598½ acres; rateable value, £60,971.

The rateable value of St. Edmund's parish is £11,548; of St. Martin's, £6,007; of St. Thomas, £12,970; of the Close, £4,129; of Fisherton Anger, £18,951; and of Milford tithing, £18,115.

The population of the wards in 1891 was:—St. Edmund, 6,091; St. Martin, 4,455; St. Thomas, 4,987.

Fisherton Anger is a parish, and was a village much more ancient than the city of Salisbury, of which it now forms a populous suburb, on the west side of the river Avon, a stone bridge of 2 arches connecting the two places; part of it is within the municipal borough of Salisbury, and the whole within the extended parliamentary borough of Salisbury, and is in the hundred of Branch and Dole and the union of Alderbury. In this parish are the stations of the South Western and Great Western railways close together, the former retaining its old station at Milford, on the south-east side of the city, for the goods department. The old church of St. Clement has been pulled down and St. Paul's erected in 1852, in the Early English style, on a site near the railway stations: it is of stone and cut flint and has chancel, nave of six bays, aisles, south porch and a square tower containing a clock and 6 bells, surmounted by a low spire: the north aisle was added in 1876: the register dates from the year 1652. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £112, gross yearly value £300, net £245, with residence and glebe (£115), in the gift of trustees, and held since 1873 by the Rev. Edgar Nembhard Thwaites. Hayter's charity of £400 yearly is for 8 poor women, who receive 10s. 6d. each weekly. Here is the Fisherton House Lunatic Asylum, the largest private asylum in England, capable of holding 672 patients; Dr. William Corbin Finch is the proprietor. Here is the capacious and admirably conducted Infirmary, built 1766, by voluntary contributions and incorporated by Royal Charter, 1862; number of in-patients average 95 daily, and out-patients admitted during 1893 amounted to 3,900: it has a convalescent home in connection with it at Bournemouth.

The clock tower, in Fisherton street, near the Infirmary, is of stone supporting an illuminated clock with four dials, and was erected in 1892, by John Roberts M.D. of this city, in memory of his wife Arabella.

A Memorial hall for evangelistic religious services was erected in 1880 from the designs of Mr. Fred Bath, to the memory of John Maundrel, a Wiltshire yeoman and Protestant martyr, who was burnt to death at Salisbury in 1556; the building, seating 600 persons, is prettily designed inside, and has excellent acoustic properties. Earl Nelson D.L., J.P. is lord of the manor. The area is 340 acres; rateable value, £18,951; the

population in 1861 was 2,424; in 1881, 4,783; and in 1891 was 5,149

Milford is a tithing, in the parish of St. Martin, adjoining to and a portion of it forming part of the parliamentary borough of Salisbury on the east, in the hundred of Underditch and union of Alderbury: the village or hamlet of Milford is about half a mile further east. St. Mark's district church, on the London road, built in 1893, at a total cost of £6,530, from designs of Mr.

J. R. Reeve, is an edifice of stone in the Perpendicular style, consisting at present only of chancel, one bay of the nave, transepts, side chapel, organ chamber, vestries and the base of a central tower: there are sittings for 400. The Rev. Henry Joseph Trueman M.A. of Clare College, Cambridge, has been curate-in-charge since 1894. The Bishop of Salisbury is lord of the manor. The area is 1,350 acres of land and 13 of water; rateable value, £18,115; the population in 1881 was 1,573; and in 1891 was 3,989.

The Theological College, The Close, was founded by Bishop Hamilton: the buildings consist of principal's house, 20 sets of students' rooms, chapel, library, dining hall, fives court & offices; Rev. Prebendary Benjamin Whitefoord M.A. principal; Rev. Henry Julian White B.A. vice-principal; Rev. L. K. Hilton M.A. & Rev. H. L. Goudge M.A. tutors

The School of Science & Art occupies premises in New street, formerly used by the Literary & Scientific Institution, now extinct: at the rear of this formerly stood Hamilton Hall, which has now been removed, & on its site an Art Gallery has been erected at the sole cost of Dr. Roberts, a resident of this city, & given to the School of Science & Art for the use of their classes; the arrangements have been carried out under the superintendence of the master of the school, Mr. Joseph Harris; Messrs. Harding & Son were the architects; the school is in connection with the Department of Science & Art, Kensington, & was taken over by the corporation in 1894; Joseph Harris, head master; William Maxwell Hammick, hon. sec

A Public Elementary Higher Grade School, in which technical education will be given to 200 boys, was built in 1889 at the sole expense of Bishop Wordsworth, on a site adjoining the Palace grounds, fronting Exeter

street; Reuben Bracher, master; there is a boarding house attached, accommodating 30 boys, built in 1893

Training College for National Schoolmistresses, The Close; Miss Hill, lady superintendent

Salisbury School is pleasantly situated on the London road; Rev. John Christopher Alcock M.A. Oxon. head master; assisted by Gilbert H. Nott B.A. Balliol College, Oxon, Rev. David R. Evans B.A. Oxon & Herbert E. Mayston, London University

Godolphin High School for Girls, Milford hill, was founded in 1708, to provide education & maintenance for 8 orphan children of gentlewomen; but under a new scheme framed in 1886 by the Charity Commissioners the school now gives a first-class high school education to over 80 pupils: there are six scholarships awarded to girls of not less than 12 years of age, entitling the holder to all the benefits of the school for a yearly payment of £20; Miss Mary Alice Douglas, head mistress

St. Thomas' (Central) National (near the church), erected in 1858, a new boys' school being added in 1891, for 190 boys & 170 girls & 130 infants; average attendance, 150 boys & 155 girls & 76 infants; William George Gane, master; Miss Ruth Hunt, mistress; Miss Emma Ruth Walters, infants' mistress

The Fisherton New Schools, erected in 1890, from designs of Mr. Fred Bath F.R.I.B.A., F.S.I. architect, are for 330 boys & 150 junior girls: the building, of Gothic character, is of red brick with stone dressings, & is nearly opposite St. Paul's church, the rector of which (the Rev. Edgar N. Thwaites) being chairman of the school committee; Arthur Smith, master; Miss Louisa Pryor, mistress

SAVERNAKE is an ecclesiastical parish formed in 1854, comprising North and South Savernake, in which are situated the hamlets of Cadley and Brimslade, and parts of the parishes of Burbage and Preshute, 2½ miles south-east from Marlborough terminal station, on a branch of the Great Western railway, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Kinwardstone, Marlborough union and county court district, petty sessional division of Marlborough and Ramsbury, rural deanery of Marlborough (Marlborough portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. Christ Church, situated at Cadley, is a stone building, in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, nave, south porch and dwarf western tower containing one bell: there are 200 sittings. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £77, gross yearly value £150, net £137, with residence, in the gift of the Marquess of Ailesbury, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Archibald Ewart Clark-Kennedy B.A. of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. The Marquess of Ailesbury is the principal landowner.

The soil is principally clay and green sand; subsoil, partly chalk and sand. The chief crops are wheat, oats and roots of different descriptions. SAVERNAKE FOREST (St. Katharine's consolidated chapelry) is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1864 out of the parishes of Great and Little Bedwyn and Burbage, 5 miles south-east from Marlborough terminal station on a branch of the Great Western railway, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Kinwardstone, unions of Pewsey, Marlborough and Hungerford, petty sessional division of Marlborough and Ramsbury, county court district of Marlborough, rural deanery of Marlborough (Marlborough portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. St. Katharine's church is a handsome stone Gothic structure, erected in 1861 at the cost of Mary Caroline, Dowager Marchioness of Ailesbury, in memory of her mother, Katharine Woronzow, the Countess of Pembroke, through whose liberality she was enabled to build it: it consists of chancel, nave of three bays, north aisle, transept, south porch and square western tower, with spire, containing a peal of 5 bells: the whole of the windows are stained, and there is an organ: the architecture of the church is in the style of Geometrical Decorated: T. H. Wyatt was the architect: there are 312 sittings. The register dates from the year 1861. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £300, with residence, in the gift of the Marquess of Ailesbury, and held since 1878 by the Rev. Francis William Carré LL.B. of Christ's College, Cambridge. Savernake Forest House, the seat of the Most

Noble the Marquess of Ailesbury, is a noble mansion in the Corinthian style of architecture, and is surrounded by forests and plantations of about 4,000 acres, which abound with deer and game; the grand avenue, about 4 miles long, is bounded by magnificent beeches and there are some fine specimens of timber trees in the forest, which includes a spot known as the "Eight Walks," where eight roads converge; and the whole is considered to be a fine example of a primeval forest covered with bracken; the house is now unoccupied. The Marquess is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is clay; subsoil, gravel. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots of different descriptions. The area is 3,705 acres; rateable value, £1,962; the population in 1891 was 437.

SEDGEHILL (or Sedghill) is a parish on the Dorsetshire border, $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles north-west from Semley station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, and 3 north from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, county court district of Shaftesbury, hundred of Dunworth, Mere union, Tisbury petty sessional division, Chalke rural deanery (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Catherine is an edifice of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, which was added in 1844, nave, with a square tower at the west end surmounted by pinnacles, which was rebuilt in 1844, and contains 5 bells, two of which were added in 1892, the gift of the rector and Mr. William Lush: there is also a large porch on the south side: there are 150 sittings. In the churchyard is a Saxon cross. The register dates from the year 1760. The living is a chapelry, incorporated with the rectory of Berwick St. Leonard, commuted tithes £250,

SEEND is a parish and village, with a station about a mile from the village, on the Berks and Hants Extension of the Great Western railway, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-east-by-east from Melksham, 4 west from Devizes and 93 from London, in the Western division of the county, union, petty sessional division, hundred and county court district of Melksham, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The village is seated on an eminence commanding some fine and extensive views of the surrounding country, and is partly supplied with water from the Trowbridge Water Works. The Kennet and Avon canal passes through. The church of the Holy Cross is a handsome stone structure, in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel (built in 1876), nave of four bays, aisles, north and south porches and square western tower, surmounted by battlements and pinnacles, and containing 6 bells and clock: there is a brass in good preservation, bearing date 1498, to John Stokys, founder of the north aisle, and many monuments to the Seymours, Schomburgs, Ludlow-Bruges, Lockes, Awdrys, Dugdales, and one to Adam Wragg and family: the church in 1885 was enriched by three handsome stained windows, a reredos of carved stone and marble stone pulpit and carved oak lectern: in 1889 a fine organ was placed in the church at a cost of £450: here are 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1612. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £148, net yearly value £240, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury, and held since 1873 by the Rev. SEMINGTON is a parochial chapelry, on the road from Melksham to Warminster, 2 miles south from Melksham station on the Great Western railway, in the Western division of the county, hundred of Whorwells-down, Melksham union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The Wilts and Berks canal here joins the Kennet and Avon canal. The chapel of St. George is a stone building in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, north porch and turret at the west end containing one bell: inside the porch is a curious inscription in Norman French which is very much worn: the church was restored in 1860, and a new chancel erected, and a vestry added in 1877: there are 160 sittings. SEMLEY is a parish, running nearly east and west, and lying in a beautiful valley, with station, 1½ miles from the church, on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, 20 miles south-west from Salisbury, 6 south-east from Mere, 3 north from Shaftesbury and 101 from London, in the Southern division of the county, Chalke hundred, Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district, Tisbury and Mere petty sessional division, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. There is a richly-wooded country in the background on the north, and the Dorsetshire hills are seen in the distance stretching along its front in the south. The old church of St. Leonard, an ancient cruciform structure, was pulled down in January, 1874, and the present building erected in 1875, at the expense of the Dowager Marchioness of Westminster: it is of Bath, Ham Hill and local stone, in the Early Decorated style, and consists of chancel, nave of four bays, south aisle and south chancel aisle: there are two entrances—viz. north and west, with a square lofty embattled western tower with clock and 6 bells: there is a stained window in the chancel to the memory of the Rev. Henry Hall M.A. who built the chancel; one to Arthur and Lucy Fane by their son, the late Vere Fane Benett-Stanford esq.; one to the memory of John Edward Benett, of Pyt House, and one given by Mrs. Benett-Stanford; also one by the late Vere Fane Benett-Stanford esq. to the memory of seven brother officers killed at the Gate Pa Fort, in New Zealand, on the 30th April, 1864; another has been added as a memorial of Mrs. Pike, of Musters; it is the gift of her children: there are sittings for

about 350 persons. The register dates from the year 1657. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £374, gross yearly value £450, net £363, including 98 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Christ Church, Oxford, and held since 1878 by the Rev. Louis Kercheval Hilton B.A. of Jesus College, Cambridge, and M.A. of Magdalen College, Oxford. Here is a Baptist chapel, which was built in 1823, to seat 250 persons. £2 2s. yearly were left in 1779 by John Perham for clothes and the interest on £300 left by Miss Dinah Bracher, for the poor of the parish. Lord Arundell of Wardour is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are John Benett-Stanford esq. and Sir Michael Robert Shaw-Stewart bart. The soil is clay; subsoil, gravel. The land is principally pasturage, all the arable growing wheat, oats and barley. The area is 2,945 acres; rateable value, £5,967; the population in 1891 was 643.

SEVENHAMPTON is a hamlet and tithing on the border of Berks, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-east from Highworth station on the Swindon and Highworth branch of the Great Western railway, 8 east from Cricklade and 6 north-east from Swindon, in the parish of Highworth, Northern division of the county, Highworth and Swindon union, county court district and petty sessional division of Swindon, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. James is a handsome modern building of stone in the Early English style, erected in 1863, and consists of chancel, nave, south porch and square western tower containing 6 bells: the interior of the church is very handsome, the font, pulpit and window arches having pillars of polished granite: the east window and all the windows in the chancel are stained: in 1894 the church was supplied with stoves for warming and re-decorated by means of a legacy left by the late Charles Sewell esq.: there are about 250 sittings. The register dates from 1813, previous to which it was included in that of Highworth. Sevenhampton is a chapelry attached to the vicarage of Highworth, joint net yearly value £300, in the gift of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and held

SHALBOURNE is a parish and village pleasantly situated in a valley protected on the north, east and south by hills, 4 miles south from Hungerford station on the Great Western railway, and 10 south-east from Marlborough, partly in Berks and partly in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Kinwardstone, petty sessional division of Marlborough and Hungerford, Hungerford union and county court district, rural deanery of Newbury, archdeaconry of Berks and diocese of Oxford. The church of St. Michael is an ancient edifice of stone, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, south aisle, south porch and square embattled western tower, with pinnacles, containing 5 bells; it was rebuilt and south aisle added in 1873: in the church there is a monument bearing date 1588, supposed to have belonged to Sir Francis Cholke: there are 250 sittings. The register dates from the year 1677. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £316, net income £232, with 10 acres of glebe, and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Canons of Windsor, and held since 1888 by the Rev. Henry Cotterell Evans M.A. of Keble College, Oxford. Here is a Wesleyan chapel, will seat 100, which was originally the old parish school. The principal landowners are the Marquess of Ailesbury, who is lord of the manor, Miss Michell, Thomas Kingston esq. and Francis Augustus Bevan esq. The soil is loam on green sand; subsoil, sand. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats.

Shalbourne township and the hamlets of Newton are in Wilts. Shalbourne tithing, Bagshot and Oxenwood are in Berks.

SHAW with WHITLEY were formed into an ecclesiastical parish in 1838 from the civil parish of Melksham, and are on the road from Melksham to Bath, 2 miles north-west from Melksham station on the Great Western railway, in the Western division of the county, petty sessional division and county court district of Melksham, union of Melksham, Potterne rural deanery (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. Christ church is a stone structure, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave and west porch with western turret containing one bell: in 1890-92 the church was re-seated and a new floor laid down, and a new organ

since 1893 by the Rev. Francis Charles Master, who resides at Highworth. There is a sum of £2,000, invested in $2\frac{3}{4}$ per Cent. Consols, bequeathed by Lady Wetherell Warneford, yielding yearly about £55, which is distributed in coals, blankets and warm clothing amongst the poor and labouring classes resident in the tithing. Warneford Place, the residence of John Phillips Thomas esq. is a fine old mansion, consisting of centre, dating from the year 1566, with wings added in 1734: the house, which stands in an extensive park, is immediately surrounded by beautiful gardens about 14 acres in extent, and is approached by an avenue of elms over a mile in length. The Rev. John Henry Warneford M.A. vicar of Salterhebble, Halifax, is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is loam and limestone; subsoil, limestone and clay. The chief crops are grass, with wheat, barley, beans and roots. The area and population are included with Highworth.

The church of St. Mary the Virgin is a noble Gothic stone structure, in the Perpendicular style, with buttresses and crocketed pinnacles, and consists of chancel, nave, aisles, north and south porches and square embattled western tower containing 7 bells and clock: a violent thunder-storm destroyed the tower in 1670: it was built in the latter part of the 15th century, except the chancel, which was erected in 1853: an organ was given in 1876 by the Long family, in memory of R. P. Long esq.: the east window, in memory of Walter Long esq. is stained, and also the west window, inserted in 1879; the other windows contain some pieces of ancient stained glass: here is a marble monument to the Hon. Thomas Beach, dated 1774, and Helen, his wife, 1771, to John Smith, dated 1775, Anne Cary, 1772, William Long, 1783; also marble monument to Henry Long, dated 1672, Richard Long, 1708, John Long, 1796; a marble roll, and also a brass, to the Right Hon. Archibald Colquhoun, dated 1820; also brasses to Maria Carpenter, 1652: Florentine and Richard Long, 1835, Thomas Flower, 1671, William Clift, 1799, Peter Crooke, 1633, and Roger Crooke, 1655: there are 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1538. The living is a vicarage, including the ancient chapelry of Semington, average tithe rent-charge £625, gross yearly value £645, net £385, with residence and 14 acres of glebe, in the gift of Magdalene College, Cambridge, and held since 1889 by the Rev. John Bond M.A. and late fellow of that college, canon and prebendary of Lincoln, and rural dean of Bradford portion. Here is a Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1854, to hold 150; also a Baptist chapel, built in 1861, to hold 100; a Sunday school was added in 1874. There is a market cross, on which there is an inscription, erected in 1679 and restored in 1714 and 1887. Fossils have been found in large quantities in the parish at various times, and also ancient coins. Charities.—In 1594 Roger Martin left £10, in 1595 Margaret Roger left £2 and Annie Martin £2 in 1596, Anthony Martin 10s. 1633, Peter Crook £2; in 1643 Samuel Martyn, by will, gave the close called Luffenham, to furnish two coats and two gowns of frieze or other cloth yearly to two poor men and two poor women; Henry Long in 1670, and Richard Long in 1730, gave 3½ acres of land; John Brown in 1722, gave 4 acres and £200, to purchase land, the rents to be given for life to 4 poor labourers; in 1737 Elizabeth Martyn gave certain land, the rents to be employed in buying linen cloth for poor women; John Hicks in 1779, gave £5 for educating poor children; in 1813 the purchase money of a cottage belonging to the second poor of Hinton was invested in Consols and the interest devoted

to the poor of the tithing; in 1815 John Tugwell left £561 13s. in Consols, the interest to be devoted for education; in 1828 the Rev. Samuel Hey, a late vicar, gave his library of 1,139 volumes and some articles of furniture for the use of his successors; in 1852 George Tayler left £3,000, the interest of which is to buy bread for six poor men and six poor women of the parishes of Keevil, Edington and Steeple Ashton. Walter Hume Long esq. M.P. of Rood Ashton House, is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is clay; subsoil, clay and stones. The chief crops are wheat and roots, with a large proportion of land in pasture. The area of Steeple Ashton is 2,715 acres; rateable value, £5,978; and the population in 1891 was 705.

Hinton is a tithing in this parish, 1½ miles north. Here is a Wesleyan chapel, built about 1864, to hold 100, and a Primitive Methodist chapel, built about 1859, to hold 60. The area is 703 acres; rateable value, £1,396; the population in 1891 was 183.

STERT is a tithing, 2½ miles south-east from Devizes station on the Great Western railway, in Urchfont parish, Eastern division of the county, Swanborough hundred, Devizes petty sessional division, union and county court district, Potterne rural deanery (Enford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. James, a small structure of grey stone, in the Early English style, was rebuilt in 1846, and has a chancel, nave, north aisle, south porch and small western turret containing one bell: the east window and small lancet window are stained: there are about 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1579, but is defective; those for 1560-1589 and 1581-1630 are entered in the registers of Urchfont. The living is a chapelry annexed to the vicarage of Urchfont, average tithe rent-charge £294, joint net yearly value £210, with 2 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Dean and Canons of

Windsor, and held since 1860 by the Rev. Skinner Chart Mañon M.A. of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge, who resides at Urchfont. Here is a chapel for Baptists. The Warden and Fellows of New College, Oxford (who are lords of the manor) and Valentine Isaac Berry esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is clay and green-sand; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are pasture and wheat. The area is 638 acres; rateable value, £1,103; the population in 1891 was 153.

STOCKTON is a parish and small village on the banks of the Wylye, 1½ miles west from Wylye station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, and 4 south-east from Heytesbury, in the Western division of the county, Elstub and Everley hundred, Warminster union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Wylye (Wylye portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. John the Baptist consists of chancel (which is divided from the nave by a solid wall, pierced by a low doorway, and two hagioscopes), clerestoried nave of three bays, aisles and north porch, with low embattled western tower, in the Norman, Decorated and Perpendicular styles, containing 5 bells: the chancel is Early English: the roof of the north aisle is of finely carved cedar wood, which was presented by the Bishop of Salisbury: there are six stained windows and in the north aisle is the tomb of John Topp esq. the founder of Stockton House, who died 1640, containing effigies of himself, his wife and six children: at the east end of the south aisle is an altar tomb to the Poticary family, with brasses, dated 1590 and 1596, and also a piscina; and in a recess at the west end of the south aisle is the recumbent effigy of a female: the interior was thoroughly restored and reseated in 1880 at a cost of £1,400, raised by subscription: there are 140 sittings. The register dates from the year 1555. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £300, net £243, with 627 acres of

glebe, and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury, and held since 1893 by the Rev. Herbert Goodenough Rogers M.A. of Trinity College, Oxford, and surrogate. There is an almshouse founded in 1642 by John Topp esq. for eight aged men or women, who have each a separate dwelling, and the funds, which are much reduced, are divided among them. On the downs is the reputed site of a British or Roman town. Stockton House, now occupied by George Ashley Dodd esq. J.P. is the property of Col. Arthur Godolphin Yeatman-Biggs J.P. lord of the manor and principal landowner, and is a fine old stone mansion in the Elizabethan style, standing in a park: the mansion contains some fine specimens of oak carving. The soil is light loam; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 2,000 acres; rateable value, £1,864; the population in 1891 was 251.

STOURTON parish is partly in the county of Somerset and partly in the Southern division of the county of Wilts, 7 miles north-east from Wincanton station of the Somerset and Dorset railway, 5½ north-west from Witham Friary station on the Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway (the station generally used is Gillingham on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the

S.W.R. 6 miles), 25 miles west from Salisbury, and 12½ north-west from Shaftesbury, Tisbury petty sessional division, hundred and union of Mere, county court district of Shaftesbury, rural deanery of Wylye (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. The hamlets of Bonham and Brook or Gaspar are in Somersetshire. The parish church of St. Peter

is an edifice of stone in mixed styles, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, north porch and western tower containing 6 bells, the sixth having been added in 1881: in 1878 the chancel was new roofed, fitted with oak stalls and re-floored, a new east window and reredos being erected at the same time: the Hoare monuments were also removed to the south aisle and an organ chamber and vestry built: there are many memorials of the Stourton family and several stained windows: the church affords about 250 sittings. The register dates from the year 1572, and there is a list of rectors from 1316. The living is a rectory, commuted tithe rent-charge £498, with 84 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Sir Henry H. A. Hoare bart. and held since 1888 by the Rev. Herbert Poole King, of Pembroke College, Oxford. There are several benefactions for the poor of the parish, amounting to about £75 yearly. The Spread Eagle Hotel is an excellent family hotel and posting house. The name of the parish is supposed to be derived from the river Stour, which rises within its boundaries. The family of Stourton, which is of high antiquity, once possessed this and the surrounding property: the Stourtons were settled here before the Norman accession, but in the year 1720 the estates they had held for so many centuries were purchased by Henry Hoare esq. of London; Sir Henry Hugh Arthur Hoare bart. J.P. of Stourhead Park, is the present possessor of this beautiful and extensive demesne, lord of the manor and principal landowner. In the park stands the old Bristol High Cross, a beautiful and highly interesting structure, finally taken down in 1763, when its disjointed fragments were deposited in the cathedral, and there remained until 1768, when they were presented by Dean Barton to Henry Hoare esq. who re-erected the cross where it now stands. It was originally set up in 1373, on the site of an earlier cross, at the spot where the four principal streets of the city of Bristol—Corn street, Wine street, Broad street and High street—intersect each other, and then appears to have consisted of two stages with pinnacled buttresses at the angles, the upper portion being canopied and containing statues of King John, Hen. III. Edw. III. and Edw. IV. one of these facing each of the four streets. In 1633 the cross was repaired and materially increased both in elegance and height, by the erection of additional stages, at a cost of £207; the first of these contains, under crocketed canopies, seated effigies of Hen. VI. Queen Elizabeth, Jas. I. and Chas. I.: in the stage above, which is similarly treated, are figures of cherubs, supporting royal shields of arms, encircled with the garter, and the whole terminates in a crocketed spirelet,

STRATFORD-SUB-CASTLE is a parish, on the river Avon, 2 miles north-west from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, Underditch hundred, Alderbury union, Salisbury county court district, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, rural deanery of Wilton, archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Lawrence is a small ancient structure, built of flint and stone, mainly in the Early English style: it has a chancel and nave, divided by a carved oak screen and lofty Pointed arch, north porch, square western embattled tower with pinnacles and containing clock and 2 bells: in the chancel is a mural tablet to Dr. Nisbet, whose widow Admiral Lord Nelson married: there are over 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1654. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £99, net yearly value about £200, with 3 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury, and held since 1886 by the Rev. Edwin Curwen Collard. Mawarden Court, now the Vicarage, the greater part built in 1673, is an interesting and historical house: Thomas Pitt esq. who brought to Europe the famous Pitt or Regent diamond, lived here: his son Robert and his grandson, the first William Pitt, afterwards Lord Chatham, also probably lived here: the latter represented Old Sarum.

The ancient borough of Old Sarum, formerly a city, was a fortress of the native Britons: the town was one of thirty, in this part of the island, occupied by the Belgæ, who were dispossessed by Vespasian. By the Romans it was made a station for troops on the Icknield Street, under the title of Sorbiodunum, in connection with other posts united by military roads. No less than six Roman roads are said to have diverged from Sorbiodunum, or

the square base of which is panelled and surrounded with miniature pinnacles, and the apex is finished with a spreading finial and cross fleury, the total height being 50 feet: at the time these additions were made, the cross was also enriched with colour and gilding, and this was renewed in 1697: in 1733, the cross being then regarded as an obstruction was taken down, but shortly afterwards was set up anew on College Green, and so remained until 1763, when it was finally removed as already stated: in 1894-5, it was completely restored by Sir Henry H. A. Hoare bart. under the superintendence of Mr. C. E. Ponting, architect, of Marlborough, the old work being most carefully preserved; on the cross there is now an inscription recording the principal incidents in its history. In the ornamental gardens of the mansion stands an ancient well, and in the Six-Wells Valley, about a mile higher up and near the source of the river Stour, now stands a building formerly at the south-west corner of St. Peter's street, Bristol, and known as "St. Peter's Pump," removed and placed here by Mr. Henry Hoare in 1765. In the tithing or manor of Bonham stands the ancient Catholic chapel: it is a plain building of stone and was, in 1882, re-roofed and otherwise repaired by the owner: it is the property of Lord Mowbray and Stourton. In this neighbourhood, and on the estate of Sir H. H. A. Hoare, though in the parish of South Brewham, Somerset, is Kingsettle Hill; on it was erected, about 1766, a triangular tower, 150 feet in height, dedicated to Alfred, the illustrious monarch of the West Saxons; there is a statue in stone of this king, with the following inscription underneath: "Alfred the Great, A.D. 879, on this summit erected his Standard against the Danish invaders." The soil is sandy; subsoil, gravel, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 3,385 acres, including the hamlet of Brook, otherwise Gaspar; rateable value, £3,774; the population in 1891 was 410.

Old Sarum. In the West-Saxon period this city of the west was termed Searobyrig, and was the occasional residence of King Egbert: under the Normans it was three times the seat of a council, in 1086, 1096 and 1116; and during the reign of William the Conqueror the episcopal see was transferred here from Wilton, and about 1220 removed to Salisbury, or New Sarum: on the centre of the hill the citadel was placed, guarded by a deep fosse on the outside and a bold rampart within: the inclosed area, about 500 feet in diameter, had on its eastern side the principal entrance, with defensive works: a large area surrounded the citadel, which was again environed by a bank and ditch: these inclosed the chief part of the old city, and measure 7 furlongs 26 yards in circumference, containing an area of 27½ acres of ground. The borough of Old Sarum returned two members to Parliament in the reign of Edward I. and continued to do so till the passing of the "Reform Act, 1832" (2 and 3 Wm. IV. c. 45), by which it was disfranchised. A spot under a tree, about a quarter of a mile from the parish church of Stratford, is pointed out as the place where the members of the borough were elected. As much as £60,000 or £70,000 is said to have been paid for a small estate containing the sites of the houses within the borough of Old Sarum: the present appearance of Old Sarum is a large mound, and in parts prettily wooded, rising from a valley on the west, and connected with a ridge towards the east. It was formerly extra-parochial, but is now a parish in the Alderbury union; rateable value, £70: it is still extra-parochial as to ecclesiastical matters. The Dean and Chapter of Salisbury are lords of the manor and chief landowners. The soil and subsoil are chalk and gravel. The chief crops are wheat, barley

and green crops. The area, including the borough of Old Sarum, is 1,480 acres of land and 21 of water; rateable value, £2,059; the population in 1881 was 321, and of Old Sarum, 13.

STRATFORD TONY is a parish, pleasantly situated on the river Ebele, 4 miles south-west from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, Cawden and Cadworth hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Alderbury union, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Chalke portion), and Salisbury archdeaconry and diocese. The church of St. Mary is a plain ancient Gothic structure of flint and stone, consisting of chancel, nave and north porch, with low square western tower with pinnacles and 3 bells: it has a stained window, designed by Mr. C. E. Kemp, of London, presented by Miss Easton, of Layton Manor, Yorkshire: the church was restored in 1882 at a cost of £625, raised by voluntary subscription: there are 84 sittings. The marriage and burial registers date from the year 1562; the baptismal registers from 1604. The living is a rec-

tory, average tithe rent-charge £183, gross yearly value £250, net £209, with residence and 91 acres of glebe, in the gift of Corpus Christi college, Oxford, and held since 1877 by the Rev. Matthew Plummer M.A. of Jesus College, Cambridge. Colonel Jervoise, late of 3rd Hussars, is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is gravel and chalk; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and turnips. The area is 1,530 acres; rateable value, £513; the population in 1891 was 115.

STRATTON ST. MARGARET is a parish and village, taking its name from the old Roman road running through it; it has a station on the Swindon and Highworth branch of the Great Western railway, 2½ miles north-east from Swindon, 79½ from London and 3½ south from Highworth: it was originally divided into three tithings, called The Street (now Lower Stratton), The Green, and Upper Stratton, and includes Upper Stratton, with Kingsdown: it is in the Northern division of the county, hundred of Highworth, Highworth and Swindon union, Swindon county court district and petty sessional division, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The Wiltshire and Berks canal skirts the parish on the south. The church of St. Margaret is an ancient structure of stone, in the Early English style, supposed to have been erected in the reign of Edward I.: it consists of chancel, nave, aisles separated from the nave by arcades of four bays, south porch, and modern square western tower containing 4 bells: the east window is decorated and stained: there are monumental tablets to William and Alice Hedges, alias Lacey de Kingsdowne, 1645; Catherine Hedges, 1649, and William Hedges, 1693; also a memorial window in the south aisle to Mrs. Eliza E. Craig, 1882: the south aisle was re-roofed in 1894: there are 350 sittings. The register dates from the year 1608. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £30, gross yearly value £210, net £104, with 132 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Merton College, Oxford, and held since 1895 by the Rev. Alexander Nairne Scott M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford: the rectorial tithe and glebe lands are in the possession of Merton College. There is an iron mission church, dedicated to St. Philip, at Upper Stratton, with 230 sittings. Here are Particular Baptist, General Baptist and Primitive Methodist chapels, with Sunday schools attached. The charities are inconsiderable, being the interest of a sum of £200, bequeathed for the sustenance of vicars' widows in 1693 by William Hedges: there is an endowment of £24 a year to the General Baptist chapel at Lower Stratton. Here is the workhouse of the Highworth and Swindon union, for particulars, see Swindon. Kingsdown House, is a stone building in the Elizabethan style, the seat of Lt.-Col. SUTTON MANDEVILLE is a parish, about 2½ miles from the Dinton and Tisbury stations on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway, 11 miles south-by-west from Salisbury, 10 north-east from Shaftesbury and 8 east from Wilton, in the Southern division of the county, Cawdon and Cadworth hundred and Tisbury petty sessional division, Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. SUTTON VENY is a village and parish, 2 miles south-west from Heytesbury station, on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, and 3 south-east-by-south from Warminster, in the Western division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Warminster, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. The old church of St. Leonard (now in ruins), originally of Early English architecture, probably dated back to A.D. 1300, and consisted of chancel, nave and aisles. The church of St. John the Evangelist (built in memory of Joseph Everett esq. of Greenhill (d. 1865) at the expense of the late Mrs. Everett, her son, Lieut.-Col. Everett, and her family) is a cruciform edifice of Frome and Bath stone, in the Early Decorated or Geometrical style: it consists of chancel, nave, aisles, north and south transepts, entrance porch on the south, and vestry on the north, and square central tower, with a spire of 80 feet, containing 6 bells removed from the old church: the aisles are divided from the nave by three arches resting on circular piers, with Early Decorated capitals: the chancel is paved with encaustic tiles, and contains an organ with two fronts, one brought into the chancel and the other into the north transept: there are several stained windows, the one at the east end being of five lights, with tracery: the walls of the chancel are handsomely decorated: on the western wall is a brass to the Rev. George Francis Sydenham Powell B.A. rector here for 33 years (d. 1888): at the north-east pier of the nave is placed a pulpit of Caen stone, and on the opposite side is an eagle lectern in carved oak, supported by a pillar, at the base of which are three lions: the church is fitted with open benches of oak, and will seat 400: it was consecrated and opened on April 16th, 1868. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £420, net £370, arising from 835 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Major Clement Walker-Heneage V.C. and held since 1888 by the Rev. Arthur Wellington Booker M.A. of Christ Church, Oxford. Here is a Congregational chapel, a

SWALLOWCLIFT (or Swallowcliffe) is a village and parish 1½ miles south-east from Tisbury station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway and 8 north-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Tisbury union, Dunworth hundred, Tisbury petty sessional division, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Peter is a stone building in the Norman style, erected in 1843: it has a chancel, nave of four bays, transept and aisles, a square embattled tower containing 3 bells, through the base of which is the south entrance: here is a very fine stained east window, the gift of Lady Herbert of Lea, in memory of her husband, and one at the west end to G. G. Blandford esq. and in the chancel two windows erected to the late Rev. J. H. Samler and his two daughters: the transept contains a large window also to the Rev. J. H. Samler (vicar for 30 years), erected by the parishioners: there are 170 sittings. The register dates from the year 1738. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £200, net £180, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1882 by the Rev. Charles Edward Tudor. Here is a Mission Hall, constructed of iron, open to all denominations. In 1862 the common lands of the parish

Wesleyan Mission Hall and a Primitive Methodist chapel at Little Sutton. Greenhill House is the property of Col. J. F. Everett J.P. and occupied by Mrs. Zwilchenbart-Erskine. The kennels of the South and West Wilts Subscription Fox Hounds are here. There are no manorial rights, but the land is divided among numerous freeholders, the principal of whom are the Marquess of Bath, Lord Heytesbury, Capt. Arthur Howard Southey of Eastleigh Court, Bishopstrow, Mr. James Nowlson Parham, Col. John Frederick Everett, Mr. John J. Estridge, Mr. Walter Mitchell, Messrs. Francis S. Long, Robert Alfred Long, James Long, Robert Elling, Joseph Smith, and T. P. Bartholomew, and the trustees of the late Mr. John D. Randall. The soil is sand and clay; subsoil, chalk and stone. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 4,116 acres; rateable value, £4,072; the population in 1891 was 723.

By a Local Government Order, dated March 25, 1885, a portion of Pertwood parish in Mere union, was for civil purposes amalgamated with this parish, the remainder being attached to East Knoyle.

Little Sutton is a hamlet, half a mile south-east, where there is a Congregational chapel.

SWINDON with SWINDON NEW TOWN.

SWINDON is a parish and large town with a first-class station on the Great Western railway, 77 miles from London, 29½ from Bath, 6 north-east from Wootton Bassett, 16½ north-east from Chippenham, 23 north-east from Melksham, 28½ north-east from Trowbridge, 38½ north-east from Frome, 37 north-east from Warminster, 32½ north-east from Westbury, 27 north-east from Bradford, 21 north-east from Devizes and 45 north from Salisbury: it is the head of a county court district and petty sessional division, in the Northern division of the county, hundred of Kingsbridge and Highworth and Swindon union, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, standing on a considerable elevation, commanding a fine view over rich valleys watered by the rivers Cole and Ray, with their numerous branches. The town is not incorporated, but the "Local Government Act, 1858" was adopted for the Old and New Town, and they were each governed by a Local Board from 1864, until under the "Local Government Act, 1894," Urban District Councils became the local authority. The town is lighted with gas by a company, whose works are in Cricklade street, and supplied with water from works at Wroughton Park.

The parish church (Christ Church) was erected in 1851, from designs by the late Sir Gilbert Scott B.A. at an expense of £8,000, raised by voluntary subscriptions: the style is the Decorated Early English: it has chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, transepts, western tower and spire and a peal of 8 bells and clock: the site was given by Ambrose Goddard esq.: in 1883 the chancel was much improved at a cost of about £500: a new oak screen was added to the western porch in 1889: in 1892 a reredos of marble and alabaster was erected by Mr. Pleydell Goddard and Miss Goddard, and a new altar and altar steps were presented with other gifts, all in memory of the late Colonel Goddard, Grenadier Guards: there are sittings for 900: the chancel of the old church is still standing, and contains several monuments, but is disused: it was restored in 1885. The register dates from the year 1640. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £222, gross yearly value £300, net £288, including 20 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1887 by the Rev. Newton Ebenezer Howe, of Magdalene College, Cambridge. The Rev. Charles Frederick Goddard has been curate-in-charge since 1892.

The vicarage house, erected in place of the old one in 1887, at a cost including site of over £3,000, is on The Sands, Bath road, and is now vacant.

The Wesleyan chapel, Bath road, built in 1880, has 600 sittings; the Congregational chapel, Victoria street, built in 1866, seats 600; the Particular Baptist chapel, Providence road, built in 1843, will seat 400; the Primitive Methodist chapel, Prospect place, in 1870, 300; Brethren Meeting Room, Prospect place, built in 1869, 250; and the Salvation Army have barracks in Market square, built in 1862.

The Town Hall, built 1852, is 50 feet by 26 feet, and is also occasionally used for meetings and balls: it will hold 600 persons. The whole of the buildings belong to the Swindon Central Market Company Limited, who hold a lease of the land from the lord of the manor.

The Corn Exchange, in the Market square, is a commodious building 110 feet by 50 feet, seating 1,100 persons, is licensed for theatrical performances, and has a clock tower 80 feet high: the clock strikes the hours on a 2-cwt. bell, and the quarters on 2 smaller bells and shows the time on two 4-foot illuminated dials.

The markets are held on Mondays for pitched corn, and every second and last Monday for fat cattle. Swindon sales of cattle, sheep and horses are held every Monday in the New Cattle Market by Mr. J. A. Y. Matthews and Mr. T. Lavington. Four fairs are held in the year, two under a charter granted to the lord of the manor in the reign of Charles I.—viz. on the second Monday

after May the 11th and the second Monday in December; also two statute fairs for hiring servants—viz. on the first Monday before April the 5th, and on the second Monday after September the 11th. Besides the ordinary cattle market the commodious sale yard of Messrs. Dore and Radway, originally established by the late Mr. William Dore, provides for sales of live stock and is attended by dealers from all parts of the country. The periodical auctions for horses, established by Mr. T. Hooper Deacon, are held in his extensive premises opposite the Market square, on alternate Mondays. New Cattle Market, in Marlborough road, holds 360 cattle, 730 sheep, 300 pigs, besides horses; opened in 1887; W. H. Read esq. M.S.A. architect.

Quarries of oolite, well adapted for building, are abundant in the neighbourhood: quantities of fossil and other remains have been found, which are highly interesting to geologists; Professor Smith, one of the earliest geologists of this country, spent much time in inspecting these quarries. In 1874 a fossil of an extinct reptile known to geologists as of the order Omosaurus was found. Fresh water marls and limestones of the Purbeck age are found in the quarries here with bones of the earliest true frog and fossils of fresh water shells, within a mile and a half of the town, on the Liddington road, is a beautiful lake of 90 acres, the reservoir for supplying the Wilts and Berks canal, which passes through the parish within half a mile of the town: it is delightfully situated in a picturesque district, beautifully wooded. The railway, quarries and general agricultural pursuits furnish employment for the working population.

The K and M Companies of the 2nd Volunteer Battalion Duke of Edinburgh's Wiltshire Regiment, have their head quarters at the Corn Exchange.

There are two newspapers published weekly, the "North Wilts Herald" and the "Swindon Advertiser," besides a daily (evening) issue of the "North Wilts Herald."

The Swindon Victoria Hospital, in The Sands, opened in 1888, has two principal wards, for males and females respectively, with a special ward for accident cases, containing 12 beds: the foundation stone was laid on Jubilee Day, 1887, by the wife of A. C. Goddard esq. who gave the site: the hospital is established on an entirely free basis, the medical staff being composed of medical gentlemen of the town: the cost of the building and furnishing was £1,960, raised by contributions: the architect was W. H. Read esq. M.S.A. Swindon: a new wing, part of the original design, has (1894) been added at a cost of £700.

The charities amount to £110 yearly from land and Consols, left by Mrs. Evans, Messrs. Sheppard and Rolleston, Anderson, Gray, Bowly, and others at various times.

The principal residence is the Lawn, a large and handsome house in the Italian style, the seat of Ambrose Lethbridge Goddard esq. D.L., J.P. lord of the manor and principal landowner.

The hill on which the Old Town stands is of sand and stone, surrounded by Kimmeridge clay, mostly covered by a rich alluvial soil. The adjoining farms are mostly pasture. The area is 4,246 acres; rateable value, £144,049; the population in 1851 (including Swindon New Town) was 4,876; in 1861, 6,856, in 1871, 11,720, and in 1881, 19,901, and in 1891 was 33,001; the great increase in the population is principally caused by the number of men employed at the station and works of the Great Western Railway Company; the population of the Urban district of Old Swindon in 1891 was 3,545.

Broome and Walcott are tithings in this parish.

SWINDON NEW TOWN (or New Swindon) was formerly a marsh, but since the construction of the Great Western railway has become a considerable town, and is

united to Old Swindon, and now forms with it practically one town, in the hundred of Cricklade and county court district of Swindon. Here is a junction station of the Great Western railway: every train stops here, as well for changing engines as for refreshment of passengers: at this station the line from Gloucester, Hereford and South Wales joins the main line; and the Midland and South Western Junction Railway Company has constructed a railway from here to Andover junction, through Marlborough and Ludgershall and to Cheltenham, Cricklade and Cirencester, which gives direct communication between Manchester and the North, and Southampton. The first section of line from Swindon to Marlborough was opened 29th July, 1881; second section, Marlborough to Andover, May 1st, 1882; and the northern portion of the line as far as Cirencester, Dec. 18th, 1883: this line is now completed, and joins the Banbury and Cheltenham railway at Andoversford Junction, the through communication is therefore complete. New Swindon is also the centre of the Great Western Railway works, and the factory for the whole of the line with its numerous ramifications. The locomotive and carriage works are on an extensive scale, and cover an area of about 200 acres, and together with the iron foundry and boiler works employ about 9,000 hands.

The Great Western Railway Medical Fund Society's Accident Hospital, in Faringdon street, was established in 1871 and contains 12 beds.

The town has been governed by a Local Board under the "Public Health Act, 1858," from Feb. 16, 1864, until the "Local Government Act, 1894," established the present Urban District Council.

The town is regularly built, partly on the land belonging to the company, and chiefly occupied by the persons employed in the works; there are a number of handsome shops, and the town is improving and increasing very fast; since 1890 twenty new streets have been made; it is lighted with gas. Great improvement has taken place with regard to the disposal of the sewage, a new system of storm water has been effectually adopted and an outfall sewer constructed, which empties itself on to the sewage farm at Rodbourne; and after the sewage has been chemically precipitated in six large tanks, the effluent water is allowed to percolate through drained land, and finally discharged into the river Ray, under the superintendence of Henry Joseph Hamp esq. town surveyor.

The Wilts and Berks canal passes in the immediate vicinity, and is crossed by a girder bridge leading from Wellington street to College street, constructed in 1885, at a cost of about £900. In 1893 the Cambria Bridge was erected at a cost of £1,500, including the widening of both approaches. The Whale Bridge, built in 1893, at a cost of £1,200, connects Princes street with Oriol street; both bridges were constructed under the superintendence of Mr. Henry Jos. Hamp, surveyor to the Local Board. In 1891 the canal was transferred to new management, and has since undergone extensive dredging and general repairs; there are 57 locks with an average fall of 9 feet, and with a length of 78 feet and width of 7 feet: the water is supplied by two reservoirs made by the Company, one at Coate, near Swindon, 89 acres in extent, and the other at Tockenham, with an area of 20 acres, also from the river Marden at Calne, and several springs. Mr. P. Munro, of Bristol, was engineer for the repairs and dredging. The canal has locks into the Thames, at Abingdon, and into the Kennett and Avon, near Melksham, and thus forms a continuous waterway between Bristol and the Thomas.

St. Mark's, New Swindon, was formed into an ecclesiastical parish in 1846. The church is a handsome stone structure in the Decorated style, and consists of chancel, nave of four bays, aisles, south porch with western tower and spire containing one bell: the church was designed by the late Sir Gilbert Scott R.A. and will seat 900 persons. There is an organ, also suitable oak choir seats: there are five stained windows, including one to the memory of the late vicar. The register dates from the year 1845. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £283, net £280, including one acre of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and held since 1879 by the Rev. the Hon. Maurice John George Ponsonby M.A. of Christ Church, Oxford, and hon. canon of Bristol and rural dean of Cricklade.

St. Saviour's, Ashford road, opened in 1890, is a structure of brick and wood, erected by the voluntary labour of workmen belonging to the Great Western Railway Company, and is intended chiefly for their use; and consists of chancel, nave, vestry, west porch and a turret containing one bell. Only one previous instance of the

kind is known in England: there are 250 sittings: the services are conducted by the clergy of St. Mark's.

St. Paul's, New Swindon, was (in 1881) formed into an ecclesiastical parish from New Swindon parish. The church, built in 1881 at a cost of nearly £6,000, is an edifice of brick, in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, nave of four bays, with clerestory, organ chamber and vestries, western, north and south porches, and western bell cote containing one bell: there is a very handsome chancel screen of open woodwork: there are 800 sittings: land has been rented from Major Rolleston, for the erection of a clergy house, working men's club and school rooms, at an estimated cost of £3,000: a site has been presented by Major Rolleston, for the erection of a mission church. The register dates from the year 1881. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £225, in the gift of the bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and held since 1888 by the Rev. Douglas Powell Ware M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. The vicarage house adjoining the church was erected in 1885.

The ecclesiastical parish of St. Barnabas, Gorse Hill, was formed Feb. 14, 1890, from the civil parish of Stratton St. Margaret. The church, standing on Gorse Hill, built at a cost of £3,200 and opened in Feb. 1885, consists of chancel, nave of six bays, with clerestory: it was designed by J. P. Seddon esq. of Westminster: the style is Transitional: it has a fine vaulted roof: in 1894 a south aisle was added, also clergy and choir vestries, at the cost of £900: the church is built of Swindon stone, with ashlar and freestone dressings: the interior is also of stone: the chancel is spacious, and is separated from the nave by a breastwork of ashlar: the floor of the chancel is laid in mosaic of various colours: the sedilia, piscina and credence are of freestone with bright blue Pennant pillars: the font is of Pennant and Mansfield marble: there is a central turret and one large bell: there are 370 sittings. The register dates from the year 1885. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value of £165, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Philip Maddocks B.D. of St. David's College, Lampeter. A Sunday school has been built from the designs of John J. Smith, architect, Swindon, of a similar style of architecture to the church, being built of Swindon stone lined with brick, having Bath stone dressings: the roof is an open one. Special attention has been paid to the aptitude of the large room for sound, and for its being used for concerts, &c. The vicarage house, built in 1892, is of stone, and cost £2,000.

St. John the Evangelist's was consecrated 27th Dec. 1883: it is in the Early English style of architecture and a building of red brick, from designs by Mr. F. B. Wade, architect, of London, and consists of chancel, nave, organ chamber and vestries: there are 400 sittings, and it is served from St. Mark's. The Mission Church, in Rodbourne lane, was erected in 1881, and is served by a curate from Rodbourne Cheney.

The Catholic church, dedicated to the Holy Rood, was erected in 1875, at a cost of £2,500, which included the presbytery adjoining the church, which consists of a chancel, separated from the nave by a rood screen, and a Lady chapel, and has a good organ: the style is Gothic, and the walls are adorned by illustrations of the stations of the Holy Cross: every window has a design round it in gold and dark brown; similar ornamentation is on the walls, and the altar and tabernacle are also most beautifully decorated: the altar is also in the Gothic style, and has niches for six statues. In 1887 a vestry was erected: there are 200 sittings: attached to the church is a mission of the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

The Baptist tabernacle in Regent street, erected in 1886 in the Classic style, is built of Bath stone at a cost of about £6,000; W. H. Read esq. M.S.A. of Swindon, was the architect. There are also large Sunday schools in the rear. The tabernacle will seat 900 persons.

The Baptists have a chapel at Gorse hill, built in 1883, which will seat 250; and one in Cambria, built in 1866, for 150. Particular Baptist, Prospect hill, built in 1884, has 150 sittings.

The Congregational church, Sandford street, built in 1876, and rebuilt in 1894, at a cost of over £3,000, is of red brick with Bath stone dressings, in the Jacobean style from designs by Mr. T. B. Silcock, architect, of Bath, and includes a large tower: it will seat about 900 persons: a Sunday school was erected in 1888 adjoining at a cost of £1,200.

There are four Wesleyan chapels:—Faringdon street, built in 1868, has sittings for 1,200; Gorse hill, 1883,

350; Princess street, 1884, 150; and William street, 1887, 150.

The Primitive Methodist in Regent street, built in 1876, at a cost of £2,409, and enlarged in 1889, at the cost of £700, has 750 seats; and that in Clifton street, built in 1881, at a cost of £414, will seat 150: another has been erected in 1890, at a cost of £1,020, and will seat 337.

The Evangelistic Mission Hall, Rolleston street, built in 1873, seats 500 persons; and the Salvation Army Barracks, Bridge street, was built in 1868 for Baptist school.

The Presbyterian Lecture Hall on the south side of Dixon street was built in 1885, and is in the Early English style, the hall being 55 feet long and 28 feet 6 inches wide, with suitable porch, entrance and lobbies, lighted with gas, and hot water laid on: the roof is ceiled at the collar beam, leaving exposed the principal timbers, which are stained and varnished: the hall can seat 300 persons; Mr. Orlando Baker M.S.A. of Regent street, New Swindon, was the architect.

The Cemetery, on a hill midway between Old and New Swindon, is about 11 acres in extent, on soil of sand and stone, and commands extensive and beautiful views for many miles west and north. There is a chapel in the Early English style, with apsidal east end, vestry and bell turret; also a separate mortuary chapel and a caretaker's lodge. The main entrances are at Clifton street, Radnor street, Dixon street and Lansdown road: the first burial took place 6th August, 1881: the total cost of land, laying out, drainage, building lodge and chapels was about £10,000. The cemetery is under the management of a board, whose meetings are held third Tuesday in February, May, August and November, at the Local Board room, 42 Cricklade street, Swindon. Offices, 42 Cricklade street and 10 Queen Anne's buildings, Faringdon street.

The Public Offices in Regent circus, erected in 1892, at a cost of £9,000, form a handsome block of buildings of red brick, with Bath stone dressings, in the Renaissance style, and occupying an area of 600 superficial yards. The west front has a grand entrance with balcony above, and a large clock tower 90 feet high. The main entrance opens to a vestibule and spacious staircase hall, ornamented with columns, pilasters and arches. The building includes offices for the clerk to the urban council, school board, town surveyor, assistant overseer, rate collectors and inspector of nuisances, and there are county court offices, where the sittings of this court are held. The largest room, 56 by 33 feet, is used for public meetings, &c.; the board room is 52 by 28 feet; in rear of the buildings is a fire engine house; Mr. Brightwen Binyon, of Ipswich, was the architect. A drinking fountain, presented by the Swindon United Temperance Board, was erected in 1893, in front of the building.

The Market occupies a piece of land at the bottom of Commercial road, and was erected in 1892, at the cost of £4,500; there are seventeen shops and a triangular piece of open ground for the use of country dealers &c.

The B Squadron of the Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry Cavalry (Duke of Edinburgh's Own Royal Regiment) is stationed in the town, and the F and G Companies of the 2nd Volunteer Battalion, Duke of Edinburgh's (Wiltshire Regiment) have their Drill Hall and Orderly Room at the end of the park adjoining Park lane.

The Great Western Railway Mechanics' Institution in High street, opposite the entrance to the Great Western railway works, established in 1843, and enlarged 1893, is a noble building, and has a library containing upwards of 20,000 volumes, including a reference library of 3,000 volumes; lectures, concerts and dramatic performances are frequently given, and there are now (1895) 6,700 members; the institute, as enlarged, comprises, among others, billiard room, dressing rooms, smoking and two reading rooms, one being for use of ladies only: the large hall, which seats 1,200 people, has a stage 24 feet deep and 50 feet wide. A free recreation ground, with permanent pavilion, was opened in 1892 at a cost of £2,860, and is 30 acres in extent.

The Great Western Medical Fund Society, established in 1847, occupies a block of red brick buildings with stone dressings, erected at a cost of £12,000, and opened in 1892. It contains two swimming baths, the larger of which, 111 ft. by 30 ft., has a spacious gallery running round, and in winter is used for concerts and meetings, and for this purpose is capable of seating 2,000 people. The smaller bath, 60 ft. by 25 ft. is used by ladies and children, and is kept open all through the winter: attached is a washhouse, with patent gas drying apparatus. There are various ante-rooms and offices, and one large committee room. The Dispensary, which adjoins, is well equipped: there are eight consulting rooms and a dental surgery.

The Accident Hospital, in Faringdon road, was erected in 1871, and consists of accident ward, with 4 beds, convalescent ward, containing 8 beds, and an operating theatre: the number of accidents treated in 1893 was 57.

The Isolation Hospital, at Gorse Hill, erected in 1892, at a cost of £4,500, is a red brick building with Bath stone dressings, and is built on the block system: it consists of administrative isolation block, containing four wards, two male and two female, with attendant nurses' rooms. The Ward Pavilion consists of two wards, male and female, also with attendant nurses' rooms. Another block contains out-offices, viz., ambulance, mortuary, disinfectant apparatus, wash-house and ironing room. Mr. H. J. Hamp was the architect.

At Okus is a smallpox hospital for 17 patients.

Masonic Hall.—The Royal Sussex Lodge of Emulation, No. 355, secretary, E. H. Pritchett, meets here on the Friday nearest the full moon in every month, excepting May, June, July and August. The Wilts Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, No. 355, Scribe, E. T. A. Hogarth, holds its meetings on the Friday nearest the full moon every month, excepting May, June, July, and August. The Swindon Key Stone Lodge of Mark Master Masons, No. 401, meets on the Wednesday next before full moon, quarterly, February, May, July and October; secretary, E. H. Pritchett.

Swindon Town Club, in Bath road, was erected in 1893: it is non-political, and has about 670 members: Mr. W. H. Read was architect: the secretary is Mr. Booker.

The County Ground, in the Drove road, was opened May, 1893, and is 29 acres in extent: a bicycle track has been laid down, of 3 laps to the mile, and in addition to the space devoted to football and cricket, there is a Galloway racecourse (several meetings taking place during the year), and a polo ground: a large ornamental pavilion has been erected, at a cost of £850, on the opposite side, with dressing rooms for competitors, at a cost of £450: there is also an entrance lodge, built at the cost of £250.

Swindon Town Gardens, formerly a portion of the Quarries, are 7 acres in extent, and were opened in 1894: the land was purchased from W. A. L. Goddard esq. for £700, and the whole area is surrounded by a fence, and there is a picturesque lodge, rustic bridges, tennis lawns, a band stand, ornamental waters, fountains, swings and giant strides for the children, &c.: the total cost amounted to about £3,800, including land: Mr. W. H. Read M.S.A. was the architect.

The area of the urban district is 1,531 acres; rateable value, £111,361; the population in 1891 was 27,295. The population of St. Mark's ecclesiastical parish in 1861 was 4,167; in 1871, 7,628, and in 1881, 11,104: the population of the ecclesiastical parishes in 1891 was:—St. Mark, 15,770; St. Paul, 6,902; St. Barnabas, Gorse Hill, 2,852.

Sextons:—St. Mark's, William Collins, 2 Morris street, Rodborne lane, New Swindon; St. Paul's, John Mitchell, Regent place, New Swindon.

Gorse Hill is now included in the New Swindon urban district, and by an Order of the Wiltshire County Council, confirmed by Local Government Board Order, which came into operation Sept. 29, 1890, it was amalgamated with the parish of Swindon, and at the same date the hamlet of Even Swindon, in the parish of Rodbourne, was also amalgamated with Swindon.

TEFFONT EWYAS, or Ewias (as it is termed in the mediæval Latin of ancient records), is a parish and village, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles west from Dinton station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway and $9\frac{1}{2}$ north-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Dunworth hundred, Tisbury petty sessional division and union, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Chalke portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church (not dedicated) is an edifice of stone in the Decorated style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays and north aisle, having a lofty western tower with pinnacles and 3 bells, surmounted by a beautiful spire, together 125 feet in height: a north transept was added in 1824: the interior has several stained windows, painted chiefly by Mrs. De Salis: the manor chapel is private property, and divided from the church by a carved oak screen, being attached on the south side to the chancel, and opening into it by two arches; it is the most ancient part of the present building, and contains the tombs of some of the Ley family (former lords of Teffont manor, one of whom married a Mayne), with three recumbent figures of knights in armour: the chapel and aisle have been roofed in oak and restored by Mr. De Salis, who has also had placed over the east window a marble mural tarsia, representing a choir of angels singing Hallelujah, a work of high art, executed by the late Baron de Triqueti, the sculptor employed by H.M. the Queen to decorate the Wolsey Chapel at Windsor: there are 100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1683. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £144, gross yearly value £208, net £130, including 30 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Fane-De Salis, and held since 1892 by the Rev. John Hewitt B.A. of Trinity College, Dublin. The rectory house, of stone, was rebuilt by the late Sir G. G. Scott B.A. in 1842. Almshouses for two poor families were built and endowed by Mr. and Mrs. Fane-De Salis in 1886. Here is a quarry, from which the stone of which Salisbury Cathedral was built was derived: the workings extend for many acres underground, forming extensive caverns, often visited by tourists: these quarries were worked in the time of the Romans, as a large number of Roman coins have been found in the workings: since the opening of the Salisbury and Yeovil line, these quarries have been again worked to a considerable extent: they yield a Portland stone of the best description. The village is very picturesque: a beautiful brook winds its course by the side of the road, on the right, backed by a shrubby wood, with a cottage here and there on its edge, and on the opposite side the ground rises into a steep, covered with undergrowth. Teffont Manor is an ancient mansion, of the date of Henry VII. the seat of William Fane-De Salis esq. M.A., J.P.: the house contains much valuable carved oak furniture, with a choice gallery, comprising original paintings by Jean de Maubuse, Pietro Perugino, Giulio Romano and other artists, with several portraits of the French Imperial family, by Le Fevre, formerly part of the private gallery of Napoleon I. at Fontainebleau. The whole parish and manor is the property of Mr. and Mrs. Fane-De Salis. The soil is sand and clay; subsoil, stone. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 742 acres, inclusive of 33 acres of glebe and 27 of road, water and waste; rateable value, £1,274; the population in 1891 was 123.

TEFFONT MAGNA is a parish and village, immediately adjoining the parish of Teffont Ewyas, or Evias, on the road from Salisbury to Hindon, 2½ miles north-west from Dinton station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, 10 miles west from Salisbury and 11 north-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Warminster, Tisbury petty sessional division and union, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Chalke portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The chapel, standing in the middle of the village, is an ancient stone building, consisting of chancel, nave, tower containing 2 bells, has a south porch (Early English), and was repaired in 1843: the chancel is separated from the nave by an old carved oak screen. There is no burial ground, as the parishioners have right of burial at Dinton. The registers until quite recently were included in the Dinton registers, which date from the year 1558: the separate registers of births and marriages of this parish date from 1852. In connection with the church a clergy house has been erected. The living is a chapelry, annexed to the vicarage of Dinton, average tithe rent-charge £272, net income £200, with 51 acres of glebe, in the gift of the President and Fellows of Magdalen College, Oxford, and held since 1886 by the Rev. TIDCOMBE is a parish, 3½ miles south-east from Grafton station on the Midland and South Western Junction railway, and 4 south from Bedwyn station on the Newbury and Devizes section of the Great Western railway and 7 south-west from Hungerford, in the Eastern division of the county, Kinwardstone hundred, Marlborough petty sessional division, Hungerford union and county court district, rural deanery of Marlborough (Pewsey portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. NORTH TIDWORTH (or Tidworth Zouch), commonly called Tidworth, is a parish and village, on the road from Salisbury to Marlborough and on the Hampshire border, and is on the declivity of a lofty range of downs, 2 miles south from Ludgershall station on the Midland and South Western Junction railway, and 9 west-by-north from Andover, in the Eastern division of the county, Amesbury hundred, Everleigh and Pewsey petty sessional division, Pewsey union, Andover county court district, rural deanery of Amesbury (Amesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of the Holy Trinity is a building of flint and stone, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and embattled western tower containing 5 bells: the fabric as it now stands dates from about 1490: the tower, however, shows some earlier work, of the date of about 1360; the font is old, apparently Norman, but the general character of the church is Late Third-Pointed: there is a brass to the Rev. TILSHEAD is a parish and village, on the road from Devizes to Amesbury, 8 miles north-east from Codford station on the Salisbury branch of the Great Western railway, 8 north-west from Amesbury and 10 south-by-east from Devizes, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Branch and Dole, Devizes petty sessional division and county court district, Amesbury union, rural deanery of Wylve (Wylve portion), and archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. The church was re-endowed in 1319, when it received Adam de Newman, the first resident minister: it is in the Norman style, and was repaired and enlarged: anciently dedicated to St. James, it was in 1850 re-dedicated to St. Thomas à Becket and is at least 800 years old, consisting of large chancel, clerestoried nave of three bays, aisles, south porch and a square central tower with plain parapet and surmounted by a small incongruous red-tiled spire, and containing 3 bells: there are seven stained windows in the body of the church, the work of the late vicar, the Rev. J. H. Johnson; the west window, a Perpendicular insertion, being in memory of John Parham, ob. 1875, of Tilshead Lodge; a brass commemorates the Rev. J. H. Johnson M.A. ob. 1884, vicar of this parish for 60 years: flints were largely used in the walling of the church: the nave arcade has very massive square piers with heavy abacus, which are probably Saxon; the font is Norman: at the eastern-most end of the south aisle is a late Decorated piscina, which seems to indicate the existence of a chantry chapel here: an oak chair in the chancel has, on the top of the upright back, a well-executed carved representation of the west façade of Salisbury cathedral: there are about 200 sittings. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge £1, net yearly value £100, including 259 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held since 1884

TISBURY is a large village and head of a petty sessional division and a union, and is situated on the sharp declivity of a hill; in the valley below is the parish church and the river Nadder, which rises in the parish of Donhead St. Mary and winds its way to Salisbury; it has a station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, 12½ miles west from Salisbury, 8 north-east from Shaftesbury and 96½ from London; it consists, for civil purposes, of three parishes, viz.:—East Tisbury, West Tisbury and Wardour, which for ecclesiastical purposes form only one parish; it is in the Southern division of the county, Dunworth hundred, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. John the Baptist, the earliest part dating about 1226, is a fine old building, in the Early English, Decorated and Perpendicular styles, in the form of a cross, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays with aisles and transepts, with north and west porches, very ancient, the north having over it a parvise or priests' chamber, central embattled tower with pinnacles, built about 1740, and containing clock and 6 bells: there was formerly a lofty spire, but this was destroyed by lightning in 1762 and again in 1795: in the private vault are interred many of the former Lords Arundell of Wardour, and the helmet of the first lord of that name, who took the standard from the Turks at the Battle of Gran, 1595, stands over his tomb: the church contains many objects of interest: the font is very ancient: a large

by the Rev. Horace Vincent Thompson, of St. Bees. A Baptist chapel was erected here in 1882 and has about 100 sittings. Here are two cottages, built in 1842 from a fund subscribed to repair the losses sustained by the poor of this and five neighbouring parishes by a flood in January, 1841, the rent to be annually distributed to the poor of those parishes on the anniversary of the occurrence. On the road from West Lavington to Tilshead is a square block of stone, bearing an inscription, which records that on the 21st Oct. 1839, Mr. Dean, of Imber, was attacked and robbed by four highwaymen, one of whom fell dead on Chiltern Down, after being chased for three hours: the others were captured and transported for fifteen years. Here is the embankment called Old Ditch and several barrows, among which are Long Barrow, White Barrow, Silver Barrow, and Kill Barrow. The principal landowners are Simon Watson-Taylor esq. of Erlestoke Park, who is lord of the manor, Miss Mills, Walter Hume Long esq. M.P. of Rood Ashton, Trowbridge, and Mr. John Coleman. The soil is mixed with flints and beautiful working; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats. The area is 3,765 acres; rateable value, £1,987; in 1891 the population was 393.

stained east window adorns the chancel: the south aisle has a carved oak ceiling, erected about 1650, restored in 1688; also the north aisle has a carved oak ceiling: "1560 Anno Domini, this Hele was erected" is inscribed on one of the beams: in 1887 the south transept was restored throughout; a choir vestry, clergy vestry and organ chamber were built and a new organ was erected; the chancel was newly panelled in carved oak, and a reredos in alabaster and terra cotta was erected: there are sittings for 500 persons: in the churchyard is an immense yew tree, measuring 30 feet in circumference, and said by experts to be 1,300 years of age. The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value from tithe rent-charge £441, net £280, with 3 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Mrs. Hutchinson, of Tisbury Vicarage, and held since 1858 by the Rev. Francis Edmund Hutchinson M.A. of University College, Oxford. Here is a Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1846, with 100 sittings; and a Congregational chapel, erected in 1842, to seat 400 persons; also two Primitive Methodist chapels, one in West Tisbury parish, built in 1877, to seat 100 persons; and one at Hatch, West Tisbury, built in 1872, to seat 90. There are charities, amounting to about £161 yearly, which are administered under a scheme drawn up by the Charity Commissioners. A Public Hall was erected in 1887, by a company formed for the purpose, to hold 400 persons. A Police Station and Petty Sessions Hall were erected in 1889, and the petty sessional division transferred from Hindon to Tisbury; the new build-

ing is admirably appointed in its various offices. A large pile of buildings here, formerly the residence of the Abbess of Shaftesbury, has for the last two centuries been occupied as a farm house with out-buildings, attached to which is a large tithe barn of the 15th century and said to be the largest in England, its dimensions being 188 feet 3 inches by 32 feet 3 inches. This is a fine agricultural district; and there are some excellent quarries, producing stone for building; the expense of carriage very much limited the use of this material, but since the construction of the Salisbury and Yeovil railway, passing within a short distance of the quarries, it has become an article of great demand. Situated on an eminence, and overlooking the surrounding country, is the Castle of Wardour, built in 1776, the seat of Lord Arundell of Wardour D.L., J.P.: it is a splendid edifice, containing numerous suites of apartments; incorporated with the mansion is a beautiful Catholic chapel, dedicated to All Saints, richly fitted up, and containing a series of paintings: the extensive park and pleasure grounds are flanked by plantations, adorned with numerous groups of stately forest trees: in the vicinity are the ruins of the old castle of Wardour, which was built in 1392, and the earthworks that were thrown up by the Parliamentary army when they laid siege to that fortress: it was surrendered, after a lengthened siege, by Lady Blanche Arundell, daughter of the Earl of Worcester, when Sir Edmund Ludlow was placed in command with a large Parliamentary force, but was ultimately re-taken and destroyed by the springing of the mine; Lord Arundell thus sacrificing the castle to the cause: the cemetery is a quarter of a mile from the chapel. Pyt House, the seat of John Montague Bennett-Stanford esq. J.P. is a fine old mansion, with heavy porticoes over the principal entrances; the family are descended from Col. Bennett, who was M.P. for Shaftesbury in the reign of Charles I.: the house, standing on high ground, commands some fine views, among others Kingsettle hill, and is situated amid a beautifully-arranged park of 150 acres. Lord Arundell of Wardour is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Lord Arundell of Wardour, John M. Bennett-Stanford esq. Alfred Morrison esq. William Wyndham esq. and Sir Michael R. Shaw-Stewart bart. The soil is various, some light loam, clay and stone and light chalk; subsoil, clay and gravel, chalk and flint and sandstone. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley and some land in pasturage. The area of the three parishes is 7,290 acres.

TOCKENHAM is a parish, 3½ miles south-west from Wootton Bassett station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 11 south-west from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, Cricklade and Wootton Bassett union, petty sessional division of Wootton Bassett and county court district of Swindon, rural deanery of Avebury (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The Wilts and Berks canal and the Great Western railway pass through the parish. The church of St. John is a small ancient Gothic stone structure, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch, western bell-cot with one bell: it was thoroughly restored in 1876 at the sole cost of a former rector, the Rev. J. J. Stanton: there is a handsome monument to the Goddard-Smith family, dating from 1692: there are 150 sittings. The register dates from the latter part of the 16th century. The living is a rectory, yearly tithe rent-charge £255, average £190, gross yearly income £265, net £106, including 36 acres of glebe with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chan-

cellor, and held since 1892 by the Rev. William Henry Hewlett Cooper M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin, and F.R.G.S. The charities amount to about £16 yearly, arising from £500 invested in Consols by Mrs. Ann Jacob in 1780, and from £200 similarly invested by Mrs. Mary Clutterbuck in 1784: the cost of keeping the family tombs in repair is deducted, and the remainder, together with a rent-charge of £3 on the Tockenham estate, is distributed among the poor who are not in receipt of parish relief. The soil is of a sandy nature; subsoil, rock. The chief crops are wheat and some pasture land. The area is 759 acres; rateable value, £1,801; the population in 1891 was 138.

TOLLARD ROYAL is a parish and village on the Dorsetshire border, and close to the bounds of Cranborne Chase, 10 miles south-east from Semley station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the London and South Western railway, 17½ south-west from Salisbury and 8 south-east from Shaftesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Chalke hundred, Tisbury and Mere petty sessional division, Tisbury union, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Tisbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The parish is divided into four farms—Higher Farm, Lower Farm, Corner Farm and Thorn Farm; the parish is called Royal in consequence of John, Earl of Gloucester, afterwards King John, holding a knight's fee here; King John also held the chase of Cranborne and used occasionally to reside here; the name of his palace is still attached to a house in the neighbourhood. Tollard Royal church and the whole of the parish are in this county, but the rector has tithes of a district of 1,260 acres of land in the neighbouring county of Dorset, called Tollard Farnham, and the cure of souls extends to the inhabitants of Tollard Farnham as well as Tollard Royal. The church of St. Peter ad Vincula, or St. Peter in Chains, is an edifice of stone in the Gothic style; it has chancel, nave of three bays, north aisle, south porch and a western tower containing 5 bells, with pinnacles and embattled parapet, and in 1882 it was put into thorough repair; it stands on higher ground than the few houses comprising the village: in the chancel there is a memorial window to Lord and Lady Rivers, who died in April, 1866, within forty-eight hours of each other, and to one of their daughters, the wife of Captain Arbutnot, who, while on her wedding tour in Switzerland, was struck dead by lightning, June 21st, 1865, eight weeks after her marriage in this church: in the wall near the pew in which

the deceased formerly sat is a wooden cross, originally raised by the inhabitants of the Alpine village near which the sad event happened, and subsequently removed and a stone cross substituted for it: a brass tablet on the wall surmounts the cross and records the circumstances: there is also in the nave a recumbent monument to Sir William Payne kt. ob. 1388: there are 150 sittings. The register dates from the year 1777. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £434, gross yearly value £504, net £380, with 80 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of and held since 1865 by the Rev. George Howard Waterfall M.A. of Worcester College, Oxford. Here is a Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1879. The principal landowners are Sir Thomas Fraser Grove bart. and Lieut.-Gen. A. H. L. Pitt-Rivers, of Rushmore, who is lord of the manor. The soil is light and flinty; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 2,807 acres of corn and down land; rateable value, £1,368; the population in 1891 was 440, of which 897 acres and 193 inhabitants are in Tollard Farnham.

Ashmore Common is 1½ miles west.

T R O W B R I D G E .

THIS ancient manufacturing town is on the line of the Great Western railway to Salisbury and Weymouth, on which it has a station, at the west end of the town, and on the bank of the river Mere or Biss, a feeder of the Avon; it is 97 miles from London by rail, and 99 by road, 10½ south-west from Devizes, 9½ north-west from Warminster, 10 north-east from Frome, 11 south-east from Bath, 5 north-west from Westbury, 3 south-east from Bradford, 5½ from Melksham, 11¼ from Chippenham and 32 north from Salisbury: it is in the Western division of the county, the head of a county court district and petty sessional division, and a parish in the Melksham hundred and union, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury, and includes the tithings of Staverton and Studley.

The town was governed by a Local Board of Health of 21 members, under the "Local Government Act, 1858," from June 13, 1864, but under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894," the Urban District Council is now the local authority; it is lighted with gas by a company formed in 1824, whose works are in Gooseacre. The Trowbridge Water Co. was incorporated in 1873, and the works were inaugurated on the 30th September, 1874, when the water was supplied to the town by a temporary arrangement, and on this occasion was thrown over the church spire, a height of 159 feet; the water is obtained from the chalk hills, in the hamlet of Biss, where an adit has been made to intercept the springs, forming the principal source of the river Biss: from this adit the water passes into a main of about 7 miles in length, whence it is delivered to Trowbridge. The Compensation works at Semington consist of a pump worked by a turbine, by which the compensating water is lifted from a stream, called the Semington brook, and conducted partly in an open channel and partly through an iron main into the river Biss, at a point just above that where the cloth mills are situated, thus giving to the river at a lower point a quantity equal to that abstracted at the source. The engineer was the late Henry Tomlinson C.E. of Cambridge.

The Kennet and Avon Navigation passes within a mile of the town, and crosses the railway by a viaduct, and joins the river Avon at Bath, which is navigable thence through Bristol to the Severn; the canal brings coal for the town and surrounding country.

The parish church of St. James is an ancient stone structure, in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave of ten bays, aisles, and north porch, and embattled west square tower, with pinnacles and surmounted by a spire 159 feet high, with a fine peal of 8 bells and clock: the entire building underwent considerable alteration and repair in 1848, during the incumbency of the Rev. John David Hastings, and a restoration of much of its original architectural beauty, at an expense of upwards of £8,000: George Crabbe, the poet, was for eighteen years rector of this parish, and his remains were deposited in a vault in the chancel of the church: here are several monuments: the baptistery at the west end has been restored by Alexander Mackay esq. and the floor handsomely laid with mosaic marble; it has two iron gates: the interior contains ten stained windows, one in memory of John Clark, one to William Willis, one to Maria Waldron and one to Sarah Maria Gane, daughter of George Webb: the church has sittings for 666 persons. The register dates from the year 1538. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £704, net £300, with residence and 67 acres of glebe, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1894 by the Rev. Algernon Charles Dudley Ryder M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge, and surrogate.

In Castle street is St. Stephen's chapel of ease to the mother church, formerly a Baptist chapel: it has a Gothic chancel and handsome window, with a figure of St. Stephen, its patron saint; it is capable of seating 500 persons.

There is an iron mission room in Upper Broad street in connection with St. James' church.

Holy Trinity is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1839; the church is a handsome stone cruciform edifice, erected in 1838, at the west end of the town, consists of chancel, nave, transepts, south porch and western tower containing one bell and clock: it was thoroughly repaired and beautified about 1861, and again in 1884: it contains four stained windows, one being the east window, paid for by subscription, one to the Rev. the Hon.

Digby Walsh, by the congregation, and two memorial windows to Charles Gane esq. and his wife: also a stone pulpit: there are 1,033 sittings. The register dates from the year 1839. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £323, net £320, with residence, in the gift of the rector of Trowbridge, and held since 1893 by the Rev. Robert Ewing M.A. of St. John's College, Oxford. The area of the ecclesiastical parish is 833 acres; the population in 1891 was 4,786.

St. Thomas is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1870. The church, in the north-east end of the town, was built at the cost of Thomas Clark esq. in memory of his father: it is a cruciform stone building in the Early English style, consisting of nave of two bays, aisles and transepts, south porch, with western bell turret containing 4 bells, and surmounted by a spire: there are 320 sittings: the east window is stained, and there are two others in the chancel, one to the memory of Miss Waldron, d. 1872, and the other given by Jesse Gouldsmith, in memory of his brother. The register dates from the year 1870. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £154, net £150, with residence, in the gift of five trustees, and held since 1880 by the Rev. William Henry Start.

The Catholic chapel, Wingfield road, dedicated to St. John the Baptist, is a stone building, in the Gothic style, erected in 1875, and has 280 sittings.

The Baptists have chapels in Church street, erected in 1736, having 860 sittings: in Court street, built 1813, with 840 seats: Particular Baptist in Union street, in 1816, for 700 persons.

The Congregational tabernacle, Church street, founded in 1771, has sittings for 715 persons.

The Congregational chapel, Silver street, was erected in 1740, and has 240 seats.

The Unitarian chapel, in the Conigre, was erected in 1820, with 400 sittings.

The Wesleyans have three chapels, one in Manvers street, erected in 1826, and having 800 sittings; another in Wesley road, erected in 1871, seating 350 persons; and the third at Islington, erected in 1814, with 220 seats.

The Salvation Army have a hall in Castle street.

A Cemetery of ten acres, at the Down, was formed in 1856, at a cost of £5,045, having two mortuary chapels; it is under the control of a burial board of 9 members.

The Town Hall stands on the east side of the Market House, immediately in front of the People's Park, and was provided by the liberality of Sir William Roger Brown, of Highfield, Hilperton, at a cost of £20,000; Mr. A. S. Goodridge, of Bath, architect. The foundation stone was laid by Lady Brown in 1887; and the building opened on June 14, 1889, by H.R.H. the Duchess of Albany: the style of architecture is partly of Queen Anne and the Elizabethan periods, with an adaptation to the present Victorian age, having gabled roof with a tower over the entrance: the material used is local stone, the face of the walls being Atworth in range work, with Corsham Down freestone dressings and cornices; Boxground stone being used for set-off and copings: the façade is richly ornamented with carvings and the royal arms and also those of the donor on the main gables: the tower, which is 101 feet 6 inches in height, has two clock dials, each five feet in diameter: the quarters are chimed on two bells, and the hour struck on a third, weighing 14 cwt.: on the lower portion of the tower appear panels, representing the staple trade of the town. The main doorway has boldly recessed piers and capitals, richly ornamented, supporting three concentric arches, delicately cut and of original design. The vestibule is floored with a handsome mosaic pavement, and has a tinted tiled dado 5 feet in height round the walls. The hall is well lighted and has polished columns of Purbeck marble, with moulded stone caps carrying semi-circular arches supporting the first floor: on the right side and facing the street is a cloak room for gentlemen and a room for solicitors and barristers. The noblest room on the ground floor is the Sessions Court, being 37 feet square: due provision is made for the bench, bar, jury, officials, with a gallery for the public. The grounds at the rear of the building, though small, have been tastefully laid out. The gables in the rear of the hall are ornamented with the Wiltshire arms and the arms of the lord lieutenant.

The Police Station is in Stallard street; Superintendent Henry White, resides on the premises.

The Savings Bank, established in 1817, has offices in

Fore street, erected in 1877. The Capital and Counties Bank Limited, and the Wilts and Dorset Banking Co. Limited, have branches here.

The Conservative Club and the Young Men's Christian Association are in Fore street, and the Liberal Club, in Conigre.

The market days are Tuesday and Saturday; a large cattle market is held on alternate Tuesdays; and a pleasure fair is held annually on the 5th, 6th and 7th of August.

An horticultural show is held annually in August, and a cattle show in December.

There is a drinking fountain in Fore street, erected November, 1876, by a native of Frome (Somersetshire).

The chief employment of the inhabitants is the manufacture of kerseymere, broad and other woollen cloths, established here as early as the reign of Henry VIII. and now the largest in the West of England. There are also extensive breweries, foundries, and engineering and brick works. A large trade is also done in the curing of bacon, and the manufacture of beds and mattresses and brushes.

Trowbridge, as far as regards the regular forces, is attached to the Western military district, the remainder of Wiltshire being included in the Southern district. The artillery barracks, on the Frome road, are capable of containing about 150 men, and are now (1895) unoccupied.

The Widows' Almshouses, in Roundstone street, have an endowment left by Henry, Edward and William Yerbury in 1698, now producing £120 yearly, from lands and money in the Funds, and are for six poor widows; each inmate is paid £1 8s. monthly.

The Old Men's Almshouses, in Union street, were built by public subscription in 1861, and are maintained by the income from funded property and by voluntary subscriptions. There are eight houses and each occupant receives 6s. weekly and usually a supply of fuel.

The New Almshouses, at Islington, were erected in 1893 by George H. Palmer esq. in memory of his father. There are three houses and each occupant receives about 8s. weekly.

There are charities producing about £113 yearly, £32 of which are distributed in bread; there were left by William Wallis in 1652 £20 and Edward Wallis £10; in 1661 Ezekiel Wallis £10; in 1692 Henry Wallis £50; in 1693 Mrs. Ann Wallis £20; in 1700 Robert Pinchin £100; in 1704 Richard Singer £120; in 1721 Mrs. Ann Wallis £30; in 1736 William Temple £20; in 1773 William Temple £20; in 1802 John Clark 50 guineas; and also £400 in stock, the interest to be paid to the organist of the church. In 1692 Richard Bissie left £50, the profits to apprentice a poor boy; in 1724 James Singer left £200, the interest to pay for the education of ten poor boys; in 1730 Richard Shrapnell left £20, the interest to pay for the education of one poor boy. In 1729 Joseph Halten left £220; in 1769 Robert Halten left £100; in 1781 Eleanor Temple £200; in 1809 Thomas Dundee £50.

A Cottage Hospital, in the Halve, a new building on the most approved plan, was erected in 1883, and given to the town by the late Jesse Gouldsmith, and was established in 1870 for diseases and accidents; a piece of land adjoining was added in 1893, the gift of Mrs. Gouldsmith, which has been laid out with shrubs, trees &c.; a small weekly charge is made for sick patients, but accidents are admitted free. There are four wards containing ten beds, and in 1894 there were 41 patients. Visiting days, Tuesdays 2 till 4; Fridays, 6 till 8 p.m.

The Infectious Diseases Hospital, on the Bradley road, is under the control of the Urban District Council.

A Public Soup Kitchen, for the gratuitous distribution of soup, has been given to the town by Mrs. Gouldsmith, and is situated in Conigre.

The Public Pleasure Grounds, consisting of about 4 acres, were opened in 1884, and in 1887 were purchased by public subscription, and now vested in the Urban Council. At the same time the Queen Victoria Jubilee Widows' Fund was established, the invested capital of which amounts to £1,000.

There is a public bathing place on the river Biss, under the control of the Rural District Council.

George Keats, the poet, was born here in 1729, and died in 1797. The site of the old castle, held by the Empress Matilda against Stephen, may be recognized by a mound called Court hill, but the castle itself has long disappeared.

Trowbridge, in the earliest records called Straburgh, was formerly a royal manor, which was given by Henry VIII. to the Somerset family, in whose possession it remained until the marriage of Lady Frances Seymour, daughter of Algernon, seventh Duke of Somerset, with the Marquis of Granby, afterwards Duke of Rutland, from whose family it was purchased by the late Thomas Timbrell esq. and is now held by William Stancomb esq. of Blount Court, Potterne, who purchased the manor from the Timbrell family.

The Prospect is the seat of John Perkins Stancomb esq. J.P.; the mansion, pleasantly situated, stands in a park of 20 acres. Bellefield house is the seat of Thomas Clark esq. D.L., J.P.

Earl Manvers is lord of the inferior manor of Trowbridge Dauntsey.

The soil is mixed; subsoil, gravel. The chief crops are grass and wheat. The area is 2,400 acres; rateable value 1894, £40,244; the population in 1891 was 11,901, including Staverton and Studley and 142 in the barracks; and of the Urban District 11,717. The population of the ecclesiastical parishes in 1891 was:—St. James, 4,763; Holy Trinity, 4,786; St. Thomas, 1,722.

STUDLEY is a tithing and ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1858 from the civil parish of Trowbridge, adjoining Trowbridge on the south. The church of St. John is a plain stone building in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch, and western belfry with one bell: the east window is stained and 7 others: there are 180 sittings. The register dates from the year 1858. The living is a vicarage, with residence, gross yearly value £139, net £133, in the gift of the rector of Trowbridge, and held since 1882 by the Rev. Robert Runcorn Monteath M.A. of Edinburgh University. The Baptists have a chapel here, built in 1850 to hold 120. The principal landowners are Messrs. James Huntley, of the Galley, Frome road, Trowbridge and John Milsom. The soil is clay; subsoil, loam. The land is principally pasture. The area is 397 acres; the population in 1891 was 283.

TYTHERTON (or Tytherton Lucas or West Tytherton) is a chapelry and small village, 2 miles east-north-east from Chippenham station on the Great Western railway, in the North-Western division of the county, Chippenham parish, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol, and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The river Marden flows south of the parish, which is bounded on the west by the river Avon. The church of St. Nicholas is a plain building of stone, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, north aisle, and a turret containing one bell: it has a curious and very fine Norman font: there are 70 sittings. The separate register dates only from 1850; previous to that date entries were made in the Chippenham register, which dates from 1578. The living is a rectory, annexed for more than six centuries to the vicarage of Chippenham, average tithe rent-charge (Tytherton) £129, joint net yearly value £193, including 17 acres of glebe here, in

UPAVON is a parish and village, on the river Avon, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-east from Woodborough station on the Berks and Hants extension branch of the Great Western railway, $4\frac{1}{2}$ south-west from Pewsey, 18 north from Salisbury, $9\frac{1}{2}$ south-east from Devizes, and 12 south-by-west from Marlborough, in the Eastern division of the county, hundred of Swanborough, Everleigh and Pewsey petty sessional division, union of Pewsey, Marlborough county court district, rural deanery of Potterne (Enford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary is an edifice of flint and stone, in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, which retains a piscina, nave of 4 bays, north aisle and north porch, with a square embattled western Norman tower, in which are 5 bells and clock: there is one stained window: the church was completely restored in 1876, at a cost of £2,650, when the bays of a south aisle were discovered: at the entrance to the chancel is a Transition Norman arch, with dog-tooth carving, in a fine state of preservation, and on each side are small openings: there is a Norman font, on which are some grotesque carvings, and there are 300 sittings. UPTON LOVELL (in Domesday spelt Lovel), is a parish and small village, on the banks of the Wylve, 1 mile north-west from Codford station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, $5\frac{1}{2}$ south-east from Warminster, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ south-east-by-south from Heytesbury, in the Western division of the county, Heytesbury hundred, Warminster petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Augustine of Canterbury is a small edifice, built in mixed styles of architecture, consisting of a chancel (built about 1150), nave, north and south porches (the latter used as the vestry), and low square tower with 3 bells: a small window in the chancel is Early Norman: the building was restored in 1892: on a stone in the wall over the south porch is the date 1633, which date was also found to be carved on one of the bosses of the oak roof of the nave at the restoration of the church in 1892, a work carried out at a cost of £600: the ancient 12th century font discovered during the progress of the work has been placed at the west end, on a new pedestal of Bath stone; the church was also re-seated in oak and a new oak pulpit and lectern erected; a defaced piscina was found on the south side of the chancel, and on the north side

URCHFONT (or Erchfont) is a parish and village, 5 miles south-east from Devizes station and $4\frac{1}{2}$ south-west from Woodborough station, both on the Great Western railway, in the Eastern division of the county, Swanborough hundred, Devizes union, county court district and petty sessional division, Potterne rural deanery (Enford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Michael is an ancient structure of grey stone, in the Decorated style, having a chancel, clerestoried nave of three bays, aisles and transepts, south porch and square tower at the western extremity, with a turret and embattled parapet, ornamented with pinnacles, and containing a clock and 8 bells: there is a good organ: the nave is separated from the aisles by Pointed arches supported by pillars, and from the chancel by an arch with mouldings of much beauty and simplicity: this arch, owing to pressure from above, is slightly irregular in outline: the chancel is large, and has a groined stone roof; it contains a piscina which is coeval with the church: there is another in the south transept of the same date, and much decayed: the porch has a stone ceiling covered with carving of a single design repeated many times: a small empty niche is above the outer doorway; the east window, erected in 1889, is stained: there are two stained windows in the south transept in memory of Miss Hallilay, one put up by subscription by the parishioners in 1858, the other in the same year by her non-resident friends; there are also four other stained windows in the chancel: the font seems to be coeval with the church: in the chancel is a fine Purbeck marble monument with two busts in the centre, and on either side a life-sized figure of a child: it was erected to Robert Tothill, ob. 1753, senior clerk of the Privy Seal to George III., J.P. for Wilts, Middlesex and Kent, and a Governor of Christ's, St. Thomas' and St. Bartholomew's hospitals, in pursuance of his will, by Sir William Pynsent bart. one of the executors: in the year 1840, the church was restored at a cost of £1,000, and in 1864 the building was entirely re-seated, and sittings for 80 additional persons provided, the gallery removed, the organ repaired and improved, and the chancel beautified, the whole costing between £700 and £800, raised by subscription; at the time of this restoration the whole of the seats in the nave were made free, and the seats in the aisles alone are now appropriated: there are about 600 sittings: also, since 1861, the vicar-

WANBOROUGH (a corruption of the old name of Wodensburgh) is a parish, 2 miles north-east from Ohisledon station on the Midland and South Western Junction railway, and 5 south-east from Swindon by coach road, but only 3½ by a bridle road, in the Northern division of the county, Kingsbridge hundred, Highworth and Swindon union, county court district, and petty sessional division of Swindon, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol: it is divided into Upper and Lower Wanborough. The church of St. Andrew is an ancient stone structure, in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave of five bays, and aisles, north and south porches and remarkable as having a square Perpendicular embattled western tower with pinnacles, and 5 bells, and in addition a spire between the chancel and nave: there is only one similar church in England, which is at Purton, in this county: the church was restored in 1830, and during the years 1880 to 1885 the chancel was new roofed, the walls of interior scraped and stuccoed, and a tessellated pavement laid down, the walls of the church and tower new pointed, the south and part of the north roof fresh leaded, new troughing and drain tiles laid down carrying the water outside the churchyard, wooden steps in tower removed, and baptistery erected to receive the new font, at a cost of nearly £500: there are sittings for 400 persons. The register dates from the year 1582. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £92, gross yearly value £275, net £230, including 85 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Win-

chester, and held since 1891 by the Rev. Henry Tanner King M.A. of Pembroke College, Oxford. Here are Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. Charities amounting to £10, derived from land left in 1745 by the Honourable William Stanley, are distributed yearly. A. L. Goddard esq. of The Lawn, Swindon, and the Dean and Chapter of Winchester and the President and Fellows of Magdalen College, Oxford, are lords of the manor and principal landowners. WARMINSTER.

WARMINSTER is a market and union town, head of a county court district and petty sessional division and parish, giving name to the hundred, and is in the Western division of the county, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury, and has a station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, situated at the western extremity of the county and of Salisbury Plain, on the river Wylve, which is here a mill-stream, 114 miles from London, 4 south from Westbury, 9 south from Trowbridge, 14 south from Melksham, 20½ south from Chippenham, 37 south-west from Swindon, 17 south-west from Devizes and 21 north-west from Salisbury. This was a Roman settlement, and is mentioned in the Domesday Survey by the name of Guermistre, and was then considered ancient, and possessed many privileges. The town is at the junction of the roads from Bath, Frome, Salisbury and Shaftesbury, and consists principally of one street, about a mile in length, lighted by gas and well paved, and was governed by a Local Board of Health from June, 1867, until the present Urban District Council was established under the "Local Government Act, 1894."

The Minster (St. Denys), at the western extremity of the town, was formerly an ancient stone structure in various styles, dating from the time of Edward III. but was completely rebuilt, with the exception of the tower, in 1887-89, from plans by Sir Arthur William Blomfield A.R.A., M.A. at a cost of £10,700, raised by voluntary offerings: it is now a handsome cruciform structure, chiefly in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, with south aisle or chapel, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south and west porches, north and south transepts, two vestries, and organ chamber, and the original central embattled tower, with pinnacles, which contains a fine peal of eight bells; in 1881 a new treble and 2nd bell were given by Mr. George Thomas Vicary, and numbers 3 to 7 were then recast: the organ, which was first used in 1792, is a very fine one, and was built to the order of King George III. for Salisbury Cathedral: in the north wall of the chancel is a stained window given by Mr. H. P. Jones in memory of his son, and the beautiful font of Hopton stone is in memory of his daughter, Miss E. L. Jones, and with the mosaic pavement around it was given by her brothers and sisters and their children in 1889: there is a fine stained east window: the stained west window was erected in 1891 by William Langley Feltham esq. in memory of his father, d. 1856, and his mother, d. 1866; and there are several windows and memorial brasses and numerous mural monuments, dating from 1635 to 1649: the carved stone pulpit was given by Miss Vicary: the church was re-opened by the bishop of the diocese on February 21st, 1889: there are sittings for 1,000 persons. The earliest date of the register is 1556. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge £40, average £30, gross yearly value £405, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1859 by the Rev. Sir James Erasmus Philipps bart. M.A. of Christ Church, Oxford, canon and prebendary of Salisbury.

Christ Church, Sambourne, is an ecclesiastical parish formed in 1838; the church was erected in 1831 as a chapel of ease, by subscription, aided by Parliamentary grant: it is a plain stone building, consisting of chancel, nave, north and south porches, square western embattled tower, with pinnacles, containing a fine peal of 8 bells: the chancel was added in 1870, the interior restored, and an organ inserted, at a cost of £1,350, and in 1881 the interior was again restored at a cost of £1,400 raised by subscription: all the seats were then made free and unappropriated, and £1,500 raised in place of pew rents, yielding an income of £56 yearly: the church will seat about 960 persons. The register dates from the year 1833. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £300, net £130, including 3 acres of glebe, in the gift of the vicar of Warminster, and held since 1867 by the Rev. William Hickman M.A. of Wadham College, Oxford.

The chapel of St. Laurence, a chapel of ease, and old chantry of the reign of Edward I. stands near the Town Hall; it is of stone in the Early English style, and has nave and Norman western tower, with a spire and one bell, and is used for week day services: there are sittings for 100 persons.

St. John the Evangelist's is a chapel of ease, standing at the eastern extremity of the town, and was conse-

crated in 1865: eight acres of land were given for the church, churchyard and glebe, by the late W. Temple esq. of Bishopstrow House, and his son, the late G. Temple esq.; they also gave upwards of £700; the total cost was about £3,000: the church is an adaptation of 14th century architecture, and comprises chancel, with vestry and organ chamber on the north side, and a nave with a north aisle of three bays, south porch and a central turret, containing one bell: the reredos of carved alabaster was erected in 1867, in memory of William John Temple, d. 1849: the chancel has three stained windows, one of which is in memory of Walter Kerr Hamilton, Bishop of Salisbury, d. 1869: the brass chancel screen was given by Mrs. Temple of Bishopstrow, in memory of George, her son, d. 1868: on the west wall there is a large Serpentine cross, in memory of the Rev. John Rule, d. 1872: the font, the gift of the Misses Temple, is of Painswick stone and Devonshire marble: there is a massive stone lych-gate erected in memory of the wife of the late W. Temple esq.: the chapel has 300 sittings.

Here is a Congregational chapel, founded 1827, with 300 sittings; Baptist, 1812, with 350; and Wesleyan, 1825, with 200 sittings.

The Missionary College of St. Boniface was established by the present vicar in 1860, for the training of young men who desire to devote their lives to the work of Foreign Missions. There are at present 20 students.

The Community of St. Denys' was established by the Rev. Sir James E. Philipps bart. in 1866, for the preparation of women desirous of assisting in missionary work abroad, or acting as nurses at home; in connection with it is St. Monica, a school for young ladies. The Sisters have schools for European and Eurasian girls, at Murree and at Lahore, in the Punjab, in the diocese of Lahore, under the direction of Bishop Matthew.

The Orphanage of Pity consists of two houses, in which are 30 children; it has no endowment, and is supported by what is given from day to day: it is free to orphan children from all parts who are of legitimate birth. The Warminster Cottage Hospital was established in 1866: there are 11 beds, and 110 patients were treated here during the year 1893. In 1873 almshouses for four aged women, with a gift of 6s. per week each, were erected by Mrs. Warren, in memory of her husband.

The Town Hall is an edifice, in the Elizabethan style, erected in 1830 by the Marquess of Bath, and contains courts for the administration of justice, and rooms for assemblies and for public meetings: the Local and Highway Boards meet here: petty sessions are held here monthly, and the July quarter sessions for the county: the County court is also held here: in 1888 a considerable addition was made to the cell accommodation for prisoners at quarter sessions.

Here is a silk winding mill, employing about 200 hands, also two large engineering and agricultural implement and steam plough works: there are also four large breweries, and malting carried on to a considerable extent. A corn market is held on Saturday, and fairs on 22nd April, 11th August and 26th October.

The Savings Bank, a fine building, in the Elizabethan style, was erected in 1852, at a cost of £2,000. There is also an Athenæum, with about 150 members, and in connection is a Lecture Hall, erected in 1879 as a memorial of the late Charles Bleek esq. at a cost of £1,500; there is also a literary institution.

Warminster is the head quarters of the 1st Wiltshire Rifle Volunteers.

The charities amount to about £320, arising from various bequests, and distributed in money, clothing, coals and food annually at Christmas.

A track on the side of a hill to the north is called the Nuns' path. Of several ancient intrenchments, Battlesbury Camp covers upwards of 23 acres; and a small one in Southleigh Wood is called Robin Hood's Bower; another crowns the larger of two abrupt and conspicuous knolls, called Cley Hill, the parochial boundary between Warminster and Corsley passing over the larger hill; it was formerly a custom for the parishioners to assemble here on Palm Sunday. In Pitmead, a large meadow on the Wylve, 2 miles east from Warminster, some beautiful mosaic pavements and other Roman remains have been discovered at various times; in a vale of the same river is King

Barrow, one of the largest British barrows in the county: and on the summit of the conical eminence of Copheap Hill is another large barrow, which was opened by Sir R. C. Hoare in 1809, and found to contain several skeletons. Cold Harbour was a Roman military halting place. Numerous fossil remains are also in the soil.

The Marquess of Bath, who is lord of the manor, Granville Newton Temple esq. and Captain Arthur Howard Southey of Eastleigh Court, Bishopstrow, are the principal landowners. The area is 6,085 acres; rateable value, £22,209; the population in 1891 was 5,563, in-

cluding 63 officers and inmates in the workhouse and 63 in the reformatory. The population of St. Denys' ecclesiastical parish in 1891 was 3,770 and of Christ Church, Sambourne, 1,766.

Boreham 1 mile south-east and Bugley nearly 1 mile north-west are hamlets.

WEST WELLOW is a scattered parish on the Salisbury and Southampton road, 4½ miles south-west from Romsey station on the Eastleigh and Salisbury branch of the London and South Western railway, and 12 south-east from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, Amesbury hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Romsey union and county court district, rural deanery of Romsey and archdeaconry and diocese of Winchester. East Wellow, in Hampshire, and West Wellow ecclesiastically constitute a parish, known as East Wellow. The church of St. Margaret is an old flint and stone building, chiefly in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, south aisle, south porch and a square western wooden belfry containing 3 bells: it is situated in East Wellow: there are about 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1570. The living is a vicarage, consolidated with East Wellow, average tithe rent-charge £183, net yearly value £160, with residence and 26 acres of glebe, in the gift of William Shore Nightingale esq. and held since 1893 by the Rev. Robert Herbert Fair M.A. of St. Peter's College, Cambridge.

There are Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. There is a mission hall at Canada, which was enlarged in 1889; services held on Sunday evenings: it has 204 sittings. William Shore Nightingale esq. of Embley Park, East Wellow, Hants, is lord of the manor and the principal landowner. The soil is sand and loam; subsoil, sand and clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots. The area is 1,397 acres; rateable value, £1,791; the population in 1891 was 631.

WESTBURY is a union town and parish, 109½ miles from London, 26 north-west from Salisbury, 4½ north from Warminster, and 5 south from Trowbridge, and head of a petty sessional division and county court district, in the Western division of the county, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The Great Western line to Somerset and Dorset passes through and the Salisbury branch forms a junction here. The town, which gives name to the hundred, is very ancient, and is supposed to have been the scene of an engagement between Alfred and the Danes in the year 890, to commemorate which there is a figure of a horse, of enormous size, cut on the side of Bratton Hill, which is commonly called Bratton Castle; the soil being chalk, the figure can be distinctly seen for many miles, and in 1873 a committee was formed, by whom the horse was thoroughly re-instated, at an expense of £40, and is now cleaned when necessary. In the town stands the Market House, erected in the year 1815 by the late Sir Manasseh Massey Lopes bart. and now used as a Town Hall, in which the County Court is held bi-monthly. The town was incorporated by royal charter in the reign of Henry IV., the municipal body consisting of a mayor, recorder, and twelve capital burgesses with subordinate officers, and the Corporation continued to be elected, although exercising no magisterial authority, until the passing of the "Municipal Corporations Act, 1883" (46 and 47 Vict. c. 18), by which it was recommended to be abolished and it finally ceased in March, 1886: the only relic of the municipal insignia now apparent y

existing is the borough seal, presented in 1597 by Matthew Ley; it is oval and of silver, with an ivory handle, and bears the arms of the town, surrounded by a legend. The borough formerly returned two members to Parliament, but by the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885" (48 and 49 Vict. c. 23), the representation was merged in that of the county. The church of All Saints is a very beautiful building of stone, having chancel (rebuilt in 1863), nave, south and west porches, and a fine embattled central tower, in the Perpendicular style, containing 6 deep-toned bells: the windows of the chancel are stained, and it is paved with encaustic tiles: in 1867 the whole of the stonework was restored, and a new floor put down, and the church re-seated with oak, and a handsome pulpit provided: the alterations cost between £3,000 and £4,000: there are several fine stained windows: it contains, among others, a fine monument to Sir James Ley kt. Chief Justice of the King's Bench, Lord Treasurer, and first Earl of Marlborough of this family, d. 14 March, 1629: there are 750 sittings. The registers date from the year 1566. The living is a vicarage, with the chapelries of Dilton and Westbury Leigh, average tithe rent-charge £175, gross yearly value £411, including 33 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Patrick Murray Smythe M.A. of Keble College, Oxford, surrogate, and chaplain of Westbury union. There are two Congregational chapels, one for Baptists, and one for Wesleyans. Here is a cemetery of 5 acres, with two mortuary chapels, and an entrance lodge on the Bratton road, opened on the 12th of May.

1857; it is under the control of a Burial Board of 9 members. The Laverton Institute, erected at a cost of over £4,000, by the late Abraham Laverton esq. M.P. occupies an elevated position on the descent of the hill, at the south-west end of the Bratton road, and was opened on the 11th of September, 1873, and is a substantial structure of red brick with Bath stone dressings, with clock tower containing a clock lighted by gas; the Institute has rooms in which various societies hold their meetings; a Technical School of Science and Art is held here, and also a Textile Class, in connection with the Cloth Workers' Company: the large room for lectures, public meetings, and musical entertainments will hold 320 persons: there is likewise at the rear a boys' British school, capable of holding 100 scholars, with separate approach. Public Baths were erected and presented in 1887 by William Henry Laverton esq. J.P. The trade of the town is chiefly in the manufacture of fancy woollen coatings and meltons, employing about 400 hands; malting is likewise carried on, and there is a brick and tile works. At Ham, close to the railway station, are iron works, developed in 1857; there are two blast furnaces, one of which is now at work, producing over 400 tons weekly; the works employ about 200 hands. On the Downs, a sheep fair is held annually on the first Tuesday in September, and pleasure fairs in the town on Easter Monday and Whit Monday. A market is held on the first Monday in each month. The charities for distribution amount to £200 yearly. John Matravers esq. by will, dated 26th April, 1814, gave to his trustees £1,000, free of legacy duty, to purchase clothing for 20 poor women residing in Westbury. This place gives the title of baron to the family of Bethell. Leighton House, the seat of William Henry Laverton esq. J.P. is a noble structure of stone, standing in beautiful park-like grounds, commanding fine and extensive views of the Downs and surrounding country. The chief landowners are the Right Hon. Sir Massey Lopes bart. P.C., M.P. who is the lord of the manor and hundred, William Henry Laverton esq. of Leighton, and high sheriff of the county, the Right Hon. Lord Justice Lopes P.C. of Heywood House, C. N. P. Phipps esq. of Chalcot, Westbury, and E. E. Porter esq. of East Hill, Frome. The soil is green sand; sub-soil, gault or dark clay. The parish contains 11,901 acres, principally pasture, arable and down land; rateable value, £31,184; the population of the parish, with Leigh and Dilton in 1891 was 5,634, including 67 officers and inmates in the workhouse, and of the ecclesiastical parish of All Saints, 3,337.

WESTBURY LEIGH is a large hamlet 1 mile south-west, with some good old houses. The chapel of ease here, erected in 1880, is a building of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, south aisle, south porch and a tower, added in 1889, at the south-west angle and containing one bell: there are 300 sittings. Here are also two Baptist chapels.

CHALFORD is a small hamlet 1 mile south.

DILTON is a chapelry, in the parish of and annexed to the vicarage of Westbury, containing a few houses, about 2 miles south-west from the town of Westbury, and 3 north-west from Warminster. The chapel of St. Mary, standing at the foot of a hill, is a small but ancient building of stone consisting of chancel, nave, south porch, and a small turret with spire containing one bell: there are 100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1585. John Wilkins' charity, of £90 yearly, arising from invested property left in 1729, is for clothing, and the Castley charity, of £15 yearly, for bread and clothing for the inhabitants of the chapelry. C. N. P. Phipps esq. is lord of the manor of Dilton.

Dilton Marsh, Bratton and Heywood are ecclesiastical parishes formed out of Westbury, and will be found under their respective headings.

WESTWOOD is a parish on the Avon and Frome rivers, 2 miles south-west from Bradford-on-Avon, 3 north-west from Trowbridge and 102 from London, in the Western division of the county, hundred of Elstub, Bradford petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church, which is supposed to have been dedicated to St. Mary the Virgin, is an ancient stone structure, in the Early English style, consisting of a singularly small chancel, nave of two bays, north aisle, with exquisitely carved oak ceiling, square tower with four stone pinnacles, and containing 4 bells: the chancel arch does not spring from a like point on each side: the east window is stained: there are 100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1666. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £135, gross yearly value £276, net £218, including 19 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol, and held since 1884 by the Rev. William Ruscombe Wollen M.A. of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge. A Parish room was erected in 1892 adjoining the church. Here is a Baptist chapel, built in 1865 to hold 100, and a Sunday school was erected in 1885, and there is a Wesleyan chapel at Upper Westwood, built in 1862 to hold 150. A cemetery of half an acre was formed in 1883 at a cost of about £250; it is under the control of a burial board of 7 members. Here are freestone quarries. The Bradford Union House is in this parish, on the side of the Avon and Kennet canal, which crosses the Avon and the railway by an aqueduct near this spot, called Avoncliff; for particulars of Union, see Bradford-on-Avon. The course of the Avon from Bradford to Bath presents a series of rich and beautiful views: the valley is narrow, and abounds with wood, rock, meadow, natural

and artificial water, as the canal runs parallel with the Avon throughout this beautiful valley the entire distance from Bradford to Bath; the river Frome empties itself into the Avon at Freshford. Westwood Manor House, now occupied as a farmhouse, was built by Thomas Hungerford, yeoman of this parish and the founder and benefactor of the church; although much reduced in size, the house has some fine specimens of oak ceiling—one on the ground floor, which has 88 oblong compartments, each 18 inches long and 12 in width; the upper storey has the greater portion of a fine banqueting hall, having a rich ceiling, with pendent bosses and deep cornice with tracery. H. W. Tugwell esq. is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is clayey; subsoil, clayey and parts heavy. The chief crops are wheat and barley. The area is 807 acres; rateable value, £1,887; the population in 1891 was 540, including 106 officers and inmates of the Bradford Workhouse.

Iford is a hamlet 1 mile north-west. Here was once a Roman settlement. Iford Manor, the seat of Mrs. Rooke, is pleasantly seated on the banks of the river Frome, in grounds and park of about 60 acres.

WHADDON is a parish, 3 miles south-west from Melksham and 3 north-east from Trowbridge station on the Great Western railway, in the Western division of the county, Melksham hundred, union and county court district, petty sessional division of Whorwellsdown, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The river Avon and the Kennet and Avon canal pass through the parish. The church is a small stone building, partly Norman, of ancient date, having chancel and nave, south porch with spire containing 2 bells, and was restored in 1879 by W. P. Long esq. when the stained east window was inserted: there is a splendid monument to Walter Long, d. 1807, and one piece of sculpture, by Westmacott, is in memory of Miss Katherine Long, of Wraxall: there is a brass to Henry Long, d. 1612, and beneath the church is a mausoleum containing the remains of the Gollodge Jacob, farmer, Whaddon Grove farm

WHITEPARISH, on the borders of Hampshire, and on the road to Southampton, is 2½ miles south from West Dean station on the Salisbury branch of the London and South Western railway, and 7 south-east from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, Frustfield hundred, Alderbury union, Salisbury county court district, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, rural deanery of Amesbury (Alderbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. The church of All Saints is an edifice of flint and stone, in mixed styles, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, aisles, north porch, with a small western wooden belfry, containing a clock and 3 bells: in it are several monuments to the Eyre and St. Barbe families: considerable improvements were made in the interior in 1869-70: it contains memorial windows to the Bristow family: there are 300 sittings. The register dates from the year 1559. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £140, gross yearly value £150, net £120, with glebe (£4) and residence, in the gift of Mrs. Durie, and held since 1893 by the Rev. Julian Pattison, of Corpus Christi college, Cambridge. Here is a place of worship for Wesleyans and Primitive Methodists. Charities to the amount of £6 10s. yearly are distributed in clothing. Broxmore House, the residence of Mrs. Durie, is an elegant and spacious building, and the grounds and scenery around the house are beautiful and picturesque. Brickworth House, the property of Earl Nelson, is now occupied by James Alexander Shirreff esq. Cowesfield House, the seat of William Frederic Lawrence esq. M.P., J.P. stands on the southern slope of the Dean Hill, and commands extensive views over the country, including the New Forest and the Isle of Wight. Earl Nelson, who is lord of the manor; Mrs. Durie, Mr. Laurence and Mr. Fort are the principal landowners. The soil is chalk, sand and gravel; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat,

WILTON is a municipal borough, union town and parish, with stations on the South Western and Great Western railways, and is near the confluence of the rivers Nadder and Wylde, 3 miles north-west from Salisbury and 86 from London, in the Southern division of the county, Branch and Dole hundred, petty sessional division of Salisbury and Amesbury, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Wilton, archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The town is supposed by Baxter to have been the *Caer Guilo*, or capital of the British prince Caroilus, and subsequently an important seat of the West Saxons; it was certainly a considerable place previous to the Norman accession: in 871 King Alfred fought a battle against the Danes, who, although ultimately successful, sued for peace here, but in 1003 Wilton was partially devastated by Sweyn, King of Denmark: in 1143 it was taken possession of by Stephen, who, however, was compelled to vacate it by the army of the Empress Matilda, by whom it was burnt: it was afterwards rebuilt: it was, in 1579, visited by Queen Elizabeth: in 1603 it was for a time the residence of the court. Wilton was at a very remote period the seat of a monastery; Wulstan, Earl of Wiltshire, is said to have commenced this foundation by the erection of an oratory: thirty years after his death, Alburga, his widow, succeeded in raising this oratory into a priory: King Alfred, after defeating the Danes, erected a nunnery and transferred it to the sisters of the priory: Editha, daughter of Earl Godwin, and the virgin wife of Edward the Confessor, was educated here, and Maud, queen of Henry I. passed her early days between Romsey and this house: Wilton was the head of the diocese during the 10th and 11th centuries: the episcopal see was transferred to Sarum by William the Conqueror, which caused the decline of Wilton: the borough first sent two members to Parliament in 23rd Edward I. but by the Reform Act the number was reduced to one, and by the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, lost its separate representation, and was made the head of a parliamentary division. From a very early period, prior to the reign of Henry I. Wilton has been a corporate borough: it was not included in the Municipal Corporations Act of 1835, but by an Order in Council, dated May 15th, 1885, a new municipal charter was granted under the Reformed Municipal Corporations Act of 1866. Under the new scheme, the old corporate borough boundary is extended, and includes the whole of the parish of Wilton, with parts of the parishes of Burcombe, South Newton and Fugglestone St. Peter. The old close Corporation and the Local Board of Health is merged in the new governing body. The charter provides that the town shall consist of one ward, to be governed by a mayor, 4 aldermen and 12 councillors, who shall also discharge the duties of Urban Sanitary Authority. The first election under the Municipal Corporations Act took place in November, 1885. The town is lighted with gas from works the property of the corporation. The parish church of SS. Mary and Nicholas was built by the late Lord Herbert of Lea and the Countess of Pembroke in 1844, in lieu of the old one, at an expense of upwards of £40,000: it is in the Romanesque style, consisting of chancel, with chancel aisles, nave of six bays, and aisles: the north front is raised on a terrace approached by a flight of steps, and the central entrance of this front is through a deeply recessed porch within a rich archway, above which is a large and elaborate rose window: the campanile tower, 100 feet high, containing 6 bells, at the north-east angle, is connected with the building by a cloister, with elaborately carved open arches: beneath the communion table the floor is composed of Italian agates and marble:

the ceiling over this, as well as the chancel and altar-piece, is beautifully illuminated in blue and gold: the pulpit is composed of Caen stone, supported by 16 black marble pillars: the body of it is beautifully inlaid with mosaic work, brought from the church of Santa Maria Maggiore: the lessons are read from a lectern in front of the communion table: at the opposite end is the gallery, beneath which is the screen, elegantly carved in stone: the font is massive, of black and variegated Italian marble: the church contains a marble bust of Henry, 9th Earl of Pembroke, who held many offices of state under George II. also monuments with two recumbent figures in white marble of the late Countess of Pembroke and Lord Herbert of Lea: there is also a fine organ, presented to the church by the late Earl of Pembroke: the windows are all stained: there are sittings for 800 persons. The register dates from the year 1615. The living is a rectory, with Bulbridge, Ditchampton and Netherhampton annexed, average tithe rent-charge £190, gross yearly value £422, net £179, with 10 acres of glebe land and residence, in the gift of the Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, and held since 1867 by the Rev. Dacres Olivier M.A. of Christ Church, Oxford, canon and prebendary of Salisbury and rural dean of Wilton. Here are Nonconformist places of worship, with sittings as under:—Congregational, 500; Primitive Methodist, 150; Wesleyan, 90; and Friends' Meeting House, 70. In 1891 a cemetery with lodge was built by the Wilton Town Council, on the Ugford road, the ground consisting of about 2 acres, given by the late Earl of Pembroke. In the Town Hall hangs an extract from the will of R. Sumption esq. which is as follows:—£4,000 in aid of the Free School; £1,000 for the better clothing and apprenticing the children; £1,000 as a marriage portion for poor young women, natives of the town, not to exceed £10 to each; also £2,000 toward the clothing and support of five poor men and five women above the age of 50, residents of the place for seven years previously. James Rawlence esq. of Bulbridge, gave £1,000 for the endowment of a trained nurse for the poor. There are also many other charities in aid of the school and for distribution. Wilton is noted as the first place in England where carpeting was manufactured: Messrs. Yates and Co. have a large factory here, where, in addition to Wilton carpets, the celebrated Axminster carpets are largely produced: there is also a large pianoforte-felt factory. Fairs are held on the 4th of May, for horses, and on September 12th for cattle and sheep, when between 90,000 and 100,000 are generally penned, being one of the largest fairs in the west of England. At the Dissolution Wilton Abbey was granted to Sir William Herbert, afterwards Earl of Pembroke, who commenced the erection of Wilton House, the present stately pile, on the ancient site; the designs were by Holbein and Inigo Jones: here Sir Philip Sidney is said to have composed the "Arcadia;" in this house, the seat of the Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, is an extensive and beautiful collection of paintings, several of them Vandykes, and one of the finest collections of that eminent artist, and ancient marble sculpture, and also many suits of armour, several being trophies from the battle of St. Quentin, in 1557, at which an Earl of Pembroke commanded the English: the river Nadder flows through the grounds, and is crossed by an elegant bridge with an open Ionic colonnade; the park of 250 acres contains some fine cedars of Lebanon and a herd of deer. Part of the tithing of Ditchampton belongs to the parish of Burcombe, but it lies contiguous to and forms part of the borough of Wilton, and is 1 mile east from Burcombe. The Hospital of St. John, at Ditchampton, in the parish

of Burcombe, was founded by Hubert, Bishop of Sarum, in 1189, for two poor men and two poor women (who receive 8s. per week) and a prior, who is appointed by the Dean of Salisbury; the appointment is at present held by the Hon. and Rev. Canon Gordon. The names of the inhabitants of Burden's Ball, which belongs to Soth Newton, are given here. Bulbridge is another tithing and adjoins the town. The Earl of Pembroke is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is alluvial and clay; subsoil, chalk and gravel. The chief crops are wheat, barley and green crops. The area of the parish is 1,827 acres of land and 25 of water; rateable value, £7,812; the population in 1891 was 1,922, and of the borough, 2,120.

WINGFIELD (or Winkfield) is a scattered village and parish, situated on the Somersetshire border, 1 mile east from the river Frome, 2 miles south-west from Trowbridge station on the Great Western railway and 2½ south from Bradford-on-Avon, in the Western division of the county, Bradford petty sessional division, hundred and union, Trowbridge county court district, Potterne rural deanery (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Sarum, and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary is a small old stone structure, in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch, embattled western square tower with pinnacles containing 3 bells: the church has been reseated and otherwise improved, and in 1861 was enlarged by the addition of a north transept, at a cost of £110, raised by subscription, when a stained window was also placed in the chancel: there are 190 sittings. The register dates from the year 1654. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-

charge £235, average £186, net income £177, with 18 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1887 by the Rev. John Haydon Cardew B.A. of Exeter College, Oxford. There are two charities, one of the annual value of £4, for apprenticing boys; the other, of the annual value of £3, to be distributed among the poor of the parish. Midway Manor House was the residence of General Shrapnel, the inventor in 1785 of the shell which bears his name; on the pillars of the park gates are carved the names of 23 battles won with the Shrapnel shell. Wingfield House is the seat of His Honor Camille Felix Desiré Caillard, county court judge. The chief landowners are Sir Victor Lewis Houlton G.C.M.G. and W. H. Laverton esq. of Leighton House, Westbury. The soil is friable clay; subsoil, gravel. The land is chiefly pasture, but some wheat is grown. The area is 1,383 acres; rateable value, £2,347; the population in 1891 was 302.

WINSLEY CUM TURLEIGH is a civil parish constituted out of that of Bradford-on-Avon in 1895. Winsley is a scattered village, and was with Limpley Stoke formed into an ecclesiastical parish in 1846, 1 mile north-east from Limpley Stoke station of the Trowbridge and Bath section of the Great Western railway, and 2 west from Bradford-on-Avon, in the western division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division, union, and county court district of Bradford-on-Avon, deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Nicholas is in the centre of the village: it was rebuilt of stone in the Perpendicular style in 1841, and consists of chancel and nave and south porch: the old tower, containing 3 bells and a clock, which stood at the west end of the old church, now stands isolated, or only connected by a passage to the gallery of the new church: the church is not remarkable for architectural beauty, but the tower is much admired, being one of the best kind of the ancient saddle-back: the church was reseated in pitch pine in 1889: there are sittings for 250. The register dates from the year 1724. Winsley is a vicarage, with Limpley Stoke annexed, joint net yearly value of £231 and in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol, and held since 1892 by the Rev. Reginald Walter Angel Angel-Smith B.A. of Queens' College, Cambridge and surrogate, who resides at Limpley Stoke. Here is a Wesleyan chapel which will hold 80. Near the church is a small gorge in the hill side called Danes-bottom, where, according to tradition, a battle was fought between these invaders and the troops of Alfred. Atwood's charity of £17 yearly, derived from funded

property, is for distribution in money. The inhabitants are employed chiefly in agriculture and in working in the freestone quarries. The Kennet and Avon canal passes through the parish in the valley. From the hill may be seen the canal, river Avon, railway and road, running at different elevations side by side through the valley. The hill sides are clothed with woods, where, through their bold, rocky character, cultivation in places is impossible; hence the valley appears beautifully wooded, and the foliage with its varying tints presents a scene of surpassing loveliness. At Avoncliff is the pumping station of the Bradford Waterworks, which supplies the reservoir. The soil is chiefly stony brash; subsoil, freestone; the crops are barley, oats, wheat and roots. The area, including Limpley Stoke, is 3,247 acres; the population in 1891 of the ecclesiastical district of Winsley and Limpley Stoke was 1,151.

Limpley Stoke will be found under a separate heading. Turleigh or Turley, is a hamlet half a mile south-east. Parish Clerk, James Forster.

WOOTTON BASSETT is a market town and parish (formerly a borough), pleasantly situated on an eminence overlooking a large extent of fertile and highly cultivated country, with a station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 83 miles from London, 5½ west from Swindon, 24 from Bath, 38 north from Salisbury, and 31 miles by rail, 18 north from Devizes, in the Northern division of the county, Kingsbridge hundred, Cricklade and Wootton Bassett union, Swindon county court district, petty sessional division of Cricklade and Wootton Bassett, rural deanery of Avebury (Avebury portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury: it was formerly governed by a mayor, two aldermen and twelve capital burgesses, but under the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, the incorporation ceased to exist in March, 1886. The Wilts and Berks canal passes within half a mile south of the town. Wootton Bassett was at the time of the Norman accession called Wodeton, and about a century after it became the property of the Bassetts, from whom it received the adjunct to its name; it consists of a single street nearly half a mile long, near the centre of which stands the Market House and Town Hall. The town was first incorporated by royal charter of Henry VI. confirmed by Queen Elizabeth and renewed with increased privileges by Charles II. in a charter dated December, 1679, by which the corporation consisted of a mayor, two aldermen and twelve capital burgesses, with a town clerk and subordinate officers. The borough was not included in the "Municipal Corporations Act, 1835," but was scheduled by the Municipal Commissioners of 1876 as a place to which the Municipal Corporations Act might be applied, and this schedule is annexed to the "Municipal Corporations Act, 1883" (46 & 47 Vict. c. 48). The corporation has since been abolished, and its property is vested in trustees, of whom the lord of the manor, Sir Henry B. Meux bart. is one, and there are, besides, two aldermen and three elected members. The borough returned two members to Parliament from 25 Hen. VI. (1446-7) until the passing of the "Reform Act, 1832" (2 & 3 Wm. IV. c. 45). The town is lighted with gas by a limited liability company, and has been much improved. The church of St. Bartholomew is of stone, in the Early English style, and consists of a chancel, nave of five bays, and aisles, south porch, and square embattled western tower containing 5 bells, and contains an organ: in cleaning the south wall some years ago a curious painting, in a rude style, was discovered of the murder of Thomas à Becket: in 1871 the church was thoroughly restored, at a cost of between £6,000 and £7,000, by the trustees of the late Sir Henry Meux bart.: in 1877 a stained window was added in memory of the 4th Earl and Countess of Clarendon, and there are several other stained windows: in 1884 a clock was placed in the tower at a cost of £150 by public subscription. There are sittings for 800 persons. The register dates from the year 1584. In the vestry are various old deeds and a list of vicars from 1200. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge, £350, gross yearly value £511, net £310, including 92 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Sir Henry Bruce Meux bart. and held since 1893 by the Rev. William Evans Cockshott M.A. of St. Catherine's College, Cambridge, late chaplain to H.B.M. Embassy, Constantinople. Here is a Congregational chapel, with 200 sittings; a Wesleyan chapel, built in 1855, seating 200 persons; a Baptist chapel, built in 1878, with 100 seats; and Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1838, with sittings for 400 persons, with vestry attached. The Cemetery of 2 acres, with two mortuary chapels, was opened in 1871 at a cost of £2,000, and is governed by a burial board of 9 members. The Town Hall was thoroughly restored in 1889,

at the cost of Sir Henry Bruce Meux: it is a half-timbered structure, with oak staircase; the upper part forms a reading-room and a museum, and contains the ancient ducking-stool, which had been removed from here to Devizes; the lower portion is used as a market and corn exchange. Hiring fairs are held on the Tuesday before the 6th of April, and Tuesday before the 11th of October, instituted in 1836, which are nearly obsolete. A large market is held on the first Wednesday in every month for cattle. There are charities, producing about £52 yearly, left by Charles Compton in 1700, Rev. Charles Pynner, Sir Francis Inglefield Gallimores, Lord Clarendon's charity (left in 1786); and Lord Clarendon, in 1824, left £100, the interest to be given to the poor not receiving parochial relief. An ancient hospital formerly existed here, and was dedicated to St. John, and in the reign of Henry IV. was united to the priory of Bradenstoke. There is a saline spring on Whitehill Farm, in the parish, the waters of which are considered beneficial. Vasterne House, the old manor house, once a royal residence, has been restored by Sir H. B. Meux bart. and is now occupied by his estate agent, Ernest C. Treppin esq. M.A. Sir Henry Bruce Meux bart. of Dauntsey, is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is oolite brash; subsoil, clay. The land is chiefly in pasture. The area is 4,830 acres; rateable value, £16,482; and the population in 1891 was 2,200. Greenhill, 1½ miles south, and Woodshaw, 1 east, are tithings in this parish.

NORTH WRAXHALL and UPPER WRAXHALL. North Wraxhall is a village, and, including the hamlet of Upper Wraxhall and the hamlet of Ford, a parish, on the Gloucestershire border, in the North Western division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Chippenham, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. North Wraxhall is 7 miles north from Box station on the Swindon and Bath section of the Great Western railway, 7 west-by-north from Chippenham, and 9 north-east from Bath. The church of St. James' is an ancient edifice of stone in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave of six bays, north aisle, south porch, and a western tower with pinnacles, containing one bell; attached is a mortuary belonging to the Methuen family; the porch is a fine piece of Norman work; all the windows are stained: there are sittings for 250 persons. The register dates from the year 1677. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge £375, average £282, gross yearly value £400, net £300, including 87 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Oriel College, Oxford, and held since 1866 by the Rev. Francis Harrison M.A. late fellow, tutor and dean of that college. There are two Congregational chapels, one at Ford, and the other near the Shoe hamlet. Legacies left by Miss E. A. Mabbett, £224 Jubilee collection, and £300 from Mr. and Mrs. Hooper, with increments amounting altogether to £833 6s. 8d. now held by the Charity Commissioners. Mr. John Howell, a native of this village, the founder of the house of Howell and James, in Regent street, London, built two almshouses in this parish for four inmates, and endowed them with the interest of £300; the trustees are the

rector for the time being and two persons nominated by him. Upwards of forty acres of glebe are let out in small allotments to the poor. The principal landowners are Major-Gen. Lord Methuen, who is lord of the manor, Mr. Isaac Holborow, trustees of the late Mr. J. J. Bown, Mr. Charles Frankcom, Mrs. B. Holborow, Sir John Poynder Dickson-Poynder bart. M.P. and Mrs. Walmesley. The soil is corn brash; subsoil, rock. The chief crops are wheat and barley. The area is 2,185 acres; rateable value, £1,891; the population in 1891 was 371. The land is particularly favourable for sheep.

Upper Wraxhall is 1 mile south-west.

Ford is 2 miles east, on the high road from Chipping Sodbury to Chippenham.

SOUTH WRAXHALL (or Wraxall) is a civil parish formed 1895, and ecclesiastical 1846, 3 miles north from Bradford, 3½ south from Box station on the Great Western railway and 5 north-west from Trowbridge, divided into Upper and Lower Wraxhall, in the Western division of the county, in the civil parish, hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Bradford-on-Avon, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. James is an ancient and interesting stone structure in the Early Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, north

aisle, and south chapel containing several monuments of the Long family, south porch, with square western tower, containing 6 bells and surmounted by a very curious gabled turret: there are several stained windows: it was restored in 1882 and has 175 sittings. The register dates from the year 1672. The living was constituted a vicarage in 1866, average tithe rent-charge £188, gross yearly value £288, net £203, with 2 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol, and held since 1885 by the Rev. Octavius Maunsell Grindon. Here is a Congregational chapel, built in 1832, to hold 70. James Fussell and Maria Matilda

Fussell gave the sum of £1,000 on April 4th, 1874, to be paid after their decease; this amount has been invested, and now produces £25 per annum, which is laid out in coals and blankets, and given away annually on the 9th November to poor persons. Wraxall Manor House is supposed to have been built somewhere about the 13th century; the first recorded possessor was Robert Longe, in the commission of the peace 1426, and M.P. for Wilts 1433, and it has remained in possession of the Wraxall Longs ever since: the house at one period was leased to a Dr. Knight, who kept a school there, and much disfigured the house by plastering over the carved ceilings and painting the oak panelled wainscots: the present owner has, as far as possible, reinstated the mansion in its original style: the banqueting room is an Elizabethan erection, with finely carved oak panels, and a fireplace dated 1598: the grand drawing-room, enlarged during the reign of James I. contains a magnificent fireplace rising from the floor to the ceiling, which is richly traced and has pendent bosses with five small carved statuettes, the centre being supposed to represent Pan, and the others are inscribed Prudentia, Arithmetica, Geometrica and Justicia, the panelling, like all the apartments, being oak: in the old guest chamber, tradition asserts that Sir Walter Long and Sir Walter Raleigh used to smoke out of silver pipes, this being

WROUGHTON is a parish and village, on the road from Swindon to Devizes, 3 miles south from Swindon station on the Great Western railway and 9 north from Marlborough, in the Northern division of the county, in a detached portion of the hundred of Elstub and Everleigh, and partly in Kingsbridge hundred and county court district, petty sessional division of Swindon, in Highworth and Swindon union, rural deanery of Cricklade, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. John the Baptist and St. Helen, an ancient Norman structure of stone, supposed to have been erected upwards of 800 years, consists of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, south porch, and embattled western tower with pinnacles and 5 bells: there are several tablets to the Benet family, one dating 1613, and five stained windows: a new oak roof, raised to the original pitch, was added to the chancel in 1880, at a cost of £550, defrayed by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, who are joint rectors with the vicar, an arrangement made in the year 1876: there are sittings for about 450: in the churchyard is a fine old yew tree, which was in existence in the reign of Charles II. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a vicarage and rectory, tithe rent-charge £287, average £213, net income £275, with 46 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and held since 1875 by the Rev. John Richard Turner M.A. of St. Peter's College, Cambridge. Here are Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. There are charities of £17, left in 1743 by Thomas Benet and his sister, Miss Elizabeth Benet; the former left £20 annually for the parish school and the £17 (before mentioned) interest of £300 invested in land; Miss Elizabeth Benet left £200 invested also in land, which brings in about £7 yearly, and is given to poor girls upon entering domestic service. Here is a reservoir, built by a company, to supply Swindon Old and New Towns with water. The principal seat in the

presumed to be the first house in which tobacco was used in England: the second wife of this Sir Walter Long is the heroine of the legend of the "White Hand:" the blue chamber has two inscriptions, a translation of which is "Every man is the workman of his own fortune" and "To be praised by the good and abused by the bad is praise alike:" a private chapel near the mansion has been converted into a farm house. The park which surrounded the place has been divided into fields and denuded of timber, but even in its decay Wraxall Manor House tells a tale of former grandeur. Wraxall Lodge is the residence of Erlysmen Pinckney esq. J.P. Walter Hume Long esq. M.P. of Rood Ashton House, is the chief landowner. The area is 1,691 acres, and the population in 1891 was 337.

WYLYE (or Wily) is a parish and village, on the river Wylye, or Wily, with station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, 6 miles south-east from Heytesbury, 12 north-west from Salisbury and 106 from London, 125 by rail, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Branch and Dole, Warminster petty sessional division, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Wylye (Wylye portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Mary the Virgin was rebuilt in 1844, in the Perpendicular style: it has a chancel and nave, north aisle, south porch and square embattled western tower with pinnacles, containing a clock and 4 bells, 3 of which have the following inscriptions respectively: "1587, Give Thanks to God," "1697, a shield of three bells," and the third, "a cross with Ave Maria;" and contains an ancient carved oak pulpit and sounding board and lectern, with the date 1628, which formerly belonged to the old church at Wilton, and was presented by Lord Herbert: there are six stained windows: a lych gate was erected in 1885 in memory of the Rev. J. S. Stockwell (a former rector) and his wife: it will seat about 300 persons. The register dates from the year 1581. The living is a rectory, gross tithe rent-charge £488, average £370, net income £260, including 7 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Earl of Pembroke, and held since 1882 by the Rev. Henry Clark Powell M.A. of Oriol College, Oxford. There is a Congregational

chapel. The charities amount to £25 yearly, arising from land and bequests. There is a Hall used for meetings and entertainments, capable of seating 150 persons and connected with it a reading room. There are some ancient camps near here, one of which is Belbury. The Earl of Pembroke is lord of the manor and the principal landowner. The soil is light loam; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 2,287 acres; rateable value, £2,549; the population in 1891 was 418.

ZEALS is a tithing of Mere, and was formed in 1848 into an ecclesiastical parish; it is on the road from Mere to Yeovil, and on the borders of Dorsetshire and Hampshire, about 4 miles north from Gillingham station on the Salisbury and Yeovil section of the London and South Western railway, about 9 north-west from Shaftesbury, 7 east-by-north from Wincanton and 24 west from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, Mere hundred, Hindon petty sessional division, Shaftesbury county court district, rural deanery of Wylve (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St. Martin is a Gothic stone building, erected in 1846: it has chancel, nave with south entrance porch and a western tower surmounted by a fine steeple: the chancel is paved with encaustic tiles: on the north of the chancel is an organ-chamber, built in 1874, containing an organ erected in memory of the late William Chafyn Grove: there are three stained windows to his memory, which were erected by his tenants: the church is seated with open benches, and will hold 280 persons. The register dates from the year 1846. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £495, net £290, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Mere, and held since 1871 by the Rev. Leonard Ramsay Henslow M.A. of St. John's College,

Cambridge. Here are four almshouses, erected and endowed by the late William Chafyn Grove esq. in memory of his mother. There is a Congregational chapel and a British school carried on therewith; and a chapel for Primitive Methodists. Zeals House (occupied by J. P. Browne esq.) is the property of G. Troyte-Chafyn-Grove esq. the owner of the manor and principal part of the land: the mansion, about 1 mile west from Mere, is of stone, and pleasantly seated in a well-timbered park of about 40 acres. The soil is sandy; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and pasture land. The area is 1,540 acres; the population in 1891 was 470.

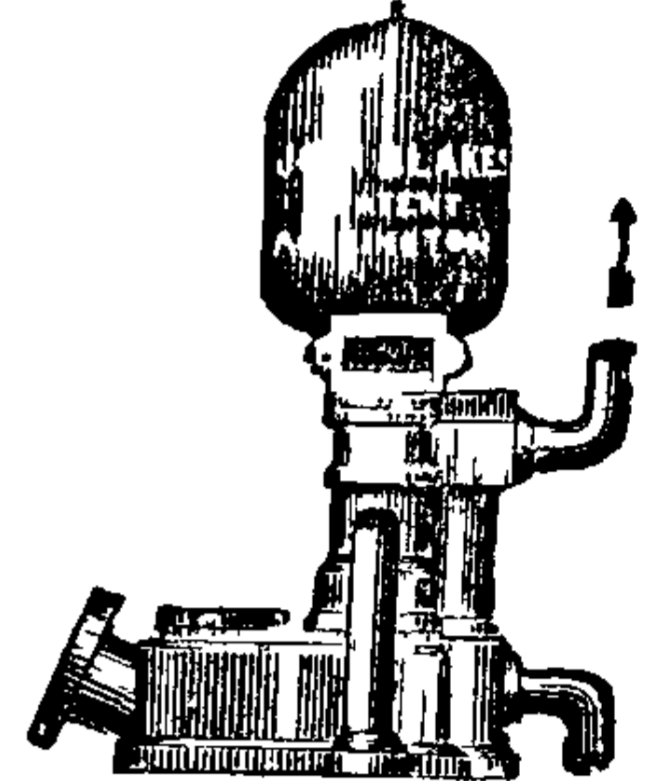


This Ram raises a portion of the same water that works it.

“As, however, your Foreign Directory appears to be a work of considerable value to British Trade, LORD IDDESLEIGH would be glad that her Majesty's Consuls should assist, as far as possible, in making it complete, and he will not object to their giving, on your application, such information of the nature specified as they may think advisable.”

THE PUBLISHERS have consequently received the greatest amount of help from the various Consuls, and a copy of the work was, and will continue to be, sent to every British Consulate throughout the world. Many and flattering letters have been received from Consuls stating and pointing out how great must be the benefit to British Trade, and how much the work was referred to for information.

The Directory is divided into **2 Sections**, Foreign and Home.

THE FIRST DIVISION embraces the British Colonies and Possessions throughout the World, and the various Foreign Countries and their Colonies to which British Manufactures are exported, arranged under the following Heads:—

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THE SECOND DIVISION embraces the names and addresses of the actual Manufacturers in the United Kingdom of the articles exported, classified in the usual way, describing as clearly as possible the specialities of each Manufacturer. Lists are also given of the Merchants and Shippers who export British Goods. Manufacturers who have either depôts abroad or Consignees, and who ship only their own goods, are indicated by a special mark. The object of the list is to show the Manufacturer who are the purchasers of his special class of goods for shipment.

This part of the Work is of great value to Buyers abroad, and also to the Merchant in this Country, by putting them in communication with the actual Manufacturers of such goods as are required abroad; while to Manufacturers it will be valuable, as showing them the Merchants and Shippers to the various Countries with which they may desire to do business.

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
